

A Letter from the Archdeacon of Dudley, Nicki Groake

On Sunday 11 June I will have the privilege of preaching at a Service of Thanksgiving for Women's Ministry in the Cathedral. 2017 is a significant year of anniversaries, an opportunity to remember and celebrate some key moments in the gradual acceptance in the Church of England of the ministry of women in leadership roles:



50 years since female lay readers were appointed;

30 years since women deacons were ordained;

25 years since the vote was taken for women's ordination to the priesthood in 1992.

In this diocese, the ministry of women has long been welcomed and appreciated wholeheartedly by the vast majority of church members. It is an encouraging environment in which women can flourish and realise their potential, serving in roles which suit their varied gifts, personalities and skills, being who God made them to be, in the same way that men can. Hopefully, as the impact of our Kingdom People: Calling Young Disciples project grows, we will similarly see young people and children increasingly playing their part, growing in confidence that what they bring is valued and vital to our shared life as God's people.

I am acutely aware that I am in a senior role in God's church, as one of a steadily growing number of women, because wise people invested in me, saw my leadership potential, gave me opportunities and trained and mentored me. They picked me up when I stumbled, let me make mistakes and learn from them, and stretched me to do more than I thought I could, trusting that God equips the called, rather than calls the equipped. I am especially grateful to those who did that when the church still had questions about the role of women. I think they were following in the footsteps of Jesus!

When Jesus walked on earth, women were uneducated, not given a legally valid voice, and treated like property. He refused to bow to those cultural stigmas, instead modelling a way of relating to women which was totally different — radically inclusive, no limits on their God given destiny or restrictions on how their gifts could be exercised. It is when women and men, and young people and children work together that the church is enabled to be what it is created to be, the hope of the world, fully representative of the body of Christ as we seek together to be Kingdom People

I hope many from across the Diocese will be in the Cathedral at 4pm on 11 June to celebrate the ministry of women. I pray that each of us will think of young people in whom we can invest —especially girls, and invite them to join us, so that we are a truly multi-generational church encouraging gifts and contributions of everyone.

At long last, the Pastoral Scheme has been drafted to join the parishes of Bengeworth, Hampton, Sedgeberrow and Hinton-on-the-Green into one 'benefice' within the Asum

Understanding the Trinity

'The words 'God is love' have no real meaning unless God contains at least two Persons. Love is something that one person has for another person. If God was a single person, then before the world was made, He was not love.' (CS Lewis).

Trinity Sunday takes place this month (11th June), yet the idea of One God in three Persons is not easy to get our heads around. CS Lewis was right in saying that we have to understand the doctrine in relational terms. So why is the Trinity so important for us?

First, the Trinity provides us with a model of community. God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit relate to one another in love and work together to accomplish God's purpose in the world. At His baptism, Jesus the Son is obedient to His Father's purpose, who declares His approval and the Spirit anoints Jesus for ministry.

This relationship between Father, Son, and Spirit has been described as 'perichoresis', a Greek word referring to dance. In this divine dance, each person of the Godhead complements and builds on the work of other members of the Trinity. God intends that our life together in the Christian community should reflect the very life of God Himself.

Secondly, we find our mission in the Trinity. Jesus said, 'As the Father has sent me, so I send you.' As the Father sent His Son into the world, so Jesus sends us out to do the Father's work, equipped by the Spirit of God. We are called to establish God's kingdom on this earth, so that God's will may be done on earth as in heaven! Our work for God is done from the standpoint of the Triune God, who created, redeemed, and enables us to do it.

All three persons of the Godhead are at work in our lives and church, as well as in the world around. If we live with a renewed awareness of the Trinity, our spiritual lives will deepen, our vision of God's kingdom will expand, and the work that God has chosen for us will take on a new vitality and urgency.

'At the heart of reality lies the love between the Father and the Son. The Spirit unites us with Christ so that we begin to experience the same depth of love that exists between the Father and the Son.' (Graham Tomlin).

Sleeping is not to be ashamed of

Do you try and live on little sleep? It is not a good idea. Just one night without proper rest quadruples your risk of catching a cold, because your immune system is suppressed. You will also face the day with less motivation, less empathy with others, slower reaction times, poorer concentration, and feeling far more hungry! For constant gnawing hunger can be caused by lack of sleep. Researchers at Pennsylvania State University found that less than six hours a night causes levels of the hormone ghrelin, which signals hunger, to rise, and levels of leptin, the sense of fullness hormone, to drop. So when you are over-tired, you will feel hungry, but never full.

Also, too little sleep can have grave long-term effects. Harvard Medical School found that less than five hours a night increases the risk of certain cancers, diabetes, Alzheimer's, obesity, cognitive decline, depression and heart disease. As one expert puts it: 'There is not one single good thing about poor sleep, yet we live in a society that at best disregards it, and at worst, views getting by on very little as a badge of honour.'

Bad sleep ages your brain. Good sleep 'shampoos' your brain. During sleep, the space between brain cells actually expands 60 per cent, allowing the brain to flush our built-up toxins. "Under-sleeping is the next sugar scare – it's a health time bomb.' So says Dr Sara Gottfird, a sleep expert.

St Richard of Chichester

St Richard of Chichester, who lived from 1197 to 1253, is patron saint of the English county of Sussex.

In 1244 Richard was elected Bishop of Chichester but King Henry III wanted someone else as bishop and he ordered that no one should feed or house Richard. So Richard lived with a friend who was a parish priest and visited his entire diocese on foot for two years until the king relented.

Richard is widely remembered today for the prayer he is supposed to have said as he was dying. The prayer was adapted for the song 'Day by Day' in the musical Godspell and it is in this form that most people know it today:

Day by day,
Dear Lord, of thee
three things I pray:
To see thee more clearly,
Love thee more dearly,
Follow thee more nearly,
Day by Day.

10 June - Queen's Official Birthday

The Queen celebrates her birthday twice each year - once on the anniversary of the day she was born, April 21, and on an "official" birthday in June.

So why exactly does the Queen have two birthdays?

It is a tradition that was started by George II in 1748 and is owes its origins to the ageless problem of the British weather.

George was born in November, and felt the weather would be too cold at that time of year for his annual birthday parade.

So instead, he combined his birthday celebration with an annual spring military parade known as Trooping the Colour, in which regiments displayed their flags or "colours" so soldiers would be familiar with them.

It is a tradition that has continued to this day. All British sovereigns are given the option of having an "official" birthday, and because the Queen's real birthday is on April 21, she has stuck with the tradition of celebrating in June.

Otherwise known as The Queen's Birthday Parade, the Queen inspects soldiers from the Household Division. It takes place on Horse Guards Parade behind Whitehall.

During the early part of her reign the Queen's official birthday was on a Thursday, but it later changed to a Saturday in June so that more members of the public could enjoy it.

The Queen usually spends her birthday privately, but the occasion is marked publicly by gun salutes at noon: a 41 gun salute in Hyde Park, a 21-gun salute in Windsor Great Park and a 62-gun salute at the Tower of London.

This year Trooping the Colour takes place on Saturday, June 17.

Lime & Vanilla Tart

Crisp pastry and a smooth custard filling give this simple dessert good bite and contrast. The addition of lime lifts the flavour for a fresh, summery tasting experience. Perfect to prepare ahead for lunch with friends.

INGREDIENTS SWEET PASTRY

500g flour 150g butter 100g caster sugar 100g icing sugar

2 eggs

50ml water

METHOD

SWEET PASTRY

- Preheat the oven to 180 degrees.
- Combine all of the dry ingredients into a food processor until it is like breadcrumbs.
- · Add the water and eggs to combine.
- Cover with cling film and chill in the fridge for at least 30 minutes to prevent shrinkage.
- Line a 6-8" tart case. Bake blind (line with baking parchment and fill with baking beans or rice) for 10 minutes and then for a further 5 minutes without the beans/rice until golden.
- · Allow to go cold.

INGREDIENTS TART MIXTURE

METHOD TART MIXTURE

3 eggs 3 limes (zest and juice) 100g sugar 250ml double cream ½ vanilla pod

- Whisk the eggs and lime juice and zest together until thick and pale.
- Boil the cream, sugar and vanilla.
- Combine everything together, sieve and then pour into the tart case.
- Bake at 130 degrees until set which will take approximately 20 minutes.
- Serve cold with Salted Chocolate or Chocolate ice cream.








St Andrew's CE First School Successful learners Success for life



The first half term is flying by and the school is a hive of activity. We are running several sports-related 'out of school' clubs such as Tennis, Cricket, Dance & Fitness, Karate and Football Clubs for both girls and boys. We also offer drumming and piano lessons for those children who wish to learn to read and play music.

We were recently very lucky to work with the Almonry Museum on a community arts project. This involved a storyteller coming in to school to do some work on creating six word stories. He told the children riddles and fairy tales, which were interesting and interactive. The children then had to do actions and recite key parts of the stories. They also created their own six word stories about caring which they had to explain in detail using senses and similes to bring them alive. These stories will be woven into banners which will hang in the Almonry Musuem over the summer.

At St Andrew's we have always acknowledged the importance of providing our children with learning experiences outside of the classroom. They not only give children the opportunity to perform hands-on learning, the types of memories that educational trips create are known as 'episodic memories', which help children retain information for longer periods. This is why each term trips are arranged to put the children's topic learning into context. Recently, both Reception classes thoroughly enjoyed their trip to Bishops Wood Centre. They listened and joined in with the story of 'The Three Little Pigs' and then attempted to build homes for the pigs from natural materials. They then tested out how strong they were when the big bad wolf came to blow them down! Following this, the children learnt about different man-made and natural materials and made clay tree guardians. Some children even built houses for the woodland animals using the natural resources they found whilst out in the woodland area. This term, Years 5 and 3 are going to Sandfield Farm in Sedgeberrow to find out more about animals and their habitats and 'how things grow.' The children always have a wonderful time whenever we take them off-site. We are not only proud of their infectious enthusiasm for learning, but also of their impeccable behaviour and maturity.

Reception's Monday morning 'Stay and Play' sessions, continue to be extremely successful. These sessions provide parents and carers with the opportunity to come into school and 'work and play' alongside their child. Recently, a father came along and showed the children how to build using bricks and cement. They then got to have a go themselves.

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
