SUMMER DAYS

August is the time for family holidays. It is also an opportunity to rest from the frantic activity of the daily routine that takes up much of the year. For most families that means the school run, work, shopping, evening activities. It is a time to rest and go away together before all the activity starts up again. It is a time of endings and new beginnings.

The Church needs a time of rest. Just as in the week we need a day of rest, so too in the year we need a month when all the usual routine comes to a halt. There is an opportunity to rest and plan for all the activities which will take us to next summer. Perhaps it is learning from nature, being in touch with God and the world. It is in such a sacred space that we grow our spiritual lives. Holidays are holy days.

In August we also plan for the activities which will start in September. At Hampton we will be starting house groups. Everyone on the Church Electoral roll will receive an invitation to join a house group near to where they live. Each house group will have from 6 to 8 persons. Bible study material will be provided but it will also be an opportunity to have fellowship together. The house group can decide upon the frequency of its meeting; weekly or otherwise. Letters will be going out in August about this.

I am reminded of a pointed story often told at sales meetings of a shoe factory which sent two of its salesmen to two of the new nations of Africa to survey the sales potential. A few days after his arrival, one of the salesmen cabled his home office:

SITUATION HOPELESS. NOBODY WEARS SHOES. RETURNING HOME.

A few hours later, the other salesman cabled:

FANTASTIC POTENTIAL. NOBODY WEARS SHOES. SEND SAMPLES.

Now you might apply this to the Church. On the one hand you might say:

SITUATION HOPELESS. FEWER PEOPLE GOING TO CHURCH.

On the other hand you could say :

FANTASTIC POTENTIAL. PLENTY OF ROOM IN CHURCH. SEND INVITATIONS.

The whole posture of the gospel is this positive emphasis. As we plan our activities let us see the opportunities rather than the difficulties of ministry. There is much to be achieved in Hampton, Sedgeberrow & Hinton on the Green. The Harvest is great!


St Andrew's Church Open Days

At the meeting held on 9th July, 28 members and 2 visitors were welcomed by the president, Joyce Davey

After the minutes had been read, Joyce thanked members for their support at the Strawberry Tea, which had helped to boost funds.

Future events which had been arranged included an Autumn Walk with a guide, around Tyddesley Woods, a walk around the gardens and grounds of Coughton Court in August, and a 'Traditional' Day Visit to Denman College in February 2010. Amongst the correspondence was an invitation from Ashton under Hill WI to an Open Evening on September 1st, with a talk on Elegant Georgian Worcester. There was also a briefing on the AGM resolution regarding a call for increased funding into the causes of the fall in the Honey Bee population. A report on the AGM from our Link Delegate was available for members to read.

The speaker for the evening was Barbara Maskell, who had come to tell us about her daughter's Japanese Wedding. After greeting us in Japanese, Barbara said that Japan had not been high on her list of places she wanted to visit. This had changed however, when her daughter, Sarah, met and fell in love with a Japanese student whilst working in a hotel in Germany. After they had been together for several months, she wanted her parents to meet him. There was some initial resistance from her father who had fought in the Second World War, but this was overcome by the young man's manner when they did meet. Inevitably, the couple decided that they wished to marry and moved to live in Japan in a tiny As Sarah did not at first speak flat. Japanese, and her future husband did not speak English, they communicated in German, which they both spoke well. Eventually a wedding date of November 3rd was set, this always being a holiday in Japan, and the wedding was to take place on one of the smaller main islands of the

country, where the groom's family lived. As Sarah's father and brother did not wish to attend the wedding, Barbara travelled to Japan on her own, accompanied by a large suitcase of gift wrapped presents, which all had to be unpacked on check-in, and scanned separately for security reasons.

Arriving safely in Japan, Barbara was taken to meet the groom's family before the Shinto wedding ceremony. This had been preceded by the necessary civil ceremony. Whilst staying with the groom's family she was introduced to some of the customs and etiquette of Japanese life. On the day of the wedding, she dressed in her 'mother of the bride' outfit, an elegant black suit and gold blouse. She had been unsure of the choice of black for a wedding, but was delighted to discover that traditionally the Japanese ladies wore black kimonos with gold embroidery for the first part of the wedding, so she fitted in completely. Barbara described the unfamiliar wedding customs, and having to copy the groom's mother to be sure of doing the right thing at the right time. Guests gave envelopes of money instead of presents, the parents had to stand up for the speeches, and were interviewed along with the bride and groom, and finally the parents were given gifts by the happy couple. After spending the honeymoon with the newly weds and two friends, Barbara reluctantly came home. She is now grandmother to two bi-lingual children, and is trying to ensure that they learn about their English heritage. At the end of her talk, Barbara was thanked by Sheila Harris on behalf of members. Members were then able to look at the many interesting items from Japanese daily life that Barbara had brought along, and also at her album of beautiful wedding photos

Great and Little Hampton Educational Charity

Annual Report April 2009

In the last financial year, we were able to support the education and training of 30 young residents of the parish. Out of the income of £2221, we made 28 general awards totalling £2050 and 2 specific awards of £50.

The Trustees, however, have been concerned for some time that the value is gradually eroding of the invested lump sum of £45,000. It has until now been in a * COIF Charity deposit account which is designed to maximise yearly income but with no capital growth. That approach works well for current applicants but we also have a responsibility to safeguard the principal and ensure that the charity will benefit the young people of the parish in future generations.

In December 08, therefore, the Trustees moved the lump sum to a COIF Charity investment fund which is designed to provide growth in capital and income over the long term.

It seemed the right time to make the move as interest rates are rock-bottom anyway and investment markets will surely rise in the long-term from their current low positions.

It means that we will have very little money to disburse in November 09 in the normal way. So we have taken the unanimous decision to suspend all distribution for the rest of the current calendar year. By 2010 the amount for disbursement will hopefully have built up into a worthwhile sum and the current instability in the financial markets may have settled.

In the light of what happens to the economy, the Trustees will by 2010 have a clearer picture as to where income can best be used to support the education and training of the young people of Hampton.

"A school which makes you long for childhood"

This year seems to have gone by very fast but has also been packed with exciting events which everyone will have read about in The Herald. I'm so pleased we are able to keep in touch with the parish in this way.

Our recent Ofsted visit provided a lovely confirmation of all the good things about the school.

The report began by saying: "This is a good school. Some aspects of its work are outstanding. Children get off to a tremendous start in the Reception Year where the provision is exceptionally good. Pupils' personal development and well-being, including the spiritual, moral, social and cultural aspects are excellent." And Parents are right to be pleased with the friendly and supported environment in which their children are nurtured and helped to flourish." The personal development and well-being of the learners was judged to be outstanding.

The report went on to say that pupils are prepared well for their future lives and that their academic achievement is good. "Standards are well above average by the end of Year 2 and particularly high in writing. Standards are above average at the end of Year 5." The effectiveness of the Early Years Foundation Stage was judged to be outstanding. "Children settle into school very well because of the highly effective attention to their welfare, the excellent induction procedures, and the welcoming and supportive environment in Reception. An excellent curriculum and exceptional teaching ensure that the children make rapid progress in their learning."

The school's curriculum and other activities to meet the range of needs and interests of the learners was also judged as outstanding. "The wide and interesting curriculum keeps children motivated and achieving all the time. Attention to the arts and sports is exceptionally good providing many opportunities for pupils to excel in these areas. Pupils are encouraged to be outward looking and to gain understanding of the wider world and the diversity within it." We were delighted that the report mentioned our music and drama productions, often staged at Evesham Arts Centre being enjoyed by many people as we believe this to be one of our strengths.

Overall I couldn't be more delighted with the inspection report. It's a tremendous achievement and a very fitting compliment to the pupils and the staff who work so well together as a team. We were particularly pleased to get outstanding judgements for the curriculum and for how well learners enjoy their education since our primary aim is for children to be happy and to learn in as interesting a way as possible. I would like to say "Well done everyone – we are very proud of Sedgeberrow School."

Can I wish everyone a peaceful and happy Summer and I look forward to writing again with our news in the Autumn.

The children have enjoyed a wealth of school trips to places far and near; Warwick Castle and Chedworth Roman Villa to support their learning in history, Birmingham Airport as a focus for learning about journeys and the Farm Shop, Ryton Organic Gardens and Over Farm to find out more about plants and how to grow them. They returned to school excited about their findings – did you know that the Romans ate snails?

We have also welcomed several visitors into school to share their expertise with the children. They have enjoyed hearing about the work of a beekeeper, a mechanic, and two police officers and proved expert themselves at asking probing questions.

garden designs by year 5. In year 4 there are four life-sized flamingos made with great application from modrock. The children have continued to make regular visits to explore the woodland and to find out more from this superb natural outdoor classroom.



After School Club has continued to flourish, running for five days a week and often with a full house. In addition a Breakfast Club has now been opened and the number of children arriving early for this is steadily growing. Watch out for the summer activity days in August. Family Learning has again been a great success and we hope for classes to resume in September.

Our thanks must go to SASSA for an extremely active term. Hard working parents have given of their time freely and have organised frequent events, culminating in a very successful fete last week.

Confirmation classes continued through the term and a few of our pupils were confirmed on Sunday 5th July.

We are pleased to welcome back Mrs Bridgeman who is currently teaching in Year 3 following the start of Mrs Collard's maternity leave. After interviews this week we are now able to announce that Mrs Thornton has been appointed and will join us in September.
