





What's the Big Idea? An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: Hebrews

'Too much religion can be a bad thing!' This saying is very relevant when we look at the Letter to the Hebrews, where the recipients' devotion to God was getting in the way of what he has done for them. The writer addresses Jewish converts, familiar with the Old Testament (OT), who were slipping back into the rituals of Judaism in order to escape mounting persecution. The letter describes itself as a 'word of exhortation' (13:22), in which the readers are encouraged to continue in the grace of Jesus Christ and not to 'ignore such a great salvation' (2:3)

There is no indication as to who wrote Hebrews; suggestions include Apollos, Barnabas, or Aquila and Priscilla. The absence of any evidence describing the end of the OT sacrificial system with Jerusalem's destruction in AD 70 suggests that the letter was written around AD 65.

The dominant theme of Hebrews is the absolute supremacy and sufficiency of Christ as revealer and mediator of God's grace. Jesus is presented as God's final revelation of himself (1:1-4), fulfilling the prophecies and promises of the OT. Christ is superior to the prophets, angels and Moses (the mediator of the former covenant), along with the levitical priesthood and sacrificial system. Where the Old Covenant required continual sacrifices and a once-a-year atonement for sin offered by a priest, the New Covenant provides a once-for-all sacrifice through Christ (10:10) and direct access to the throne of God. God's people must now look only to him, whose atoning death, resurrection and ascension have opened the way into the true, heavenly sanctuary of God's presence.

The writer of Hebrews also gives five solemn warnings to his readers. There is the danger of neglect (2:1-4), unbelief (3:7-4:13), spiritual immaturity (5:11-6:20), failing to endure (10:26-39), and the inherent danger of refusing God (12:25-29). If we are to maintain our faith, we need to keep our focus on the person of Christ: 'Therefore, since we are surrounded by such a great cloud of witnesses, let us throw off everything that hinders and the sin that so easily entangles, and let us run with perseverance the race marked out for us. Let us fix our eyes on Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy set before him endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God' (12:2).


September in the Garden

As summer draws to its close the garden can begin to look a little sad. No need for this, the late flowering plants such as Dahlias and Salvias will flower long into the autumn if regularly 'dead headed' the same applies to the roses. You may have planted a packet of Nasturtium seed, keep dead heading this too and add a few of the leaves and flowers to the salad bowl – delicious and spicy.

It is a good time to plan those Spring Displays of bulbs in bowls both for indoors and in the garden. Plant up the containers for outside with a bottom layer of

tulips, followed by daffodils then crocus and ending a top layer of snowdrops to give you a succession of spring flowers. Now is the time to start planning for summer, if you have large clumps of perennial herbaceous plants now is the time to divide them.

Discard the old centre growth and replant from the new

outer parts increasing the number of plants at the same time as improving the stock.

In the vegetable garden plant over wintering onions, which come into growth early in the spring and give a good crop from the end of May, they taste good too. If you have planted squash which can be stored keep an eye on the plants, leave the fruit on for as long as possible to gain maximum size, but harvest if a sharp frost is forecast.

If you have not done it yet – clean the greenhouse to make sure there are no pests to overwinter in cosy quarters, and then it is ready to protect your patio plants which need a little shelter in the cold months ahead. Good Gardening.
