



From Mark Binney The Faith of Queen Elizabeth II

In the space of a few months a number of remarkable landmarks have passed in the life of Queen Elizabeth II. On 9 September 2015, Elizabeth became the monarch who has ruled the Commonwealth for the longest period, surpassing her great-great-grandmother



Queen Victoria. And on 21 April 2016 she celebrated her 90th birthday. With the official birthday on the 12th June 2016 we will be able to share in the celebration of her 90th year.

A pound coin in the UK bears an image of the Queen's head, surrounded by the words: ELIZABETH II D.G.REG.F.D.' It stands for: 'Elizabeth II Dei Gratia Regina Fidei Defensor.' These words are in Latin and they mean: 'Elizabeth II, by the Grace of God, Queen, Defender of the Faith.' The faith of which the queen is a defender is Christianity.

What does it mean for the Queen to be Defender of the Faith? It has a formal meaning, because it indicates that the Queen is the Supreme Governor of the Church of England. But it also has a personal meaning, because her reign has been characterised by acknowledgement of her dependence on Jesus Christ. This has been central to both her public pronouncements and her private devotions.

In her role as Supreme Governor, the Queen is spiritual leader of the 25 million people who are baptised in the Church of England. (About one million of them go to church each week.) This is mainly a ceremonial role, because in practice the church is led by the Archbishop of Canterbury and other bishops. There are many other church denominations in the UK which do not have the Queen as their leader, but they usually have a profound respect for her faith. These include, for instance, the Roman Catholic Church, the Church of Scotland and the Redeemed Christian Church of God.

The title Defender of the Faith was originally granted to Henry VIII in 1521. It was given by Pope Leo X in response to the King's support for the Roman Catholic Church. However, Henry expected that the Pope would reciprocate with approval for his intention to divorce. He did not. In the turmoil which followed, the Church of England was founded, with the King as leader instead of the Pope. Monarchs since 1536 have had the title Supreme Governor (originally Supreme Head). There have been breaks during the reign of Mary I in the 16th century and following the English Civil War during the 17th century.

Queen Elizabeth II succeeded to the title upon her coronation on 2 June 1953. However, her personal faith in God was clear before that. On the occasion of her 21st birthday in 1947 she made a radio broadcast in which she said this: 'I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong.'

'But I shall not have strength to carry out this resolution alone unless you join in it with me, as I now invite you to do. I know that your support will be unfailingly given. God help me to make good my vow, and God bless all of you who are willing to share in it.'

In 2015, as part of the television broadcast she makes to the nation and the commonwealth, the queen said this: 'For me, the life of Jesus Christ, the Prince of Peace, whose birth we celebrate today, is an inspiration and an anchor in my life. A role model of reconciliation and forgiveness, he stretched out his hands in love, acceptance and healing. Christ's example has taught me to seek to respect and value all people of whatever faith or none.'

The Bible Society has produced a book to celebrate the Queen's 90th birthday and her life of faith. This will be given out at all Services on the 12th June. Do join us at the 11am Thanksgiving Service at Hampton. Afterwards there will be a Bring and Share Lunch on the Vicarage lawn.

A letter from the Bishop of Worcester for June editions of Parish Magazines

During June the British people will decide whether or not to remain in the European Union. The decision is significant not only for this country but for the rest of Europe and the world. I hope and pray that people will reflect very carefully before casting their vote.

Much of the argument has centred on whether we would be better or worse off economically if we were to leave. The consensus seems to be that we would be worse.

Then there is the question of migration. Every alternative scenario for our relationship to the other countries of Europe should we leave – the Swiss model, the Norwegian model – would not change our obligation to allow free movement of people from Europe. In any event, this country has consistently benefited from immigration: Economically, culturally and spiritually.

Yet there's much more at stake than issues of economics or migration. A vote to leave could well precipitate the beginning of the breakup of the European Union. That would be very risky from a geopolitical perspective: it would make the world a much more dangerous place. That's why Barack Obama and most world leaders are so exercised about the prospect – and why Mr Putin would love it to happen. There is, of course, much about the European Union that is unsatisfactory. It is in need of a great deal more reform. However, even with its faults it has been described as the Twentieth Century's dullest miracle. Because of the EU, it is now unthinkable that the countries of Europe, which fought each other so fiercely a couple of generations ago, should now go to war with one another. It continues to have a hugely important part to play on the world stage. It will be much stronger with us in.

Some may feel it is wrong for me to comment on politics. To them I would quote Archbishop Desmond Tutu: 'When people say that political and religion don't mix I wonder which Bible it is that they are reading.' This question is far too important to be left to politicians.

As a Christian I want the world to be a safer, more peaceful place and believe that our membership of the European Union contributes hugely to that. You may not agree with me but I hope that I have encouraged you to think, reflect and pray before casting your vote if you have not already done so. Please don't underestimate the importance of voting or the implications of where you put your cross. And may God bless you and our country at this crucial time of decision. **+John**

Annual Report of the Great and Little Hampton Educational Charity: April 15th 2016

The value of the fund dropped slightly this year because of the vagaries of the stock market. It is now worth £69,293 compared to £72,270 at this time last year. Strangely, the dividend income over the last twelve months actually increased from £2,642 to £2,712.

We were, therefore, able to continue to support the education and training of the young people of the parish much as we have done in the past. We had rather a greater number of applications this year (up from 36 to 45) so the cake had to be cut a little more thinly. We had also very little in the way of a float at the start of the year so we had to budget very carefully.

Out of the income of £2,712, we disbursed student grants of £1,875; the clerk's honorarium was £230 and expenses for stationery and postage came to £47.

32 applicants who are following degree courses away from home were awarded £45 each.

8 who are studying for a degree while living at home and 1 on a further education course away from home received £35 each.

3 doing a further education course while living at home and 1 apprentice had £30.

We are very pleased to welcome Craig Jennings as our new trustee. His roots go deep in the parish and we are sure his relative youth will prove a good balance in our deliberations.

Once again we would like to thank Dennis Wright for so reliably checking over our books and our clerk, Jan Dodwell , for her meticulous administration.

So, all in all, the charity is in good heart. The value of the fund is still substantially higher than when we first invested and the dividends seem steadily to provide good returns.

Financial support, in our modest way, for the young people of Great and Little Hampton looks set to continue for many years to come.

Pioneers in Mission

An exciting new project called Pioneers in Mission (PiM) is being developed by Sarah Hewitt, our Missioner, to offer placements to people who want to get involved in ministry within a mission context.

There are six, eighteen month PiM placements on offer, each one having a different focus in one specific area of mission. The PiMs will form an intentional community in Evesham to extend the reach of the Kingdom. Sarah will coordinate the PiMs and their work and mission across the group.

Each PiM will have an opportunity to build from established mission projects and to create new mission projects of their own and will be assigned a Mentor and will stay with host families in the Parishes. PiMs will work part time in Evesham and work part time in their chosen focus area. Placements will focus on one of the following six areas:

- Children and Families
- Young People
- Older People
- Communications and PR (including Social Media)
- Musical Worship Leader
- Social Business.

All PiMs will also have the opportunity to study at the Church Mission Society who are fully supporting this project.

Obviously, the start of the project depends on whether funding can be achieved and then people coming forward to apply for each of these roles. If you think you may be able to offer someone a room for the duration of a placement please contact Sarah Hewitt on <u>07456 549969</u> and she will explain about what support, financial and otherwise is available.

Most popular Bible Stories: The Parable of the Prodigal Son

This month we come to the last of our 10 Must Know Story from the Bible. The parable of the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:11-32) is one of Jesus' most well-known stories. Yet it also beautifully presents the good news of the Gospel, through the theme of lost and found.

The younger son is lost when he demands his inheritance early, deliberately making himself independent and treating his father as dead! This reflects our own lostness as human beings, when we cut ourselves off from the loving presence and grace of a loving heavenly Father.

After squandering his wealth, he finally comes to his senses: 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son; make me like one of your hired servants.' (18,19). However, even before he arrives home, his father runs to greet him and welcomes his son back home. The celebrations for the homecoming of this son reflect the 'rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents' (7).

This story graphically demonstrates the amazing grace of God for each one of us. The older son's misunderstanding of the father's actions is a warning not to harden our hearts to the work of God's grace in ourselves and others. 'There is nothing we can do to make God love us more. There is nothing we can do to make God love us less.' (Philip Yancey).

The story is told of a father and son who had become estranged and the father searched for him to no avail. In desperation, he put an advert in a local newspaper: 'Dear Paco, meet me in front of this newspaper office at noon on Saturday. All is forgiven. I love you. Your Father.' On Saturday 800 Pacos showed up!!



An apple a day

Here is an excellent reason to eat an apple each day: they really can help reduce the risk of dying early – by up to 35 per cent.

A new study by the University of Western Australia has found that apples may boost health because of their high levels of fibre and flavonoids. Apples are high in soluble fibre that slows the build-up



of cholesterol-rich plaque in the arteries. Apples are also a good source of magnesium, potassium, vitamin C and flavonoids, which have been linked to lower risk of cardiovascular disease.

Bats in the Belfry

Bats and churches have long been associated with one another which is interesting considering how bats are often viewed as 'evil' creatures; spreading diseases and murdering virgins whilst they sleep against crisp pure white cotton bed linens. As features of the landscape for centuries, churches have proved stable roosting spaces for bat species which will have been relocated from trees and caves due to deforestation and development.

The UK has 18 resident bat species and of these, at least 8 are known to use church buildings for roosting. The stable construction using stone, tiles and wood form excellent crevices to squeeze into or spaces to fly around in to warm up their muscles before emerging to feed at dusk. Bats and their roosts are protected by law due to their declining numbers and their bad reputation is unfairly given. The only reference of bats in the Bible is when they are referred to as 'unclean birds' and 'should not be eaten' (Lev 11:13-19)

Bats do not transmit diseases and they are not responsible for the spread of AIDS or ebola. In Mexico one species of bat (the Mexican long-tongued bat) is single-handedly responsible for the pollination of the plant Agave tequilana which only opens its flowers at night and is used to create tequila. So without bats there would be no tequila!

Bats are not blind, they have perfectly good working eyes but their echolocation is more sophisticated in the hunt for food in the dark! Bats in a roof space, under eaves or in a church building will not cause destruction like rodents or squirrels. They do not gnaw on cables or wood or insulation and they do not build nests either, simply returning to their preferred place of roost faithfully for anything up to thirty years. Their droppings are very dry and powdery; it does not smell of anything and is excellent for roses and fruit bushes!

If you've ever been in your garden about 25 minutes after sunset, you may get a fleeting glimpse of these fascinating creatures as they fly around your garden. The Pipistrelle bats are the ones people most usually see, they are fast and change direction in the blink of an eye putting on acrobatic displays that are hypnotic to watch. These little bats are the size of the first joint in your thumb and weigh about the same as a twenty pence piece and yet this tiny creature will eat up to 3,000 midges and small insects in one night. Welcome news for those of us who get bitten to shreds in the summer!

St Peter's Church, Hinton on the Green has been monitoring the bats in their village for a couple of years now. Regular bat walks around the church and surrounding farmland has led to at least four species of bat being identified and observed by the villagers. Churchyards and grounds surrounding the church are often full of trees and flowers which attract insects which in turn attracts bats. The use of bat detectors brings a whole new experience to watching bats as listening to the calls as they fly around above is something special. Knowing there were bats in the area and finding droppings in one section of the belfry made the recent roof works even more important. By preserving this gorgeous building, a place of shelter used by bats was also being preserved for future generations of the village.

The church PCC has worked with a licensed bat worker to ensure that lighting and scaffolding wouldn't encroach on the area used by bats and the contractors on the project are aware of the importance of these bats. For St Peter's, bats have not created problems within the church, they have instead provided a unique insight as to what takes place as the evenings go dim.

Bats are incredibly vulnerable and need our help. Bat walks are an excellent way to get to know your local bats and if you would like one please contact eveshambatwalk@gmail.com

Hampton WI – May 2016



The President welcomed members and one visitor to the meeting held on 12 May, along with Carla Auger from Evesham Vale WI, who will be our delegate at the National Federation Meeting in Brighton next month.

This was our Resolutions Meeting, when we had an opportunity to discuss and vote on the two Resolutions. The results will be submitted to the NFWI prior to their Annual Meeting in June. The resolutions concern appropriate care for people in hospital with dementia and avoiding food waste to address food poverty.

Our bi-monthly lunch will be at the Gardeners Arms, Charlton on 20 May, and there will be a friendly skittles match at Pershore Sports Club on 22 June.

We were pleased to welcome Sue Ablett to talk to us about The Falklands, a place familiar to us, of course, because of the war in 1982 in which many British and Argentine lives were lost. There are 778 islands in the archipelago and it is very remote, in the Southern Ocean and 8,000 miles from Britain. Cruise ships visit regularly, on their way to the Antarctic. The first slide Sue showed us was one of white sand, calm sea and blue sky, not guite what we expected, but it looked idyllic. However it is very windy, so probably not the best choice for a beach holiday. There were shots of wildlife, our favourites being the five different types of penguin. There are many other birds (ground nesting, as there are no trees), seals and sea lions, all of which seem guite unphased by the approach of humans. In the 1800's the penguins were boiled for their oil, and their population was decimated, but fortunately this practice was stopped, and they have now recovered in numbers. There are also 600,000 sheep, though, perhaps surprisingly, Sue said she didn't see any of them. About 2000 of the 3000 population live in the capital, Stanley. Children are educated at home up to the age of 8, at which time they go to boarding school in Stanley. All old buildings are built of corrugated tin, which is easy to transport. It's not easy or possible to pop down to the local shop to get supplies. Interestingly, though, Waitrose and Tesco brands are available in the supermarket. Mail is delivered by air. Sue's love for the place was obvious in this fascinating talk. Heather Gibbs gave the vote of thanks on behalf of members. Sue then judged the competition for **something beginning with 'H'**. The winner was Nicky Woodcock with a Handbag and Hand Cream (Two Essentials for a WI Lady).

Next month Judy Dale will talk about Tales from the Stones.
