

COVENTRY BLITZ REMEMBERED

Seventy years ago on the 14th November over 500 German bombers commenced Operation Moonlight Sonata, their target was Coventry. At the centre of England Coventry was regarded as one of the finest preserved medieval cities. In one terrible night most of it was destroyed.

Coventry had already experienced some small raids. But this was different. Hitler wanted revenge for the RAF bombing of Munich. The raid started at 7.20pm and did not finish until 6.15am. A firestorm had been started in the centre of the city which was not intended to spare anything. The glow could be seen 150 miles away. An early loss was the Cathedral of St. Michael. By the morning 4,330 homes had been destroyed and three-quarters of the city's factories had been damaged. The people had hidden themselves in cellars, crypts and air raid shelters. It is remarkable that the number of dead was not higher; 554 people died and 865 injured. This was still a great shock to everyone as nobody had experienced bombing on this scale before. The Germans coined a new word for it 'coventrated'.

King George VI visited and toured the devastation on the 16th November. On the 20th November the first mass burial took place at the London Road Cemetery. A week later there was a second mass burial. At the Cathedral a stonemason saw two wooden beams lying in the shape of a cross and tied them together. A replica of the wooden cross replaced the original in 1964 and stands in the ruins of the old cathedral on the altar. Another cross was made of three nails from the roof truss of the old cathedral by the Provost and is known as the Coventry Cross of Nails.

The night of the 14th November was not the last time that Coventry was bombed. Two raids lasted between six and eight hours long in Easter week 1941. Coventry suffered 41 raids in the war with the last being in August 1942.

After the war the rebuilding plans included Europe's first pedestrian precinct and the new St. Michael's Cathedral. As you walk through the city there are some notable remnants of the old medieval city. Sadly they are all too few and only serve to remind us of what was lost on the night of the 14th November 1940. Let us remember before God, and commend to his sure keeping: those who have died for their country in war.



1st Hampton Guides

Hampton Guides, along with all other Guide Units in the country have celebrated the finale of the centenary year, and the launch of the next one hundred years of guiding. Billed as a 'once in a lifetime event' the closing ceremony took place at Twyford, the highlight of which was the remaking of the promise at ten past eight on Wednesday 20 October (20:10 20/10 2010). Members of guiding, including past and present members, who could not be at the event were invited to make their promise at this time, to unite guiding throughout Great Britain.

Throughout this special year Hampton Guides have faced many challenges; making pottery, climbing a rock wall, making and flying kites, having a street party, learning street dance, going up the Abbey Bell Tower, an evening walk and campfire at Bredon Hill, and of course, camping!

Operation Christmas Child

As part of my experience with Hampton Guides, last year I helped at the local centre for Operation Christmas Child. This year, I would like to invite you all to make a contribution towards giving a child in a developing country a shoe box of presents. There are leaflets available from Hampton Church, from the Vicarage, and online at:

http://www.samaritans-purse.org.uk/.

It is very simple, and easy to make a difference. You will need to find an old shoe box and cover it with Christmas wrapping paper. Then you need to decide if your gift is for a boy or girl, and choose an age range: 2-4 yrs, 5-9 yrs or 10-14 yrs. Finally you need to add some presents and a donation of £2.50 to cover the cost of sending your box to your child.

Suggested items to include are toys (teddy bears, jigsaw, yo-yo, etc), educational supplies (felt pens, colouring book, notepad, stickers etc), hygiene items (toothbrush, toothpaste, hair brush etc),

and other items including sweets (sell by date to be at least March 2011), gloves, scarf, hat etc.

Please do not include chocolate, medicines or vitamins, toy guns or knives, no clothing (only those listed above), no glass containers, no liquids (including blow bubbles, shampoos, bubble bath, toiletry sets or aerosols, no dangerous objects like razors or scissors, no novels, or anything of a political nature. Finally, no knitted stuffed toys without a CE mark.

Our five hundred and eighty second Dedication Festival took place on Tuesday, 16th September. There was as announced three Celebrations of the Holy Communion, the total number of Communicants showing an increase on last year, we are glad to say.

In the afternoon there was a Parochial tea in the Rectory garden, at which a goodly number, namely sixty parishioners sat down.

There was a Choral Evensong at 8pm, at which the sermon was preached by the Rev. W.B. Monaham Rector of St Swithin's Worcester. There was a good congregation, but there were many in the Parish who through there absence missed the opportunity of hearing a magnificent and impressive appeal to the hearts and consciences of those present, which we think that the few who heard it will forget.

The weather was what it almost always is on our Dedication Festival, namely cloudy, making those who were responsible for the tea, very undecided as to whether it ought to be in the garden or in the School however it held up, and to the satisfaction of everyone we were able to have it in the garden. The collection in at Evensong was quite unworthy of the congregation being only 16 shillings and 3pence there being no coin larger than a shilling. On the whole the Festival was quite a success and worthy of the occasion.

HINT OF THE MONTH

Root Vegetable Mash

Serves 6-8

500g **each** of celeriac, parsnips and carrots, peeled and cubed

50g butter (melted)

Salt and ground Black Pepper

50g Gruyère or Mature Cheddar Cheese (grated)

Method

Place vegetables in a large pan, cover with cold water.

Bring to the boil, then cover, reduce heat and simmer for about 20 minutes, or until tender.

Drain vegetables and return to the pan, add the melted butter and season to taste. Mash until smooth, then place in an oven-proof dish, and sprinkle with the grated cheese.

Cook at Gas 5 /190°C for 20 to 30 minutes, until the cheese is golden brown. Serve immediately

This recipe can be prepared a day in advance:

Make the mash and keep chilled overnight, then add the cheese and cook as above.

St. Andrew's C.E. First School

Last month the Head Teacher reported that the school had been inspected by Worcester Diocese. The full report has been received and the school and governors are very pleased with the key findings which are highlighted here.

The distinctiveness and effectiveness of St Andrew's First School as a Church of England school are good.

St Andrew's is a good church school where children thrive in a secure family atmosphere built upon clear Christian values. The children are industrious and enthusiastic about their school and fully enjoy the many opportunities provided for them.

Established strengths

- The enthusiastic and able staff team led by a visionary headteacher
- The courteous and thoughtful pupils of the school
- The school's strong and fruitful relationship with the parish community

The school, through its distinctive Christian character, is good at meeting the needs of all learners.

St Andrew's ethos is built around a very strong, pupil centred dynamic where learners are encouraged to adopt roles of responsibility and leadership. All children demonstrate a keen aptitude for work and learning, the positive attitude of the staff providing a strong model for the children's own attitude to their work. They speak highly of the staff - a comment from Key Stage 1 '...we love our teachers...', being typical of the things that the children say.

The good impact of 'Values for Life' recently adopted by the school are reflected in the way that these children are able to discuss their roles in the context of the school, for example clearly identifying the importance of worship in the setting up of a 'Green Day'. Parents appreciate the valuable role of the Christian/Church status of the school in establishing its strong moral and value driven ethos. The explicit faith context of St Andrew's is understood by the children who speak openly of the school being special because it is a place for '...learning about God.'

The impact of collective worship on the school community is good.

The children participate enthusiastically and are able to discuss the particulars of worship such as prayer, with appropriate understanding for their age. Children also have a growing appreciation of the pattern of worship in the Anglican Church. The imaginative involvement of the incumbent in worship is leading this development and forming a creative bridge between worship in school and parish. For example the introduction of 'Open the Book' - where members of the Church community lead worship based on dramatised Bible stories, has had an excellent impact on the children. This is especially so because of the 'Open the Book' team's inclusion of pupils in their presentations; children are very enthusiastic about taking part.


The effectiveness of the leadership and management of the school as a church school is good.

The headteacher's clear vision and able leadership has led to improved confidence among the governors and the staff team over the last year. In recent terms the relationship with the local incumbent has also grown to provide substantial stimulation to the development of the school's distinctive Christian character.

Parents are very supportive of the school. They mention specifically the strong links with the church community and especially the school's 'open door' policy which makes them feel fully valued as part of the school community. Parents also noted that the opportunities to attend church and the provision of confirmation classes have an important impact on their children.
