





From Mark Binney

As we celebrate the joy of Easter we are reminded that Christianity is about faith, our faith in the risen Lord. How effective are we in sharing our faith with those around us? Each of us has a personal story of how we came to Christ. Are we aware of the faith journey of other members of the congregation?

The Easter faith is to be shared with those around us. God makes 'his light shine in our hearts to give us the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Christ' (2 Corinthians 4.6). God enables us to recognize that Jesus is God. He makes it possible by his Holy Spirit for a person to see who Jesus is. When Paul is on the Damascus road he asks "who are you, Lord?" and is told "I am Jesus" (Acts 9.5). This is the moment of Paul's conversion when he recognizes for the first time who Jesus is.

People need to hear the Gospel to be able to respond to God's invitation to enable his light to shine in our hearts. There are many things in this word which blind us to faith. We can chase after the things of the word which are passing away, such as material possessions. They can take the place of God for many people. 'The God of this age has blinded the minds of unbelievers' (2 Corinthians 4.4). The eternal is completely obscured by the here and now.

Easter is the time to commit ourselves afresh to draw people to Jesus to encourage as many as possible to make a decision to follow him. We are all called to share our Easter faith and bring others to Jesus. It is in the success of carrying out this task that the future of the Church depends. This is the mission of the Church. We live at a time when Evesham is growing with all the new housing that is being built. It is vital to reach out and attract the people moving into the area to see the Church as being alive and relevant. God will do his part and we must do ours.

Prayers Published for HM The Queen's 90th Birthday



Her Majesty The Queen has approved prayers written for the celebration of her 90th Birthday. Two prayers (or Collects) have been published in traditional and modern forms. The prayers are primarily intended for use in services marking the national celebrations in April and June. In addition two graces have been published for use as thanksgivings at the start of other celebrations such as street parties. The Bishop of Exeter, Robert Atwell, who chairs the Liturgical Commission which prepares liturgy for the Church said: "The Queen has steered

Britain through some challenging and difficult times over the past seven decades, providing the country with stability and wisdom. She is an inspiration to many people, young and old. The Queen's 90th birthday gives an opportunity not only to thank God for her service, but to celebrate the gifts of all older people in our society." One of the graces reflects the words used in The Queen's first Christmas broadcast in 1952, a year in which her father, George VI died and at the end of which she was looking forward to her Coronation, the following year. Churches are being encouraged to share their plans to mark Her Majesty's birthday through the Church Care website, which also offers tips and advice on planning events and services and will promote initiatives on a dedicated celebration map and on Twitter through @CofE ChurchCare using #HMQ90.

Cuban Biscuits from Women's World Day Of Prayer Service on Friday 4 March (Tortiticas de Nevidad)

Ingredients

150g self raising flour 100g margarine 100g sugar

1 egg

1 cup mixed dried fruit

Glacé cherries

Cornflakes crushed in a bowl

Method

Cream the margarine and sugar Add the egg, flour and dried fruit (plus some extra cherries if liked) Mix well

Make into about 15-18 small balls
Roll balls in the crushed cornflakes
Place on greased or non stick baking tray
Press down gently and place a piece of cherry in the middle of each biscuit
Bake at 180°C (160°C), Gas Mark 4 for 15 to 20 mins.

Most popular Bible Stories: David and Goliath - Five Smooth Stones!

This month's Must Know Story, about Goliath's defeat by David (1 Samuel 17), is one of the best known in the Bible. Goliath was nine feet tall, dressed in bronze armour and carrying a sword and spear. However, David was a young shepherd, whose only weapon was a sling and five smooth stones. We won't face somebody like Goliath, but will face other giants in our lives (fear, insecurity, loneliness, failure etc.) What five stones can help overcome the giants that we face? David was unafraid of Goliath, 'Let no one lose heart on account of this Philistine; your servant will go and fight him.' (32). We need courage to face the giants in our • Confidence: David's experience as a shepherd gave him confidence in facing Goliath. 'The Lord who rescued me from the paw of the lion and the paw of the bear will rescue me from the hand of this Philistine.' (37). We also can be confident in God's help to overcome our problems. • Preparation: 'Then he took his staff in his hand, chose five smooth stones from the stream, put them in the pouch of his shepherd's bag and, with his sling in his hand, approached the Philistine.' (40). Like David, are we using the gifts and experience that God has given us in the fight? • Trust: David didn't trust in his own abilities, 'You come against me with sword and spear and javelin, but I come against you in the name of the Lord Almighty' (45) Will we put our trust in God alone? • Victory: 'for the battle is the Lord's' (47). When we turn our battles over to God, He will give us 'That little stone took Goliath by surprise; such a thing had never entered his head before!!'

Breakfast - with Jesus Christ

"It is the Lord!" (John 21:7) There is something very reassuring in the simple scene by Galilee's lake, described on that post-Easter morning. Taking place there was the birth of a mighty world-wide adventure that has not ended yet! Was there ever a breakfast like it? They'd been fishing all night, but in vain.... until they heard a "How are you doing, guys?" There is even the little distant call from the shore: detail in the instructions from the beach that it was to be on the right side of the boat that the net should be thrown out this time. That Stranger. That voice! Suddenly the net was full of wriggling fish. It was like coming in at the start of the film again – (see Luke 5:6). Then Peter's hundred yard splash to the shore... the charcoal fire and 'large' tilapia fish... the typical action of fishermen in counting the catch – how we love the Bible, with its teeming stories. And now breakfast on the beach, with Jesus Christ! It was a re-commissioning for the apostle Peter, who only days earlier had denied any knowledge of Jesus. From now on it would be different. "Feed my sheep," said Jesus. 1. Whose call but Christ's call? Peter would never be the same again. Those who have truly heard the call of Christ, will still be standing firm when revolutions explode, when finances plunge, when a church falls apart. 2. Whose word but Christ's word? 'Feed my sheep,' were His words. Whoever we may be teaching, Christ's servant is to see to it that what is taught is Christ's word and not one's own. The power that brings forgiveness and resurrection life can only come from one source! 3. Whose flock, but Christ's flock? 'MY lambs... MY sheep' - they were never ours! Realise this - and so much of the conflicts that can occur between the friends of Jesus will cease overnight.

Can you smell the tilapia fish grilling on that little fire by Galilee's beach? The Stranger on the shore is calling YOU. Along with John, dripping wet in the boat, recognise that He is no stranger. "It is the Lord."

1 level tsp. Cinnamon


8oz Thick Marmalade

Hampton WI - March 2016



Our speaker this month was Nick Grainger, who gave us a very interesting talk entitled 'Tailor to Auctioneer' starting with his time in his father's bespoke tailoring business in Savile Row. At 34, Nick was the youngest person working there and he came into contact with some very well known people. For example, he did fittings for the King of Spain, both in Spain and in Savile Row, and for George Bush Senior.

Following a move to Kingham, the tailoring business was less successful and Nick became an auctioneer. He had long been interested in antiques. His mother had had an antiques shop and Nick started collecting items from the age of 12. The business proved to be very successful. He has clients all over the world and has travelled extensively. These days, buyers often place their bids on line of course. As an example, Nick told us about the sale of some early Chinese stamps, brought in by a member of the public, which went to specialist collector in Hong Kong for a very substantial sum and some pearl studs, which turned out to be Fabergé, and were also very valuable. In an attempt to stamp out poaching, rules concerning the sale of ivory are very strict and it can no longer be sold unless it dates from before 1947. A Steinway baby grand piano from 1949 with ivory keys required a special certificate before the sale could proceed.

For the last 12 years Nick has had a pet parrot and more recently he bought a pair of parrots, which now live in the pheasantry at Sudeley Castle, rather than at home. They are very noisy pets, he said. There were lots of questions and several members had brought in items of interest for Nick to look at. Joyce Davey thanked Nick for his fascinating and informative talk.

Nick judged the competition for **something beginning with 'E'**. The winner was Barbara Wright with an **Egg** with a very pretty Chinese decoration.

Everyone agreed that our lunch at Broadway Golf Club had been excellent again this year, and the lovely weather allowed us beautiful views over the Vale.

Our bi-monthly lunch will be on the 18th of this month at Casa, the Italian restaurant in Vine Street. It has been suggested that Scrabble fans might like to get together every fortnight or so for some not too competitive games and a cup of tea and the Knit and Natter group is going strong on alternate Mondays. There are other events in the pipeline, including the Group Meeting at the Littletons WI and the WFWI Spring Meeting at No 8 in Pershore next month.
