

FARMING MATTERS

It's another Harvest Festival! We need to say in our Schools and Churches that farming matters not just to us but to the world and to God who gave us this world. With the growth in population more food is needed. Likewise it is hoped that more young people will consider farming as an important and worthwhile career.

Jesus understood rural life. He used the everyday language of farming, vine-growing and shepherding to communicate truths about life and God. A favourite story is the parable of the farmer and his field; often called the parable of the sower. God is like the farmer who sows seed in a field. Some seed falls on the paths and the birds quickly eat it. Some seed falls where there are rocks, and not much soil. Plants quickly grow but soon the sun dries them. There is not enough soil and the plants die. Some seeds grow where there are too many weeds. The weeds stop the growth of the plants and they die. But other seeds fall on good ground and they grow well. The harvest comes from these plants. The seed is like the word of God. It has a good result in the lives of some people and a poor result in others.

God must understand a farmer's frustration. There is also the truth that death leads to new life: 'Unless a grain of wheat falls into the ground and dies, it remains a single grain. But if it dies it yields a rich harvest' (John 12.24). Jesus was talking both about agricultural life and his own life and death. As the seasons pass new life comes from old; part of the rhythm of life. Next year's harvest is now being prepared and worked for. Our own lives will produce a harvest.

Conversely, for many farmers there have been a series of faith challenging problems: Foot and Mouth, B.S.E., Bluetongue, flooding, bureaucracy, payment problems, Bovine T.B., to name but a few. These issues do matter to God. We must all offer prayer and support to those who find some of these problems too great to cope with. Farming is like the ministry of God in this respect, hard work and often very frustrating. A harvest is always welcome but the efforts to achieve it are little known.

This year saw the last ever Royal Show after 170 years. It is a sign of the struggle and changes faced by farmers. Very few farmers now attend such shows. They will evolve into country life shows. People care about food; there is always the hope that they will be as interested in how it is grown. Environmental concerns are becoming familiar to the public as it impacts upon daily life. One huge warning to us all is that of California's farms and vineyards. We have a picture of vast farms with huge crops. All that could be gone by the end of the century if nothing is done to slow climate change. The Secretary of Energy Steven Chu warned that if this is so "I don't actually see how they can keep their cities going". Supplying the world's food needs in the future is going to challenge us all.

SYNERGY 2010

This is the new initiative of Churches Together in Evesham and District (CTED) chaired by Aaron Walker of the Vale Christian Centre. CTED is a grouping of all denominations coming together to share our faith.

All you need to know about SYNERGY 2010

Where did the idea come from?

You may recall HOPE 2008 which was a nationwide initiative during 2008 to make people aware of the love of Jesus and the hope which he brings. Hope 08 Evesham was possibly the first time for many years where churches of different "brands" put aside their differences, concentrated on their core beliefs and worked together to demonstrate the Christian gospel in action. It was a great success - people who were from a non-church background saw churches working together in a positive way all over the nation. Only recently have we heard of local people coming into personal relationship with Jesus as a result of HOPE 08. During 2008 the churches involved each contributed a sum of money to fund the event which comprised, Christian music concerts for young people, a family day with 1000's of burgers and hot dogs being given away (many people found the concept of truly free, no strings attached very difficult to understand), various children's activities, lunches for those more mature in years and a service of celebration on the final day.

What does it mean?

Synergy focuses on the fact that "Together we can do more". For example; if two horses can pull 9000 pounds, how much can four horses pull? Surprisingly four horses can pull more than 30,000 pounds! When we as Christians set aside our differences and focus on the message of Jesus together, we can do more.

Why do it?

Whether we like it or not, people generally do not have a high opinion of church and often do not want to come to church to hear the gospel message. That leaves us with a problem: How do we tell them about Jesus? We need to present the message of Jesus in an environment where they

feel comfortable; we need to go to them rather than expect them to come to us.

When is it?

2 to 6 June 2010

Where is it?

Crown Meadow Evesham.

What's happening?

Synergy has started already with awareness events already being held. Members of the Synergy steering group have been visiting churches in the local area to share the vision for 2010. There is a men's conference planned for 26 September 2009 and women's conference for 14 November 2009.

On Saturday 1 August 2009 we gave away 1000 doughnuts and Synergy information slips to shoppers in the town. Many remembered us doing this last year and gave them a more positive opinion of Christians.

For the main event in 2010, there will be two youth focussed events with themed concert nights, a children's holiday club, Dan Magness the football freestyler world record holder will be there, Dougie Dug Dug (Doug Horley) and his children's team, Mark Ritchie who uses humour to communicate the gospel and many other events yet to be

The event will be funded differently to HOPE 08. We honestly believe that there is money out there to fund this. Our vision is to present a high quality event which is honouring to God. Rather than funding coming directly from churches, we are asking Christians within churches to commit to the event by paying a sum per month towards it. Your church treasurer has details. Mothers' Union Meeting on 8th September 2009

The meeting began with prayers.

Ida welcomed our guest Mavis Firkins and our new members Pat Bayliss and Pat Smith. Mavis is the Vice President of the Worcester Diocese MU.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and deemed to be a true record.

Matters Arising:

Ten members of our group went to the Pershore and Evesham Deanery tea. Jenny Perkins has volunteered to take on sourcing and sending cards to the baptised children. This will start as soon as a list of names is prepared. The marriage anniversary cards have not yet been sourced. The MU will have the middle section of a new notice board in church, which will be situated at the back of the church. It will be magnetic so no pins will be required! If members wish to receive a magazine they will need to sign up and pay the £9 fee by 30th September. This will consist of 6 issues a year plus three Families Worldwide publications. Enrolled members will be asked for their £16 fees towards the end of the year: however members can pay in instalments if they wish.

Next month (October) there will be an outing consisting of a hotel meal and trip to a living history museum in South Wales. The living museum is an old manor house where a king stayed overnight during the civil war. The house and gardens have been kept exactly as they were at this time. The servants are dressed up and they provide a guided tour, speaking in 16th century English. As an example, they tell you how to sweep the chimneys: two boys would go up on the roof and drop

down two geese, which would flap around inside the chimney and clean it! The museum has a lovely tea room, spa, swimming pool, shop and gardens. The hotel is owned by Pam Eustace's sister. Pam told us a story about her brother who built up the hotel.

No meeting in October. The next is on 10th November - this is our first birthday.

Mavis Firkins talked about a new project that has been set up to help women with poor backgrounds. For example, they may have no formal qualifications, been in an abusive relationship, suffer from poor self esteem, or had difficult or traumatic childhoods. Approximately 100-150 women are helped each term.

The centre provides many types of help, depending on individual circumstances. For example, there are courses on literacy and numeracy; there is counselling, role play, and a crèche.

Members can help by mentoring and listening to the women, offering refreshments, or manning the office. Training will be given. CRB check will be necessary. Also, toiletries are required for pampering sessions. A visit can be arranged, in pairs.

Ida thanked Mavis for her informative talk. The meeting ended with refreshments.

HAMPTON WI SEPTEMBER 2009

The September meeting was our traditional Harvest Supper, which was as usual, well attended.

There was a reminder

that there were only two more months left for bringing items for the Christmas Shoeboxes which Mrs Groves is putting together. She had been raising money towards the cost of delivering the boxes, by running a bookstall at meetings.

Recently we had enjoyed a wander around the grounds and walled garden at Coughton Court, and an open meeting at Ashton-under-Hill. Future outings to Westonbirt, Denman College, Tyddesley Wood and Redditch were discussed.

Our speaker for the evening was Amanda Davies, the 'Lady Thatcher'. She began by describing her practical working gear, especially her tough 'rigger' boots with metal along the instep to give stability on ladders. Thatching appeared to be one of the oldest forms of roofing, and Amanda had brought along the two types of material most commonly used, wheat straw and water reed. The wheat straw is more local to this area. Water reed (known as Norfolk Reed) came originally from East Anglia, but is now in short supply, with most of it being imported.

Amanda demonstrated the method of thatching by tying the straw or reeds into bundles, securing through to the joists with special nails, then fastening in place with withy hoops. One layer of thatch would be laid, followed by another, and so on up to the ridge line. The final ridge line would finish the roof off, and is often trimmed with a decorative feature.

Amanda is one of a very small minority of female thatchers in this country, and she appears to enjoy her job immensely, despite it being very physically demanding.

Following Amanda's talk, we enjoyed our Harvest Supper, followed by an array of desserts provided by members.

Our next meeting will be our Annual General Meeting on October 8 2009.

HINT OF THE MONTH Pumpkin Soup

900gr/2lb Pumpkin, peeled, deseeded and chopped

1 Medium Onion, chopped

½ teaspoon Turmeric

100gr/4oz Canned, Chopped Tomatoes

1 teaspoon Sugar

A pinch of Grated Nutmeg 568ml/1 pint Fresh Milk 275gr/10oz Natural Yogurt 2 teaspoon Corn flour


Chopped parsley and Natural Yogurt to garnish

Put all the ingredients except the corn flour, parsley and yogurt in a saucepan, bring gently to the boil then cover and simmer for 15 to 20 minutes until soft. Liquidise or mash very thoroughly and return to the pan, Blend the corn flour with most of the yogurt and stir gently into the soup, reheat but do not allow to boil. Serve with a sprinkling of parsley and a swirl of yogurt.
