



## Asum Group Bulletin Better Together

So what is this 'Asum Group'?

Well, it is: six churches; one Kingdom People in Evesham and around - worshipping, serving and witnessing together; sharing and encouraging vision, ideas and resources for ministry and mission – believing that there are some things we can do better together than on our own.

#### Mark's Sabbatical

One of the 'resources' we share within the Group is our stipendiary staff (Andrew Spurr, Sarah Hewitt and Mark Binney). In this quarter (January to March), Mark is on sabbatical leave.

Everyone knows that 'taking time out' is crucial to our health and well-being. For full-time staff, it is particularly necessary – because they are expected to be always well-read, up to date with their studies and full of vision! So, once every seven years, stipendiary ministers are encouraged by their bishop to take a three-month

sabbatical. They are expected to remove themselves entirely from the normal responsibilities of ministry and instead to take up some focused study or project to nourish their ministry, broaden their minds through some travel and/or a retreat - and to have some extended holiday time.

So we wish Mark well in these three months, and pray that he will be well refreshed, encouraged and renewed for the coming years of his ministry among us. In the meantime, the other ministers in the Asum Group make Mark's sabbatical possible by sharing our personnel 'resources' across the churches!

#### Try a different diet?

Have you tried 'SoulFood' yet? It happens every Sunday evening, 6pm (until about 7.15pm), in All Saints' Church, Evesham. But what goes on there?

Well, first everyone is invited to sit and eat – around one table. The food is good and plentiful (don't eat before you come!). As the meal ends, someone will explain a little about the 'theme' of the evening for reflection and prayer.

The team responsible will have put together four 'prayer stations' around the church – at which each person present, in their own time and their own way, can explore some ideas or experience related to the theme. This is normally a quiet time – with perhaps some music playing in the background. Everyone uses this time differently – according to what seems helpful to them personally. Some will try to get to all the stations in the 45 minutes or so provided; some will want to go to just one or two stations.






At the end, a leader invites everyone to gather together for a closing thought and prayer.

## WOMEN'S WORLD DAY OF PRAYER

(INTERNATIONAL AND INTERDENOMINATIONAL)

## 3th March 2017

### 'Am I being unfair to you?' 2.30pm – St Mary's Catholic Church, Evesham

Women's World Day of Prayer is an international, ecumenical, prayer movement that invites women, from a different part of the world each year, to prepare a worship service through which their hopes and fears for their country may be brought before the whole world in prayer.

On Friday 3 March, over 5,000 services will be held in the British Isles on the theme of 'Am I Being Unfair to You'? The Christian women of the Philippines wrote the service and it has been translated into 1,000 different languages and dialects, to be used, throughout the whole world, starting at sunrise over the Island of Samoa, and continuing until sunset off the coast of American Samoa.

In 2013, Typhoon Haiyan – named locally as 'Yolanda' – struck the Philippine islands in the western Pacific Ocean. This is mentioned in the service but you will also hear the stories of a girl, a mother and an older woman, recounting their situations and their hopes and fears. The service focuses on the Bible story of the workers in the vineyard: Matthew 20 v 1-16. There is a reflection on the artwork designed by Rowena 'Apol' Laxamana-Sta.Rosa. It is very thought provoking and illustrates contrasting scenes.

The Day of Prayer is not just for women. It is completely ecumenical, we have representatives from most of the Churches in Evesham taking part, and everyone is very welcome. The service lasts about an hour and there will be light refreshments afterwards. We hope to see you there.

## Candlemas

In bygone centuries, Christians said their last farewells to the Christmas season on Candlemas, 2 February. This is exactly 40 days after Christmas Day itself.

In New Testament times 40 days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple.

So where does the Candlemas bit come in? Jesus is described in the New Testament as the Light of the World, and early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name, Candlemas.

The story of how Candlemas began can be found in Luke 2:22-40. Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is of course found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West. But in medieval times, the Nunc Dimittis was mostly used just on this day, during the distribution of candles before the Eucharist. Only gradually did it win a place in the daily prayer life of the Church.

## Prayers ... for the people around us

Commend to God everyone working in local government, in offices or amongst us from day to day and councillors who are responsible for decisions, which affect us all. Remember everyone serving in the emergency services, coming to our assistance whenever they are needed. Pray for all those who are serving sentences in the prison at Long Lartin, and for the staff working there, that ways may be found to prepare inmates for a better life on release. Ask for God's blessing on the fellowship in the Hampton Club, that it may continue to flourish. Include prayers for people working on the land at this difficult time of the year.

# Jane Austen – well worth her weight in coins and bank-notes!

The much-loved novelist Jane Austen is about to make history. 200 years after her death, she will appear simultaneously on a British coin and a British bank note. That means that only the Queen, who as head of state must be depicted on British currency, will be more prevalent.



The Royal Mint has chosen Jane Austen as the new image for its commemorative £2 coin. About five million will be released into mass circulation sometime this Spring. At about the same time, the Bank of England will release its new, plastic, unrippable £10 note, with Jane Austen replacing Charles Darwen.

Historians cannot recall the last time a figure other than the reigning monarch appeared on both coins and notes at the same time. The release of both coins and notes will be in step with the 200th anniversary of Jane Austen's death, in the summer of 1817, at the age of just 41.

## The beauty of pearls – out of darkness and trial

On 6th February we celebrate the Queen's Accession to the Throne 65 years ago... meanwhile, Norma Murrain, a jewellery designer, notices that the Queen loves pearls...

The beauty of pearls - out of darkness and trial

"The Kingdom of Heaven is like a merchant seeking goodly pearls; who when he had found one pearl of great price, went and sold all that he had, and bought it " Mathew 13:45-46

Have you noticed how often the Queen wears pearls? Is it because pearls are the birth-stone for June (when she celebrates her official birthday)? Or because she loves their natural beauty? Or is it because pearls represent wisdom and purity? We will never know.

Natural pearls form when an irritant - usually a parasite or grain of sand - works its way into an oyster. As a defence mechanism, the oyster secretes a fluid to coat the irritant. Layer upon layer of this 'nacre' is deposited until a lustrous pearl is formed. A cultured pearl undergoes the same process, though here the irritant is a surgically implanted bead or piece of shell.

Pearls can come from either salt or freshwater sources. Once the irritant is in place, it can take up to three years for the pearl to reach its full size and nacre thickness. Of all the pearls produced, only about five per cent are of true gemquality.

There is a parallel with the way pearls are formed in nature, and the way we grow as Christians. To form 'pearls of wisdom 'in humans, three conditions should be present:

**Timing** – Just as an oyster must mature for about three years before it can transform an irritant into a pearl, so Jesus spent three years maturing his disciples, and when we go through tests as Christians, timing is crucial. Like the disciples, we need to spend time with God, building our relationship with Him. We need to know His promises, so that when testing times come, we already have the precious Word of Truth as our nacre-forming ammunition! With His truth in our hearts we can cover every negative thought with layer upon layer of truth.

It may seem that our struggles will never end, but rest assured God will never give us more than we can bear, and He will never leave us or forsake us.

**Irritant** – What is the irritant in your life? I have faced a few that have forced me to my knees, forced me to fast, and forced me to cry out to God! My irritants came in the form of sickness, divorce, bereavement, friendship failures, financial frustrations, to name a few. Yet through them all, God built up layer upon layer of his Word and His Love in my life, until my 'irritant' became a testimony to His faithfulness. Every problem has resulted in another layer of 'nacre' of His grace.

**Darkness** – Natural pearls are formed in the deepest, darkest waters, and we will find ourselves in dark places whilst our pearls of wisdom are being formed. Illness and emotional pain may lead to isolation and depression. Yet I have emerged from deep darkness with more wisdom, more compassion, a greater ability to empathize with others in trouble, a greater love for God, and a greater passion to share His love. All of my best jewellery designs are based on my personal faith journey. No wonder Jesus describes the Kingdom of Heaven as a precious pearl. No wonder He is also the Pearl of Great Price!

## **St Andrew's CE First School** Successful learners Success for life



The Spring Term began well with everyone returning to school refreshed after their Christmas break. We have lots of interesting work and events planned as usual and will be embarking on lots of exciting topic work, enabling the children to learn through our rich and broad curriculum.

Both Reception classes have been learning all about food, and will be cooking, baking and best of all....tasting! Sticking with the food theme, Year 1's topic is 'Chocolate' and they excitedly visited Cadbury World in Birmingham recently where the children discovered how chocolate is made and manufactured. They even got to try a little bit of chocolate! 'Queen Victoria Rules' is Year 2's topic and they had a wonderful visit to the Black Country Museum, which included a Victorian school day experience. Years 3 and 4 are learning about what life was like in Ancient Egypt and have been producing some wonderful Ancient Egyptian art, which will be displayed in their classrooms. They also recently enjoyed 'The Wonders of Ancient Egypt' Workshop where the children handled many artefacts, which were up to 5000 years old. They also took part in a mummy wrapping contest - it was so much fun! Year 5 are exploring what life was like for the Ancient Greeks, including the notion of Democracy and how the Olympic Games were back then compared to how they are now.

Reception's 'Stay and Play' sessions, which take place every Monday morning at 9am – 9.45am, are very well attended. These sessions provide parents and carers with the opportunity to come into school and 'work and play' alongside their child. Our extra-curricular clubs, which are an essential part of school life because they enrich children's experiences beyond the curriculum and develop social skills, are well underway.
