


The New Year has arrived amidst the Christmas celebrations. Enter then the wise men from the East who brought their presents for the new born King of the Jews. What would they give the baby Jesus?

Deciding on presents is not easy. There is nothing worse than seeing a present rejected, re-gifted or cast out. It needs wisdom to match the gift to the recipient. The wise men obviously chose well in the three gifts they brought; gold, frankincense and myrrh. Gold was the traditional gift for a King, frankincense for a priest, myrrh for one who is to die. “We saw his star in the East”, they said, “and have come to worship him”. And when they found him “they fell down on their knees and worshipped him”.

The wise men set out on a journey to find Christ. We too are on a journey through life. As we welcome 2013 as one more step on that journey, how near are we to him? Benefice Service Times

Much consideration is currently being given as to how Mark can be spread over the four churches under his ministry without killing him, having him arrested for speeding or leaving any of the churches without a regular Eucharistic service. We are already heavily dependent upon our retired priests taking many of the services but, following at least one resignation, they cannot and should not be expected to carry any increase in work load: they are, after all, supposed to be retired. Therefore modifications will have to be made to the current patterns of worship: some may be adjustments to the start time of a service, some may have to be of a different type and some will have to be cut from the rota completely.

Mark is making every effort to retain as many of your services as possible but, even with the current number of retired clergy making themselves available week after week, sacrifices will have to be made and your churchwardens ask you to be flexible and understanding in your approach to these changes. Each PCC will have the chance to debate and, hopefully, agree these changes: as soon as the next Services Rota can be completed copies will be displayed in each church together with identical information appearing in the church magazines and on the weekly Pew Sheets.

Please hold in your prayers all those involved in effecting the necessary changes, that they may be guided by the Holy Spirit and that we may all feel enabled by the fruits of their labour.

Prayers ... for our community

At this New Year ask for guidance for our local government representatives and for the people who work in these local services, especially those who care for the elderly and the lonely who are often overlooked. Mention everyone at the Christian Centre and their efforts to serve others in all sorts of need. Pray for our schools and colleges as they re-assemble for the new term, that their time may be enjoyable and fruitful.

WOMEN'S WORLD DAY OF PRAYER (INTERNATIONAL AND INTERDENOMINATIONAL)



1st March 2013



St Andrew's Church, Hampton - 2.30pm

The Women's World Day of Prayer started in the USA in 1884.

When Mary Ellen James called for a day of prayer in 1887, she was not planning a great worldwide movement, destined to become the largest ecumenical movement in the world organised and led by women. She was simply reacting, as a Christian, to the society in which she lived. The wife of a Presbyterian minister in New York and the mother of seven children, Mary Ellen was aware of the problems faced by many women around her, particularly new immigrants to America - the awful slums with their poverty, unemployment, poor housing, and lack of health or educational facilities. Something had to be done.

Two years later, two Baptists called together a Day of Prayer for the World Mission. The Day of Prayer initiated by these two women expanded to neighbouring countries, then on to Europe and other continents.

Since 1927 the day is known as Women's World Day of Prayer and is held on the first Friday in March. The theme chosen this year is 'I was a Stranger and you welcomed me', and the material for the service has been prepared by the women of France.

What's the Big Idea?

An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament:

1 Thessalonians

'The way we conceive the future sculpts the present, gives contour and tone to nearly every action and thought through the day.' (Eugene Peterson).

In 1 Thessalonians, Paul helps his readers to understand the importance of the Second Coming of Jesus to the Christian Faith. It is the earliest of his letters, written when Paul was staying in Corinth during his second missionary journey in 49–51 AD.

Thessalonica was the capital of the Roman province of Macedonia, as well as a flourishing centre for trade and philosophy. The city was committed to the Greco-Roman gods and Emperor Worship, and contained a sizable Jewish population. After founding the church Paul was forced to leave, when he was falsely accused of speaking against Caesar. As the new Christians were left with little spiritual support, Paul wrote this letter to encourage them.

Paul addresses a number of issues through this letter. They were not expecting persecution, so Paul explains that this is normal Christian experience. He also challenges those members of the community who were bringing the church into disrepute by living off wealthier Christians rather than earning their own living.

However, the most prominent theme in letter is the second coming of Jesus. It is mentioned in every chapter of the book. The Thessalonians were unclear about the timing of the day of the Lord. Some members of the church had died, and they weren't sure what would happen to them at Christ's return. Some thought that they would miss out on the second coming. However Paul assures them that when Jesus returns, the dead in Christ will rise and be caught up with the living to meet the Lord. Therefore, believers don't need to fear God's wrath, but rather are assured of inheriting his salvation.

Living in the light of Christ's return calls for holy and blameless lives. Let's make Paul's prayer for the Thessalonian Christians our own, as we too await Jesus' return: 'May God himself, the God of peace, sanctify you through and through. May your whole spirit, soul and body be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ?'

100,000 downloads for BRF Bible reading apps

While surveys show that daily Bible reading is an uphill struggle for many Christians, with time pressure, relevance and simply knowing where to start being key reasons, there appears to be no shortage of interest in trying new ways to solve the problem.

The Bible Reading Fellowship (BRF) launched their first daily Bible reading notes app, based on their New Daylight series, in February 2010. Two more apps have followed, based on their Guidelines notes (offering a wider breadth of theological viewpoints) and Day by Day with God, (daily reading notes written by women for women). Today, downloads of their three apps have passed 100,000, with readers spread worldwide.
