

Who is Welcome this Christmas?

There was no-room for the refugee family. Everywhere was full to overflowing. The last inn they tried was packed, so they had to make do with a shed, camping out, making a home as best they could, finding somewhere dry at least, so the baby could be born under the shelter of a barn roof.

No room for the refugees. It's been an on-going theme of our news cycle this year as the plight of families fleeing Syria has worsened. We have witnessed millions of people fleeing war and violence in what has become one of the largest refugee crises ever recorded. And it has been the pictures of child refugees which have most impacted us.

Jesus, as a child, was a refugee, unwelcome and homeless. No wonder then that as he grew up and began his earthly ministry, he called outcasts friends, invited those on the edges to come closer. Many of those who were comfortable and settled continued to reject him, or simply missed the opportunity to welcome him into their homes, their lives, because they did not grasp who he was.

We easily sanitise our recounting of the birth of Jesus as we celebrate Christmas. The stable becomes a homely scene, softly lit, populated with wise men, shepherds and cute donkeys. We forget it was a last resort: a dirty shed occupied because young refugee parents were shut out of all the more suitable accommodation. Let's allow ourselves to engage with this part of the story differently this time, perhaps allowing ourselves to consider whether we would have welcomed a refuge family into our homes then, and whether we would now.

Let's also reflect this Christmas on whether we are really ready to welcome Jesus into our homes, our lives, not just at Christmas, as a baby, but the rest of the year, as our Lord and Saviour, and one who invites us to love and welcome those who are outcasts, as he loves and welcomes us.

Holy Land Pilgrimage

Most popular Bible Stories: Who is the Baby?

A little girl was examining a Christmas crib with her grandmother and commented, 'Grandma, it's really nice, but there's one thing that bothers me: is the baby Jesus ever going to grow up? He's the same size he was last year!!' As we continue with the top ten Must Know Stories, the birth of Jesus must be the most well-known. However, are we really growing in our understanding of this story? The angels announced, 'Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord.' (Luke 2: 10,11). The birth of a baby is a time of great joy and excitement and Jesus' birth is good news for all people! He is none other than the king of the universe, who has come as our Saviour. To experience this joy, we must let go self-centredness and living as our own saviour. His deliverance and wholeness is a real cause for joy! 'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests.' (Luke 2:14). We may feel anything but peace with God, ourselves, or even with those closest to us at Christmas. How can a Jewish infant born to a peasant family in first century Palestine be the source of peace between God and man in the twenty first century? Jesus came to establish such peace through his death on the cross. Trusting the Prince of Peace in our lives brings peace with God. If we ignore this message of Christmas, we won't benefit from it. As the carol says, 'Joy to the world, the Lord has come, let earth receive her king.'

The Story behind the Hymn: Good King Wencelas

Each year at Christmas we sing about good King Wenceslas looking on the Feast of Stephen... ever wonder who on earth he was? Here are three of the five verses...

Good King Wenceslas looked on the Feast of Stephen
When the snow lay round about, deep and crisp and even.
Brightly shone the moon that night, tho' the frost was cruel
When the poor man came sight, gathering winter fuel...
Bring me flesh and bring me wine; bring me pine logs hither;
Thou and I will see him dine when we bear them thither.
Page and monarch forth they went, forth they went together,
Through the rude winds' wild lament, and the bitter weather...
In his master's step he trod where the snow lay dinted;
Heat was in the very sod which the saint had printed.
Therefore Christian men, be sure wealth of rank possessing,
Ye who now will bless the poor, shall yourself find blessing.

This carol was 900 years in the making... and started with a brutal murder in Bohemia. For Wenceslas was a real person, the Duke of Bohemia, who lived in the early 10th century. He seems to have been a rare ruler, in that he was just and had compassion for the poor. His goodness made him enemies, and when he was only 22, he was assassinated on the steps of a church in Prague in 935. But that was not the end of Wenceslas. Deeply mourned by the common people, he was soon considered a martyr and a saint.

A cult of Wenceslas grew up in Bohemia, influencing the High Middle Ages idea of the rex Justus – or 'righteous king' - that is, a monarch whose power stems mainly from his great piety. The story of Wenceslas came to England sometime before 1853, when Queen Victoria's envoy to Stockholm sent some rare books to a friend, John Mason Neale, Warden of Sackville College, East Grinstead. Here Neale found the story of Wenceslas in an ancient poem by Czech poet Václav Alois Svoboda. Neale published his translation as a carol in 1853. He made the 'Duke' into a 'King', as a later Pope had conferred the regal title on Wenceslas. The carol tells the poignant story of a young king and his page braving harsh winter weather in order to bring food, wine and fuel to a poor peasant on the Feast of St Stephen (26 December). The journey is terrible, and the page only gets through by following in the king's footprints, step by step, through deep snow.

There are themes here of following Christ, through suffering, to do good to the poor. If the story is ancient, so is the melody that Neale chose for his carol - it goes back to Finland in 1582. Good King Wenceslas... today, a millennium after his brutal murder, he is still remembered in Prague, where a statue of him stands tall in the middle of Wenceslas Square. His goodness is not forgotten.

Hampton WI - November 2015

Ann Evans, our President, welcomed members and visitors to our meeting on 12 November and began with a few business items.

The first of the bi-monthly Lunches had been held at the Queen's Head, Salford Priors, and had been very enjoyable. In January the venue will be The Star at Ashton under Hill. Members were requested to volunteer to bring raffle prizes, flowers, help with tea and give the vote of thanks to speakers during our 2016 meetings. The visit to Tudor House in Worcester had been interesting and informative, with a tour led by the very enthusiastic curator. Ashton under Hill had been the clear winners of the Group skittles tournament. In February we will be going to Broadway Golf Club for our New Year's Lunch.

The President then introduced Vince Williams and Jon Goodson, who had come to talk to us about 'The WI at War' and some of the many ways in which the WI was able to contribute to the war effort, while maintaining its pacifist status. The first WI in the UK was formed in Llanfair PG on Anglesey in 1915. The aim was to teach women in rural communities to grow and preserve food to help provide essential nutrition for people during the war years and also between the wars, when there was rationing and food was short. To help, the Government relaxed sugar rationing for WI's. With the Germans attacking food convoys and fishing trawlers in an attempt to starve the population, the keeping of livestock became a 'backyard' job. Pig and rabbit clubs were formed and wild rabbits were hunted for food, and also for their pelts, which were then sold to the USA for use in fashion items.


By the time of World War 2, one in 3 villages had a WI and the membership had grown to 300,000. Throughout, the Government encouraged WI's to hold regular meetings to maintain high morale. WI members were involved in transporting and housing evacuees and Lady Denman set up an Ambulance Fund. Food parcels were sent to the colonies and to our allies and, after the war, when the Germans were starving, the WI sent food and clothing to help. At the time of the Cold War the NFWI began a campaign to limit nuclear testing and during the Gulf War they collected books to send to the troops. It was an interesting and enlightening talk. Pam Wills gave the vote of thanks on behalf of members.

There was a good variety of entries in the competition for **something beginning** with 'N', which was won by Sally Aldous with a pen **nib**.

On 10 December it will be our Christmas Social. We are always pleased to welcome new members and visitors. Meetings start at 7.30 pm in the Hampton Guide and Scout Community Hall If you would like to join us at one of our meetings, do come along.



Cranberry Orange Cookies

Ingredients MAKES 48

225g butter, softened 1/2 teaspoon salt

200g caster sugar 225g chopped cranberries

100g dark brown soft sugar 60g chopped walnuts (optional)

1 egg lcing

1 teaspoon orange zest 1/2 teaspoon orange zest

2 tablespoons orange juice 3 tablespoons orange juice

300g plain flour 200g icing sugar

1/2 tsp. bicarbonate of soda


Method

Preheat the oven to 190 C / Gas mark 4.

In a large bowl, cream together the butter, caster sugar and brown sugar until smooth.

Beat in the egg until well blended. Mix in 1 orange zest and juice.

Combine the flour, bicarbonate of soda and salt; stir into the orange mixture. Mix in cranberries and if using, walnuts, until evenly distributed.



Bake for 12 to 14 minutes in the preheated oven, until the edges are golden. Remove from baking sheets to cool on wire racks.

Icing

In a small bowl, mix together 1/2 teaspoon orange zest, 3 tablespoons orange juice and icing sugar until smooth. Spread over the tops of cooled cookies. Let stand until set.


