From Mark Binney 'Peace be with you'

When Jesus appeared among the disciples on that first Easter Sunday, his first words were 'Peace be with you'. These were the usual words with which one Jew greeted another and they still are. The Hebrew word for peace is 'Shalom'.



Nowadays it has become a widespread custom to pass the peace in Church during our Sunday Worship. The priest or minister will read a verse of Scripture and then say, 'The peace of the Lord be always with you', to which the congregation reply, 'And also with you'. Next the minister says 'Let us greet one another with a sign of peace.' Then everyone shakes hands with those around them, saying 'Peace be with you.'

In doing so we are repeating to each other the words with which the risen Christ greeted his disciples on the first Easter Sunday. We are declaring our faith that 'where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them'. We recognise that Jesus stands with us when we worship and that he brings his peace into our troubled lives. The hand of Jesus is extended to us through the other members of our church.

For many people there is no peace in their lives. There is strife at home, strife at work, money problems, being let down by friends. So if you wish them peace then you are praying for a radical change in their circumstances. Peace is not something to be taken for granted. It has to be worked for, appreciated, accepted. When we look at the world about us there are terrible conflicts going on where peace is absent and whole nations are suffering.

The peace of Jesus is very much at the heart of the church. It is sad when someone refuses to share the peace. In middle eastern tradition you do not sit down at a meal with someone unless you are at peace with them. Every worshipper is called to share Christ's peace this Easter with those around them that we might know his risen presence to bring peace to the church, peace among nations, peace in our family life, and peace in our hearts.

The peace of God, which passes all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of his son Jesus Christ our Lord.

Never Far Away - The Road to Emmaus

Lester Amann considers how the risen Christ reveals Himself to us...

We can only imagine how the two travelers to Emmaus felt knowing that Jesus had died. Gone were their hopes for a bright future. They thought God had let them down. They had suffered a cruel blow and were bewildered and upset.

In their grief, the risen Jesus came alongside them and spoke with them at length but somehow they didn't recognise Him. Why was this, and why did Jesus intend to leave them at Emmaus without first revealing who He was?

The answers may be found by looking back at the

The answers may be found by looking back at the encounters Jesus had with people. He never forced His true nature onto anyone. Every individual had to make up their own mind as to who He was, and to decide if the things He said were true.



Today, Jesus does not 'gate-crash' into our lives. In a number of ways He gently and persuasively reveals Himself. So, the story of the walk to Emmaus should encourage us each time we feel His absence; at those times when we thought He would step in and immediately solve our problems! On our journey of life, we can have times of sadness and it can seem as though God is far away.

But while we are thinking that Jesus has left us alone, He is actually with us. He knows where we are and what we are feeling. He can quietly draw alongside us. Surprisingly, it can sometimes be in situations of sadness and solitude that Jesus 'speaks' to us more clearly.

We don't have to go off in search of some 'religious experience' or to a special 'holy place'. He is present in the here and now. Jesus is the unseen companion on every journey and the unseen guest at every meal. In His way and in His time, our Lord reveals Himself to us in different situations. We may be aware of His presence in surprising circumstances and on unexpected occasions. How important it is that we stay alert.

There will be times when we will be like those two men on the Emmaus Road, searching for answers. We will earnestly desire clear and direct answers to our questions and the knowledge, understanding or revelation may be slow to come. But, with Jesus, there are many lessons to be learnt along our Emmaus Road than would have been discovered any other way.



Working out the Date for Easter Day

Because the Church calendar follows the moon, Easter Day can be on any Sunday from March 22nd to April 25th! Easter happened on a date representing the first Full Moon of Spring on the Jewish Calendar. Because of that, Easter Day is always the first Sunday after the first calculated Full Moon on or after March 21st. If the Full Moon is on a Sunday, Easter Day is on the next Sunday.

For the past 1500 years, March 21st has been used to represent the date of the March equinox (the real equinox might be a day or two different).

Several methods have been used since early Christian times to work out the date of Easter Day. It was made more complicated in 1582 when Pope Gregory XIII replaced the old Roman 'Julian' calendar (started by Julius Caesar) with a new more accurate 'Gregorian' calendar, which most people still use today. In the UK, Easter was first calculated using the Gregorian calendar in 1753 when the country had changed calendars.

The next time Easter will be on March 22nd (as early as it can be), will be in the year 2285. Easter last occurred on March 22nd in 1818!

There are several version of how to calculate the date of Easter. Below is a version with all the maths already done (it works for the Gregorian calendar for the years 1900 to 2199), so all you have to do is:

- 1. Divide the year number by 19: e.g.2015/19=106.05
- 2. Multiple the number before the decimal point by 19 (106 for 2015): 106x19=2014
- 3. Then subtract the result from Step 2 from the year number: 2015-2014=1
- 4. Add 1: 1+1=2
- 5. Look up the 'Golden Number' in the following table (2 for 2015!). Easter is on the first Sunday after the date in the table. In 2015 Easter is on April 5th, so it works!

The number 19 is used to find the 'Golden Number' because the dates of Full Moons repeat, almost exactly, every 19 years. The dates in the table are the dates of the 'Paschal Full Moon' (a 'representative' Full Moon used in the calculations!), which represents the real Full Moon quite closely.

For the love of chocolate

Are you going to indulge in Easter chocolate this year? Ever wonder where it first came from? We have the Aztecs of equatorial Central America to thank: it was they who discovered that a certain tree, later named Theobroma Cacao, was well worth cultivating. The Aztecs considered chocolate the 'drink of the gods' (Theo means God, broma means drink; hence the name). The Aztecs credited chocolate for everything from spiritual wisdom to sexual prowess; Emperor Montezuma is reported to have drunk more than 50 flagons of the stuff each day.

The Spanish explorer Cortes also called it 'the divine drink', and the conquistadors brought chocolate back to Spain. From there it travelled north, and reached England about 1849. It was first served as a drink, until during the Industrial Revolution it caught the attention of several leading Quaker families, (including the Cadburys, the Frys, the Rowntrees and the Terrys. It was the Fry family who created the first 'eating' chocolate... and the rest, as they say, is history. Today the world eats about 600,000 tons a year. Enjoy your Easter egg!

The Real Easter Egg

The Real Easter Egg is still the only Fairtrade egg with a copy of the Easter story in each box. There is also a charitable donation for every 150g egg sold. More than £140,000 has been donated from sales. It also supports farmers and producers in the developing world by using Fairtrade chocolate.

David Marshall, who heads up the Meaningful Chocolate Company, said; "The



Real Easter Egg campaign aims to establish giving a Real Easter Egg as a tradition. We can be found in Tesco, Waitrose and Morrison's. This is a very positive example of putting our faith into practice so it is hoped that churches will support this year's Real Easter Egg campaign by visiting www.realeasteregg.co.uk and ordering.

Each year the content of the Real Easter Egg changes. This year blue egg has a unique 3ft storybook/banner, the Premium Peace Edition contains an olive wood key ring made in Bethlehem and there is a dairy free dark chocolate egg.




Prayers ... for the people around us

Hampton WI - March 2015

Ann Evans welcomed members to this month's meeting, along with one new member, Sally and a prospective dual member who had recently moved into the area. The New Year Lunch at Broadway Golf Club had been very enjoyable. The food, as always, had been very good, and on such a fine day, the views over the Vale had made a lovely backdrop.

Several members had attended the Daffodil evening at Fladbury WI. It had been a lovely evening, with a talk on Mary Quant, illustrated with many of her designs and other items, accompanied by a 60's style buffet.

Two members have birthdays this month and they were presented with posies made by Ann. This was an innovation for the current year, along with the new competition format, which had proved very successful, with a marked increase in entries.

Members were told of a Special WI Garden Party at Buckingham Palace in June, to mark the WI Centenary. Unfortunately tickets were limited to one per institute. Members wishing to attend would be balloted.

Four members volunteered to make up a team for the Group Quiz on 28 April. A friendly skittles morning followed by lunch, had been arranged for 30 April at St Ecgwins Club.

It was then time to welcome John Derby, who had come to tell us about the work of the Evesham Street Pastors. He started off by telling us about Evesham nightlife, which was a bit of an eye-opener for most of us who tend to think of Evesham as a relatively quiet town. Apparently Evesham has the reputation for being a lively place at night! The three night clubs are open past midnight, and people come for a fairly wide radius to enjoy the night life. On a busy night between 2am and 3am, there can be up to 500 people on the streets, or 200 to 300 on less busy nights.

The Street Pastors spend time in prayer before going out on to the streets at 10pm. They return at midnight for some refreshment and go out again at 1.45am until around 3pm, and are usually back home in bed by 4pm. Back at base, prayer partners will be praying for them.

Street Pastors started nationally about ten to twelve years ago, at a time when street crime was on the increase. They form a bridge between the Church and the world at large, and are well supported by the Churches in Evesham.

During a typical night they will be giving out flip-flops to girls struggling on high heeled shoes; space blankets to keep scantily girls warm; lollipops which help to diffuse potentially dangerous situations; bottles of water to help with dehydration; bottle tops which can be used to prevent drinks being spiked with dangerous substances, and last but not least – sick bags.

A great deal of the time, they will just be talking, or rather, listening to young people who need to talk about their problems. According to their activity log, last year they had 2695 significant conversations, and were asked to pray for 220 people. In many cases just by talking and listening they can alleviate situations without the need for police to be involved.

John kindly judged this month's competition, for an item beginning with 'M', and the winner was Joan Parry with some pre-decimal MONEY. Next month it's 'A', so we are looking forward to a wide range of entries again.

At our meeting on 9 April **Prime Ministers' Partners** will be the subject of David Howe's talk.

We are always pleased to see visitors, so do come along to one of our meetings at the Hampton Guide and Scout Community Hall. You will be made very welcome. Our meetings are held at the Hampton Guide and Scout Community Hall on the second Thursday of the month at 7.30 pm. Do come and join us.

What do we want from our Parliament?

With the General Election coming in May, this Christian perspective on politics might be of interest...by Antony Billington, head of theology at the LICC.

A few months ago, in late January, we marked the 750th anniversary of the first English Parliament, held by Simon de Montfort in the Palace of Westminster. In another few weeks, in May, we will be facing a General Election. So it seems appropriate to recognise the long, albeit somewhat chequered, history of democracy we have enjoyed in this country.

At the very least, elections provide an opportunity for us to reflect on priorities and concerns, for ourselves and for the society in which we live: health, education, transport, housing, welfare, tax, crime, environment, immigration. Not for the first time will we notice how many of these play to our fears as well as our hopes.

In all of this, we recognise that politics is an inevitable feature of life for the 'whole-life' disciple. We recognise, too, that Scripture allows us to be neither overly cynical nor overly confident about the potential of politics to make a difference.

As Romans 13:1-7 reminds us, we acknowledge that 'the authorities... have been established by God for... our good' – words written in the context of an imperial power holding sway. In the UK, where we have a voice in deciding who the 'authorities' should be, where it's possible to encourage the values by which society operates, we accept the responsibility that comes with the privilege, and vote wisely.


More specifically, a perspective nourished by Scripture helps to reframe how and why we vote. We vote not simply for what will benefit *ourselves*, but for what will benefit *others*, for that which serves the wider community. Scripture places high premium on right treatment of the vulnerable and marginalised. What do manifestos say about the poor, the elderly, the disabled, the asylum seeker? Since the gospel reframes *aspirations*, we vote less for what might bring material gain than for what might bring moral gain.

What will be the effect of policies on marriage, family life, poverty? Given the centrality of *relationship* at the heart of the gospel, we vote for what will build and nurture relationships – personally, nationally, internationally. On issues related to religion, not least the freedom to practise our faith in the public square, we vote for that which is more likely to promote the way of the gospel.

Who we vote for and why arguably says as much about us as it does about candidates and parties. Who will you vote for? What will you vote for?
