NEW LIFE

Easter eggs are such lovely things! Now do I mean the eggs which come from the chocolate factory or the eggs which are laid by a hen? As it happens I like both of them! One of them has the potential of new life and one of them does not. The imposter is obviously the chocolate egg. It is not capable of ever giving life to a baby chick.

Easter is about new life. After a hard winter we can see all the signs of springtime forcing their way through. The bulbs bursting into yellow daffodils, leafless trees starting to bud, gardens showing signs of vitality. On the farm the fields are full of baby lambs and lots of rabbits! All these things are used as symbols of new life.

It is at this time that we think about what happened to Jesus. How on the Friday his disciples knew that he had died and this was the end. His body was placed in a tomb and a large stone rolled across the entrance. Very early on the Sunday some women came to the tomb and found that the stone had already been rolled away and that the tomb was empty. Mary Magdalene was standing there crying when suddenly she saw a man standing there and slowly realized it was Jesus. He who had been dead was now alive. The cave which had been a tomb was now full of new life. This is why the Easter egg reminds us of Jesus.

Just as Spring is about new life and growth Jesus promised to give new life to everybody who believes in him. This means everybody, you and I. Life can be changed. We need not be stuck in our ways. It sometimes seems that nothing changes. But it does! The spring follows from the winter and everything changes in time.

We might contemplate the times in life when we have felt trapped by something without any hope. It is then that God has rolled away the stone and released us. This can happen to a community as a whole or even a nation. Life changing events do happen and the power of God to transform is ever present. Dietrich Bonhoeffer wrote these words in prison. 'We must persevere in quiet meditation on the life, sayings, deeds, sufferings and death of Jesus in order to learn what God promises and what he fulfils. One thing is certain: we must always live close to the presence of God, for that is newness of life; and then nothing is impossible for all things are possible with God; no earthly power can touch us without his will, and danger can only drive us closer to him.'

So let us give thanks for the joy of Easter that we might celebrate life in all its redeeming fullness.

The confirmation service will take place at St. Peter's Bengeworth on Sunday 30 May at 4pm.




A day trip to Drayton Manor Park and Zoo is planned for the Easter holidays, to help the group who all live near each other to make lasting friendships.




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

News from Hinton

SPRING IN HINTON

What glorious sunshine we are enjoying at the moment, although by the time you read this it might well be cold and wet. Robert Browning's famous line "O to be in England now that April's here, "is all very well, but surely March is far more exciting, being the harbinger of Spring.

The Vernal Equinox, the first day of spring, occurs on March the 20th this year. The build-up to this time brings so many flowers, signs that life continues as it has done for ages, but when you see the celandines, snowdrops, aconites, daffodils, and primroses, to name but a few, do you ever wonder why they are almost exclusively white or yellow and that the more garish colours come out later?

For many years on the farm, Spring did not mean flowers, seeing buds on the hedgerow, catkins or hearing the first lark song (we think that was today, March 7th incidentally). It was the harvesting of the first crop that had not been planted in the Autumn, such as sprouts, leeks, cabbage etc. It was RHUBARB. The early variety Timperley would be fit to pull by mid month, even without a protective covering of straw. Most of this is still in the future, but the nicest thing about the future is that it always starts tomorrow!

Matter arising:

Deanery Festival: This will be on 25 March at St Andrew's Church at 7pm. Refreshments have been offered. Readers and greeters have been organised. There will be enrolments and welcomes during the service. John, Jenny and Alan will be enrolled during the service.

There will be visitors from Uganda coming to this deanery in the summer. In order for this to take place we need to help raise funds. Ida suggested that the collection from the Deanery Festival go towards this.

A summer outing is planned in May, to include lunch. More details to follow.

Betty spoke about prayer partners. Everyone in the group should have one.

Charlie has been appointed on the Faith and Works Committee for the Diocese.

Revd Mark began his talk on church vestments. He spoke about how the church had used colour from mediaeval times to the reformation. However, after the reformation the purer tones were popular. In some cases preference for the protestant remains, for example painting walls white, and also by having black and white vestments. Mark demonstrated this by showing his robes; black cassock and white old English surplice with a black stole. Even recently some people did not like the use of colour. In Victorian times colour started to come back into fashion, evident in stained glass windows. Black is used for funerals – but Mark uses purple.

Stoles have come back into fashion and have various symbols on them. Gold is only used on Easter and Christmas Day. Mark explained the use of the chasuble and how the stoles are hidden when worn under it. He also talked about how the vestments are matched to the altar frontals. The current collection in St Andrew's is showing signs of wear, and new vestments and frontals will be needed. He suggested that the Mother's Union might want to consider donating a white frontal for weddings and baptisms.

Ida thanked Mark for his talk and the meeting ended with refreshments.

HAMPTON WI - March 2010

After welcoming members to the meeting, held on 11th March, the President, Joyce Davey, confirmed events which would be happening during the year. During March, ten members were attending a 'Day at Denman', when they would be given a tour of the Denman College facilities. Several members were attending the Annual Council Meeting at the Three Counties Showground, and we would be entering a team for the Group Quiz to be held at Badsey at the end of the month. In addition some members were going to see the EODS production of 'Honk', a musical about the Ugly Duckling. During the rest of the year, there were plans for several possible outings, including a Worcester Walk, visits to Hidcote Gardens and Charlecote Park in the summer, and Webb's of Wychbold nearer Christmas. It was hoped to hold a lunch at The Kings Court Hotel at Alcester in lieu of an August meeting.

As we had been forced to cancel our New Year Dinner in January, due to the bad weather, it was agreed that in 2011, this would be held in February. There was some discussion as to venues and whether to have a lunch instead of a dinner.

Our speakers for the evening were Michael Worton MBE and his wife Maureen, who are the driving force behind the charity, Chernobyl 2000. Michael began his talk, by reminding us of some of the details of the Chernobyl disaster, which took place nearly twenty four years ago in April, 1986. Although Chernobyl itself is in the Ukraine, because of the direction of the prevailing winds on that day, most of the radioactive dust was blown towards the neighbouring country of Belarus. This contaminated the whole country to varying degrees, and the population have been living with the consequences ever since, and will continue to do so for untold years to come. The contamination of the land means that

the food the people eat is contaminated, and the incidence of cancers has increased. In particular thyroid cancer has increased by 4000%.

Michael and Maureen first became involved when their son took in a couple of little girls who came with a party from Belarus for a holiday, and they got to know the interpreter who was accompanying the party, who had come to England for a month. Michael explained that a month here would add two years on to the life of a child, as they would have a chance to eat uncontaminated food, and drink fresh milk, which they can't do in their own country. From speaking to the interpreter, Michael and Maureen realised what a dire situation most people were in, and six months later Michael decided to drive to Belarus with two vans of necessary supplies. After being arrested at the border they eventually arrived in Minsk, the capital.

From those small beginnings the charity has grown, and now convoys of large trucks make the journey, packed with anything from washing powder to hospital beds, or school equipment to disposable nappies. All items are donated, along with money, as it costs about £2000 per truck to make the journey. Evesham Hospital had donated hospital beds and bedside cabinets when one of the wards was being refurbished. Everyone involved with the charity donates their time, and it seems to be a full time job collecting donated items from all over the country.

Michael and Maureen finished by showing a DVD of one of the convoys leaving Bredon Hill Middle School. The charity has strong links with the school, and pupils have accompanied some of the convoys. Members were left full of admiration for the couple, who have done so much to help improve the lives of the people of Belarus.

The next meeting will be held on 8th April, when Louvain Beer, will give a talk on Food Safety in the Home, entitled 'Honey I've Poisoned Your Lunch!'

Visitors are always welcome at our meetings. These are held on second Thursday of each month in the Hampton Scout and Guide Hall, beginning at 7.30pm.

St. Andrew's C.E. First School

At St Andrew's we have been working very hard since September to improve our standards in Writing in all subject areas. We are doing this by spending time learning phonics-based spelling in each class every day and having targets to work towards for every child in Key Stages One and Two. We also have lots of support for children who need any extra help with writing including Teaching Assistants and Teachers working with small groups, 1-1 Tuition for selected pupils and new ICT software to support writing development. Our progress since the start of the year shows that all of the effort made in this area is beginning to pay off and as a school we are getting better at Writing within all areas of the National Curriculum.



Our school offers a wide range of extra-curricular activities which provide all pupils with opportunities to practice and learn beyond the school day. We currently have clubs for ICT, Gardening, Dance, Football and Golf, as well as an After School and Breakfast activity club throughout the week. During the school day we provide music tuition for flute, violin, ukulele, guitar, recorder and ensemble. Through external providers we are also beginning to successfully develop our sports skills - as demonstrated when we won the Evesham School's Rugby Tournament at St. Egwin's last week. Well done Year 5!

We have invested in a lot of new computer equipment this year. Each class has access to a group set of computers with a range of software and an Apple iMac for media editing in every class. There is also a whole class ICT area which allows timetabled access to a PC for each child. Our teachers are learning how to use Apple MacBooks to plan and deliver media-rich interactive lessons and we are currently upgrading our Interactive Whiteboards in each class to next-generation widescreen SmartBoards. We will be starting to use a new Learning Platform to support parents in using ICT with their child and enabling home access later in the year for all families who attend St Andrew's.

HINT OF THE MONTH

Cheese and Celery Fritters

Makes approximately 16

8oz Cheddar Cheese

6 sticks of celery

2oz Self Raising Flour

Salt and pepper to taste

Pinch of nutmeg

2 Eggs

Butter or oil for frying

Finely grate the cheese into a bowl.

Scrub and chop the celery very finely, and add to the cheese.

Stir in the flour, seasoning and nutmeg.

Bind together all ingredients with the beaten eggs, to form a fairly soft dough.

Heat the butter or oil in the frying pan.

Drop the mixture in teaspoons into pan, and fry on both sides until golden and cooked through.

Drain on absorbent paper, repeat using remaining mixture.

Serve HOT.
