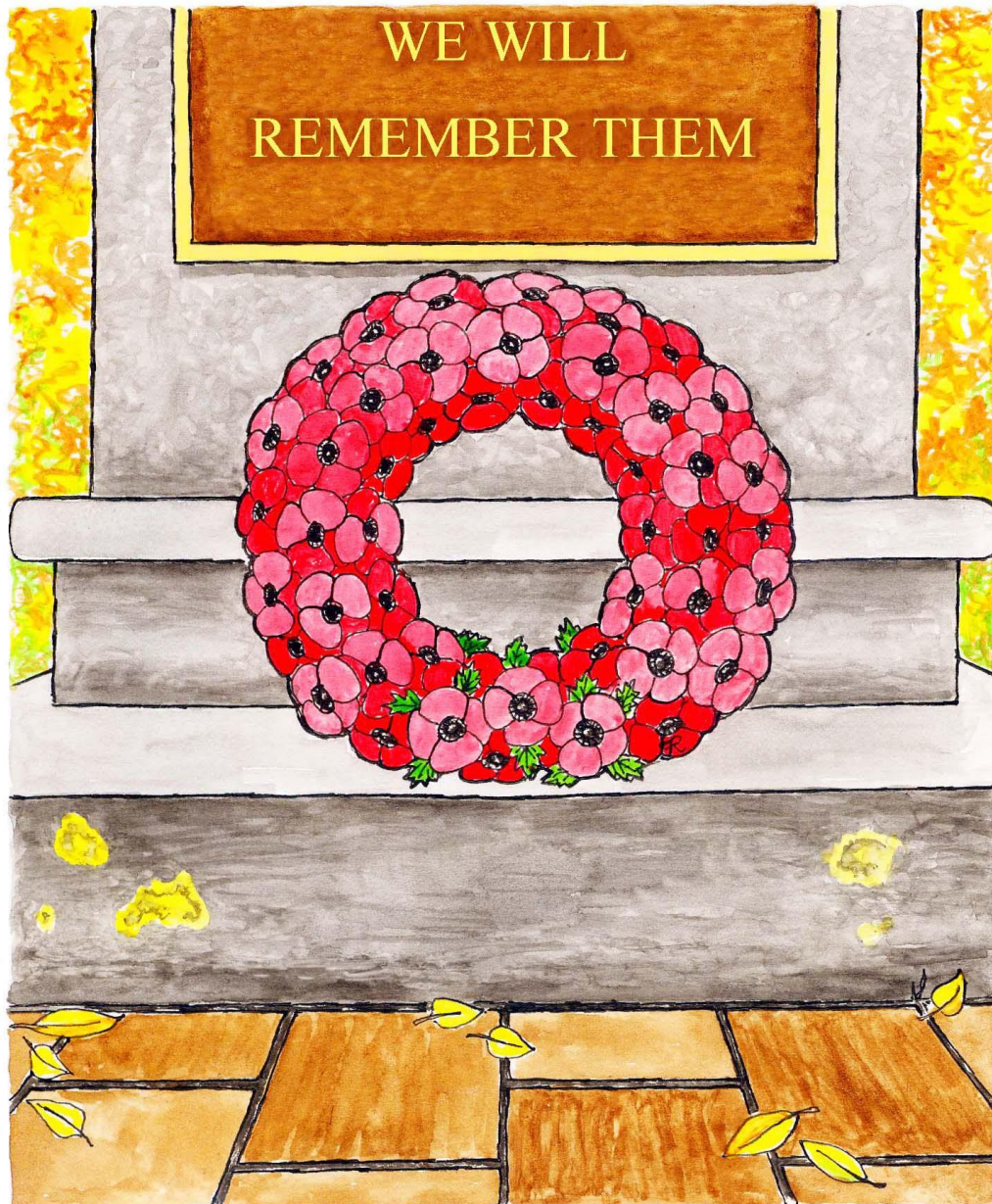

## From Mark Binney

### 1914

It is one hundred years ago that the Reverend Studdert Kennedy arrived in Worcester two months before war was declared. He had been ordained in Worcester Cathedral in the summer of 1908 but then served his curacy in Rugby. After a second curacy for his father in Leeds he accepted the slum parish of St. Paul's in the Blockhouse Worcester. At the time he was a strong supporter of the war and of the campaign to persuade able-bodied men to join up in the service of their country. He wrote in the parish magazine at that time "There ought to be no shirking on that duty". Over the next few years his view was to change.



In 1915 Studdert was allowed to leave the parish to make his way to France as an Army Chaplain. This was to transform him without any intention on his part to be a figure recognised throughout the nation and who could attract thousands to listen to his words. Although he grew to hate the war, he never lost his belief in courage which was amply displayed in his own experience. He was awarded the Military Cross for acts of conspicuous gallantry at the attack on Messines Ridge.

The war became the context in which his concern about the problem of suffering took on a new significance. He chose to use poetry as a way of grappling with it and used the thoughts of ordinary soldiers to explore the problem. This makes his poetry very readable and popular. How could God stand by and watch his creation tearing itself to shreds? Studdert gave an understanding of what the gospel had to say at a time of great suffering. By the time the war ended and he returned to Worcester, his volume of poetry 'Rough Rhymes' had made him a national figure. The soldiers gave him a nickname by which he is better remembered as "Woodbine Willie" because of his practice of giving cigarettes as well as spiritual aid. He wrote 'They gave me this name like their nature, compacted of laughter and tears, a sweet that was born of the bitter, a joke that was torn from the years.'

The collected poetry of Studdert Kennedy was published in 1927 as 'The Unutterable Beauty'. This was at a time when all the country was feeling the raw grief of the huge loss of life. Every community had lost many men, mostly young. There was a huge gap in people's lives and they struggled to make sense of it all. At Bengeworth Church a whole chapel was created to remember the fallen. In many places war memorials were built to help with remembrance. At St. Paul's Worcester Studdert built a very large crucifix as a war memorial which still stands outside the Church even though sadly the building has ceased to function. 'Surely a Mother understands Thy thorn-crowned head, the mystery of thy pierced hands – the Broken Bread.'

Studdert only had a decade of life after the war. He had an extraordinary personal charisma, which attracted large audiences. His language was colourful and he

would speak to people rather than preach to them illustrated by his use of a chair on the steps up to the altar. It was inevitable that he left St Paul's Worcester in 1921 to become Chief Missioner of the Industrial Christian Fellowship in London. His funeral was held in Worcester Cathedral in 1929. Thousands attended and lined the streets. Archbishop William Temple said that he was "One of God's greatest gifts to our generation" and "the finest priest I have ever known".

As we commemorate the outbreak of the First World War one hundred years later we reflect on a four year conflict which was to change people's lives in a way that they could not envisage at the time. Studdert Kennedy is one of many people who have shaped popular thinking about suffering and war. It is important to remember their experience of the reality of war. The tragedy would be if in this computer games age war is divorced from any understanding of suffering.

## **Missioner News from Sarah Jayne Hewitt**

The Missioners Conference that I attended was outstanding, giving ample time to sit and consider everything we had heard. At the end I sat down and wondered if I were to come up with just one thing from the conference what would it be?

It was this: Let's stop doing anything that isn't missional and what we have to do, that is not missional, how do we incorporate mission?

I was interested in what George Lings had to say on the first day. He explained about being, "committed at the core, loose at the edges" an idea from the Northumbria Community.

For many church members the phrase 'regular attendance' has become meaningless. Perhaps monthly is the new normal? Clergy wish for weekly attendance but this is not the norm. Paradoxically, looseness in attendance will require a more committed life between attendances. This is a challenge for all of us. How do we maintain our faith and faith relationships without weekly attendance?

There is also new variety of de-churched people, who have left a church but kept the faith. George asked us to consider what their reason for leaving could be. He says, it is, apparently a combination of a lack of sense of belonging and church infighting. We need to take heed of this.

Blending is also on the increase: blending means mixing attendance at other places and local church attendance. Where is the boundary between the core and the loose edge? Are we committed at the core?

So we need to search for our church DNA, both its essence, and its method of transmission. Is this about relationships or practices? We need to build a relationship of love with God, love our neighbour, and love of ourselves. This then needs to go into our practices, not the other way round.

A path for all Christians? Disciples are better seen as apprentices. Learning about our faith is not just about content. It is about skills. We need to become masters of the skills of mission. The word 'disciple' was, after all replaced by 'Saints' and 'children of God'.

We need to welcome back theosis, to travel and grow like Jesus. (Theosis is the understanding that human beings can have real union with God, and so become like God to such a degree that we participate in the divine nature). That is a vision of what could be at our core. So these are the challenges and I would be interested in your response to them. The challenges George posed are set below.

### **The challenges (for a Missioner and all the church)**

1. Will you love the church?
2. Will you be determined to be Jesus centred?
3. Will you advocate that church is relationships before practices?
4. Will you be clear enough on the core to dare to have looseness at the edges?

## **30 November - Andrew and the Referendum: BETTER TOGETHER?**

Scotland seems to have been a very busy place these last couple of months. The amazing exuberance of the devolution referendum and its consequences have kept the spotlight firmly north of the border and now, at the end of this month, the Scots will be celebrating once again, this time to honour their patron saint, Andrew. The referendum campaign earned universal respect for its enthusiasm, mass participation and generous spirit. It was good to be reminded that it is possible to disagree agreeably, to hold passionate convictions oneself and yet respect the equally passionate convictions of others. In the end 'Better Together' just beat 'Let's Separate', but there was little bitterness at the end of a fiercely fought but fair exercise in democracy.

And now it is time for St Andrew to be honoured - the disciple who is noted for the way in which he longed to share with others the good thing he had discovered. It was not enough for him simply to decide for himself to recognise Jesus as the Messiah of Israel and follow him. He went straight off and introduced his brother Peter to the Saviour, and followed that up by bringing Nathanael/Bartholomew to Jesus. 'Better Together' seems to have been his slogan, too! 'We have found the Messiah!', he told them, unable to keep the good news to himself.

Andrew's connection with Scotland dates back to the claimed translation of his remains from Patras in Achaia to Scotland in the eighth century. The church in Fife where these remains were buried became a place of pilgrimage during the tenth century. All of this may be no more than pious legend, of course, but that St Andrew was highly regarded in Scotland and became its patron saint is beyond doubt.

Perhaps in the new spirit of togetherness engendered in these islands by the referendum result we might take a fresh look at our four patron saints. Patrick and David are secure, genuinely historical and undoubtedly linked to the lands that now honour them. Andrew has little proven connection with Scotland but presents an admirable historical example of faith and commitment to the good of others. St George, by contrast, has not the remotest connection with England (and indeed may never have existed). Might this be the time to look again at England's patron saint and even (dare one say it?) replace him with a more credible candidate - St Alban, the first English martyr, might fill the role admirably?

Meanwhile, this month Scotland remembers one of the very first disciples of Jesus, a man more honoured for those he brought into the kingdom of heaven than for his own mighty miracles or deeds of faith. Perhaps with him, and the saintly Patrick and David, we can all learn to march 'better together' into what one hopes will be a generous and bright future for these islands? And I suspect that George, the Turkish soldier-martyr, would enjoy the journey too!

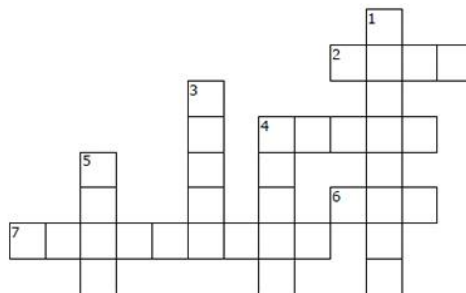

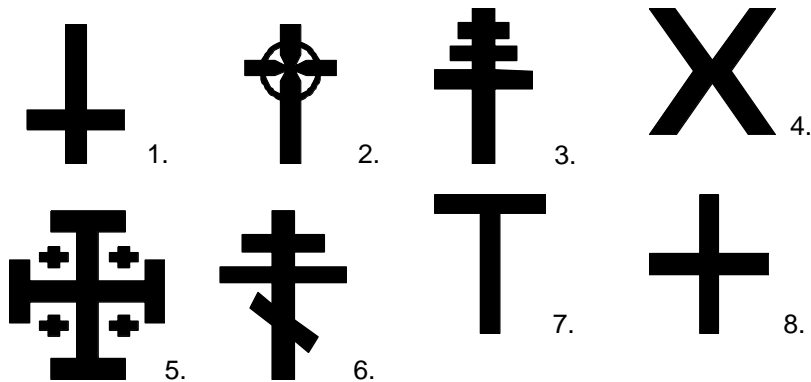


COVENTRY CATHEDRAL

The medieval cathedral was a burnt out shell. Two of the burnt roof beams were tied together to make a cross and this makeshift symbol was set up where the altar had been. A cross was also made from the 14<sup>th</sup> century iron nails that had held the roof together and this Cross of Nails still remains today as a symbol of sympathy, forgiveness and reconciliation. Copies of the Cross of Nails have been presented to countries round the globe as a reminder that love and understanding bind us together and that we need to remember the horrors that happen when people forget that.

## Lest We Forget

One of the most amazing sights in London this year has been the art installation 'Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red' at the Tower of London. The dry moat has been filled with 888,246 ceramic poppies, each representing a British or Colonial soldier killed in the First World War and commemorated in this centenary year. 'In Flanders fields, the poppies grow between the crosses, row on row, that mark our places; and in the sky the larks, still bravely singing, fly scarce heard amongst the guns below.'

This is the first stanza of John McCrae's poem, first published in Punch magazine in 1915. Within months, it came to symbolise the sacrifices of all who were fighting in the First World War. Today, the poppy remains a tangible symbol of all those who have sacrificed their lives in war. But why do we remember?

'They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore.' (Micah 4:3). Writing about 700 years before Christ, Micah's words have to be seen against a background of violence with the fall of Samaria and the instability created by the aggression of Assyria. However, he prophesied a future of hope, a world where nations come together in peace instead of war. His vision saw a time when the arms of war would be turned into farming tools and people would live in peaceful community.

Our understanding of peace is more than the avoidance of war or the absence of conflict. It's about building relationships between people, communities and nations, which positively creates a love and care for others founded on justice for all. As we remember the sacrifice of those who died in the First World War, our response must be to look practically at how we can build relationships of peace and justice in our world, starting with our own families, colleagues and neighbourhoods. As Micah says, 'we will walk in the name of the Lord our God for ever and ever.' (4:5). We always need God's presence and power to change us into the people who have a passion for peace and justice, and compassion for everyone. 'They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old: Age shall not weary them, nor the years condemn. At the going down of the sun and in the morning we will remember them.'

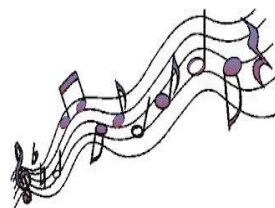
