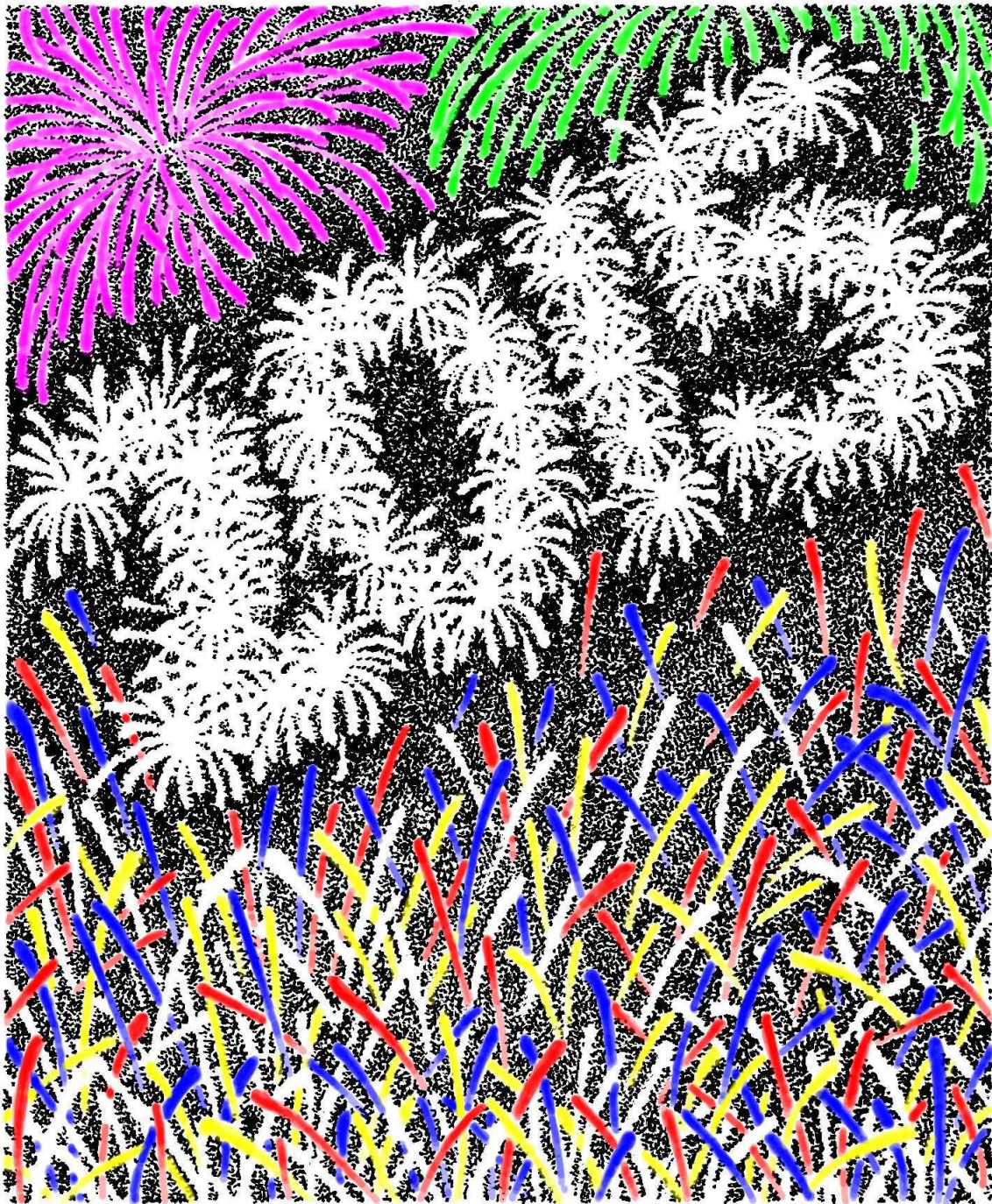

THE WELL IS DEEP



The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity is traditionally observed from 18 to 25 January. Every year the theme for the Week comes from a different part of the World. This year it is called 'The Well is Deep' and has been chosen by the churches of Brazil. They have traditionally been tolerant of their various social classes and ethnic groups but are now living through a time of growing intolerance made manifest in high levels of violence, especially against minorities and the vulnerable. Increasingly there is competition for the religious market by some Christian groups for a place on the mass media, for new members and for public funds.

The Brazilian churches have begun to recognise that intolerance should be dealt with in a positive way by respecting diversity and promoting dialogue. We can share in this task. Competition and violent discrimination lies beneath the surface of our society. Jesus challenges us to acknowledge that diversity is part of God's design, to approach one another in trust and see the face of God in all men and women.

It is easy to prefer the company of 'people like us', who share the same background, upbringing and tastes. The problem is that people like that seem to be becoming fewer these days. Perhaps this is because as we get older we become set and narrow in our ways. It is easy to slip into a prejudice against anyone who is different.

The alternative is to celebrate difference. This is after all what makes travel such a rich experience. This also applies to religion. It is easy to un-church people with a different background from our own and chop up the Body of Christ into separate denominations. The danger is living and worshipping in watertight boxes that have no connection with other believers. This is why the work of Churches Together is so important that Christians work together as the Body of Christ.

As we enter another year let us seek to model our lives on the tolerant and loving life of Christ. That's what matters, all the other things we argue about are only words. If the centre of your faith is strong then it doesn't matter what happens on the periphery.

1 January - The Naming of Jesus

It is Matthew and Luke who tell the story of how the angel instructed that Mary's baby was to be named Jesus - a common name meaning 'saviour'. The Church recalls the naming of Jesus on 1 January - eight days after 25 December (by the Jewish way of reckoning days). For in Jewish tradition, the male babies were circumcised and named on their eighth day of life.

For early Christians, the name of Jesus held a special significance. In Jewish tradition, names expressed aspects of personality. Jesus' name permeated his ministry, and it does so today: we are baptised in the name of Jesus (Acts 2:38), we are justified through the name of Jesus (1 Cor 6:11); and God the Father has given Jesus a name above all others (Phil 2:9). All Christian prayer is through 'Jesus Christ our Lord', and it is 'at the name of Jesus' that one day every knee shall bow.

Have you ever wondered where the name 'Jesus' comes from?

The name Jesus is a transliteration of a name that occurs in several languages. It is of Hebrew origin, 'Yehosua', or Joshua. Or there is the Hebrew-Aramaic form, 'Yesua'. In Greek, it became 'Ἰησοῦς' (Iēsoûs), and in Latin it became 'Iesus'.

The meaning of the name is 'Yahweh delivers' or 'Yahweh rescues', or 'Yahweh is salvation'. No wonder the angel Gabriel in Luke 1:26-33 told Mary to name her baby Jesus: "because he will save his people from their sins".

25th January – time for haggis and bagpipes!

He died 'lang syne' – long ago, back in 1796, but the Scottish poet Robert Burns is



still remembered each January, over many a 'Burns Night' supper of cock-a-leekie soup, haggis, neeps and tatties - and whisky. Scots and other Burns lovers throughout the world, from Canada to the USA to Russia, still celebrate the poems this most beloved of Scots poets wrote so long ago.

Burns wrote about ordinary things – food, love, death, friendship, and disappointment. We still quote him: 'the best laid schemes o' Mice an' Men'. And at the end of our

lives, we can use his 'Prayer, in Prospect of Death': 'Thou art good; and Goodness still/Delighteth to forgive'. Indeed the Bible promises that if we put our trust in God, he will forgive us and give us new life in him. A good thought at the beginning of a new year!

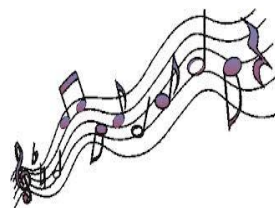
