

CHRISTMAS AND THE PRESENT

Christmas has come early in the high street this year. Perhaps it is a sign of how desperate shops are for business. The recession seems to be affecting more households than ever and combined with the cuts in public spending there is little appetite to go on a spending spree. There may be hard times ahead. That said, most people will still splash out on food and gifts. It is difficult to cut back on the expectation of a good Christmas. If it is tough for those with money then spare a thought for those who are struggling to cope.

For the past few decades the commercial development of Christmas has known no limits. It has made for a season of excess upon excess. Now that the financial bubble has burst it is a fresh opportunity to restore something of the simplicity of Christmas. After all Jesus was born in a stable not in the Hilton. The feast is a celebration of the ordinary made special by God. Many adults remember with affection the Christmas of their childhood; a less material age when Christmas was very different from the rest of the year. If you have little then a time when you have special things brings wonder and excitement into the celebration. You do not need to be rich to enter into the joy of Christmas.

On the 6th December we are reminded of St. Nicholas the patron saint of bankers and children. He teaches us about the spirit of giving rather than receiving. He started out in life with great wealth and then gave it away. The practice of hanging Christmas stockings is based on his giving away bags of gold and placing them through open windows into socks that had been hung to dry (ever wondered why you used to have a bag of golden chocolate coins in your stocking!). Here we have the virtue of showing kindness to people we don't know without any expectation of reward. Do we send our cards and presents in the same spirit?

St. Nicholas demonstrated how we should live. His faith in Jesus inspired him to be kind to people. It is a good question to ask, what type of person do you wish to be? At a time when the economy has suffered do we measure success as the amount of money that someone has hoarded or the use to which it has been applied. There is something of St. Nicholas in that television programme 'The secret Millionaire'. We can be generous as well. There is much joy to be found in giving.

I wish you a kind Christmas that in the chill of recession we might recover the true spirit of Christmas that makes us leap for joy. As you look back on 2010 it is history, 2011 is a mystery, but today is a gift, that is why it is called the present.

Operation Christmas Child

Thank you to everyone who took part in Operation Christmas Child. Approaching thirty completed shoe boxes were collected from 1st Hampton Guides and St Andrew's Church; they included contributions from the Youth Group and the Mother's Union. Hampton Guides took on the challenge of going to the local collection centre to check both our own boxes and some of the other thousands which flood in each year. The Guides were checking that there were no liquids, for example, blow bubbles or shampoo. The boxes are travelling to Swaziland, children there are taught to fear wild animals so any toy animals like lions, snakes, bears had to be removed. The boxes are security sealed and sorted into gender and age. They are placed in large cartons, ready to await transportation. The boxes are carried by lorry to Liverpool, from there they are loaded onto ships; each container can carry as many as eight or nine thousand shoeboxes. The journey will take approximately six weeks, and Swaziland is the furthermost destination for shoe boxes. Therefore, they are the first batch to leave the depot.

The response from this area has been outstanding, and the gifts will be very gratefully received by children who otherwise may not have anything at all this Christmas.

I would like to add my own personal 'Thank You' to all who supported this event.



News from Hinton

I have often wondered if anyone keeps back copies of the Herald. Please let me know because if no one does I can recycle last year's, instead of desperately looking for inspiration, which usually causes a large amount of perspiration!

Earlier this month Julie and I took a trip abroad, during which we paid a visit to the Hassan II mosque in Casablanca, claimed to be one of the largest religious buildings in the world and containing the world's largest minaret. It took three years to build commencing in 1992, comprising entirely local materials, and built by three thousand local artisans who worked 'round the clock'. The tall building is decorated with cedar woodcarvings, and floored in pleasant cool marble; beautifully cool to the feet when we took our shoes off. It will hold a congregation of 20,000 – just think what the collection would amount to!! However, of that number provision is only made for 6,000 ladies - in two galleries virtually out of sight of the men. Mixed congregations mean the concentration on the prayers may be less than total!! The reason for the disparity in numbers is that the ladies are expected to be too busy at home cooking, cleaning, child minding etc, whilst the men when not working have time to spare (seems they've got it about right then!). A most interesting and innovative feature of the building are two very large sliding panels in the roof, which on occasions of maximum attendance and extreme heat mean that a change of air is possible and quite probably essential.

Ida welcomed our speaker, Mrs Jean Swift, who was to give a talk on the subject: 'A Pair of Jesus Boots'.

After the minutes of the previous meeting had been read and agreed to be a good record, members were reminded of several items:-

MU Holy Communion always follows the day of our meeting, normally the second Wednesday of the month.

For the next meeting members were asked to bring a favourite Christmas Reading and we will sing some carols.

Our speaker started by reflecting on the busy summer. She read a piece about how we touch one another's lives. She talked about her early school days; eventually she qualified to teach, and sat at the teacher's desk! To remind us of our own childhood, she played the music for 'Gentle Jesus, Meek and Mild'

Jean next read an extract from Joyce Grenfell about a Free Activity Period. This summed up her experience of teaching. She went on to teach children who were unable to attend school due to hospital treatment, or illness, from which they were unlikely to recover. One 16 year old who had a prosthetic leg, found it difficult at first. One day the school sent him something to read – A Pair of Jesus Boots. They did eventually find the funny side!

Jean did lots of music for pupils with a Special Educational Need. She brought along some castanets! They loved it! She spoke about one girl who was in a coma, who later remembered Jean telling her stories. She also showed us Big Bird, which was lovely for children who could not speak. Mary was enraptured with Big Bird, and although she could not speak she was able to move a single finger.

Jean taught one of the Beatles! It was Paul McCartney when he was in year 6. She played 'She Loves You' in memory of Darren, who had multiple problems. He loved the Beatles, but had a negative view of himself. Jean taught him that his smile was a gift that he gave to others, and that he was very, very, special.

Jean showed us a bell, representing AFIA: 'Away From It All', holidays given by the MU to special cases. Billy went to Butlin's with AFIA and bought Jean the bell. Jean loves her treasures from her children!

Rebecca was a strong young lady, she had a parcel from Billy Connelly, and she did not believe it to be from him. She was asked to write about a character from the book The Snow Goose. Her writing was about a goose flying high, as the soul flies to heaven.

Jean finished by relating a story about a lady who planned her funeral, including the direction to have a fork in her right hand when she was in her coffin. If you want to know why, ask a member of our Mother's Union!

Ida thanked Jean for her talk and before we had our refreshments Pippa read us this poem:

Take the time to work, for it is the price of success.

Take the time to think, it is the source of strength.

Take the tune time to play; it is the secret of youth.

Take the time to read, it is the seed of wisdom.

Take the time to be friendly, for it brings happiness.

Take the time to dream, for it will carry you to the stars.

HINT OF THE MONTH

Macaroni Cheese with Leeks and Cherry Tomatoes.

Serves 4

150g/5oz Macaroni or Penne 1 Leek thinly sliced 15g/½oz Margarine or Butter 25g/1oz Plain flour 200ml/7oz milk ¼tsp English mustard 50g/2oz Grated Cheddar Cheese 12 Cherry Tomatoes

Method

Cook the macaroni in boiling water for eight minutes, add the leek and cook for a further four or five minutes until the pasta is tender.

Meanwhile put the margarine, flour and milk into a non-stick saucepan place over a low heat and whisk constantly until a smooth sauce is obtained. Remove from the heat and add the mustard and most of the cheese, check the seasoning.

Preheat the grill and warm a baking dish.

Drain the macaroni and leek and add to the sauce. Thin with a little of the cooking water if needed. Pour into the baking dish, top with the Cherry Tomatoes and the rest of the cheese. Grill for five minutes until golden brown and piping hot. Enjoy.
