Love is in the air

It can't have escaped your notice that Valentine's Day is fast approaching. The shops are filled with chocolates; Jewellers have special necklaces and rings, and florists have ever more beautiful displays of red roses and the like.

I wonder if you still send your loved one a card for Valentine's Day. I know that many younger people do, but as love blossoms and deepens through the years it is important to continue to treat your loved one. During a marriage service I often say "every day is a wedding day!" This means that, regardless of the number of years you have been together, each day must have an element of care and tenderness.

In his book, 40 Ways to say I Love You, James Bjorge tells a story about Ole and Olga. Ole and Olga lived on a farm. Olga was living on a starvation diet of affection. Ole never gave her any signs of love, and Olga's need to be appreciated went unfulfilled. At her wit's end, Olga blurted out, "Ole, why don't you ever tell me that you love me?" Ole stoically responded, "Olga, when we were married I told you that I loved you, and if I ever change my mind, I'll let you know."

While love cannot be explained, it does need to be talked about. It is easy to take it for granted. How many couples do you see at a meal sitting in silence as though there is nothing more to be said? They know each other's thoughts. But there has to be more, perhaps the words "I love you".

Love is very strong and binding. St. Paul wrote that "neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor things present, nor things to come, nor powers, nor height, nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 8.38).

Everyone is loved. Valentine's Day is an opportunity to love and be loved.

Evesham Parish Church - Lent Series 2011 Places of Belonging

Austen Ivereigh – Monday 14 March 2011 at 7.30pm

Austen Ivereigh is a prominent figure in London Citizens, one of the pre-eminent Roman Catholic social commentators in Britain today, and author of Faithful Citizens. He will be describing how it is possible for people of faith to be catalysts for social change in the places where we live.

Robert Beckford – Monday 21 March at 7.30pm

Robert Beckford, author, lecturer in theology at Goldsmith's College, London and regular broadcaster for Channel 4, argues that the New Britain is full of opportunities scarcely imaginable in the last century, and that you don't have to look too hard to see our changing nation as a place of potential rather than decline.

Paula Gooder – Monday 28 March at 7.30pm

New Testament scholar Paula Gooder will be exploring what sense of belonging which the early church had, and what bonded Christians together in the inhospitable culture of Imperial Rome.

Phil Groves – Monday 4 April at 7.30pm

Phil Groves holds the post of Director of Indaba at the Anglican Communion Office. Indaba is a Zulu word for a method of Bible study which seeks to engage Christians of opposing positions. Dr Groves will be asking how it is possible to remain a single church in the midst of diversity of conviction.

Clare Short – Monday 11 April at 7.30pm

Clare Short, Minister for International Development in the last government, will be sharing her experience of the change in global politics, and asking what role we should seek in the new international order.

All talks take place in the Church Rooms and will be followed by discussion and questions. Doors open at 7pm for tea or coffee.

The New Prayer Diary

I hope that by now everyone has seen and is using our new prayer diary. The deepening of prayer is one of Bishop John's key priorities for the diocese and with that in mind, it was felt important to place greater emphasis on our intercessions diary to enable it to be accessible to everyone.

The prayer diary is pocket-sized to enable it to be carried around or simply kept by your bedside; as well as being suitable for use in church. It features news happening around the diocese as a basis for prayer (as well as praying for the individual parishes as has always happened). Hopefully it will be an effective prayer tool as well as an alternative way of communicating some of the great things that are happening in the diocese.

The diary is free to all parishes and there should be enough for everyone who wants one to have a copy, it's definitely not just for readers and clergy. If you haven't seen it, then please do ask in church and make sure you get your copy! It's also available on the diocesan website and I'm happy to produce versions in large-print if people contact me.

The January-March edition is the second prayer diary in the new format and it still continues to evolve, so I'd really appreciate any feedback and thoughts about what you find most and least useful.

Church Electoral Roll

The church electoral roll is the formal list of church members and everybody who worships regularly should be on the roll. Each year the roll must brought up to date. If you are not already on the roll please complete an application form. It is important that the list is up to date.

Under Church Representation Rules you are entitled to have your name entered on the roll, if you:

- Are baptised
- Are a member of the Church of England
- Are aged sixteen years or over,
- Are resident in the parish, or, not being resident in the parish, have habitually attended public worship in the parish for the last six months.

At St Andrews the revision will start on 20th February and application forms will be available in church and must be returned to Michael Hunter, The Electoral Roll Officer, by 13th March.

Year of the Bible

2011 will be the 400th anniversary of the King James Bible, which was completed in 1611. To celebrate the impact that this edition had on our faith and society generally, this year has been dedicated as the 'Year of the Bible'.

The King James Version was the bible's third translation into English, completed by more than 50 scholars. It became known as the **'Authorised Version'** and was, for many years, the bible in standard use in churches and regularly read aloud in people's homes.

There are a large number of phrases which were first used in this version which have crossed over into daily use such as

> 'Let there be light', 'My brother's keeper', 'The apple of his eye', 'Ye of little faith', and 'Broken-hearted'.

The KJV was also directly quoted in Martin Luther King's **'I have a dream'** speech and President JFK's inaugural address, as well as many hymn lyrics.

Events and activities will be happening both nationally and as a diocese to commemorate the year of the bible and a virtual parish tool-kit is also planned to help churches mark the occasion.

Natural Church Development

On St Andrew's Day we launched our development programme for Hampton. Natural Church Development is a different way of thinking about growth. It focuses on quality rather than quantity; good quality will bring increased numbers. In fact research shows that going for increased numbers rather than increased quality is counter-productive.

Improvement in quality of the church is like growing a plant – it is a long term process and to be successful all parts of the church need to 'grow'.

The research with over 50,000 churches in 70 countries has identified Eight Quality Characteristics required for church growth – and in healthy, growing churches none were missing. NCD does not tell us what we must do – rather it guides us to discover and develop what works in Hampton.

Eight Quality Characteristics

Empowering Leadership: Leadership is obviously important but the 'all powerful one leader' does not work. In growing churches the leader 'empowers' other Christians to become what God intends them to be.

Gift-orientated Ministry: God has a plan for us all and has given each of us 'talents'. What the leaders do is to help church members to discover their gifts – and then find a role which is suited to their gifts.

Passionate Spirituality: It is difficult to put into a few words just what this means: a commitment to faith being lived out with dedication, with passion. Without this passion a church will decline – no matter what else is done!

Functional Structures: Structures and ways of doing things which work help growth. There can be resistance to change 'we have always done things that way' but patterns of life have changed and we need to respond to those changes.

Inspiring Worship Services: Worship needs to be inspiring! This is not about following recent trends – it is about making the services indispensible experiences which the congregation enjoy attending and leave uplifted.

Holistic Small Groups: Small Groups allow church members to get to know each other better, get support and practical help and to deepen their spiritual life. Holistic Small Groups encompass all of that; new members can feel part of the church and not just anonymous members of the congregation.

Need-orientated Evangelism: A church will only grow if it spreads the good news and more people come to join the church. But we need to think about how we do that; we need to think about those outside the church and find out what their needs are and how to make the faith relevant to them.

Loving Relationships: Relationships are very much at the core of any organisation – and Christian love is a central part of Jesus' message.

Putting NCD into practice

It would be impossible to try to develop all eight of the characteristics at once. At the start of the process the factors will not be equally developed so it is best to focus initially on the 'least developed'. In order to discover which is least developed members of the congregation were surveyed and the results identified the 'minimum factor'. The questionnaire asked how we feel about our church; the survey will be repeated in a year or so to check on progress.

The survey asked each of us to agree or disagree with almost 100 statements such as:

'The tasks I perform in our church match my gifts.' 'I enjoy listening to sermons in the worship service.' 'I experience God's work in my life.'

'The activities in our church are well planned and organised.'


The results of the questions were compared statistically to give a score for each of the quality characteristics for our church.

The Minimum Barrel

NCD has developed a model to illustrate the importance of each of the eight quality characteristics. The staves of the barrel represent the eight characteristics.

The barrel will only hold water up to the lowest stave. The level of the water represents the attendance at services.

We must focus on the shortest stave and make it longer.



Survey Results – September 2010

The survey of 27 members of the congregation, including Mark, gave us a starting point. Our highest score was 49 for Gift-orientated Ministry and our lowest was 22 for Need-oriented Evangelism; our average was 36.

Next Steps

The Natural Church Development programme should involve all parts of the Church Community – those who come to all services, the choir and bell ringers, the Mothers' Union, the Youth Group, etc. A small group consisting of Mark, Michael Hunter and Bill Wakefield have started the process but as things get underway others will be involved too.


Our Mission Plan is the key document which guides us. Rather than a five year plan we are converting it to a rolling programme which will be updated regularly. In future our Annual Report will give details of the progress made each year.

In order to move forward with Needs-oriented Evangelism we are planning to bring together those who have the 'gift' or 'calling' for evangelism. This will not be a subcommittee with minutes etc but rather a group who focus on discerning how we can address the needs of the community and putting it into practice.

Although we are going to start by focussing on Needs-based Evangelism we need to continue to work on the other aspects of church life. For many years we have said we need to get more people involved – and that is not going to happen unless we all put effort into developing the areas identified in the Mission Plan and do not become side-tracked.



HINT OF THE MONTH

Cabbage and Chorizo Soup - Serves Four

Chorizo is a spicy Spanish Paprika Sausage or try using your favourite salami

400g/14oz Small potatoes, unpeeled and thinly sliced

- 1 Medium onion peeled and sliced
- 1.5l/2¹/₂ pts Vegetable or Chicken stock

200g/7oz Savoy cabbage 225g/8oz Chorizo Sausage, sliced Salt & Pepper Parsley to garnish

Method

Put the potatoes and onion in a large pan with the stock, cover, bring to the boil and simmer for 15 minutes

Finely shred the cabbage, add to the pan, half cover and steam for 5 minutes.

Heat the sliced Chorizo in a frying pan until slightly brown on both sides.

Stir the cabbage into the soup, check the seasoning and serve in warmed bowls. Spoon the Chorizo slices on top and garnish with parsley leaves.
