PEACE and WAR

Seasons of Mist and Mellow Fruitfulness
Close bosom-friend of the maturing sun;
Conspiring with him how to load and bless
With fruit the vines that round the thatch-eves run;
To bend with apples the moss'd cottage-trees,
And fill all fruit with ripeness to the core;

An extract from: Ode to Autumn by John Keats

Keats captures the joyfulness of the English countryside - it could have been written here in Evesham! How easy it is to see the work of God, and also the work of those who love God. What a lovely image this is, of a God who loves us, provides for us (Give us this day our daily bread) and cares enough about us to want us to enjoy life, with the company and joy of friends and neighbours. I imagine that God heaves a sigh of relief to see that all is well here.

Sadly, what we see here in Evesham is not the same the world over; for we are terribly aware of tension and war in other parts of the world, where people cannot live in harmony with others. When we think of Remembrance Sunday it is easy to call to mind those who lost their lives in the First and Second World Wars, but we should not neglect the 200 or so British soldiers who have perished in Afghanistan. The following extract from The Times puts it into context:

Britain's frontline troops in Afghanistan are being killed at such a rate that, were it to continue, one in 36 would not survive a six-month tour of the country.

So how do we respond to this? Do we have a duty of care for those not in our parish? Edmund Burke coined a pertinent saying: *Evil Flourishes When Good People Do Nothing.* If 'good people' are doing nothing does that make them any better than those, 'bad people' who are doing something? The quote should be, 'Evil flourishes when good people wait.'

In the events of the Holocaust, the evil or "bad people" were the Nazis, the people who were carrying out the orders, and taking pleasure in killing innocent people. With the Nazis being the bad, that then would make the "good people doing nothing" the citizens who weren't the victims of massive genocide and anti-semitism. The non-Jews, non-Roma, non-disabled, non-African, non-homosexual, the said 'approved Germans,' the socially accepted, the other countries who weren't directly involved; those were the 'good people'. Because of their waiting, 6 million people suffered. When WW2 ended fewer than 300,000 Jews were saved. Evil flourished. And Evil will continue to flourish as long as good people wait.

So we must, as a parish of good people, do our best to further peace in the world. There are many ways we can do this: we can pray and ask God to help, we can write to our MP and demand that our voice is heard, and we can sign a petition to improve conditions for our armed forces, organised by the British Legion - http://www.britishlegion.org.uk/campaigning/the-legion-manifesto/take-action.

Finally we can ensure that there is harmony in our own family and community. Perhaps it is time to forget and forgive a quarrel with a friend or neighbour.

The lady smiled in her wistful way and answered "This is Remembrance Day, and the poppy there is a symbol for the Gallant men who died in the war. And because they did, you and I are free That's why we wear a poppy, you see."

"I had a boy about your size, with golden hair and big blue eyes, and he loved to play and jump and shout. Free as a bird, he would race about, as the years went by he learned and grew, and became a man, as you will too."

"He was fine and strong, with a boyish smile, but he'd seemed with us such a little while. When war broke out, he went away I still remember his face that day. I'll be back soon Mum, so please don't cry."

"But the war went on and he had to stay and all I could do was wait and pray. His letters told of the awful fight. (I can see it still in my dreams at night) With the tanks and guns, and the cruel barbed wire, And the mines and bullets, the bombs and the fire."

"Till at last, at last the war was won and that's why we wear a poppy, son."
The small boy turned as if to go,
Then said, "Thanks lady, I'm glad to know, that sure did sound like an awful fight,
But your son, did he come back alright?"

A tear rolled down each faded cheek:
She shook her head, but didn't speak.
I slunk away in a sort of shame,
And if you were me, you'd have done the same,
For our thanks, in giving, is oft delayed,
though our freedom was bought and thousands paid.

And so, when we see a poppy worn, let us reflect on the burden borne by those who gave their very all when asked to answer their country's call that we at home in peace might live. Then wear a poppy! Remember and give!

Feeding The 50,000

Chandiamma Moligeri was born a 'weeder'. As a dalit woman, she worked for most of her life in others' fields, in exchange for grain or small amounts of money. Struggling to feed her family and with little chance of escaping the legacy of the Indian caste system, she lived unnoticed on the margins of society.

But out of the most severe poverty came an incredible story of rich generosity...Chandramma's life was turned around when she joined a local women's group, or sangham, supported by Christian Aid partner the Deccan Development Society (DDS). These women cleared an area of drought-prone wasteland and farmed it, using traditional methods learned from DDS. Slowly, they restored life to their land - and then brought the celebration of an enormous harvest to their whole community.

In sanghams across the Medak district in Andhra Pradesh, DDS now works with 5,000 women. These women have decided to do something amazing. From their excess harvest, they have helped to feed 50,000 of the poorest people in their communities. And the women are now passing on their knowledge. DDS is training them to use film and radio to raise awareness and campaign on issues such as climate change. Now their skills and passion are helping communities throughout Andhra Pradesh to share in the joy of harvest.

As for Chandramma, she is no longer reliant on others for handouts. Instead, she has become a landowner herself. 'I am the only person I know who has passed on land to her daughters,' she tells us with a twinkle in her eye.

16th Once again the ladies of the WI at Eckington supplied a most delicious afternoon tea, very much appreciated by members after spending an hour or so browsing around Pershore.


23rd Worcester Age Concern sent Maggie Parker today to give a talk on Healthy Eating and Exercising. All her advice was taken on board by her audience.
