## **A Letter from the Bishop of Dudley for Parish Magazines**

For the past year I have been serving on the board of the Human Tissue Authority, the body that regulates organisations that remove, store and use human tissue for research, medical treatment, post-mortem examination, education and training, and display in public. They also give approval for organ and bone marrow donation from living people. I have become increasingly fascinated by its work and the many ethical questions that arise as medical science advances what is possible.

Part of my role, along with other board members, is to give the final approval for living organ donations, having ascertained that the donation is being given without reward, coercion or duress - all of which are illegal in the UK. The donor also needs to be capable of giving informed consent, having understood what the procedure involves and its consequences.

There are often incredibly inspiring stories such as a husband giving a kidney to his wife, or a work colleague donating to someone across the office. There are also people who choose to donate a kidney or liver lobe altruistically to someone who they do not know, and will likely never meet or know anything about.

Recently I read a report submitted to the HTA for such a donation. It was an older person who decided that she would mark a significant birthday, not by receiving presents but by giving to someone else. Her Christian faith had inspired her, in thankfulness to God for good health and so many opportunities, to offer to donate one of her kidneys to a complete stranger.

This would not be the choice of everyone, and many people might not be physically or psychologically fit to proceed, but it made me reflect upon how important it is to be people of gift.

If we believe that everything we have, including our bodies, comes from God, then offering to donate in life and in death is part of our good stewardship. Donation then becomes an incredible gift of love as 'freely you have received, freely give' (Matthew 10.8) and it furthers our Christian calling to bring healing, motivated by compassion, mercy and prioritising the needs of others.

Some people choose to be blood donors, thus contributing to the 7000 units of blood that are needed each day by the NHS; red blood cells, platelets and plasma are all needed to save lives. Others choose to donate bone marrow. Others register to be an organ donor when they die so that the 6,900 or so people who at any one time are waiting for a transplant might be given an incredible gift. The sad reality is that there aren't enough donors; in 2015, 429 patients died while on the active waiting list for a transplant and a further 807 were removed because they became too ill.

It can take some bravery to have that difficult conversation with family members to explain that when you die you would like to be an organ donor. That conversation

is, however, really crucial. If this is your preference, do register - by signing up to the Organ Donation Register - and carry an organ donation card, but also have that conversation today so that your family understand your wishes to bring life and health to others if something were to happen to you.

Life is an incredible gift. Donation in life, and in death, gifts to others lots more life in all its fullness.

The wonderful warm welcome and unconditional love shown to the returning son is a great example of how God loves us, unconditionally and generously. Let us pray for all families...large and small...single parent families...families where there has been breach of relationship...families facing financial hardship...loss of employment...families where both parents work, but a grandparent needs support...families struggling with illness, physical or mental...families who are facing the challenge of change, such as a house move...loss of a traditional livelihood, say working on the land...families who have lost someone through relationship breakdown or bereavement....

Jesus is our faithful friend...He does not want us to struggle in life for success...He is more interested in our faithfulness...Lord make us faithful followers of you!

## The Evesham River Festival

This year the fabulous river festival will return to Workman Gardens on 8th & 9th July 2017, where a wonderful programme of events will ensue alongside and on the River Avon.

Many of your favourites will return to the water such as a colourful parade of steam boats from the steam boat association, who this year recognise Evesham River Festival as an official rally!



## Strawberries and Wimbledon

The tradition of consuming strawberries and cream at Wimbledon is often attributed to King George V. He was an avid tennis fan and started the tradition of royal patronage at Wimbledon as early as the 1910's. His son who became King George VI participated in the doubles event in the 1926 and was as frequent a visitor as his father. Queen Elizabeth II paid her most recent visit to the Championships in 2010, while Prince William and his wife Kate's are regular visitors.

Nevertheless according to a 2006 New York Times article, the royals can take no credit for the use of strawberries and cream as a snack between matches, with strawberries being a Wimbledon staple since the inception of the tournament in 1877. Wimbledon takes place at the height of the UK summer, which is traditionally the period during which strawberries are briefly available. Summer, strawberries and tennis have been a match made in heaven for more than a century now.

It is estimated that that in excess of 28,000 kilograms of strawberries and 10,000 litres of cream will be consumed during the Wimbledon fortnight. The price for a portion of a minimum of 10 strawberries and cream at Wimbledon has remained at £2.50 per serving for seven years, since 2010. The strawberries come from farms in Kent. To ensure the utmost freshness, strawberries are picked at 4.00am, collected from the packing plant at 9.00am and are delivered to the Club by 11.00am for inspection and hulling. They are then enjoyed by guests on the same day.

If you aren't lucky enough to be at Wimbledon, perhaps you could make your own strawberry cupcakes. Make your favourite cupcake recipe, and top with cream infused with fresh strawberries, as below.

### Ingredients for Strawberry cream frosting

250ml double thick cream

2.5ml vanilla extract

15ml white sugar

6 strawberries hulled and sprinkled with 15ml castor sugar. Stand for 30 minutes.

Place the cream, vanilla extract and sugar in a large mixing bowl and mix (don't beat) till combined. Place the mixture and your electric beater whisks in the fridge and leave for 30 minutes.

Remove from the fridge and beat until soft peaks form.

Blend the strawberries into a puree and add to the cream, a little at a time, whilst beating continuously until stiff.

Use to decorate the cupcakes and add a halved strawberry on top.

## Hampton WI – June 2017

Due to the General Election, we had a change of venue for our June meeting, which was held at Ecgwin's Club in Evesham. There was a small amount of business before our speaker for the evening arrived, he was delayed a little having got a little lost en route, mostly due to Fish Hill being closed for re-surfacing.

During the past month, two members had attended the Lucy Hingley Lecture at the University of Worcester, on the subject of Macular Degeneration, given by Dr Jagdeep Ghandi, who is a Consultant Ophthalmologist at Worcester Royal Hospital. He gave a very comprehensive overview, with lots of information, including advice on diet, such as eating plenty of green vegetables (especially kale!), and taking the supplement Lutein.

A group of members had visited Working World for lunch, which had been excellent. In addition to the lunch, members were able to have a look round at the other activities, and saw Clients making Christmas labels from old cards. It was suggested that they could be asked to make leaflets to advertise the Hampton Flower Show in September, where we would be having a joint 'Home-made' Stall with St Andrew's Fellowship.

Looking forward to the coming months, visits are proposed to the Confetti Fields at Wick in July and the Tomato Nurseries at Lower Moor in August, and we would be having a Strawberry Tea at Hampton Farm Shop. A team of four would be taking part in The Festival of Words Quiz at Raphael's at the end of June, and three members would be attending a lecture on Forensic Science in July.

Our Speaker for the evening was Alan Brewer, who gave us his fascinating (and at times very funny) talk about his experiences on working first for BOAC, then later British Airways. Having enjoyed cooking with his mother, Alan served a four-year apprenticeship as a baker, before becoming a Master Baker. This led to a job in catering at the BBC, becoming Hospitality Chef at Television Centre, which included working with Fanny and Johnny Craddock for three months. Replying to an advertisement for BOAC led to a forty-year career. Back in those days, the food in first class was cooked on the plane! During his career, Alan went round the world many times, and he described some of the many different aircraft he had flown in, and places that he had visited. Alan progressed to become Chief Cabin Services Director, travelling with many celebrities, but also accompanied the Queen and her party on a three-month tour for the Commonwealth Games in 1972. All in all, a fascinating life!

*Successful learners Success for life*



We cannot believe how fast this academic year has gone!

Last month, we were very lucky to welcome two special visitors, Michael and Elemini from Dumila Primary School in Tanzania, to St Andrew's. They were greeted by all the children in our Open the Book Assembly and spent the morning talking to our Reception children about their hometown in Africa. The children were taught to say 'hello, goodbye and thank you' in Swahili and told us about their schools, animals and what sports they enjoyed playing. The children listened intently and then asked some wonderful questions.

Once again, our Inspire Workshops have got off to a great start, with many parents and carers attending to work alongside their children. Their popularity is not only because they provide a wonderful opportunity for children, parents, carers and our staff to all work together collaboratively, they also show to everyone what we are learning, and how.

Our Stay & Play sessions in Reception are also very well attended. These sessions provide parents and carers with the opportunity to come into school and 'work and play' alongside their child. Recently, parents and carers have enjoyed a plethora of activities which included a number bingo game, making rhythms on the bongo drums, creating animals using animal print paper, tasting exotic fruits and recording their favourites on a graph. Kiwi was their favourite fruit! They also enjoyed using iPads for educational games.

For the first time in the history of St Andrew's, pupils from Years 4 and 5 learnt to bell-boat on the River Avon in Evesham. Using three boats, pupils, staff and volunteers started from Evesham Rowing Club, then rowed under the Workman bridge, through the lock - all three boats were in the lock together and then around the weir! This training was all in preparation for the Bell-Boating Regatta that was held in June. Our coach, Andy Train, is a British sprint and marathon canoeist and has competed in five Olympic games.
