



A letter from the Archdeacon of Dudley, Nikki Groarke Thy Kingdom Come

Many of us lack confidence in talking about our faith – perhaps we're only just beginning to realise how easy it is to share a story of how God has been at work in our life with a friend, or perhaps we've yet to be convinced. Hopefully what we can all do, however long we have been a disciple of Jesus, is pray!

This month there is an opportunity to do this in an intentional way, praying for our friends to discover what it means to have a relationship with Jesus. Churches across the country are signing up to join a great wave of prayer for our nation to know Jesus Christ. In the week before Pentecost this year (8th – 15th May), the Archbishops of Canterbury and York have invited every church in England to pray for all Christians to be blessed with new joy and confidence to share their faith. Many churches are considering hosting 24-7 prayer rooms. Some prayer rooms will be held across a rural benefice or deanery, others in larger churches or with sisters and brothers from other denominations and streams. There'll even be a dedicated prayer room at the heart of Lambeth Palace, the home of the Archbishop of Canterbury. A round the clock prayer room can sound a daunting prospect, but when I was involved in one in my curacy parish in London it was a really powerful experience, where my faith grew enormously. We've committed as a diocese to pray for the week, with sign up slots on the website, so you can join in from home if you can't make it to an actual prayer room. Perhaps sign up for an hour with a few friends from your church, and pray for five people each!

There are lots of ideas about how to pray on the website:

http://thykingdom.co.uk/, including some inspiring videos, encouraging stories and practical ideas.

In the letter to all clergy announcing this

wave of prayer the Archbishops said:

"At the heart of our prayers will be words that Jesus himself taught us – 'Thy kingdom come, thy will be done.' It is impossible to overstate the life-transforming power of the Lord's Prayer. It is a prayer that is reassuring enough to be on the lips of the dying and yet dangerous enough to be banned in cinemas. It is famous enough to be spoken each day by billions in hundreds of languages and yet intimate enough to draw us ever closer into friendship with Jesus Christ. It is simple enough to be memorised by small children and yet profound enough to sustain a whole lifetime of prayer. When we pray it with sincerity and with joy, there is no imagining the new ways in which God can use us to his glory."

As the kingdom people of the Diocese of Worcester this prayer is a core part of our life together. I do encourage you to pray it with faith as you pray for your friends, as part of this national wave of prayer.

The Story of Morsheda



Bangladesh is one of the poorest countries in the world and also one of those most at risk of flooding. Each year, when snow melts on the Himalayas, the rivers swell. The water floods homes, spoils crops and ruins possessions. Sometimes, raging floods destroy houses, sweep away small children and wash away

the very land on which the homes stand.

For Morsheda and her four children things have been so hard for so long, she can hardly imagine a life without fear and suffering. One year, her humble house filled up to her waist with floodwater. To stay dry, and keep away from the dangerous snakes that swam through her home, she raised her bed up on bricks. As



darkness fell, she drew her children to her and prayed the river wouldn't rise further before morning. She says "When the river rises I get frightened. This house is very low. If I could raise my house then I would feel much safer living here with my children."

A better life for Morsheda is just six feet away. Christian Aid partner, GUK, is providing Home Safety Packages for those at risk. These not only provide the materials needed to raise a home and land to avoid flooding, but also include money to buy things that can provide a much needed income such as a cow, goats and seeds.

Pray for all our neighbours affected by floods and climate change. Pray for our neighbours who give up their time to collect during Christian Aid Week (15-21 May). Pray for our neighbours who live in fear and suffering. Pray for our neighbours who have the power and means to make a difference.

Most popular Bible Stories: Daniel in the Lions' Den

This month's Must Know Story is Daniel in the lion's den (Daniel 6). The leaders in Babylon, under King Darius, wanted to get rid of him. However, Daniel was a powerful person in the kingdom, because he was committed to God. How did Daniel respond to the opposition?

He chose Character over Comfort

Although his opponents tried to find fault with Daniel (4), they were unable to do so, because he was 'trustworthy, neither corrupt nor negligent'. Are there things in our own lives that fail to please God and spoil our witness? Let's bring them to God and ask him to help us overcome them.

He chose Discipline over Distraction

A law was passed that declared anyone praying to a god, apart from King Darius, would be thrown in the lion's den. As soon as Daniel heard this, he went to his room to pray (10). He consistently maintained a discipline of prayer three times a day. Like Daniel, do we maintain such a daily discipline of prayer and reading the Bible, especially in the difficult times?

He chose Love over Life

When Daniel was found praying to God by his opponents (11), he was reported to the king, who threw him into the lion's den. However, Daniel chose love for God over seeking his own comfort and security. He trusted God, who shut the mouths of the lions! As a result, King Darius issued a proclamation that everyone in the whole kingdom should worship the God of Daniel. Because of the choices he made, Daniel prospered (28). In what ways do we see our choices for God resulting in blessing?

As the song challenges us, 'Dare to be a Daniel! Dare to stand alone! Dare to have a purpose firm! Dare to make it known!'

Help to shape the future of healthcare services

With an ever increasing demand for services the three Worcestershire CCGs need to consider local needs yet balance this with the money available to us.

They do not have enough money to continue to buy all the services that they currently do in the same way as they have done before. In 2016/17 alone, if they continue to buy services in the same way as last year then they will need to spend £25 million more than their combined budgets.

They therefore need to find ways of reducing costs in some areas to be able to protect other essential services that they currently buy.

This survey is designed to help them find out what you think about some of the changes that they could consider in order to close this £25 million gap in funding. At this stage these are just ideas. No decisions have been made and the proposals are in no order of preference. They are committed to hearing people's views about each of these potential changes before deciding whether they consider any of them in the future.

They are working with Worcestershire County Council to help carry out this exercise because they have experience of carrying out similar exercises to this. The results of this questionnaire will be shared in public meetings and published on their websites; however the results will be statistical and will never contain anything that could identify individual respondents.

This helps me make sense of it all.

When I was a kid I spent a lot of time with my grandmother. We had sleepovers and I would go after school and play charades and have tea with her. On Sunday we would go to church. I would go into Sunday school and hear stories of the Aesop tales (some of which I remember today), then join together with the adults at the end of the service for prayers. I could tell Nan anything and she would always know what to say to me.

Eventually she died and I was left devastated and like a lot of people before me I asked the question "why could god be so cruel to take someone I loved so much?" People say if there is a god why is there so much suffering? I didn't go to church for a long time, I was very cross, it seemed so unfair. One day I got talking to someone and they told me this.....

It is not God that lets bad things happen. If you believe in God you believe in the devil too. On earth there is a constant struggle between good and bad; sometimes bad wins. The way to stop this is to learn to live with each other in peace and love; simple really! Although I was only 13 at the time this made sense to me. God is not to blame, he loves us

May Day Celebrations

May is upon us and we begin the month with May Day Celebrations. These originate from pre-Christian times and were celebrated in many parts of Europe. It was seen as the beginning of summer with villages and towns celebrating the fertility of the soil, livestock and people. Today we view it as more of a spring festival, celebrating fresh growth, new life and hopes for a prosperous harvest. We look forward to warmer days and the enjoyment of summer. Today celebrations synonymous with May Day are May Pole dancing, Morris dancing and crowning of May Day Queens.

May Pole dancing has become increasingly popular over time. May Poles themselves have become communal symbols bringing the local community together, and are usually erected on village greens. These days the dance is generally performed by boys and girls standing alternately around the pole, each holding a brightly coloured ribbon. They then weave in and around each other until the ribbons are woven together around the pole creating a decorative pattern, the dance is then reversed and the ribbons unwound until the dancers come back to their starting places.

Over the coming months many of our villages will be holding fetes, bringing together those within their communities. This is an opportunity for villagers to come together, get to know each other and to raise money for a common purpose. Here in Hinton we will be holding our annual St Peter's fete on Sunday, 3 July. We look forward to bringing our small village community together as well as those from our surrounding area. We will be celebrating with some May Pole dancing by Fladbury First School May Pole dancers, so we hope many will come and join in the fun. Our fete enables us to continue to raise funds to help with much need repairs to our lovely church so we can continue to build it into a community space for our village. Hinton's PCC are committed to enabling all within our village feel that our church is a place that can be used for all kinds of community purposes and events whilst also providing worship for those who wish to partake. So, May Day celebrations seem a fitting way to look forward to new growth within our community and church and keeping the spirit of village and community alive, particularly for our children, villagers and generations that follow.

We were delighted to welcome more visitors to this month's meeting, when we all enjoyed a talk by John Dixon on the 'Beguiling Barbara Cartland'. Barbara was a 'local' girl, having been born in Edgbaston, lived for a time in Pershore and gone to school in Worcester and Malvern. Her grandfather had been a businessman, who committed suicide after he lost the family money and her father was killed in the First World War, so Barbara and her two brothers were brought up in relative poverty. The family moved to London where Barbara began her writing career as a journalist with the Daily Express, initially as an anonymous gossip columnist. She credited Max Beaverbrook with teaching her to write and, as we know, went on to become a prolific author of romantic fiction. Sadly her two brothers, to whom she was very close, were both killed in the Second World War. Barbara married twice. Her first marriage was to Alexander McCorquodale, with whom she had a daughter, Raine, (later to become step-mother to Princess Diana). The marriage was not happy, they divorced and Barbara subsequently married Alexander's cousin, Hugh, and they had two sons. But there was much more to Barbara Cartland than just her novels. She had taken her children to the US at the start of the war, but had felt guilty about leaving and returned home to join the WVS and the St John Ambulance. She served on a local council and became involved in various campaigns, including fighting for the rights of gypsies and setting up sites for them to live on. She appeared twice on 'This is Your Life' and in 1991 was invested as Dame of the Order of the British Empire for her contribution to Literature. Barbara Cartland died at the age of 98 and was buried at the family home, Camfield Place in Hertfordshire, in a wicker coffin because of her concern for the environment.

Joan Parry thanked John for his enlightening and interesting talk, and John then judged the competition for an item beginning with 'G'. The winner was Ann Evans, with a selection of Ginger – crystallised, ground and root ginger.

Next month will be the Resolutions Meeting and there will also be a talk by Sue Ablett on the Falklands. The competition will be for an item beginning with 'H'.

Eco-Schools – Rocket Seed Experiment

The whole school is getting involved in a science experiment run by the RHS Campaign for School Gardening partnered with the UK Space Agency. As part of Tim Peake's six month Principia mission, rocket seeds were sent to the International Space Station. After several months on board they were sent back. Sedgeberrow School have received two packets of 100 seeds that we must grow and compare. One packet will have stayed on Earth, the other will be from the space mission. The children have already started the experiment and are looking forward to embarking on this voyage of discovery to see what growing plants in space can teach us about life on Earth. Our results will be added to a national database to compare results.
