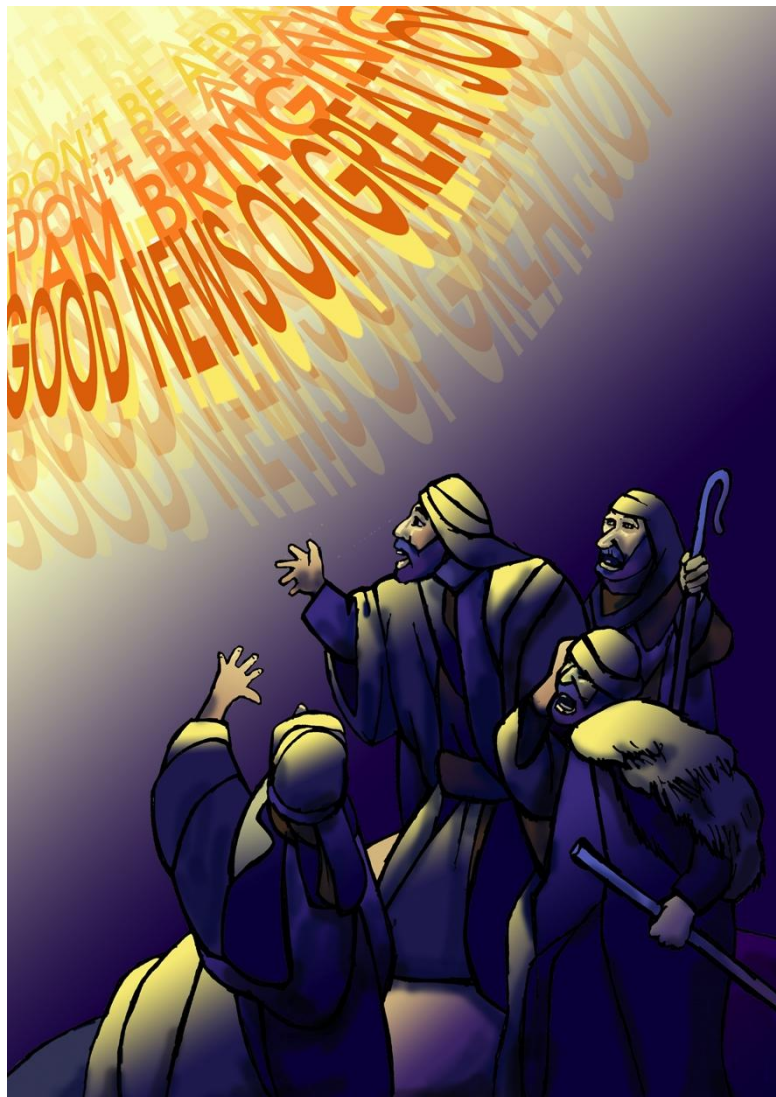

The Coming of the Lord



Half a millennium before Christ, Isaiah “saw” the coming of the Lord, and it energised his message. In Isaiah’s words;

“Behold, the Lord God comes with might, and his arm rules for him; behold his reward is with him, and his recompense before him.” And then a softer tone, *“He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms”*.

“The coming of ...” is a wonderful, anticipatory phrase, especially for Christians longing for the coming of the Lord. We know this as Advent, a season of preparation. In years gone by many preparations were made for Christmas – there was the ritual of stir up Sunday, making the Christmas pudding, making Christmas food and making and storing presents. This took place before Advent which is a penitential time to prepare the Soul to receive Jesus.

The period of waiting, wanting, and hoping for the Lord seems faintly out of touch with our increasingly secular society. Many shops have already put up their decorations for Christmas with special shopping events and offers. One trader has even proclaimed the Christmas starts on November the fourth. Decorations and lights are up in the shopping centres urging people to spend, and spend they will with the average present being £26. Some houses have Blackpool type illuminations. Parties are arranged and Christmas activities or Services sought. What has Advent become, a commercial Christmas?

Does this mean as Christians that we should go with the flow? I remember in my childhood that we prepared the house for Christmas on Christmas Eve. There were obviously some practical arrangements made during Advent. But there was a contrast between Advent and Christmas in a way which is hard to see now. Advent has become a preparation season for Christmas rather than a penitential time. With all the Carol Services, School Services and Christmas fayres, it is a very busy time. And yet we still need to prepare ourselves in a spiritual way to receive Jesus otherwise something very precious is lost. It can easily become a mad commercial selfish festival devoid of any real meaning. The phrase that Christmas is really for the Children could not be further from the truth!

In our hearts we long for the presence of the Lord, Jesus Christ, who comes to us in human form to save us from ourselves. If you are expecting to receive visitors into your home this Christmas would you do so without any planning? Thus it is with Advent that we embrace the richness that it has become but also spend some time making ourselves ready to receive Jesus afresh in our hearts. The joy of Christmas is to be found in the coming of God.

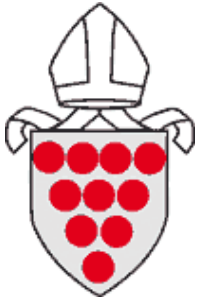
4 Wednesday afternoon sessions

Christmas: Why does it begin at midnight with Holy Communion?

Certainly in recent times, Holy Communion at midnight on Christmas morning has proved popular with modern families. One British writer pointed out its “domestic convenience” in 1947: “for where there are children and no servants, husband and wife may be unable to communicate at any other time.” (So things don’t change, then!)

Little Hospice Hoima

From Professor Ken Holden, Honorary Treasurer, Hospice Africa

'Thank you for the donation of £66 from St Andrew's Parish Church to Hospice Africa. The money will be used to support our activities at Little Hospice Hoima in Uganda. The Give a Chance project helps to pay the school fees of children orphaned by cancer. Relatives are generally happy to take care of orphaned children but can't afford the compulsory school fees. The Road to Care is a new development for women with cancer of the cervix. In June 2013, Little Hospice Hoima was treating 434 patients.'

More about the Give a Chance team:

They are a part of Hospice Africa Uganda, which provides supportive care and pain relief to patients suffering from cancer and HIV/AIDS. The resources to treat these diseases are limited, especially out in the rural areas. Treatment is further complicated by the stigma and lack of education surrounding these diseases - people often don't seek care until very late in their illness and some of the pathology I have seen is just unimaginable.

Hospice tries to address all of a patient's needs, from symptom relief to spiritual and family support and counseling. This is where the Give a Chance team comes in. One of the main fears patients have is what will happen to their children when they die. Give a Chance finds donors to sponsor the children, to pay their school fees and provide essential items like shoes and mosquito nets, once their parents have passed away. Knowing that their kids will be provided for is often an enormous relief for Hospice patients, and it gives the kids the opportunity for an education and a future that would otherwise disappear after losing one or both parents.

Prayers ... for the people around us

At this season children are first in our minds. Pray for their happiness in the warmth of their families and especially for children who will see little of the goodies we would like them to enjoy. Ask God to bless the charity Crisis and its work among the single homeless; include the hostels where they offer food, shelter, medical attention, advice and friendship. Pray for the safety of everyone who will be travelling over the holiday; may they arrive happy and well. And remember the emergency services who will be on call throughout. Give thanks for the love and friendship of everyone you share the holiday with.

Recipe for December – Sausage Spirals

This is a different take on traditional sausage rolls. I used good quality sausages (with skins removed) as they are already seasoned, but you could use just sausage meat and add your own seasoning, onion, sage or even 75g of grated parmesan.

Ingredients

500g good quality pork sausages (skinned)

425g pack of ready-rolled puff pastry

1 medium egg (beaten)

Optional: 75g grated parmesan cheese, 1 tsp. dried sage, medium finely chopped onion

Method

Turn pastry sheet on to a floured surface. It can be made slightly larger by rolling gently with a floured rolling pin. Spread sausage contents (or sausagemeat mixed with any optional ingredients) over the pastry. Leave a 1cm border along the long edges. On one long edge, turn in border and roll up like a Swiss roll. Seal edge with beaten egg and brush egg over the top, then slice into 2.5cm slices. Place on a baking sheet lined with baking parchment, with cut sides uppermost. Leave spec to spread. Bake for 40-45 minutes until golden and puffy.

What's the Big Idea?

An Introduction to the Books of the New Testament: 2 Peter & Jude

In the New Testament 2 Peter and Jude are two short letters, which are often in sermons and regarded as a little obscure! However, they contain some gems of Christian teaching:

How to grow up in Christ and keep from falling; the inspiration of the Bible; why Christ's coming has been delayed; the dangers of false teachers and wrong doctrine; God's protection of us all.

There is also a close literary association between 2 Peter and Jude, especially in the 2 Peter 2. It is very possible that 2 Peter makes use of sections of Jude. We know little about the date and intended readers of 2 Peter. Peter probably wrote in around 65 AD to churches in Asia Minor that contained both Gentile and Jewish Christians. Jude was the younger brother of Jesus and James, and it is assumed that he wrote to a similar audience in Antioch.

Both 2 Peter and Jude specifically criticise false teachers who were undermining the churches, with a primitive form of Gnosticism. It had the following characteristics:

They denied the lordship of Jesus by the way they lived (2 Peter 2:1; Jude 4).

They were immoral themselves and encouraged immorality in others.

They minimised the place of law in the Christian life and emphasized freedom by perverting the grace of God (2 Peter 2:10, 10ff, 18ff; Jude 4, 12).

They were plausible and crafty, fond of rhetoric, out for gain, and pandered to those from whom they hoped to gain some advantage (2 Peter 2:3, 12, 14, 15, 18; Jude 16).

They posed as visionaries or prophets and were arrogant and cynical of church leaders (2 Peter 2:1, 10, 11; Jude 8).

They were self-willed, divisive, and confident of their own superiority (2 Peter 2:2, 10, 18; Jude 19).

In the face of such false teaching, both Peter and Jude encourage their readers to be on their guard against such people, relying on God's strength to oppose their teaching with the truth of God's saving grace.

'To him who is able to keep you from falling and to present you before his glorious presence without fault and with great joy - to the only God our Saviour be glory, majesty, power and authority, through Jesus Christ our Lord, before all ages, now and for evermore! Amen.' Jude 24,25

The newly elected President, Jill Robinson, welcomed members to the meeting on 14 November, which was the 45th anniversary of our first meeting in 1968. Four of the original members from the first meeting are still members today; Pam Wills, Rosemary Reid (the first President), Jill Robinson and Rosemary Ind.

Members were reminded of the Federation Carol Service at Worcester Cathedral on 8 December. Jill thanked those who had brought items for the Shoebox Appeal, which would be taken up to the warehouse. She reminded us that there would be a collection of food items for Caring Hands at our December meeting. Future events included the Spring Council Meeting on 20 March 2014, to be held at No. 8, Pershore, when the guest speaker would be Sheila Dibnah, talking about life with her husband Fred. Advance notice was given of the National AGM to be held in Leeds in June 2014, and that the WI Centenary Baton would be passing through Evesham on 11 September 2014.

Jill then welcomed our speaker for the evening, Pauline Smith, who told us about her 'Macmillan Journey', her experiences fundraising for the charity. Pauline became involved after the death of her young son from cancer, when she started fund raising for the Cobalt Unit at Cheltenham. Over the years she has had many innovative ideas for raising money, including hosting street market-style Macmillan coffee mornings in a greenhouse, 'Picnic in the Park, a 1940's Tea Party, and many other events, including a not-so-successful dog show. For the last 3 years she has been hosting Winter Warmers lunches, which she holds twice a month with the help of friends. These are so successful that she now has a waiting list. In recognition of her work she received the Douglas Macmillan award at the charity's Centenary Garden at BBC Gardener's World Live at the NEC, and was later invited to a reception at Downing Street by Samantha Cameron. The people present comprised the 'Voices' – people who have been affected by cancer and are using their experiences to help others; some of the people who run Macmillan; nurses and just two fund raisers. Pauline stressed what a wonderful job the Macmillan nurses do, and spoke about how things have moved on over the years, to provide calm and welcoming surroundings for cancer patients and help for their families. A fairly new initiative is the Macmillan 'pods' in hospitals, where those recently diagnosed can go for help and advice on a variety of issues.

Following Pauline's talk, there was celebration cake and a glass of wine, to commemorate our 45 years. The next meeting will be held on 12 December, when we will be holding our Christmas Social.

Visitors are always welcome at our meetings, which are held at the Hampton Guide and Scout Community Hall on the 2nd Thursday of the month at 7.30 pm.

St NICHOLAS - Feast Day 6 December

St Nicholas was the bishop of Myra, in Asia Minor, in the fourth century. Lots of stories are told of his kindness and generosity. He is the patron saint of Russia, children, scholars, merchants and sailors.

One legend tells of his secret gifts to three daughters from a poor family. It is said that he threw 3 purses of gold down the chimney where they landed in the girls' stockings which they had hung up to dry in front of the fire. This is supposed to be the origin of hanging up Christmas stockings.



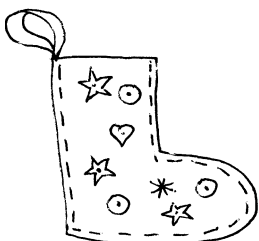
Over time the name of St Nicholas changed to Sinterklass and thus to Santa Claus in the Christmas celebrations.

STOCKING DECORATIONS

You will need some Christmas- coloured felt, a needle and thread, fabric glue, ribbon and sequins or buttons for decoration.

Fold the felt in half and cut out two simple stocking shapes. Sew these together with a simple running stitch, leaving the top edge open. Sew a loop of ribbon to the top of the stocking.

Now you can decorate the stocking with scraps of felt, lace, buttons or sequins. Glue them on carefully and leave to dry. You could even try writing a name in glue and sprinkling on glitter to cover it.



This would be nice to give as a present with a little present or sweet inside or to hang on the Christmas tree as a decoration. You can make them any size you like.

The group meets at 9.0pm for prayer and preparation, then at 10.00pm the Street Pastors go on patrol and the Prayer Pastors remain behind to support with prayer, there is telephone contact available between the groups and at Midnight there is a welcome soup break with prayer, then out on the street again until 3.00am.

This wonderful project is lead by John Darby and supported by most of the Churches in Evesham and has the added benefit of bringing together the different strands of Christianity, which exist in our society. There is a lot of preparation in setting all this up including extensive training for all the active participants. Each Street Pastor is clearly identified by wearing a uniform including a baseball cap with appropriate insignia. The Pastors carry water, flip-flops to replace the high heels, and lollipops for the inebriated to suck, this helps them to calm down.

Street Pastors is a very Good Thing and we must all support this effort, which brings so much help to the people who get into difficulties during their social life on Friday nights.

December in the Garden

We are now at the beginning of winter although there are still lots of warm days – open the ventilation in your greenhouse, good air circulation will prevent the spread of disease such as botrytis. I do hope you cleaned the glass back in the summer!

Now is the time to start your Christmas decoration plan and gather coloured stems such as Cornus (dogwood), willow and holly. The birds usually get round to eating the holly berries during the first week of December, so it is as well to keep ahead of them, you can leave the cut branches in the garden under some fine mesh to protect it, it will stay fresh until needed. Winter flowering shrubs will be coming into bud, early flowering Daphne and Lonciera will soon be adding their scent to the garden.

Check over the bulbs, which have been planted up for Christmas and New Year flowering, bring the early flowerers into the warm and water gently. If the plant pots outside need brightening up you could add some pansies, and it is not too late to pop some hellebores into the garden, they will flower in the early spring and increase in size for future years. Feed the birds – rake under fruit trees to expose the soil, then the birds can eat the pests. Make sure your bird feeders are well stocked with food and remember to keep the bird table clean, it really does help with bird health – dirty food can spread disease.
