

Love is.....

St. Valentine's Day this year falls on Sunday. The Church's traditional commemoration of Valentine has nothing to do with lovers! It is concerned with two separate people called Valentine. One was a 3rd century Bishop (Valentine of Terni) who was martyred at Rome in 273. The other (Valentine of Rome) was a priest martyred for his faith in the mid 3rd century. So where did the custom of sending cards and flowers declaring love come from? Obviously not from the two Valentines. It seems that John Donne may be responsible with his marriage song for Princess Elizabeth's marriage to Frederick V, Elector Palatine on St. Valentine's Day in 1632. Donne's marriage song merged the religious commemoration of Valentine with love.

Love is doing very well in the 21st Century. Cards abound in all the shops as the expression of deep feeling between one person and another. It is nice to be told that someone loves you. Indeed judging by the sharp increase in wedding bookings many relationships blossom into a binding commitment of love.

If you had to select one reading about love it is more than likely that you would select Chapter 13 of Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. Paul challenges them to think again about the meaning of love. He talks about a Christian understanding of love which is more embracing than the love of one person for another, deep though that love may be, because at the back of Paul's mind is the knowledge that God so loved the world that he gave his only beloved son that we might have life. This is the love that is patient and kind, that is not jealous or conceited or proud, not ill-mannered, selfish, irritable, does not keep a record of wrongs, not happy with evil, never gives up, and never fails in faith, hope and patience. It is eternal, it is pure. In other words that is quite some kind of love.

It is no coincidence that the earliest form of the Holy Communion was called a love feast. God's love is open to all. We find it easy to put up barriers in relationships. We love some people and dislike others. God loves those whom we find it very difficult to love. Perhaps as we grow older love fades like a dim image in a mirror. We can be cynical and lose the ability to love and be loved. Children seem to have a more natural appreciation of love. The child who would trust an adult more closely resembles the love of God because of its purity. But think of the cost of this purity when children have been abused. Think also of the cost of the cross. Is it not a symbol of love for us all that God so loved the world that he gave his only son?

Valentine's day is an opportunity to think about the meaning of love. Why not join us on that day at Church for a special celebration?

Lent in the Benefice

Choice

There is a 4th Century story about a young king who went to visit a saintly desert monk, one of those shrivelled-up men who filled the desert around Cairo after the age of persecution. The young king looked at the monk and said, 'What a wonderful sacrifice you are making!' The monk replied: 'Your sacrifice is much greater!' 'What do you mean?' asked the shocked King. 'Because I have renounced the passing world, while you, young King, have renounced the eternal world.' This is the message of the Church each Lent. The choice is presented to all of what is *really* important, just as Jesus offered it to Jerusalem. The Church can only do what Jesus did – present the offer. The response to that offer is out of the control of the Church, just as it was beyond Jesus. It's an

offer that can be refused, and often it is in the midst of busy and rushed lives, that the Church can only make the offer.

When faced with times of crisis or challenge, many people turn to self-help for support. But what about Christians: How can we find strength not merely in self-help but in God's Help?

A Way through the Wilderness is a five session course which explores God's promise to comfort his people as they struggle through life's wildernesses.

Women's World Day of Prayer

The first Women's World Day of Prayer Services were held in 1926. There had been Prayer Days held by various women's groups of different Christian traditions since the middle of the 19th Century. These were mainly in Canada and America, but in 1926 the American Group sent their Service to women's Groups and partners in Mission in other countries and WWDP was born. It was brought to this country by Scotswoman Grace Forgan in 1928, when she found out about it while attending a missionary conference in Jerusalem, and the first service in the UK was held in Scotland in 1930.

The Women's World Day of Prayer is always held on the first Friday in March and starts with Services at dawn in Tonga and ends 36 hours later as the sun goes down back in the Pacific in Samoa. The Service, which is ecumenical, is arranged and distributed by the women of a different country each year, and this brings freshness and diversity relating to the particular culture of that country. This year it is Cameroon. It is a wonderful feeling to know that during that day the same prayers and praises are encircling the world in a great wave.

The services are usually organised by the different churches in a town on a rota basis. In Evesham, last year it was in Bengeworth Church, and the year before it was organised by the Baptists. This year it is being organised by the women of the Catholic Church in Evesham and will be on FRIDAY 5th MARCH.

It is always a good opportunity to socialise with other Christians. AND it is not restricted to women. Anyone will be most welcome, please put this date in your Diary. It normally starts at 2pm.



HINT OF THE MONTH

Garlic Mushrooms

50g/2oz	Butter
900g/2lb	Button Mushrooms wiped and quartered
2	Shallots, chopped
2	Garlic Cloves, crushed
1 tbsp	Fresh Rosemary
2	Bay Leaves
150ml/¼ pt	White Wine
2 tbsp	Tomato Paste
300ml/10 oz	Passata
1 tbsp	Fresh Thyme
	Parsley Sprigs to garnish

Serves 4

Melt the butter in a pan, add the mushrooms, shallots, garlic and rosemary, then cook for 3 minutes, stirring, until coated in butter.

Add bay leaves, wine and tomato paste to pan, and stir until well blended.

Pour in the passata and add the thyme. Bring to the boil, then reduce heat and simmer for 15 minutes or until the mushrooms are tender.

Remove bay leaves before serving. Garnish with parsley sprigs.

Supporting Families: Our Policy Principles

The Mothers' Union promotes the well-being of families. But in a world where rhetoric about family life abounds, what are the principles which guide the Mothers' Union's engagement in the political debates affecting families around the world?

The following is our first principle; others will be in subsequent magazines.

1. The Mothers' Union believes that strong families, in all their diversity, make strong communities

Most people are part of a family. Families may all look and act very differently from one another. They may have different sizes, structures, cultures, lifestyles and ways of interacting. Family members may not all live under one roof and some may get on better with each other than others. It is in the interest of all to value the contribution that families make to society and to ensure that social structures are family friendly.

Christmas Greetings from John and Una Crowe – December 2009

The Revd. John Crowe was Vicar at St. Andrew's Hampton from 1972-1977. He left Hampton to go as Team Rector to Leek where he stayed for several years, leaving to take up an appointment at Dorchester Abbey where he stayed until his retirement.

We have always kept in touch with John and Una since their days at Hampton and they send an "annual review" of their life each Christmas. We thought this might be of interest to those parishioners who remember him.

John and Frances Smith

“For the last 2 years or more life has been a real roller coaster, a real mix of ‘ups and downs’ and 2009 has been no exception. We started on New Year’s Day by journeying out to Tangier to begin 2 months stay at the Anglian chaplaincy. It was a fascinating and challenging time – full of surprises! Our flat was about 20 minutes walk up to St Andrew’s Church, widely recognized for its beauty; painted by Matisse, it is one of the most instantly recognised churches in art history. As chaplain, John was responsible for the Sunday worship, visiting the congregation and UK prisoners at the notorious Tangier prison. Europeans made up only a third (about 20 at that time of year) of the congregation, the rest being Nigerians desperately wanting to get over to Europe. The British Consul was excellent with practical help over the prison when there were complaints from the prisoners, and with UK visitors who got into various scrapes. Una was invited to play the organ on Sundays and also was able to visit to visit and help the Mother Theresa sisters at their mothers and babies centre nearby.

On the ‘downside’ – January and (early) February were the coldest and wettest months in living memory! Apart from a couple of days out in Tangier it was not possible to see much of the coast line nearby. The main line was washed away and out of use for a couple of weeks at the end of January. Tangier’s traffic is horrendous and everyone has to be careful over possible mugging and theft.

However, on the ‘up side’ – we had generous hospitality from many of the expats and ourselves arranged hospitality in the flat for people from the congregation and so got to know people quickly. We were particularly grateful to Christopher Gibbs whom we had known since we moved to Dorchester on Thames. Christopher was much involved in the Abbey. He is now Churchwarden at St Andrew’s Tangier and entertained us at his beautiful villa overlooking the Straits. We also made contact with the Catholic Church, other denominations and local Muslims.

On our return home to Leominster it was a great shock to find that Una was in need of treatment for a recurrence of her cancer. What followed has been 9 months of chemotherapy which has just finished. We await a CT scan after Christmas and the results early in January. Una has surprised the doctors by doing so well in defying any side effects until just recently. She has kept positive and active throughout – helped by many prayers and positive thoughts aimed in her direction.

We had a lovely family holiday in Borth in September where we celebrated John’s 70th birthday. Monica was able to juggle her part-time teaching so that she could join us.

Part of the year included the sudden, unexpected death of John’s niece, Rachel which was a devastating shock. We all went to her funeral in St Luke’s, Charlton – a very moving and memorable service which helped turn a ‘down side’ event into a positive celebration of her life”


