Sea Sunday

Sea Sunday this year falls on the 12th July. It is the day when we remember the world's 1.2 million seafarers. This may seem to be very remote from Evesham but we have to remember that the sea is our nation's lifeline. Much of our food, fuel and many of the everyday items we use have been transported thousands of miles across seas and oceans to our local supermarkets.

It is tough being a seafarer and quite lonely. This makes the work of The Mission to Seafarers very important. On behalf of the Anglican Communion, The Mission to Seafarers reaches out with a message of love and hope to crews visiting the centres in 230 ports around the world. We hope to support them in this valuable ministry on Sea Sunday by our prayers and giving a financial contribution to their work.

The sea can be a dangerous place to make your living. Recently there has been an unprecedented rise in maritime hijackings. In 2008 there was a world-wide total of 293 incidents of piracy against ships, up more than 11 per cent from 2007. Last year 49 vessels were hijacked and 889 crew taken hostage, while a further 46 vessels reported being fired upon. Crews were injured and killed, and there are still 21 crew missing, presumed dead.

These are just some of the dangers that our seafarers face. They may well have left home suddenly with little provision (i.e. no warm clothes or replacement clothes), often they have no way of contacting their families, they may be isolated on board because of their language or faith, they may be poorly paid, and they may face many dangers at sea and on the docks. When they arrive in a port they can all too often be treated as hostile intruders.

So how does The Mission to Seafarers help? To take an example lonely seafarers far from home at Christmas find a warm welcome at the Mission centres worldwide. Last Christmas in Falmouth seafarers received presents donated by local churches. In Antwerp seafarers who had felt forgotten, were happy and very thankful for the presents taken by the local chaplain. In Vlissingen a host of activities were organised by volunteers and local people to keep seafarers entertained just before Christmas, and a homeward bound Peruvian crew joined in the Service of Lessons and Carols. In Melbourne seafarers were entertained to a sunny Christmas Day lunch at the Flying Angel Club, and over 500 Christmas bags were handed out to seafarers visiting Melbourne in the run up to Christmas.

Seafarers are our neighbours. We should care what happens to them. Jesus chose the men of the sea to be his first disciples. In 2009 they are launching a SIM card for seafarers to keep in touch with their families at a reasonable price.

The money was spent on new fencing - financed by Rooftop Housing Association and items of play equipment such as a climbing wall, swings a roundabout and of course a safety surface. Mr Faal, head of our link school in Gambia, spent a week with us in May and thoroughly enjoyed his visit. The whole school and many parents were at the gate to greet him and the children then put on a special welcome concert. He spent time in school, went with a class visit to Warwick Castle and attended the cluster concert. We have planned our next topic to develop the link and look forward to the future.

Just before half-term we had a whole school day called 'Think-fit Thursday'. This was a PSHE day (Personal, Social and Health Education) teaching children all about being healthy through both sensible eating and exercise. There were many different activities going on one of which was a sponsored bounce to raise money for our sheltered quiet area in the playground. The children were sponsored for how many bounces they could do in one minute and the record was 112! An excellent day which was followed by our inter-house competition the next day – skipping. Money raised from non-uniform was sent to the British heart Foundation who have provided a set of skipping ropes for us following some training that staff attended.

We had a visit from Ofsted on Tuesday 9th June to inspect the school. It went very well and the full report will be available on the internet in a few weeks time.

HAMPTON WI PRESS RELEASE -JUNE 2009

27 members and 1 visitor attended the meeting on 11 June and were welcomed by the President, Joyce Davey.

Following the reading of the minutes. Joyce encouraged members to check the green book for forthcoming events, which included a guided walk in Tyddesley Wood and an invitation from Harvington WI to join their trip to London in September to visit Buckingham Palace. Several members had attended an Open Meeting at Littleton WI the previous enioved Tuesday and had interesting talk Fairtrade on and Kenya. Joyce reminded everyone of the strawberry tea at her house on 16th June, when there would also be a bring and buy sale and a raffle. Members were asked to bring a folding chair, in the hope that it would be possible to sit outside - last year we were unlucky and it started raining just as everyone arrived!

Our speaker this month was Rosie Callaghan, a nurse with Worcester PCT, who gave us a very interesting account of the history of Evesham hospitals. In 1837, following the Poor Law Act, a two storey workhouse was built on the site of the current hospital car park. Rosie told us that families entering the workhouse were split up and sadly may never have seen each other again. An infirmary was built in 1870, followed 10 years later by a chapel for use by the "undesirable" inhabitants of the workhouse. many people are aware, this building has now been converted into a

pharmacy. There was also a sanatorium at the end of Kings Road, where any visitors had to speak through closed windows. The building of the Cottage Hospital in Briar Close, which was opened in December 1879 with 12 beds, was funded by the Evesham people of and surrounding villages. An operating theatre and nurses' home were added in 1889 and 1912 respectively and a female ward in 1927. Rosie said that originally Avonside Hospital had been erected as a temporary building in 1930 to serve as an emergency However, this was never hospital. dismantled and has since been modified to form part of Evesham Community Hospital. Between 1940 -1945 the RAF moved into the hospital and after 1945 a school of nursing was developed. It is interesting to note that in 1948 there were 287 beds, whereas by 1966 this had reduced to 60 beds. Rosie explained that earlier on there were more long-stay elderly people in hospital. In 1986 the maternity unit relocated to Worcester and in 1987 the Cottage Hospital merged Rosie showed slides to Avonside. illustrate her talk, including some of and nurses and others doctors connected with the hospital. Many of these were recognised by various members, who were able to add to the information Rosie with gave us memories of their own. Pam Wills thanked Rosie for her most interesting talk.

The competition, for a photograph of Evesham in days gone by, was won by Janet James.

Our next meeting will be at 7.30 pm on Thursday, 9 July in Hampton Scout and Guide Hall, when Barbara Maskell will give a talk entitled My Daughter's Japanese Wedding. Visitors and new members will be most welcome.
