Letter from the Bishop of Worcester Thy Kingdom Come

From Ascension Day on 25 May to Pentecost on 4 June, parishes across the Diocese will be joining with Christians worldwide in a ten-day wave of prayer for the coming of God's Kingdom. This is the second year of the initiative from the Archbishops of Canterbury and York and this year it's become a global movement with Christians of several denominations around the world praying together for more people to come to know Jesus. It hardly needs saying that this fits well with our Kingdom People Vision.

Throughout our own diocese, many of us will be getting involved with prayer events planned in deaneries and parishes. We hope lots of people will also join us in pilgrimage – walking from the four compass points to form the shape of a cross as we converge at Worcester Cathedral for a service of praise and celebration at 7pm on Pentecost Eve.

Christians in the north of our diocese will have their own event as well - at 2.30pm on Pentecost itself. People from all denominations will be gathering in Priory Ruins to pray for particularly for Dudley Borough.

At the centre of this is prayer. Together we'd like to cover the ten days in a wave of 24/7 prayer and hope as many people as possible will join in and 'pledge to pray'.

As Archbishop Justin says: "In praying 'Thy Kingdom Come' we all commit to playing our part in the renewal of the nations and the transformation of communities... I cannot remember in my life anything that I've been involved in where I have sensed so clearly the work of the Spirit."

I pray that the evidence of this being a great work of the Spirit will be very clear to us in this Diocese.

The Tea Service

- cherishing hospitality, friendship and faith 'If you go down to the church Friday, you're sure of a big surprise...'

Every Friday lunchtime at All Saints, there is a guiet buzz of anticipation in the air. The nave is being turned into a café, five tables are laid out beautifully and decorated with fresh flowers, and sumptuous cakes and biscuits are brought in ready to serve. By 2pm, all is prepared for guests to arrive, the host team offering a warm welcome. But there is no 'us and them' about this gathering; all are companions, coming together to celebrate friendship and faith.

Especially cherished at the Tea Service are those friends who are living with dementia, their carers and friends. There is always a flavour of 'reminiscence' - and making connections – with a theme or idea for the week. This is explored through pictures, objects, questions and conversation – leading in to a 'thought for the day'. And there is plenty of music, thanks to a 'resident' piano player, and a hymn or two during the afternoon, plus a prayer.

And, yes, there is tea – lots of it – usually two rounds, one at the beginning, and one at the end. So the advertised 3pm end-time often spills over till 3.30pm! Any cakes left over are wrapped up for people to take home.

How did this all start? Well, Rosie Grove, was the catalyst to begin with. She was thinking that something more could be provided for older people, and was also



aware that some members of the congregation at All Saints were living with dementia, and finding the regular services difficult. With the encouragement of people developing the national Dementia Awareness agenda and interest expressed by people **Dementia** from various local Churches, plus the new Alzheimer's Society initiative to make Evesham a 'dementia friendly' town, the possibility of a project began to emerge.

At a 'Dementia Matters' day in Birmingham that Rosie attended, she met someone who was successfully running a dementia-friendly 'café' in a church in Lichfield diocese, having first 'audited' the building to ensure a suitable environment could be provided. And this sowed the idea that has now taken root in Evesham! All Saints' PCC agreed to support such an 'audit' – and then a new project. Rosie explains: "The idea was to provide tea, a small service – which involved music – and a theme connecting ideas and memories. So – for example the 1960s, or transport, or sheep – quite often associated with the time of year."

Four small teams now take it in turns to plan and host each Tea Service, and

various people have kindly donated things – like crockery and cake stands. Now there are usually about a dozen people coming along regularly – mostly dementiasufferers, carers and friends from around the town. When you add together helpers and others, the company can number 25 or more!

Rosie reports that the Tea Service is still developing. The full team met recently, having got feedback from guests – who said "unhelpfully nice things", apparently. But there was a request for some savoury food – sandwiches, not just cakes! And the team are planning two summer 'Tea Outings' – a picnic on the river, and a visit to a plant nursery.

And now the Tea Service team are asking for <u>our</u> help to 'network' this invitation to everyone we know across the Asum area. As Rosie describes it: "everybody wants to feel cherished sometimes – and this is your opportunity; come in – and we will look after you...".

So please 'log' this venture firmly in your own memory. **Fridays. 2pm. All Saints' Church.** And be ready to invite (or bring along) anyone you know who is living with dementia or feeling isolated for whatever reason. There are now leaflets - available in our six Asum churches – for us to use to help with this vital networking.

And, **more hosts are needed to support the teams.** If you think you could be involved once a month, please give Rosie Grove a call on 01386 442111.

The next meeting of the Asum Group Council is on Monday 22 May, 7. 30pm at All Saints Church, Evesham. If you want an idea or issue to be raised, please speak to one of your representatives, or come to the meeting yourself!

Acts for Everyone

At the end of May comes Ascension Day (25th), a bit of a neglected festival in the Church. As Luke reminds us in Acts 1:1-11, it was the opportunity for Jesus to commission His disciples His witnesses in the world:

'But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth.' (Acts 1:8).

What is a witness?

a witness knows Jesus:

A credible witness speaks of what they know personally. The disciples had spent 40 days with Jesus and now they were called to share that experience and relationship with others. What is my story of how Jesus is alive in my life?

a witness grows in Jesus:

Jesus told them to wait for the gift of the Spirit to empower them as witnesses. 'Do not leave Jerusalem, but wait for the gift my Father promised, which you have heard me speak about.' (4). The Spirit equips us to display Jesus' character (fruit) and enables us to witness (gifts). How does our life demonstrate the difference Jesus makes?

a witness goes for Jesus:

They were called to witness for Jesus in ever-increasing circles of influence. For us, this means family and friends, workplace and community, and the wider world. Where is God calling us to serve Him?

The story is told of Jesus arriving in heaven after the Ascension, being welcomed by the angels. Gabriel asked Jesus, 'what is your plan for everyone to know your love?' Jesus replied, 'I have given my disciples the task of carrying the message into all the world.' Gabriel's face dropped, 'These are unpredictable men, what if they fail? After a pause Jesus answered, 'There is no other plan!'

Deadline for cashing in your old £1 coins

Dig into the pockets of your coats, rummage down the backs of your chairs and couch, empty your piggy bank, look in your car – do

whatever it takes, but FIND all those old £1 coins that may lurk around your house – before it is too late.

For this autumn, the little round £1 we have known since 1983 will become worthless. The Treasury has just brought out a new 12-sided £1 coin. The change to the new silver and gold dodecagon is the largest to affect the UK's currency since 1998, when the old 50p coin was abandoned for a smaller, shiner version.

The face side of the new £1 coin features the Queen, while the tail side features four emblems: the English rose, the leek for Wales, the Scottish thistle and the shamrock for Northern Ireland – all emerging from a single stem within a crown.

24th May: John & Charles Wesley: Let's Sing a Hymn

Later this month the Church calendar celebrates the lives of John and Charles Wesley. John's great gift to the Christian cause was the little matter of founding the world-wide movement known as Methodism. His brother Charles had an equally profound impact through his hymns. He actually wrote over 500, most of which aren't sung nowadays, but among the ones we do still sing are all-time favourites – 'Love divine, all loves excelling', 'O for a thousand tongues to sing'. 'Jesu lover of my soul', 'Hark the herald angels sing' – and scores more.

40 years ago almost everybody knew quite a lot of hymns, but sadly that's no longer true. Traditional hymns aren't usually sung at school assemblies, not even in church schools, and while the audience for 'Songs of Praise' on BBC TV is substantial, most of those watching are over 50. With only about ten per cent of the population even irregular church-goers there is inevitably a lack of familiarity with hymns of any kind. Christmas carols are an exception, as is 'Jerusalem' and 'Amazing Grace', because they are frequently heard outside church.

Singing hymns is a wonderful experience at its best – just ask a Welsh rugby crowd singing 'Bread of heaven'! It seems a pity to lose it.

It's not a bad idea to take ten minutes and think what is your favourite hymn, and why – ancient or modern doesn't matter. Then try singing it in the bath or under the shower – a very purifying experience.

Why the C of E is keeping its custom of reading the marriage banns

The C of E has recently voted to keep its medieval tradition of reading the marriage banns. Not because it is worried about 'illegal' marriages taking place, but because it hopes it will help to keep up congregation numbers among young people. Members of the General Synod, who met and voted on it in February, said that ditching the popular tradition would mean losing an important source of new worshippers. Just under 45,000 people got married in CofE churches in 2015. So, as one archdeacon explained, reading the banns 'gives us access to 90,000 people in the 18-45 age group, which is the age group that we struggle to reach.'

Check the children's money-boxes and your parking money, and also the Church Offertory box, payment for items sold in Church, the collection money, Petty Cash and the Vicar's beer fund.

The old £5 will no longer be legal tender from 5 May. The new £1 coin is starting to appear now and the old ones will cease to be accepted in shops from 15 October. Banks will exchange £5 notes and £1 coins for a short time after they cease to be legal tender.
