Introduction

Since 2018 St. Andrew's Church has been within the Benefice of Asum South. Consisting now of Great & Little Hampton along with the Church of Mary the Virgin, Sedgeberrow and the two St. Peter's Churches, in Bengeworth and Hinton on the Green. St Peter's Church, Bengeworth became a Resourcing Church in April 2021 and operates separately from other churches in the Benefice.

Reverend Mark Binney is now recognised as Rector of these Parishes until the end of May 2024, then the Benefice will be in Interregnum while the Diocese decides on its future.

Our Benefice is a member of the Asum Group, with the Churches of All Saints, Evesham and St. Egwin, Norton & Lenchwick.

We are in the Pershore and Evesham Deanery, of the Worcester Archdeaconry, in the Diocese of Worcester.

Our Patrons are the Dean and Chapter of Christ Church, Oxford (Hampton) and the Dean and Chapter of Worcester (Sedgeberrow), Laslett's Hinton Charity (Hinton) and The Bishop of Worcester (Bengeworth).

Constitutional Matters

The Parochial Church Council (PCC) is responsible for the

- Management of the church
- Care and maintenance of the church buildings
- Safeguarding of all other assets
- Finances and accounting records, which must disclose with reasonable accuracy the PCC's financial position.

The PCC is of the opinion that in preparing the financial statement for 2023 the appropriate accounting procedures have been followed.

Members of the PCC are elected at the Annual Church Meeting for a term of three years. They may stand for re-election at the end of this period. All members on the Church Electoral Roll are entitled to vote and to stand for election.

The election of two Churchwardens is carried out each year at the Annual Meeting of parishioners. All parishioners are entitled to vote. Churchwardens may be elected up to a maximum of six years and cannot be elected again for a period of two years.

John Martin's Charity

We again offer our grateful thanks to the Trustees of the John Martin Charity for the financial support they give us every year. Their help and generosity, ensures our church is open for worship and available to the local community for Baptisms, Weddings, Funerals and Confirmations.

Ministry Share.

Every year we are expected to pay a contribution towards the Pershore and Evesham Deanery Share which is due to the Diocese of Worcester. Following the changes to the Deanery's there are now 69 Churches within the Deanery and the amount that each church is expected to pay is now based on the benefice they fall under and the number of worshippers who attend Sunday services, averaged over 5 years. The contribution requested for St. Andrew's in 2023 was £ and following grant payments and energy cost contributions we paid £14,000.

This is money we have to find for ourselves. The John Martin Charity is not allowed to help us with this as it falls outside their remit. In previous years we have had to dip into our savings to pay the full amount. In 2024 we will have to pay as a Benefice and the total amount requested is £63,382 to be shared between Hampton, Sedgeberrow and Hinton on the Green, Bengeworth's contribution is separate from the other parishes in the Benefice.

Review 2023

Clergy, Lay Ministers & Services.

We acknowledge and understand that Reverend Mark Binney is limited with time with three Churches to minister to. With the new Service times he is able to preside at each Church for their main Service at least twice a month. We thank him for the time and effort he puts into the Church Services and other activities at St. Andrews, they are much appreciated.

We also thank Charlie for supporting Mark in his Ministry and Communion.

Reverend Patrick Wooster continues to help us with the continuity of our Services; presiding at the Sunday 8.00am and 10am Wednesday services of Holy Communion as well as Festival Services. The PCC offer their grateful thanks for his ministry to us and thank him for his continuing support of our Church.

We wish to thank Elaine Major LLM and Helen Black ALM for taking on the responsibility of the Morning Praise Services which are offered on the first and third Sunday of the month. They have been instrumental in getting Open The Book restarting at St Andrew's School and children have also had services in the church on a regular basis. Tots Group has been meeting regularly and the number of regular attendees is growing. We would also like to thank Robin and Laura Hillman who have been an essential part of the Lay Minister Team even through Robin's health issues. Robin's death on 27th March leaves a big hole not only in everyone's hearts but also in the team and we are so grateful for any help that Laura still feels able to provide.

With Mark and Patrick our Licenced Lay Ministers are continuing to offer their services and we have been able to continue offering a regular and varied pattern of worship. Plans are being drawn up to offer as many services as possible during the interregnum or until we have confirmation of what the Diocese intends to do with the Benefice.

In normal circumstances Holy Communion is available every Sunday at 8am and Wednesdays at 10am plus the second and fourth Sundays at 10.00am. On the 5th Sunday of the month Communion was held in one of the Benefice Churches at **10am.** In the interregnum it is anticipated that each church will have a monthly Eucharist and regular Morning Praise services. More regular benefice services may have to be held.

Non communion Services currently on the first and third Sundays again at 10.00am and are more geared towards children and families. These services are well attended; with children and their parents now in regular attendance. Special Services for Festivals are also covered. Rev Mark Binney and Elaine Major regularly offered Communion to those who are ill or housebound. This is a very important part of our outreach and very much appreciated by those who receive.

The Care Home team have kept in touch with Cavendish Park and Austen Court and have started services at Cavendish Park on a regular basis. We wish to thank those ministering to residents and those in the community who are unable to attend

services. We especially thank Cath Lattimer for her 'goodie bags' and kindness to those in need.

We also thank Diana Scorse for her devotion to her post as Organist and Choir Mistress. She has been a dedicated member of the Church for many years and covers most Services at St. Andrews. We realise how lucky we are to have this continuity as many churches struggle to find an organist. We also thank Charlie for covering for Diana when the need arises.

The Bell-Ringing team call us to worship most Sundays and offer their services for weddings etc. There was an issue with bees in the Tower during the previous summers which we hope has been resolved. The commitment of the Captain and ringers to St. Andrews is much appreciated. The towers are open again and ringers from Evesham Bell Tower will continue to join with St. Andrews and other teams have come to ring special peals during the year.

Building and Land.

On 15th April 2023 The Peace Garden for formally opened by Rev Binney. Sandra Capaldi from Evesham Round Table has been working with the Churchwardens to bring this area to life as a wildlife community garden. The Men in Sheds made a Peace Pole which was set into the garden and the local school children have made bug hotels and planted wild flower seeds. Shirley Lynch has given a tree in memory of John Lynch which has also been planted in the area. The next project is to provide seating for people when using the garden.

Vestry Project

The Faculty was granted in September 2023 and work has begun on clearing the vestry. The first job that needs to be tackled is the floor in the vestry and grants have been applied for.

Church Wardens Report 2023

The year started with the final visitation with Robert Jones as Arch Deacon. We discussed plans for Hampton once Mark Binney has retired. He introduced us to Sarah Dangerfield, the Area Dean, and she promised us her support in this process. He also said he felt that Andrew Spurr, Vicar of Evesham, would also support us.

We attended Pershore Abbey Church for our admission Service and Mark accompanied us.

We hosted the John Martin Commemoration Service again this year, another of Mark's last services.

The vestry project has continued to be the main focus of our work this year. Some items have already been cleared from the vestry and buyers have been found for items not related to the church. As the office will also have to be moved, when Mark leaves the vicarage we have archived any relevant documents and disposed of items found in the loft – all proceeds to the vestry fund.

In September we had the faculty granted, for the alterations and repairs to the vestry. The first job of laying pipework for the toilet is due to begin shortly. Grants are being applied for to fund other parts of the project.

It is hoped that a large percentage of the funds will be met by the sale of Fairfield Hall, the Elim Church wish to purchase this building and presently rent it from us, through the Fairfield Hall Committee. Unfortunately, they have had problems selling their existing property in Evesham town.

As we approach the interregnum and Mark's retirement, we are making plans with the lay readers and retired vicars and Caryl our administrator to ensure we have regular church services and that Funerals, Weddings and Baptisms continue. We are in regular contact with Sarah Dangerfield and the new Arch Deacon, Mark Badger as it appears that we will not be having much support from the Vicar of Evesham.
