







## **Prayers ... for the Church**

The heavens are telling the glory of God

May 28<sup>th</sup> is Ascension Day when we celebrate the passing of Jesus into his Father's Kingdom. Give thanks for his life on earth and for his continued spiritual presence with us. May 1<sup>st</sup> is the Festival of Saints Philip and James and 16<sup>th</sup> of Mathias; pray for strength for Christians to follow the example of these Apostles. May 31<sup>st</sup> we commemorate the Visit of the Virgin Mary to her cousin Elizabeth; pray for all families looking forward to the arrival of new babies. Ask God to bless the work of our leaders, Mark, Bernard, Leonard, Patrick, Elaine and John and give thanks for their ministry. Include in your prayers the mission of the Methodist Churches of our area and the various groups within our United Benefice which bring people together in worship.

## **Prayers ... for the World**

Pray for all who engage in caring for sick people throughout the world and especially in those areas where poverty prevents the development of health-care. Include in your prayers those who support this work by a variety of fund-raising and the patients where governments cannot provide this service. Bring to God the people of Ukraine whose independence is under threat; mention the leaders of powerful countries who have it in their power to influence events in this area. Ask for God's blessing on the poor people of India that they may receive a greater share of their country's opportunities. Pray for the victims of the Malaysian Airline disaster and for their families who have had to endure so much uncertainty.

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#### From Mark Binney, Priest in Charge House Groups

Have you ever considered joining a house group? Perhaps you are not sure of the point, or don't think it will help you. If you have been a member of any small group (not church) you will already understand how it is easy to get to know each other, and how to work with each other. More personal relations are formed when the group meets on a regular basis.

Likewise for house groups; the small group with regular meetings can help you to know and understand the bible. From experience, those groups who did not meet regularly were not as successful as those who met each week.

The early church was made up of small groups, who were helped by the Holy Spirit coming upon them at Pentecost. When they were gathered together they were able to be fully joined as disciples, and to pray and give mutual support. With Jesus as their teacher they would be able to put into practice the command 'Love one another' by working collaboratively.

Small groups who meet to read, learn, discuss and act upon God's word can be hugely successful and beneficial to those in the group. A DVD with handbook is used; each video is about fifteen minutes in length and features Rev Richard Bewes, Rev Paul Blackham and a guest speaker. There is time for discussion and helpful questions to prompt learning, and relate the passage to current times. Meetings end in prayer and usually take around an hour with tea being served. There is a large collection of DVD's and accompanying handbooks at the vicarage featuring all sections of the bible.

Often there is fear about joining a group – some people may think that they are not academic enough to cope with the text, or they are too old, or too young – this is not the case! The group, which meets at the vicarage on Monday mornings, is proof that you are never too old, or too clever, or too young to learn something new about Jesus. Each member has grown in knowledge, and in faith. They are strong in their desire to learn more, and put their faith into practice in practical ways. Their faith is nurtured, much like a gardener tends his plants. They are able to withstand the storms of life and stand strong on Christian ethics.

#### From the Diocesan Newsletter The Worcester Pilgrim Artefacts return to Worcester Cathedral from Tuesday 8 April 2014



You may have noticed, if you have visited Worcester Cathedral Crypt recently, that something (or rather, someone) is missing - the Worcester Pilgrim who was buried in the Cathedral in the late 15th century.

Ever since he was unearthed nearly 30 years ago during restoration work, the Pilgrim's boots and staff have been on display in the Crypt. They are a unique survival and form an important part of the Cathedral's heritage. Now, as part of the first phase of the Cathedral's "Telling the Story" initiative, which has included installing new interpretation displays, touchscreen terminals and mobile App trails, the Pilgrim artefacts have been sent away for conservation and restoration, and will be housed in a new state-of-the-art presentation case.

We are now ready for the Worcester Pilgrim's belongings to return, and a new exhibition has been opened, including striking images showing how the Pilgrim looked in life - and death!

A team from the University of York's Centre for the Study of Christianity and Culture have undertaken considerable research with academic colleagues and the specialists at the Cathedral. From this they have created interactive resources, which enable visitors and the local community to explore the Cathedral's fascinating history, art and architecture, as well as its current life.

Peter Atkinson Dean of Worcester said "We are delighted to welcome back the Worcester Pilgrim's effects after their conservation, the pilgrim represents an important part of the story here."

### Café Church

#### **The Lent Series**

Well, it is finally over. Mark and I have been really pleased with the Lent Series and the quality of all the speakers bringing us such great insights into growing our churches in ways that are sustainable.

Lynn Chetcuti talked about small groups, not necessarily and not just House Groups, but other kinds of groups (garden team, coffee club, befriending etc...) as ways of deepening friendships and growing in faith. ## Little Hospice Hoima

St Andrew's Church supports Little Hospice Hoima, which is under the umbrella of Hospice Africa Uganda. We recently sent £70, which were the proceeds from our Church Sunday Coffee.

The founder of Hospice Africa Uganda, Professor Doctor Anne Merriman, has been nominated for the Nobel Peace Prize. This is part of her nomination: Dr Merriman has spent a life in service to providing health care to those in desperate need. She introduced palliative care in Singapore, helped to establish a formula for liquid oral morphine, established Hospice Africa, lobbied for the legalization of morphine in Uganda, developed a centre for excellence in palliative care for Africa in Hospice Africa Uganda, developed the Institute for Hospice and Palliative Care in Africa and was a founding member of the Palliative Care Association of Africa, the African Palliative Care Association and the palliative care unit at Makerere University. In recognition of outstanding service to those in need Professor Dr. Anne Merriman has been nominated for the 2014 Nobel Peace Prize.

## 29 May – Ascension Day -40 Days with the Risen Christ

40 days after Easter comes Ascension Day. It may seem crazy to call it Eastertide when Easter is clearly over! - but these are the 40 days during which the Risen Christ appeared again and again to his disciples, following his death and resurrection.

The Gospels give us little of Christ's teachings and deeds during those forty days. Jesus was seen by numerous disciples: on the road to Emmaus, by the Sea of Galilee, in houses, etc. He strengthened and encouraged his disciples, and at last opened their eyes to all that the Scriptures had promised about the Messiah. Jesus also told them that as the Father had sent him, he was now going to send them - to all corners of the earth, as his witnesses.

Surely the most tender, moving 'farewell' in history took place on Ascension Day. Luke records the story with great

poignancy: "When Jesus had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, he lifted up his hands - and blessed them."

As Christmas began the story of Jesus' life on earth, so Ascension Day completes it, with his return to his Father in heaven. Jesus' last act on earth was to bless his disciples. He and they had a bond as close as could be: they had just lived through three tumultuous years of public ministry and miracles – persecution and death – and resurrection! Just as we part from our nearest and dearest by still looking at them with love and memories in our eyes, so exactly did Jesus: "While he was blessing them, he left them and was taken up into heaven." (Luke 24:50-1) He was not forsaking them, but merely going on ahead to a kingdom which would also be theirs one day: "I am ascending to my Father and to your Father, to my God and your God..." (John 20:17)

The disciples were surely the most favoured folk in history. Imagine being one of the last few people on earth to be face to face with Jesus, and have him look on you with love. No wonder then that Luke goes on: "they worshipped him - and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God." (Luke 24:52,53)

No wonder they praised God! They knew they would see Jesus again one day! "I am going to prepare a place for you... I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am." (John 14:2,3) In the meantime, Jesus had work for them to do: to take the Gospel to every nation on earth.

#### Hinton on the Green – St Peter's Church United we stand – divided we fall

We are one of a group of churches forming a 'United Benefice'. The churches are Hinton, Sedgeberrow, Hampton and Bengeworth. Sometimes people think it's best to 'go it alone' – at the moment



Scotland is preparing to take a momentous decision about whether it should be part of a 'United Kingdom' or not. Sometimes people think they might be better off as part of a larger whole. We only have to look at what's happened recently in the Crimea to see this.

Generally though, it seems that there is strength where there is unity. It's important for those within the United Benefice to support one another. At our last Hinton PCC meeting one member commented, "We can't really expect them to come to our church if we don't go to theirs."

As a result it was decided that we wouldn't have our intended service on 11<sup>th</sup> May but instead ask members of the Hinton community to attend the Christian Aid service which will take place at St Peter's, Bengeworth, on that day at 3.00 p.m. Similarly, we found that there is going to be a 'Pentecost Party' in Workman Gardens on 25<sup>th</sup> May – which is when Hinton had intended to have a 'picnic service'. So the picnic service has been postponed until 22<sup>nd</sup> June and we suggest that parishioners join with others in our 'Group' to enjoy a BBQ, comedian, bouncy castles and fun in Workman Gardens on 25<sup>th</sup> May.

We very much hope Hintonites will join in these activities and make the effort to go to those other churches when there is a 'Benefice' service there. We have a **Benefice Service here in Hinton on 6<sup>th</sup> July,** which is when we shall be celebrating Petertide this year.

The date isn't quite the right one but the sentiment – to celebrate our Patron Saint – is just the same. Money raised at the Fête goes to the Church Restoration Fund. We hope members of the other churches will join us on this occasion.

In a brief run through of business, members were reminded to bring items for the sales table at next month's Resolutions meeting. An outing to the Guide Dog Training Centre in Leamingon has been arranged for Wednesday, 9 July and on Tuesday, 12 August there will be a 'posh tea' in the hall, when Diane Bennett from Caring Hands will give a talk on the work of the charity and members can bring donations of tinned food and clothing.

Jill then handed over to Jan Titley, who first reminded everyone of the Group Quiz on 29 April and spoke about plans for a tea party in St Andrew's Hall, Pershore, to celebrate the arrival of the Centenary Baton on 11 September.

Following the business, Lisa Jayne Smith, dressed as Marie Lloyd, described the history of the Music Hall from 1850 - 1950. With a variety of costumes, songs and recitations Lisa took us from the spit and sawdust of the Victorian era, with its monologues and tragi-comedy, to more sophisticated Edwardian times, when performances took place in theatres in front of a more middle-class audience, and the Queen of the Music Hall, Marie Lloyd, introduced sauciness and showed her ankles. Then came the First World War, and Vesta Tilley with her song about Burlington Bertie. The 1920's brought jazz, swing and the Charleston, Gracie Fields and Charlie Chaplin. The 30's and 40's saw the Depression and World War II. There was often a shortage of people to put on the shows, so clever costumes enabled one person to play several parts. It was also the time of such well-known performers as Joyce Grenfell, Arthur Askey and Flanagan and Allen. In the 50's the 'vision box' arrived, making entertainment more accessible, bringing about the demise of the music hall and the theatres began to close, or were converted to bingo halls.




