Intimidation or silliness?

It was very disappointing to hear about the Christian nurse who was ordered to remove her crucifix from around her neck at work. Mrs Chaplin lost her Employment tribunal case in April against the Royal Devon and Exeter NHS Trust. The tribunal said that the Trust had acted in a reasonable manner, and that the wearing of a cross was not a "mandatory requirement" of Mrs Chaplin's faith. It seems that a Muslim can wear a hijab which is certainly not a requirement, but a Christian cannot wear a crucifix which is the most important symbol of Christian faith. The tribunal has ruled that a cross ban is not discrimination. It is hard to understand how they could have arrived at such a ridiculous conclusion.

This may be one case but you have to add it to all the other attempts to reduce the influence of Christianity in this country. It seems that a vocal minority have taken it upon themselves to make Britain a secular society. At every opportunity they attempt to erode the religious heritage of the U.K. The renaming of Christmas by local government is a prime example. Also on forms the 'Christian name' is replaced with 'forename'. On buses there are adverts for atheists saying 'There is probably no God'. Even the year is now prefixed Common Era (CE) rather than the Year of our Lord (AD). Now they have started on Easter.

We decided at Hampton to buy some Holy Week posters this year for the congregation to display as well as using them in the Good Friday Procession of Witness through Evesham. At the same time we purchased a flag version of the poster. All it said is "**This is Holy Week**" and had a large image of the crucifix on it. Everybody thought it added something special to the most Holy Week of the Christian year. However Wychavon District Council Planning Department objected to our flying the crucifix from the flag pole. They had received a complaint about it and said that we needed to apply for planning permission for an advertisement if we wished to fly our Holy Week flag again!

On May 6th we will all have an opportunity to vote for the future of our country. As Christians we should stand up for our faith and question the candidates about where they stand on these issues. We can do something about the drive towards a secular Britain if we support the candidates who display Christian values. The majority of people in this country profess to being Christian. It is important to use that voice in decision making rather than saying nothing. Politics is too important to be left to the fanatical few or those who have wounded our country by the erosion of all that is good.


Hampton Parish Annual Meetings

HAMPTON WI

After welcoming everyone to the April meeting, the President, Joyce Davey, began with the news that the Hampton team had won the Group Quiz on 31 March and the four team members - Sybil Frost, Liz Rodway, Cathy White and Jean Wright - were congratulated on their success.

Joyce then went on to give a brief resumé of the Annual Council Meeting, which had been held at the Three Counties Showground on 24th March. This had been an excellent day. Members had been asked to give any bras they no longer wore in aid of the Worcestershire Breast Cancer Unit and photographs were taken of us all waving bras of varying colours and sizes in the air. The guest speaker was Bob Flowerdew, who gave a very interesting talk on organic gardening with lots of tips for keen gardeners.

Our speaker for the evening was Louvain Beer, with a talk entitled Honey I've Poisoned Your Lunch. Louvain said at the outset that a lot of the things she was about to tell us were largely common sense and probably things we already knew. However, although cases of food poisoning following eating in restaurants were falling, the incidence in people over 60 was rising. Young children and older people were more vulnerable and therefore the points were worth repeating. In particular Louvain stressed the importance of washing hands thoroughly before handling food (singing Happy Birthday twice was a guide as to how long this

should take), and ensuring food was stored and cooked at the correct temperature. Fresh and pre-cooked food should be stored and prepared separately and she reminded us that cooked starches, such as rice, pasta and potato were very susceptible to bacteria and if being prepared in advance, perhaps for salads, they should be cooled quickly and refrigerated.

Louvain mentioned three methods of possible contamination, namely physical, in other words 'foreign bodies'; chemical, such as improperly cooked kidney beans and certain types of mushroom and biological, for example salmonella or e-coli. Food intolerances and allergies also needed to be taken very seriously and it was always advisable to err on the side of caution.

Some people were confused by the Best Before and Use By dates on food labels. In clarification, Louvain explained that the Use By date was a legal requirement on foods which could cause harm if they were eaten after the stated date, whereas Best Before referred to quality rather than safety and it was really a question of common sense as to whether the food was still good to eat.

Sheila Harris thanked Louvain on behalf of members for her interesting talk and the very useful reminders on food safety.

The competition for a food safety poster was won by Ann Davis.

The next meeting will be our Resolutions Meeting to be held on 13 May at the Hampton Scout and Guide Community Hall, when new members and visitors will be very welcome.

HINT OF THE MONTH

Green Peppers Stuffed with Rice and Cheese

4 medium sized Green Peppers

100q/4oz Rice

100g/4oz crumbled Lancashire Cheese or grated Cheddar Cheese

½ tsp Made Mustard

150ml/1/pt Fresh Single Cream

25g/1oz Butter

Salt & Pepper to taste

Serves 4

Cook the rice. Cut the top off each pepper and remove the seeds and fibres, put them in a pan, cover with boiling salted water and simmer for two minutes, lift out and drain upside down on kitchen paper. Combine the cooked rice with the cheese, mustard and cream, season to taste, fill the peppers with this mixture, stand them in a heatproof dish, cover with foil and bake in a moderate oven for fifteen minutes.
