

# **SEA SUNDAY 2010**

The recent controversy about BP chief executive Tony Hayward sailing in the Solent at a time when his company has a crisis in the Gulf of Mexico, reminds us what a dangerous place the sea can be. With an oil slick the size of Scotland, the Deepwater Horizon well is already America's worst environmental disaster and BP to date has failed to fully control the spill. The contrast between the two locations is dramatic. One presents us with the worst effects of commercial exploitation on the sea whilst the other highlights the natural beauty of the sea that attracts many to it for holidays and sailing.

It is perhaps like dumping millions of tons of rubbish on Washington whilst at the same time sitting in your own perfect English garden. No wonder people in America are exceedingly upset. And yet the commercial exploitation of the sea involves us all as consumers who demand our fuel and energy needs to be met. With oil and gas having to be extracted from deep wells under the sea there are greater safety risks as technology pushes at the boundaries as to what is possible. At the same time the size of ships has increased and therein the possibility of dramatic future disasters.

The sea has always been a difficult environment to tame. We have had to develop skills to sail on it and large engineering projects to mitigate the effects of coastal erosion or the rise in sea level. But there will always be an element of unpredictability about it. The sea can be a focus for the best of human endeavour as well as revealing the worst aspects of commercial exploitation.

This year has been designated by the United Nations International Maritime Organisation as the 'Year of the Seafarer'. It is good to think about those who are part of a hidden industry that is rarely heard about or seen unless there is a disaster. On Sea Sunday we have that opportunity as a matter of faith. Over 90% of our trade is by ship. As an island nation we should be more conscious of the sea. I remember looking at a coastal parish and asking someone if they had seen or read a magazine called 'Coastal'. "Why on earth would I want to do that" came the reply. They had no idea of any relationship between their way of life and living by the sea. And no it was not Tony Hayward! At the same time, although we might not live in a coastal area we ought to learn more about life at sea. If it all remains hidden from us we can expect there to be greater environmental damage and abuses of human labour. The sea is a vital important part of God's creation. We ignore these things at our peril.

# Back to Church Sunday 26 September 2010



#### THOMAS CRANMER

In June we read about the Book of Common Prayer, the first prayer book in English. The person who wrote most of it, Thomas Cranmer, was born on 2nd July 1489. He became Archbishop of Canterbury in the reign of Henry VIII, however Thomas lived in dangerous times for anyone who took an interest in religious matters.



When he was a young man people were executed for smuggling Bibles in English into this country.

Thomas worked to replace the old style of worship with a closer interpretation of scripture. God's word was available to most people for the first time: people were at last allowed to read the Bible in their own language. More people were able to read and write although it still wasn't something that most people could do. But Thomas Cranmer was part of that beginning that we take for granted every time we say our prayers now.

# St Swithin's Day -15 July

St Swithin's day if thou dost rain For forty days it will remain St Swithun's day if thou be fair For forty days 'twill rain na mair

Traditional rhyme

Saint Swithin was a Saxon bishop. He was born in the kingdom of Wessex and educated in its capital, Winchester. He was famous for charitable gifts and building churches. His feast day is 15 July and his emblems are rain drops and apples.

Swithin was chaplain to Egbert, the 802-839 king of Wessex. Egbert's son Ethelwulf, whom

Swithin educated, made him bishop of Winchester in 852.

Only one miracle is attributed to Swithin while he was alive. An old lady's eggs had been smashed by workmen building a church. Swithin picked the broken eggs up and, it is said, they miraculously became whole again.

Swithin died on 2 July 862. According to tradition, he had asked to be buried humbly. His grave was just outside the west door of the Old Minster, so that people would walk across it and rain fall on it in accordance with Swithin's wishes.

On 15 July 971, though, Swithin's remains were dug up and moved to a shrine in the cathedral by Bishop Ethelwold.

Miraculous cures were associated with the event, and Swithin's feast day is the date of the removal of his remains, not his death day.

However, the removal was also accompanied by ferocious and violent rain storms that lasted 40 days and 40 nights and are said to indicate the saint's displeasure at being moved. This is probably the origin of the legend that if it rains on Saint Swithin's feast day, the rain will continue for 40 more days.

# Great and Little Hampton Educational Charity: Annual Report - June 2010

The Trustees' decision to switch the fund from a Deposit to an Investment account in December 2009 and suspend distribution of grants for one year appears to be working out very well. You may remember we were becoming concerned that grants to future generations of Hampton students would be worth very little if we did not safeguard, as best we could, the value of the income from our original deposit balance of just over £43,000.

We are very pleased to announce that the investment fund is valued on June 10 2010 at £51,123.91. Furthermore our income from dividends last year was £2244 which is more than we were, on average, getting in interest from the deposit account.

The good news is that from this September, therefore, we are able to resume our usual distribution of educational and training grants to the young people of Hampton.

Applications are invited for grants, available at the discretion of the Trustees for students under the age of 25 on 1 September 2010 who reside in the area of the Parish of Great & Little Hampton.

# Cotswold Line Promotion Group Rail Excursion from Evesham to Minehead

The Cotswold Line Promotion Group (CLPG) has arranged for a special excursion train to Minehead on Saturday 18 September. The train is currently expected to depart Evesham at around 06.40am arriving at Minehead at 12.15pm. It will depart for home at 16.55 should get back to Evesham at around 21.20.

The route is via Oxford, Swindon and Westbury to Taunton and thence over the heritage rails of the West Somerset Railway (WSR) with splendid hill and coastal scenery. There will be opportunities for steam buffs to ride on steam and heritage diesel hauled trains of the WSR at discount fares.

All seats must be reserved in advance and booking will commence on 1 July for members of the public. Standard class fares will be £27 for adults and £12.50 for children aged 5 to 15 years with under-fives free. #### **HAMPTON WI**

Our President, Joyce Davey, welcomed members and visitors to the meeting on 10 June, and after dealing briefly with business items, introduced our speaker for the evening, Joyce Payne, who spoke to us about her life as a court dressmaker. In the time of Louis XIV, Joyce explained, all dressmakers were men and if women were caught making dresses, their tools and even half-finished garments could be confiscated. However the king's mistress petitioned the King, saying that, for reasons of modesty, ladies would prefer to have their dresses made by members of their own sex and, thanks to her powers of persuasion, the King agreed and women were allowed to become dressmakers. Joyce brought pictures of the elaborate designs which were fashionable in the French court at that time. Men, too, were very interested in fashion and well shaped legs were considered so important that they would put padding in their stockings to enhance their calves. In the days before pattern books and catalogues, dolls made of wood or wire were dressed to demonstrate the current fashions.

More recently, shortages at the start of the war led the government to ask top couturiers in London to devise styles of clothing which would use the minimum of fabric; for example, no turn-ups, waistcoats or pleats were allowed and boys would wear short trousers until they were about 14 years old.

To become a court dressmaker it was necessary to have been trained by one of the top 10 couturiers and Joyce's family moved to London to enable her to train with Mattli, where she spent 3 years as an apprentice before becoming a hand. Every girl had her own cottons, there were different colours for each stage; the original lines, corrections, fitting and final corrections. This meant that anyone could pick up a garment and know precisely which stage had been reached. When Joyce felt ready for a change she applied to Norman Hartnell and was offered a position in the sleeve room, but she

preferred to continue working on complete garments and so decided not to move at that time. Later she did change employers and gained experience with lace work and tambour beading. After marrying and having children Joyce went into teaching. but when she was widowed she started her own business and has made dresses for many well-known people, including Moira Shearer, Vivienne Leigh, Katie Boyle, Gipsy Rose Lee and a Coronation dress for Lady Sefton. Joyce also worked for Simplicity, ensuring that the paper patterns actually worked. She now does soft furnishings and is volunteering for conservation work with the National Trust. Ann Evans gave the vote of thanks to Joyce for a most interesting and informative talk.

Our next meeting will be at 7.30 on 8 July at the Hampton Scout and Guide Community Hall, when Sheila Tremellen will talk on Kennels to Buckingham Palace via TV. New members and visitors will be made most welcome.

## HINT OF THE MONTH

# **Raspberry Bread Pudding**

568ml (1pt) Fresh Milk 3 Eggs and 2 extra yolks

150ml (5 fl. oz.) Fresh Double Cream 75g (3oz) Sugar

7½cm (3in.) Cinnamon Stick 1 tsp Vanilla Essence 6 Slices of Firm White Bread – crusts removed 225g (8oz) Raspberries

40g (1½oz) Butter

#### Method:

Gently heat the milk, cream and cinnamon stick together until bubbles appear around the edge of the pan. Leave to stand.

Spread one side of the bed with the butter, and place buttered side up in a greased 1 litre (2pt) ovenproof dish.

Beat eggs, yolks, sugar and vanilla essence together. Remove the cinnamon stick from the milk and stir the milk into the egg mixture. Pour over the bread slices.

Place the dish in a large baking tin, filled with water half way up the sides of the dish.

Bake for 45 – 50 minutes at 190°C, Gas Mark 5, until lightly set.

Serve with raspberries. Enjoy!
