A Letter from the Bishop of Dudley Creating a Manger in our Lives.

A fable from my childhood came to mind recently. It went something like this:
In the carpenter's shop the tools were tetchy.

"Brother Hammer, you're too noisy."

"Me? Brother Plane's work is all superficial. No depth."

"Me? Brother Tape Measure is always telling others what to do, measuring us all by his own standards."

"Me? It's Brother Screwdriver who drives us all crazy going round in circles."

"Me? Sister Sandpaper always rubbing the wrong way."

"Me? Sister Saw goes back and forth endlessly."

Then the footsteps of the carpenter could be heard and the bickering ceased. When he entered the shop, he put on his apron, went to his bench, and picked up Brother Tape Measure, then Brother Plane, then Brother Hammer and Sister Screwdriver, then Sister Saw, and lastly Sister Sandpaper, whom he used to smooth all the rough edges of the manger he had made. A manger for a herd of animals to snuffle their noses in so as to find the oats in the bleak midwinter.

Perhaps through the season of Advent we should make a manger in our lives, being guided by he who learnt these skills in a Nazareth workshop.

Measure where we are in relation to he who gave the length of his.

Plane away the places where forgiveness is needed.

Hammer against the injustices of the world and screw together the fragments in need of reconciliation.

Saw away the dead branches that need to be pruned so that we might grow.

Sand the rough edges of our tongues, our thoughts, our lack of generosity.

In such a way we respond to the invitation "come let us walk in the light of the Lord" and Jesus is laid again in the manger of our lives and our communities.

From the manger he looks at us, and the whole world, with eyes of peace and forgiveness and love. Just as he will when others use their carpentry skills to fix a wooden beam to a tree outside a city wall.

Travel well this Advent in the company of the master carpenter and see again his most amazing creation, not in wood and nails, but in flesh and blood.

Traditions of Christmas Bells

Bells, especially Church Bells, have traditionally been associated with Christmas for a long time. In the Anglican and Catholic churches, the church day starts at sunset, so any service after that is the first service of the day. So a service on Christmas Eve after sunset is traditionally the first service of Christmas day! In churches that have a Bell or Bells, They are often rung to signal the start of this service.

In some churches in the UK, it is traditional that the largest bell in the church is rung four times in the hour before midnight and then at midnight all the bells are rung in celebration.

In the Catholic Church, Christmas and Easter are the only times that Mass is allowed to be held at Midnight. It's traditional that at both midnight Masses, the church and altar bells too in many cases are rung while the Priest says the "Gloria" (Gloria in excelsis Deo).

Having a Mass at Midnight at Christmas dates back to the early church, when it was believed that Jesus was born at midnight, although there has never been any proof of this! A lot of Churches have midnight services on Christmas Eve, although not every church will have a mass or communion as part of the service.

In many Catholic countries such as France, Spain and Italy, the midnight mass service is very important and everyone tries to go to a service.

In Victorian times, it was very fashionable to go carol singing with small handbells to play the tune of the carol. Sometimes there would only be the bells and no singing! Handbell ringing is still popular today.

Boxing Day - the Day after Christmas!

Boxing Day takes place on December 26th and is only celebrated in a few countries; mainly ones historically connected to the UK (such as Australia, South Africa and New Zealand) and in many European countries. In Germany it is known as "Zweite Feiertag" (which means 'second celebration') and also "Zweiter Weihnachtsfeiertag" which translates as Boxing Day (although it doesn't literally mean that)!

It was started in the UK about 800 years ago, during the Middle Ages. It was the day when the alms box, collection boxes for the poor often kept in churches, were traditionally opened and the contents distributed. Some churches still open these boxes on Boxing Day.

It might have been the Romans that first brought this type of collecting box to the UK, but they used them to collect money for the betting games, which they played during their winter celebrations! In Holland, some collection boxes were made out of a rough pottery called 'earthenware' and were shaped like pigs. Perhaps this is where we get the term 'Piggy Bank'!

The Christmas Carol, Good King Wenceslas, is set on Boxing Day and is about a King in the Middle Ages who brings food to a poor family.

It was also traditional that servants got the day off to celebrate Christmas with their families on Boxing Day. Before World War II, it was common for working people (such as milkmen and butchers) to travel round their delivery places and collect their Christmas box or tip. This tradition has now mostly stopped and any Christmas tips, given to people such as postal workers and newspaper delivery children, are not normally given or collected on Boxing Day.

Boxing Day has now become another public holiday in countries such as the UK, Canada, Australia and New Zealand. It is also the traditional day that Pantomimes started to play.

The 26th December is also St. Stephen's Day. Just to confuse things, there are two St. Stephens in history! The first St. Stephen was a very early follower of Jesus and was the first Christian Martyr (a person who dies for their religious beliefs). He was stoned to death by Jews who didn't believe in Jesus.

The second St. Stephen was a Missionary, in Sweden, in the 800s. He loved all animals but particularly horses (perhaps why there is traditionally horse racing on boxing day). He was also a martyr and was killed by pagans in Sweden. In Germany there was a tradition that horses would be ridden around the inside of the church during the St. Stephen's Day service!

St. Stephen's Day (or 'the feast of Stephen') is when the Carol 'Good King Wenceslas' is set. It's about helping the poor - so it has a strong connection to Boxing Day.

Weekly Giving Envelopes – Message from Shirley Lynch

It is that time of year again when I need to prepare the Weekly Giving Envelopes ready for next year, and we give a big thank you to everyone who has donated in any way over the past year.

Giving on a regular basis is very important, not only as a Stewardship discipline for ourselves as Christians, but also it means that the Church has a regular income and our Treasurer can pay the bills to keep the Church running.

Gift Aiding is also important as it means that we can claim back from the Government 25p for every £1 donated, but the donor must be paying enough **INCOME TAX** (VAT and Council Tax must not be taken into account) to cover the amount

to be reclaimed. Please would all of you donating through Gift Aid check that your donations are covered by your Income Tax payments, and let me know if this is not the case; we will be required to pay the money back, if not. Most of the members of our congregation are pensioners, and, as we are all too well aware, circumstances can change and this is one thing that we probably wouldn't think about.

At the present time we are also allowed to claim back Gift Aid on small cash donations made at services and on monies donated in the privacy envelopes as long as it is not more than £20 at any one time, and not in the form of a cheque.

If there is anyone out there who would like to join either the Gift Aid or the Privacy scheme, please do contact me, you don't need to be a member of the congregation. Unfortunately there are many people in the community who for one reason or another are not be able to come to church anymore, but still appreciate the Services that the church offers. We are very happy for people to donate by Standing Order as this is another source of regular income for the church and there are a number of people who already do this.

Thank you also to all those who give so much of their time, whether it is cleaning the silver and brass, arranging the flowers, singing in the choir, playing the organ, keeping the Church clean, reading, intercessing, being a Verger, Server or Communion Assistant, bell ringer, Sidesman, Churchwarden or PCC member - the list goes on, but it is all part of our giving and Christian Stewardship.

Mincemeat and Marzipan Teabread

200g self raising flour
100g butter
85g light muscovado sugar
85g marzipan, cut in to cubes
2 eggs
300g mincemeat
2tbsp flaked almonds



- Rub the butter into the flour until it resembles fine crumbs.
 - Stir in sugar and marzipan
 - In a separate bowl, whisk the eggs and stir in the mincemeat.
 - Add to the flour mixture and combine together
 - Spoon into a greased and lined 2lb loaf tin, smooth the top and sprinkle with the flaked almonds
 - Bake for 1 hour until risen and golden
 - Allow to cool in tin for 10 minutes, then turn out onto a wire rack to cool

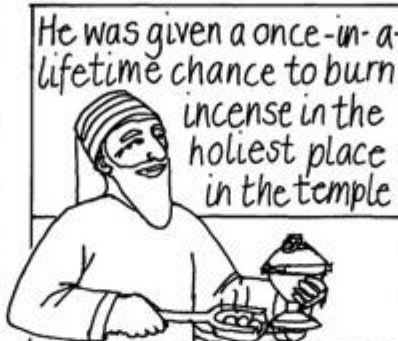
A short story from the Bible

What happened?



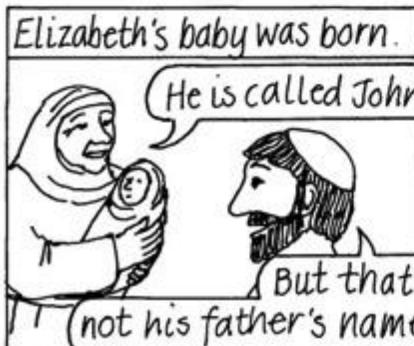
He went home and soon Elizabeth had good news

Successful learners. Success for life.



The second half of our autumn term is well underway. In November, we were delighted to welcome our local MP for Mid Worcestershire, Mr Nigel Huddleston. He began his visit with a tour of our new, state-of-the-art, Key Stage 2 building before participating in a question and answer session with our Year 5 pupils. He then joined our Key Stage 2 pupils to observe a two minute silence to remember and honour those who lost their lives in the two World Wars and the British soldiers killed or injured since 1945. He also listened to pupil's poetic tributes to the fallen. It was moving for everyone to think of the reasons behind marking the day.



As Christmas quickly approaches, we are getting ready for our celebrations, with rehearsals for our Reception performance of 'It's a Baby' and Key Stage 1's performance, 'A Little Nativity'.
