



### From Mark Binney Priest in Charge

The time of harvest reminds us of the glory of God's creation, and his promise to us that we should have life in abundance. At the moment there are apples, blackberries, pears and nuts waiting to be picked, to name but few. How lucky we are in Evesham to have so much of all that is lovely around us! We are doubly lucky too, for the green grocers and farm shops



are full of sweet, tasty fruit, vegetables and crunchy salads if we can't or don't grow ourselves.

Each is a miracle of perfection, given by God:

Then God said, "I give you every seed-bearing plant on the face of the whole earth and every tree that has fruit with seed in it. They will be yours for food Gen 1 29 Now the LORD God had planted a garden in the east, in Eden; and there he put the man he had formed The LORD God made all kinds of trees grow out of the ground-trees that were pleasing to the eye and good for food Gen 2 9-10

*The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it.* Gen 2 15

So at each meal please think about the way it was created, or cooked, and give thanks for all that God has done for us.

However, you may be surprised to know that in Evesham there is a lot of hardship, people who can't afford to buy food for themselves, and so they feed their children. Or indeed, homeless people who tell me that they haven't eaten for two days. Yes. In this day, this is outrageous! How can we let this happen? – These are people who through no fault of their own, have found themselves unable to cope because of the low amount of benefits paid or low earnings.

And this is where Jesus' command to us to feed the poor comes in. Many of you may have been donating food for the Vale of Evesham Christian Centre, and I personally thank you for your generosity. There is one special lady in the parish who regularly helps at the centre by being up to her arms in washing up – just to help.

My challenge to you this month is two fold: firstly, thank God for every meal, and secondly, carry out Christ's commandment to feed the poor – by continuing to donate food, or perhaps offer up some practical help? ### Holy Days in October 18 October - Thank you, Dr Luke! *By David Winter*

'Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, bless the bed that I lie on' - my grandma taught me that one. At least it meant I never forgot the names of the writers of the four Gospels. This month Luke, the writer of the third of them, has his feast day – 18th October.

He was, we learn from the letters of St Paul, a 'physician' - an educated man and probably the only one of the writers of the New Testament who was not a Jew. In modern terms he was Turkish. Paul took him as one of his missionary team on a long journey around the Middle East, and they clearly became close friends. Under house arrest later in his life Paul could write, 'only Luke is with me'.

However, it is his Gospel which has established him as a major figure in the history of the Christian Church. Mark's Gospel may have more drama, Matthew's more prophetic background and John's a more profound sense of the mystery of the divine, but Luke offers us a Jesus who is utterly and believably real. This man turned no one away, reserved his harshest words for hypocrites and religious grandees, cared for the marginalised, the poor, the persecuted, the handicapped and the sinful. His Gospel is full of people we can recognise - indeed, in whom we can often recognise ourselves.

He was also a masterly story-teller. Try, for instance, the story of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32). Read it (this time) not as a sacred text but as a brilliant piece of story-telling: subtle repetitions ('your son, this brother of yours'), believable characters, drama and profound emotion. There is the older brother, so cynical about his sibling's alleged reformation, the 'prodigal' himself, so hesitant about throwing himself on his father's mercy after the folly of his earlier behaviour, and there is the father, of course, abandoning the dignity of his role in the family and actually running to welcome his wretched son's return.

There are more women in Luke's Gospel than in any of the others, but also more poor people, more lepers, more 'sinners' and tax-collectors, more 'outsiders' who are shown to be 'inside' the love of Christ. This, for many of us, is the great Gospel of inclusion and compassion. Here is a Jesus for the whole world and for every one of us. Thank you, Dr Luke!

"Reach for the Stars"

After a busy and eventful school year in 2013/2104 we were all glad to reach the Summer Holidays. Although we are very proud to have gained an outstanding judgement for our Ofsted Inspection, Church School Inspection and Eco-schools assessment it has been hard work and everyone deserved a break!

We have all come back to school refreshed and rested however and are looking forward to the new school year. Term began very calmly on 2 September 2 with 26 new children welcomed into Reception. Staff have been busy planning exciting new topics linking to the new National Curriculum 2014 which include Percy the Park Keeper, Where the Wild Things Are, Beside the Sea, Romans, Rainforests and Game On. We will report on some of the activities covered as the term proceeds such as the Rainforest Workshop planned in for Year 4 and a visit to the Cotswold Wildlife Park for Year 1 both linking to their topic work.

This half-term we are taking Hope as our Christian Value focusing on a good year ahead for all.

Years 2 and 5 are swimming this term, and farm days begin soon, as does instrumental tuition for Years 4 and 5. On 26 September we will be celebrating the European Day of Languages by dressing in costume and experiencing the culture of different countries. We will be looking forward to our Harvest Celebration on 9 October and Year 5 will be having Bikeability training later that month.

Parents' evenings are due to take place during the week before half-term, along with our first interhouse competition. New house captains were elected at the start of term along with School Councillors for this year so there are a number of proud children around at the moment. It is nice to see how many are confident enough to stand for election and present their speeches. Our Talent Show, due to take place in November, is another opportunity for children to shine.



During the Summer holidays the school boiler was replaced along with the noisy old heaters in the school/village hall. Although this meant some disruption in bookings over the period we hope that the end result is going to be more efficient (and quieter!) for all concerned.

commenced and children are enjoying, Tag Rugby, Energy Club, Forest Club, Drumming Lessons and Boys' and Girls' Football Clubs.

Last month, Year 5 thoroughly enjoyed their three night residential trip to Kingswood Activity Centre in Stafford. They participated in many teambuilding and adventure activities.

We celebrated Harvest during the week of 29 September and following the Harvest Church Service, we donated food and produce to the 'Caring Hands' food bank at the Christian Centre in Evesham which serves vulnerable families in Evesham and surrounding areas.

The online application process for school admissions for September 2015 is now open. On 11 and 12 November, we will be holding open mornings from 9.30am – 11am, when parents and carers with children who are due to start school next year are welcome to come and look around the school.

#### The Wychavon Festival of Brass The Entertainment Contest takes place on Saturday 1st November 2014. Evesham High School

The Wychavon Festival of Brass was the result of an initiative developed by the Vale of Evesham Commerce and Tourism Association which, in the late 80's, was seeking to raise the profile of the town. An exciting brass band contest was seen as an interesting and novel way of attracting visitors and offering the local population the opportunity to hear and experience some fabulous brass music!

Because of the support of VECTA, Wychavon District Council and a variety of other local organisations, WFB has continued to grow and develop, adapting itself to differing conditions and needs as economic climates change, and bands and venues come and go!

Many bandsman will remember the early contests, the first of which was held in the Market Square and the nearby All Saints Church in Evesham. It was a beautiful and memorable day and the bands were bathed in sunshine. However, before long, the event became nomadic and rotated between the Wychavon towns of Evesham, Pershore and Droitwich before settling permanently (as far as we know!) back in its home town in 2013.

Over twenty years have elapsed since that first contest and the festival is still alive and kicking! It regularly undertakes new projects like the development of a Youth Festival, and seeks to sustain itself and interest in the brass band movement generally through collaborative efforts with its other partners in staging concerts and other events from time to time.
