

A Letter from Bishop John Launching 'Calling Young Disciples'.

In this diocese we are committed to fulfilling our vocation to become Kingdom people characterised by love, compassion, justice and freedom. An enormous amount of consultation was undertaken before our Kingdom vision was adopted and I am gratified by the manner in which it is reaching deep into the diocesan bloodstream.

In order to help to realise that vision, Diocesan Synod adopted a Calling Young Disciples project as a major focus within it. The project will complement and add to the work of our Youth Officer, Simon Hill and Children's Officer, Emma Pettifer, helping more churches to engage effectively with children, young people and their families. During the consultation, it was clear that most parishes wanted work with children and young people to be a priority.

I am delighted that Ruth Walker, a very able and experienced priest from the Diocese of Coventry, has just been appointed as Project Director. Ruth will be licensed at Diocesan Synod in November and will formally start her new role thereafter. We have received a generous grant from the Mercers' Company, for which we are very grateful, to fund this post.

We have also applied for funding from the Church Commissioners to appoint mission enablers to work on the project in parishes and we shall be working with Ruth on the appointment of the first two of these in the next few months.

I hope that everyone will pray for this exciting project: for it to be effective in proclaiming the love of God in Jesus to young people in our Diocese. Prayer, of course, is at the heart of all this. The first thing we are bidden to pray for by Jesus in the Lord's Prayer is: 'Thy Kingdom Come'.





Reminder - End of British Summertime

The clocks go back by 1 hour at 2am on the last Sunday in October, which is 30 October.



The Origins of British Summertime (BST)



BST was established after a campaign by a builder called William Willett, who was allegedly annoyed with the waste of daylight in the early mornings of summer. He suggested the change in 1907 in a leaflet called The Waste of Daylight. One year after Willett's death, BST was introduced in May.

The idea of changing clocks had been suggested before Willett introduced it.

In 1895, a New Zealander called George Hudson proposed a daylight-saving scheme to the Wellington Philosophical Society and it was trialed successfully in 1927.

Hudson was an entomologist and wanted lighter nights in the summer so he had more chance to go out

collecting insects.

The UK has not always changed its clocks. During the Second World War in 1940, clocks across Britain were not put back an hour at the end of British Summer Time in a bid to save fuel and money. In subsequent years, clocks continued to be moved forward by one hour every spring, and put back by an hour each autumn until July 1945. During this time, the UK was two hours ahead of GMT – a period called British Double Summer Time.

October 31 All Hallows Eve - or Holy Evening

Modern Halloween celebrations have their roots with the Celtic peoples of pre-Christian times.

In those long-ago days, on the last night of October, the Celts celebrated the Festival of Samhain, or 'Summer's End'. The priests, or Druids, performed ceremonies to thank and honour the sun. For there was a very dark side to all this: Samhain also signalled the onset of winter, a time when it was feared that unfriendly ghosts, nature-spirits, and witches roamed the earth, creating mischief. So the Druid priests lit great bonfires and performed magic rites to ward off or appease these dark supernatural powers.

Then the Romans arrived, and brought their Harvest Festival which honoured the Goddess Pomona with gifts of apples and nuts. The two festivals slowly merged. When Christianity arrived still later, it began to replace the Roman and Druid religions. 1 November - All Saints' Day - was dedicated to all Christian Martyrs and Saints who had died. It was called 'All Hallows' Day'. The evening before became an evening of prayer and preparation and was called 'All Hallows' Eve', The Holy Evening, later shortened to 'Halloween'.

For many centuries, however, fear of the supernatural remained strong. During the Middle Ages, animal costumes and frightening masks were worn to ward off the evil spirits of darkness on Halloween. Magic words and charms were used to keep away bad luck, and everybody believed that witches ride about on broomsticks. Fortune telling was popular, and predicting the future by the use of nuts and apples was so popular that Halloween is still sometimes known as Nutcrack Night or Snap-Apple Night.

Today, Christians have learned to turn to prayer instead of charms to overcome the powers of darkness. And the deeper, true meaning of All Hallows' Eve, should not be forgotten. As Christians, we all draw closer to Christ when we remember and give thanks for our loved ones and for others who have gone before us through the gates of death.

Winnie the Pooh - a much loved bear


Winnie-the-Pooh was born 90 years ago this month, on 14 October, 1926 – in the sense that this was the date on which the world-famous children's book by A. A. Milne was first published.

Technically, Winnie-the-Pooh, also called Pooh Bear, is a fictional anthropomorphic teddy bear hero of a number of books, always illustrated by E H Shepard, who therefore gave Pooh his distinctive shape in the mind of the reader.

To his many admirers, Pooh is the wise, kind and loving companion they always wanted – a bear of very little brain and with many faults, but whose heart is always in the right place.

The Pooh stories, written originally for the author's only son, Christopher Robin, and set in an area recognisable as Ashdown Forest in Sussex, have been translated into many languages, including a Latin version, Winnie ille Pu.

Though naive and somewhat literal-minded, honey-loving Pooh composes songs and hums and comes up with unexpected solutions to problems. He also invents the game Poohsticks. He has been recommended to Christians for his love toward his friends, such as Piglet, Tigger, Kanga and Rabbit – all modelled on Christopher Robin's soft toys.



Examples of Pooh's wisdom are widely quoted. His refusal to let Piglet worry him can be seen as deeply Christian:

"Supposing a tree fell down, Pooh, while we were underneath it?"

"Supposing it didn't," said Pooh after careful thought.



This year Mrs Williams has a full Reception class, and we have new starters in years 1 and 5 who have transferred to us from other schools.

The 2015-16 school year concluded in great style with the KS2 children's performances of 'Dance Wars' at Pershore Number 8 theatre, which was my

personal highlight of the year. The staff are excited about this year and we are looking forward to building on last year's successes. We want every child in school to have an avenue to express their interests, talent and skills. We aim to provide the children at our school the highest quality, enjoyable and most memorable education



possible. Last year we really achieved high academic, sporting and artistic standards, putting this school amongst the best in Worcestershire and we want to repeat that this year.

This terms activities include a Macmillan Coffee Morning organised by the children at the end of September and a Harvest Assembly on 7 October where we invite parents to join us for a celebration of thanks. The children learn some fabulous songs to perform and we sell off fresh produce donated to us by the parents and friends of the school.
