





### Prayers ... for the Church

For unto you is born this day a Saviour which is Christ the Lord As you prepare during Advent for the great Feast of Christmas, pray for Christians who are persecuted for their faith and who may therefore be unable to join in the celebration. On Christmas Day give thanks for the gift of our Saviour come to live amongst us, as He still does in spirit and in love. Pray too for those for whom this will be a discovery of a great truth; that they may continue to grow in understanding and faith. On 28<sup>th</sup> when we remember the Holy Innocents put to death by order of Herod, bring before God all children who are victims of neglect and cruelty from those who should care for them; may this be a season when the love of God delivers them from their unhappiness.

Mention the people of the Pacific Islands that they may live happily together in prosperity.

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# From Mark Binney Silent Night

This Christmas the carol Silent Night is being sung as a reminder of the remarkable Christmas truce of 1914. Albert Moren a British soldier recalled that 'it was a beautiful moonlit night, frost on the ground, white almost everywhere.... There was a lot of commotion in


the German trenches and then there were those lights – I don't know what they were. And then they sang "Stille Nacht" – "Silent Night". I shall never forget it. It was one of the highlights of my life.' The soldiers exchanged gifts of tobacco and chocolate and played football between the trenches in no man's land.

Silent Night was first performed on Christmas Eve 1818 at St. Nicholas Parish Church in the Austrian village of Oberndorf near Salzburg. The young priest Father Joseph Mohr had written the lyrics and asked the schoolmaster and organist Franz Xaver Gruber to compose a melody and guitar accompaniment for the church service. The Carol has grown to be a favourite throughout the world ever since.

For the Centenary of the 1914 truce a new verse and chorus has been commissioned for the carol, which will be sung by thousands of football fans and carol singers at Silent Night events throughout the country. There is a stadium event at Evesham United Football Club at 1pm on Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> December sponsored by Churches Together in Evesham as part of Hope 2014. You are warmly invited to bring your family and friends to sing carols at this special event.

The Christmas truce lasted until the morning of December 26<sup>th</sup>. The power of the moment is in the joy that Christ the Saviour is born. There is hope for this divided world. The Archbishop of Canterbury invites us this Christmas to leave our defended positions and meet those we might consider to be our enemies, exchange greetings and make peace.

# **Gift Aid**

Yours, Lord, is the greatness, the power, the glory, the splendour, and the majesty; for everything in heaven and on earth is yours. All things come from you and of your own do we give you. (Quote from the old ASB Communion Service)

The time has come to start preparing the 'regular giving' boxes for next year. Regular giving is such an important part of our Church life, not only because it is a way of showing our love to God for all he gives us, but because without it we would not have a Church to worship in or money to spend on Mission, which is what we as Jesus' Disciples are called to do. Over the year we support the work of the Tots Group, Open the Book at St. Andrew's School, regular input at Alphabet House Play Group, the Youth Group as well as our Bible study groups.

In this country, unlike some other European countries, we do not receive any help from Government for the upkeep of our churches. Our Parish Share, which we are required to pay, helps to support our Clergy, both active and retired, as well as educating and training new clergy, Readers and ALMs, and mission both at home and abroad, which the Diocese carries out. Then, there are all the regular Church bills; heating, light, insurance, cleaning, office equipment, repairs – great and small, and anything we feel would enhance the working of our community, such as putting in a toilet so that the church is more accessible for use by the Tots Group and the older members of our congregations. Those coming to Weddings, Baptisms and Funerals, may have travelled a long way and it is a long way across the vicarage garden to the toilet at the Parish Room. We are very fortunate that we have John Martin as our benefactor and still receive substantial support from the John Martin Charity, without which we would not be a viable church.

We are very grateful to all those who give on a regular basis, whether Gift Aided or not. Most people now know that Gift Aid can be claimed on any giving by a person who pays Income Tax enough to cover the amount claimed which is 25p for every £ given. We now have new rules from HMRC which mean that any giving on the plate, and that includes envelopes which are not Gift Aided, at a service with 10 or more people in the congregation, can also be counted for Gift Aid, with some provisos. We cannot include cheques or any giving by one person that amounts to more than £20 at any one time. Even so this has made a welcome difference to the amount of Gift Aid we have been able to claim.

# We three kings of Orient are... what?

"A cold coming they had of it at this time of the year, just the worst time of the year to take a journey, and specially a long journey, in. The way's deep, the weather sharp, the days short, the sun farthest off, in solstitio brumali, the very dead of winter."

It was 1622, and the Bishop of Winchester, Launcelot Andrews, was preaching a magnificent sermon to King James I. Reckoned one of the best preachers ever, Launcelot Andrews' words were later taken up by T S Eliot and transformed into his wonderful poem 'The Journey of the Magi'. What a vivid picture – we can see it all! The camels' breath steaming in the night air as the kings, in their gorgeous robes of silk and cloth-of-gold and clutching their precious gifts, kneel to adore the baby in the manger.

Yet the Bible does not give us as much detail as some people think. Tradition down the centuries has added a great deal more. For instance, we know from St Matthew that the magi were 'wise', or learned men of some sort, but we do not know if they were kings or not. The Bible tells us there were several; tradition has decided upon three, and even named them: Balthassar, Melchior, and Caspar (or Gaspar). But the Bible does tell us that the magi gave baby Jesus three highly symbolic gifts: gold, and frankincense, and myrrh. Gold stands for kingship, frankincense for worship, and myrrh for anointing – anticipating his death.

There is a lovely ancient mosaic in Ravenna, Italy, that is 1,500 years old. It depicts the wise men in oriental garb of trousers and Phrygian caps, carrying their gifts past palm trees towards the star that they followed... straight to Jesus.

Our beautiful church has been included in the recent At Risk Register, published by Worcestershire Heritage, stating that St Peter's in Hinton on the Green is "very bad" with structural cracks on the tower.

#### Yew 4 you

Yew trees can be found growing in churchyards all over the country. Many of them are hundreds of years old and some pre-date the church itself. The dark foliage and bright berries of the Yew are a welcome sight as winter approaches. They are often found in churchyards because this area would be enclosed and animals were unlikely to wander in there. **Every part of the Yew is highly** 



poisonous except for the fleshy fruit BUT .... THE SEED INSIDE IS DEADLY.

If you go into a churchyard or have Yew trees in your garden be **very** careful that children do not eat the 'fruits'. The Yew relies on birds to help it spread to new areas. Seeds pass harmlessly through the bird to be 'deposited' in a new site ready to grow into a tree. Some animals seem able to eat the berries, known as arils, with impunity e.g. foxes, squirrels and badgers but **never underestimate its toxicity**. Don't allow your pet to chew Yew wood, and make your family aware of its dangers.

# Why Rudolph really does have a red nose

As Rudolph the Red-nosed Reindeer celebrates his 75th birthday this month, it has been discovered that the red nose may well have some basis in scientific fact.

Researchers in Sweden have used thermal imaging cameras to capture the heat from reindeer as they graze, and discovered that while most of a reindeer body is well insulated, their noses glow bright orange, due to the large amounts of heat that they release. The reason is simple: reindeer have a high concentration of blood vessels in their nose and lips to help keep those areas warm and sensitive as they rummage through snow, looking for food.

Angels are God's messengers and you can read about the good news they brought to the shepherds in Luke's Gospel, chapter 2, verses 8-20.


## MAKE YOUR OWN CHRISTMAS ANGEL

You can make a whole host of angels, one for the top of the tree and a row of them, all different sizes, to go on a windowsill. To alter the size, simply draw a bigger or smaller circle, you could use a dinner plate or a small tin to draw round. You could even make a giant angel using a dustbin lid!



#### You will need:

Scissors, thick white paper or thin white card, some felt tip pens and something circular to draw round (use a small plate or saucer to start with).



Draw a circle on the paper and cut it out. Mark the centre of the circle (lightly fold it into quarters to find the centre).

Copy the face and features on to the circle and colour them in.

Mark the dotted lines and cut around them and around the halo and hair as marked.

Fold the angel into a cone by putting one wing over the other and slotting them together. A little piece of sellotape will hold it firmly.

What do fish sing at Christmas? Shark, the herald angels sing.

# THE GREAT WAR: AND THE CONSEQUENCE WAS ...

Do you remember the old party game of 'Consequences'? Armed with pencil and paper, participants added various steps to a sequence of events, culminating in the requirement to answer this question: 'And the consequence was?' Well, mostly that was amusing, but in real life consequences of our actions are not always funny, sometimes they are disastrous. That seems to be the story of the end of the Great War. The guns fell silent on November 11th 1918, but the consequences of that appalling conflict rumbled on through the history of Europe ever since. The problems seem to have stemmed from the 'peace process' itself. After the Armistice, there were months of negotiations culminating in the Treaty of Versailles, which was finally signed on the 29th of June 1919.

The conditions of the Treaty, largely dictated by the victorious Allies, were intended to ensure that Germany would be in no position in the foreseeable future to embark on military aggression. Kaiser Wilhelm was to go into exile. The German army was to be limited to 100,000 men, with no artillery, tanks or aircraft and her navy reduced to only eight sea-going ships - with no submarines. The Rhineland would be occupied by the Allies for fifteen years, and Alsace-Lorraine was returned to France. Other parts of Germany were ceded to Poland and all overseas territories were shared between the Allies. Probably worst of all were the swinging financial reparations, which Germany had to pay for the damage she had inflicted on other countries. Effectively, the German economy was left in ruins. Very soon, this led to the collapse of the Deutschmark. Hyperinflation followed in

the early years of the nineteen-twenties. By 1923 a loaf of bread cost two billion marks! Wages devalued overnight and families were literally starving. Not surprisingly there was disorder and strikes, and America felt bound to come to her rescue, pumping money into the German economy.

The Wall Street Crash of 1929 put an end to that, paving the way for an ambitious politician called Adolf Hitler to offer an authoritarian way out - National Socialism. Singling out the German Jews as 'the problem' - the hideous era of the Hitler Youth, the Nuremberg Rallies, Kristallnacht and Belsen began. Hitler built the autobahns and made the trains run on time, but he also prepared a whole nation for war and did his best to eliminate the Jewish people altogether.

And the consequence was? Well, take your choice, but the Second World War is the most obvious, and the mass emigration of Jews to their old homeland was another. There was a better consequence, too. At the end of World War II Churchill demanded 'Unconditional Surrender' by the Axis powers, but he also counselled 'magnanimity in victory'. The lesson of 1919 had been learnt. Germany and Japan were defeated, but not humiliated, and the world now is a rather safer place . . . as a consequence.

### Little Hospice Hoima Legalising the prescription of morphine in Uganda

Imagine a world where the strongest painkiller is Paracetamol. This was the situation in 1993 when Hospice Africa started work in Uganda. After much lobbying by Dr



Anne and Dr Jack Jagwe, the law in Uganda was changed in 2004 and oral morphine can now be prescribed, both by doctors and also by nurses who have qualified at Hospice Africa Uganda. This has encouraged the legalisation and use of morphine in other countries. This is now recognised as the key step in developing palliative care in sub-Saharan Africa.

At Hospice Africa Uganda patients are asked to pay 5,000/- per week, (about £1.50) towards the total cost of 45,000/- for care per week, independent of the number of visits and medications. About one third of patients can manage to pay. HAU assist those who cannot afford (60%). HAU visit patients and families at home, supports them with pain and symptom control and counselling. This cost includes transport and specially trained staff. A daily dose of morphine costs about 20p.
