

GROWING THE CHURCH

Last year 10,000 people were added to the Church in one day. This happened here in the U.K. through Back to Church Sunday. It is a very simple mission idea based on one person inviting another to Church on a particular Sunday. The last Sunday in September was chosen because it tied in well with the idea of a new year, a new start and chimed with 'back to school'.

It all started in Manchester back in 2004. Robert Hicks, an entrepreneur, emerged with an idea about a Sunday when people could try church again. With Church numbers in decline, he wanted to encourage churches to invite people to come to church on one Sunday when a specially warm welcome was guaranteed. Since then the idea has been adopted by every single diocese in the Church of England except one. It has also spread to other denominations.

This year Back to Church Sunday is on the 26th September. We are taking part and would like to make it a success. It does mean that EVERY member of the Church should invite one or more guests to Church on the 26th and sit with them. Invitations will be given out at the start of September. Sadly many people did not invite anyone to Church last year. If we are to grow the Church then we do need everyone to take part.

Does Back to Church Sunday work? It does if an invitation is made. No training is needed. All you have to ask is "Would you like to come to Church with me?" Why not give it a try this year and think about someone who you would like to invite. Research indicates that 2.9 million people are likely to go to Church in the future if they are asked. That's 6% of U.K. adults. Perhaps God is already asking them and all they need is your help!

There is a lot that each Church can do to create the environment for growth and the detail of this will vary between Churches. Considerations are the Church's advertising of services, notice boards, heating, appearance of the Church, toilets, provision for children, how newcomers are welcomed, seating, hospitality, welcome cards, follow up, parish magazine etc. The list might seem endless depending on what has already been achieved. It all depends on the desire to grow.

If everyone invited someone and they became part of the congregation then 25 people would be 50 people. The next year 50 people would be 100. It is possible to grow the Church. That is how the Church started out and it is now rediscovering how simple evangelism really is if we all play our part.



OBERAMMERGAU 2010

In 1633 the Black Death was widespread across Europe and many people died. The people of Oberammergau produced the first performance of the "Passion, Death, and Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ" as a thanksgiving that noone in the village had died from the plague.

The play has been performed as a thanksgiving every ten years up to the present date. Initially it took place in the local village church cemetery, but later the enormous theatre of today was built to accommodate the thousands of people who began to flood in from all parts of the world to see the performance which offers a wonderful opportunity for meditation. The performance lasts for six hours from 2pm to 11pm with a three hour break for dinner.

"Tableaux Vivants", or as we would call them, "Living Images", from the Old Testament occur before many scenes and appear to illustrate parallel incidents with events in Jesus' life. Examples are the Ten Commandments, and dancing round the golden calf preceded the scene of the expulsion of the merchants from the temple; the Paschal meal before the Exodus from Egypt before the Last Supper; Daniel in the lions' den and the mocking of Job came before the trial and mocking of Jesus; the sacrifice of Isaac came before the Crucifixion.

The text of the play and the emotionally stirring music have been revised and modified over the years to produce what could almost be described as an oratorio.

Oberammergau is a very small German village and yet there is one amazing fact about this very polished, professional performance – the participants, be they actors, singers, musicians, producers, or stage hands, have to be born in the village or have a minimum of twenty years' residence.

It is difficult to describe feelings about the play. The presentation was so good it made us feel as if we were participants in the events taking place before our eyes. Seeing the very strong portrayal of the last week in the life of Jesus was very different from reading the written word.

Summing up, there are not words to describe such an overwhelming experience, and it will never be forgotten.

HAMPTON WI – July 2010

At the meeting held on 8th July, 27 members and 2 visitors were welcomed by the president, Joyce Davey.

After the minutes had been read, Joyce thanked members for their contributions of goods for the Chernobyl 2000 charity, which had been collected and passed on last month.

Those members who had taken part in the walk around Worcester, led by Betty Ballard had enjoyed it very much, and it was hoped to arrange a further walk to the Battlewell, later in the year.

Joyce read some extracts from the report sent by Gilly Aspey of Ashton under Hill WI, who had been our delegate to the AGM in Cardiff in June. Gilly painted an expressive picture of an inspiring event, when 4000 women descended on a very cosmopolitan city. Amongst the items reported at the meeting, were an increase in membership in the first five months of 2010, and the setting up of new Institutes in many different locations, including prisons and places of work. The delegates had enjoyed a good speaker, in Tim Smitt of the Eden Project, and had been entertained by the choir, 'Men Aloud', who provided a very good finale to the day.

Future events which had been arranged included Cream Teas at the President's home on 30th July, a lunch at the King's Court Hotel, Alcester, and a visit to Charlecote Park, both in August. A visit to Croome Park was arranged for September. Looking ahead to 2011, it was hoped to organise a day visit to the National History Museum of Wales, at St Fagan's, near Cardiff.

The speaker for the evening was Sheila Tremellen, who gave a talk entitled 'Kennels to Buckingham Palace via TV'.

Sheila had been rescuing, rearing and re-homing abandoned puppies over a 20 year period, when she had re-homed over a thousand puppies. She had purpose built kennels and isolation unit at her home, to cater for the puppies who arrived both singly and in litters. The most she had had at any one time had been three litters, with a total of twenty three puppies. Sheila also followed up on the progress of the puppies once they had been re-homed, to check up on them, and would have them back if new owners could not cope.

The main focus of Sheila's talk, however, was the recognition for her good work, by being nominated for an award for her work in animal welfare. This award was voted for by viewers of the TV programme 'Animal Hospital', hosted by Rolf Harris. Sheila was one of three finalists, and was filmed at work with the puppies, with the film being shown on the programme. At the awards ceremony in London, Sheila was delighted to be the winner. Her journey to London and getting to the ceremony was beset by several crises, which Sheila described in a very entertaining fashion. Following the award, Sheila was thrilled to be invited to the Royal Garden Party at Buckingham Palace in 2005, and even more delighted to be awarded an MBE in 2006. She described the investiture ceremony vividly and then showed us her medal.

The President thanked Sheila for a very entertaining talk on behalf of members.

The competition for Best Picture of a Four Legged Pet was won by Ann Evans.

The next meeting will be our Harvest Supper on September 9th, at 7.30pm in the Hampton Scout and Guide Hall. Visitors and prospective members will be very welcome

HINTS OF THE MONTHS

Salad for August - Cool and Minty

4oz (110g) Cucumber – Cut into 1" (25mm) slices 2 sticks Celery – chopped 4oz (110g) Black grapes – halved and pips removed 2oz (55g) small crispy Lettuce leaves 1 red Apple – cored and sliced 1tbs (15ml) Lemon juice 2tbs (30ml) Olive oil 2tbs (30ml) Vinegar Fresh Mint leaves 1tsp Caster sugar 4 Smoked Mackerel filets or cold meat of your choice Lemon slices to garnish

Method

Place the cucumber, celery, grapes and lettuce in a large bowl. Toss the apple slices in the lemon juice to prevent them discolouring and add to the bowl. Place the remaining ingredients in a small bowl and whisk together, pour the dressing over the salad vegetables, arrange on a serving dish with the fish and garnish with the lemon slices.

For September – Plum Caramel Pudding

Slices of stale Bread Ripe Plums Butter Brown Sugar



Method

Grease a pie dish with butter and scatter with sugar then line it with half slices of bread. Half the plums and remove the stones, place a layer in the dish, sprinkle over a little sugar. Add further layers, finish with a top layer of bread, spread with butter and bake in a moderate oven for 1 hour. Turn out onto a warmed dish and serve with cream or custard.
