Prayers ... for the Worldwide Church

My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord

There is much to commemorate during April. On Palm Sunday (9th) we remember the triumphal entry of Jesus into Jerusalem; join this journey in your prayers. Good Friday (14th) marks the self-sacrifice of Jesus to bring about the redemption of us all. Easter Day (14th) brings the triumph of Jesus over death; give thanks for this victory and for all that it means to us. Pray for our country, England, on Saint George's Day (23rd) and on Saint Mark's day (25th) give thanks for his Gospel. At this time of great joy bring to God all who lead us in the music of our worship. Give thanks for the service of our Eucharistic Ministers and pray for the congregations of our two churches dedicated to Saint Peter at Hinton and Bengeworth.

Prayers ... for the World

Ask God to bless schools throughout the world and especially those in underprivileged countries, the pupils, students and the teachers who lack the facilities of our developed world. Pray for medical missionaries who cheerfully choose to serve in the most difficult circumstances. Include in your prayers the people of China, especially for those who do not enjoy the good things in life. Pray for the refugees who are driven from their homes to depend on the kindness of those of us who have sufficiency and more. Ask God to be with the United Nations Organisation in its work to bring aid to so many areas of the world.

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Letter from Robert Jones, Archdeacon of Worcester

I recently attended one of the so-called Way Stations of the Reformation. This is a roving exhibition commemorating the Reformation, surprisingly on a bus, which is being sent from Germany around over sixty different significant cities in Europe, returning there for the 500th anniversary of Martin Luther in October later this year. The theme of the Way Station was Reformation: Then and Now.

The question being asked was what needed reforming back then in the sixteenth century, and was that, in a sense, 'job done' for ever. If not, what needs reforming today if the Church is to be *semper reformanda*, always reforming. In others words, did enough change already happen back then, or is it something we live with constantly. Thinking back to the recent General Synod it is clear that this debate is still alive and well.

Martin Luther was a German monk. When he decided to challenge what he saw as shortcomings, even betrayals, of the gospel in the church, he never intended to create a new church. He wanted to heal it and take it back to its roots. With the sale of indulgences he saw the danger of clergy become merchants of grace, grace itself becoming some sort of commodity which could be acquired. So his conclusion was that it's all about grace, God's free gift, because that is what God is like.

He soon discovered all sorts of unintended consequences in his Reformation. It is easier to set off events, rather than stop or control them. His Reformation reminded the church of the primacy of God's grace revealed in Scripture, but it marked years of division and even war, and the raising of destructive human passions where Christians could not even see each other as belonging to the same Church.

It is easy to divide, but it is harder to reconcile. So we may, like Luther, get the basic message right, but we need to return constantly to what that message means as it works out in practice. You could say that it has taken the churches 500 years to get back to the position of recognising that they belong in the same church. This is why the archbishop of Canterbury keeps going on about learning the art of good disagreement – church history contains too many examples of the bad.

We are firmly placed in this world but are fired by a vision of another world. We live on earth, but seek the kingdom of heaven. This other-worldliness must not lead us astray into ways of behaviour, which actually deny the nature of Christ we are called to imitate. In that sense we are always in need of reform, *semper reformanda*, the good news being that our God is always the same: He loves us anyway.

Jesus at the gates of Jerusalem

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, when the Church remembers how Jesus arrived at the gates of Jerusalem just a few days before the Passover was due to be held. He was the Messiah come to his own people in their capital city, and yet he came in humility, riding on a young donkey, not in triumph, riding on a war-horse.



As Jesus entered the city, the crowds gave him a rapturous welcome, throwing palm fronds into his path. They knew his reputation as a healer, and welcomed him. But sadly the welcome was short-lived and shallow, for Jerusalem would soon reject her Messiah, and put him to death. On this day churches worldwide will distribute little crosses made from palm fronds in memory of Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem.

Hampton WI – March 2017

After welcoming everyone, Ann Evans, our President, reminded us of the various activities, which would be taking place during the coming month. Final arrangements were made for the visit to the Archive and Archaeology Department at the Hive, in Worcester, and our bi-monthly lunch at the Dolphin Inn, Bishampton.

Members were invited to put their names down to provide items for our 'Strictly Home-Made' Stall at the Hampton Flower Show at the end of September.

It was agreed to send a donation to ACWW, who were raising money for the New Hope Gardening Project in Zimbabwe.

Members were asked their opinion on whether they would like to receive the County Newsletter digitally or be able to read it on Facebook, as opposed to a printed copy, which is the current method. The large majority of members opted for the current arrangement.

Our speaker for the evening was Helen Hurdman, who told us about the charity 'Working World' which she set up in 2008. Helen previously worked at Evesham College with young people who had learning difficulties, but found that some services were being withdrawn, so decided to set up the training centre for young adults, which is based at the Adventure Playground, Woodlands, Evesham. This has grown over the years and now has seven staff, and supports over thirty young adult clients.

The staff work with the clients in small groups on a variety of work activities. Some of clients go on to work for other local employers, some combine a part time job with coming to Working World, some just attend Working World. The activities include running the café on the site, household and gardening tasks, running a small mobile shop that is taken to supported housing schemes, packing and selling sweets, envelope stuffing and leaflet delivery. Opportunities for the young people to socialise away from the centre are also arranged.

Helen was accompanied by one of her clients, who gave a brief description of her time there, and had brought along some packs of sweets for us to buy.

Next month we will be welcoming Catherine Clark, who will tell us about 'My Life in Hats.'

If you would like to join us at one of our meetings, do come along. We are always pleased to see visitors and you will be made very welcome. Waste of time (and still no space to park the car)



You always knew this: that hunting for somewhere to park your car is a big waste of time. In fact, it is an astonishing waste of time: British drivers are wasting an average of nearly four days every year, simply looking for parking spaces.

In London, drivers spend almost eight minutes searching for a space after each journey. That compares with five minutes in the East of England and East Midlands, according to research by the British Parking Association.



According to the BPA's research, the average time a motorist spends looking for a space is 5.9 minutes, adding up to 90.5 hours –

or four days – over a year, based on the national average of 921 car journeys a year.

It all takes its toll. Drivers report growing stress and anxiety as they miss appointments, or are late for work and activities, simply because they cannot get out of the car. They loath other drivers who carelessly park across two spaces, and vilify car parks that are difficult to navigate.

If anyone asks, say 'The Lord needs it.'




So off they went...

and they found it as Jesus had said.




Why are you taking our donkey?

Others cut palm branches and waved them.




They shouted the traditional welcome to the Passover feast



Chocolate



One of the more earthly pleasures of celebrating Easter is the sheer amount of chocolate around. But chocolate was part of other religions long before Christianity.

According to ancient Mayan legend, some 3,000 years ago, cacao, or the cocoa tree, which grows in the tropical rainforests of South America, was a bridge between heaven and earth. The Mayan used the beans for a drink called xocolatl, which means 'bitter juice' which means it wasn't hot chocolate as we know it. Even so, by 400 BC they had exported the beans to Costa Rica.

The Aztecs in Central America agreed that cacao must have had a divine origin. They believed that their god Quetzalcoatl had come down from heaven on the beam of the morning star, bearing a cacao tree as a gift for human beings, and that whoever drank the hot foaming drink was given divine wisdom.


Christopher Columbus arrived in the New World in the 15th century, to find that a slave could be bought for 100 beans. But Columbus never really 'got it' about cacao beans, and when he returned to Portugal, he threw them away as useless. Chocolate was considered good for various ailments. The Spanish explorer Hernan Cortes called it 'a drink that builds up resistance and fights fatigue'. Finally, the Spanish began to pay attention. Spanish monks brewed up a drink from the beans that was far more acceptable to European taste, sweetening it with sugar, and adding cinnamon and nutmeg.

By the 18th century chocolate was so popular in Europe that the Swedish naturalist Linnaeus renamed the cocoa plant Theobroma – food of the gods.

Although chocolate was originally only for the wealthy, devout Quakers such as Joseph Fry, Joseph Terry, Isaac Rowntree and John Cadbury had a dream that chocolate could replace gin as a drink for the working classes. Their determination to make this possible was driven by their Christian zeal, and they in part succeeded.

Then in the middle of the 19th century it was discovered that chocolate could be made into solid bars! With this discovery, Easter eggs were on the way. Both Fry's and Cadbury's launched them in the 1870s, and the rest is history.

These days, Fair Trade chocolate is the thing to look out for – it guarantees a fair price to the cocoa farmers who make it possible for us to go on enjoying this heavenly stuff.

In class, the teachers had prepared lessons and activities based around books and stories which everyone enjoyed immensely.



Sadly, due to low numbers, our after-school club Shine made the decision to close at our site. However we are still offering parents the facility of after school care with “Little Big Learners” - a company that runs after school care 3.15-6pm during the term time and also holiday clubs from the cricket pavilion in Ashton-Under-Hill. The company offer a healthy snack and drink on arrival and homework/reading support if required. The sessions are run and led by a Qualified Teacher. They collect children from Sedgeberrow School every week day during term time and transport them personally to the club. For more information please see their website www.littlebiglearners.co.uk.

During April, we will find out who we are welcoming into our Reception class next year and arranging induction visits for them to begin to get used to the school environment. They will meet Miss Murray, who will be teaching Reception class during the Summer term and also from September, whilst Mrs Williams goes on maternity leave expecting her first baby in April.

There are still plenty of events coming up before the Easter break. Our PTA have organised a Bingo fundraiser for the parents. We also have an assembly led by Joe Cook (Managing Director of local firm D A Cook (Builders) Ltd and current South West Chairman of the National Federation of Builders) to teach the children about building site safety. At the end of March, Year 2 will be visiting the Almonry Museum in Evesham to learn all about our local history.
