Prayers

Sunday 13th November is **Remembrance Sunday**; join with people throughout Britain who will be giving thanks for the selfless service of all those who sacrificed their lives in the two World Wars and other conflicts. Pray for the repose of their souls and for those who continue to mourn them. Give thanks for their example of service and ask for the help of the Holy Spirit as we try to live up to that example; continue to bring before God the many areas of the world whose peoples suffer the oppression of armed conflict, that they may find release from that oppression and for everyone striving to bring help to them.

November 1st is the **Feast of All Saints**. Give thanks for lives of the saints and ask for help to live up to their example; pray too for the people of All Saints Parish, Evesham that their celebrations and life of worship together may be joyful. **November 2nd** is **All Souls' Day** when we commemorate the Departed. Pray for their repose, especially for those who are particularly dear to you. **November 30th** is the **Festival of Saint Andrew**, Patron saint of Hampton parish. Give thanks for his service to Jesus and pray for the success of the mission of this parish dedicated to him. Give thanks for the work of our **PCCs managing** the business of our parishes. Pray for the **children who will be baptised** in our Benefice this month and for their **parents and god-parents** in their new responsibilities.

Offer prayers for the people who work in the NHS, the emergency ambulance service, hospitals, general practices, nurses and care workers in the community and ancillary services. Mention in your prayers anyone known to you personally who is working in this service and include the Evesham Community Hospital and its patients. Ask that they may be granted patience, courage and comfort.

Ask for God's blessing on **organisations which serve young people**, to give them the opportunity to find enjoyment together and to develop skills which will serve them and the communities in which they live. You may wish to include the Red Cross movement, the St John Ambulance, the Baden-Powell organisations and the Youth Group within our Benefice. Give thanks for the **leaders** of these groups; may they find satisfaction in all that they achieve. Bring to God, **social clubs** whose purpose is to foster friendship amongst their members; amongst those known to you, include the **Friendship Club** at Hampton, its members and leaders.

In these difficult economic times pray for the leaders of industry and business. May their efforts bring about employment for **the many people seeking work**. Remember those with family responsibilities, the young people who have never found work; while their search continues may they find comfort and hope. Include in your prayers your friends and neighbours, remembering the various problems which some may be facing and give thanks for the goodwill which many are spreading and for the happiness which you experience in their company.

Blessed be the Lord, for he has heard the voice of my prayer.

November is the month in which we remember before God, and commend to his sure keeping, all those who have died for their country in war. We do so in the annual Two Minute Silence on the 11th and also on Remembrance Sunday. This year is the 90th anniversary of the Royal British Legion. The first ever poppy appeal was held on the 11th November 1921.

As time distances us from the post war experience of Britain following the 'Great war', it is easy to forget the scale of the problems that faced the British Legion. The war memorials remind us that every community lost a large number of young men (725,000). But not mentioned are the 1.75 million who suffered some kind of disability and half of those were permanently disabled.



To this we also have to add the dependents that then had no income. The work of the Royal British Legion has been a lifeline for many service families.

The Royal British Legion reminds the nation of the human cost of war and actively works for peace. The standard of each branch represents the ideals of service to God and to our Queen and country. One, the British Legion standard, is the Union flag which is a sacred symbol of unity.

At the centre of the Union flag is a cross.

Jesus said, *"Greater love has no one than this, that he lay down his life for his friends."* The cross makes us mindful of the sacrifice of Jesus Christ, who gave his life to save us, not just his friends but his enemies. If we keep Jesus Christ central in our lives, in our morals, in our hopes, then we live not just for ourselves but for God.

At the centre of our Standard are three crosses.

During the Crusades, St. George became the patron saint of England and his cross, blood red on white became the English emblem. The patron saint of Scotland is St. Andrew and his emblem, a white diagonal cross on blue, forms the countries national flag. St Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland and when the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland was formed in 1801 he was represented on the Union Flag by a red diagonal cross on white.

The fact that the standard is made up of three crosses reminds us not only of our history as a nation but is also a lesson in how it is possible to bring together people who in previous centuries fought each other.

At the centre of our standard is our own cross.

Jesus said, *"This is my commandment: Love one another."*

The fruit of the great sacrifice made by our servicemen and women who did not return from war are the freedoms we enjoy as a nation. We should never take that sacrifice for granted or forget that it is our service personnel today who are maintaining that freedom.



Jesus calls us to follow his example of self sacrifice, to take up our own cross and follow him. And what does that mean? It surely means being prepared to stand up and be counted as a Christian. To stand up for a sense of what is right in our nation and the world. It means speaking out for things which our forbears would have taken for granted. Not to speak out means that a minority shape our country and its values.

As we look at the British Legion Standards on Remembrance Sunday, the royal blue signifies fidelity, and the gold band recalls all those who have died in the service of our country, and reminds us who remain that we must ever be true to 'Service not self'. There are still wars and conflicts throughout the world. Not everybody shares our commitment to freedom and peace. That is why the

work of the Royal British Legion is needed now more than ever. Let us give thanks this November for 90 years of the Royal British Legion.

How to share your faith – without getting hurt

Have you ever noticed that you tend to meet two kinds of non-Christians in this world? The first kind is not particularly FOR Christianity, but not especially AGAINST it, either. They are simply curious, with honest questions about what you believe. The Bible has guidance for us when we meet this kind of person. "Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect." (1 Peter 3:15) So – when this person wants to talk to you, a gracious, serious conversation will ensue!

Then there is the other type of non-Christian – those who react with aggression and anger. They do NOT want to know. They scoff and bristle if the subject comes up. The Bible also offers some guidance here: don't waste your time with such people. Jesus is very blunt: "Do not throw pearls to pigs... they may trample them under their feet, and then turn and tear you to pieces." If you have ever been in a social gathering and tried to share something that matters deeply to you about God, only to be reviled and mocked by someone there, you will know how that feels! The Bible advises you not to let yourself get hurt in this way. Christians are not to be 'storm troopers' for the Kingdom of God, charging into hostile enemy territory and gunning for people to be converted. Instead, we are urged to "keep in step with the Spirit" (Galatians 5:25), and to follow where God is already going in someone's life.

St Andrew's Community Survey

There was an excellent response to the survey with many of you speaking to those who do not normally come to church. We have 70 responses at the time of writing and it is going to take some time to collate all the results. Some early highlights:

- Most people would be sad if the church was closed or lost to the community.
- There were a significant number who did not know that St Richard's Hall was anything to do with St Andrew's Church and almost all felt that changing the name would be a step forward.
- The idea of improving the facilities in the church went down well with most of those asked – they felt that we need to make more use of the building.
- Many people were last in the church for a funeral

St Andrew's Church Centre

St Richard's in Fairfield was built in the mid 1950s to serve the community around it and for some years it had a very active congregation. Over time that congregation dwindled and they joined St Andrew's. Recently the hall has been the base of Alphabet House Nursery and various clubs which meet in the evenings. Our Community Survey confirmed that many people did not associate St Richards with St Andrew's Parish and so we have renamed it St Andrew's Church Centre.



We intend developing the Centre and running more activities there for the people of Fairfield and for the parish generally. The first parish event at the renamed centre is the quiz night on Saturday 19th November

What's the Big Idea?

An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: Luke

This month we look at Luke, the third of the synoptic gospels. Luke also wrote Acts, as both are addressed to the same individual, Theophilus (1:3 cf Acts 1:1). It is clear from certain sections of Acts that Luke accompanied Paul, who mentions his 'dear friend Luke, the doctor' (Col 4:4). We can assume that Luke was a well educated Gentile, a doctor by profession.

Theophilus was probably a Roman official who acted as Luke's patron, ensuring that his gospel was copied and distributed. It was always intended for a wider audience, to help both Gentile believers and unbelievers understand who Jesus is. Luke also wanted to show that Gentile Christians have a place in the kingdom of God, as the gospel of Jesus is intended for the whole world. Although we cannot be sure when the gospel was written, this was probably in Rome at around 60 AD.

Luke's account of Jesus' life and ministry can be divided into 4 main sections:

- the coming and early life of Jesus (1:1-4:13)
- Jesus' ministry in and around Galilee (4:14-9:50)
- his ministry (mainly teaching) on the road to Jerusalem (9:51-24:53)
- his final week in Jerusalem (19:28-24:53)

For Luke, the key focus is how God's plan of salvation for the world is fulfilled in Jesus. Therefore, he writes an orderly account ranging from the birth of Jesus to his ascension. He is a strong champion of the outsider. As an outsider himself (a Gentile writer) he shows how Jesus includes those who are typically seen as outsiders by the religious establishment of his day. This includes women, the poor and sinners (including tax collectors, prostitutes and shepherds!), as well as showing how Gentiles, Samaritans and Jews are all included in God's plan of salvation. When compared with the other synoptic gospel writers, Luke also emphasises the importance of prayer in Jesus' ministry and the role of the Holy Spirit.

A key verse which reflects this perspective is found when Jesus encounters the tax collector Zacchaeus, 'For the Son of Man came to seek and to save what was lost' (19:10). Whenever we find ourselves on the outside of God's life and love, as Zacchaeus, Jesus comes to find us and welcome us afresh into his kingdom.

Saint Andrew – 30 November

The apostle Andrew is patron saint of Scotland. According to the gospel of Matthew, Andrew and his brother Simon Peter were the very first two disciples whom Jesus called. “Come, follow me, and I will make you fishers of men.” (Matt 4:18, 19)

Without more ado, they obeyed. “At once they left their nets and followed him.” The story is touching for the simple but total faith which they had in Jesus.

Whenever the gospels mention the disciples, Andrew’s name is always in the first four. Rather than a boisterous leader of men (like Peter), he seems to have been an approachable person who wanted to help people. It was Andrew who helped introduce a group of Greeks to Jesus (John 12:20-2) and Andrew who offered Jesus the five small barley loaves and two small fishes when Jesus challenged them to feed the five thousand. (John 6:8) His faith in Jesus over small things was richly rewarded, and this faithful, kindly Galilean fisherman turned disciple went on to become one of the twelve apostles of the Christian Church.

Andrew never settled back in Capernaum by Galilee. Instead, his ‘fishing for men’ seems to have taken him far. One ancient tradition links him with Greece, where both Scythia and Epirus claimed him as their apostle. Another place in Greece, Patras in Achaia, claimed to be the place where Andrew was eventually martyred.

Like Jesus, he was crucified, but the story goes that during the two days it took him to die, he preached earnestly to the people about Jesus. Andrew was not afraid of death on a cross – he had seen it before, and knew one thing for certain: because of Jesus, there was nothing but eternal life ahead of him.
