A Letter from the Bishop of Worcester for Parish Magazines H a r v e s t

The season of harvest festivals is upon us. It's good to know that it's still an important fixture in the calendar of our parishes, particularly the rural ones.

Harvest is about taking nothing for granted. Farmers certainly don't, in my experience, but I think that there is a temptation for many people in our society to take their food for granted in a way that never happened in the past.

There is an increasing disconnectedness between most people and the food they eat. Our generation is more removed from the land than any previous one with a much greater proportion of us living in an urban setting rather than rural and many people never seeing anything of farms and farming. Urban myths about children thinking that milk comes from bottles abound.

There is also a continuing globalisation of food production, as with much else. When we eat, we're involved in a vast, complex, interweaving set of life and death dramas as never before. In these dramas we are only one character among many, but no matter how solitary our eating experience may be, every sniff, chomp and swallow connects us to vast global trade networks and thus to biophysical and social worlds far beyond ourselves.

We owe thanks to God and to very many other people for the food on our plates. We should never take them or it for granted. The contrast with our partner diocese of Morogoro in Tanzania is stark. Crop failure there has led to malnutrition and even starvation. The picture remains bleak – and that is true of vast swathes of Africa. Maybe the plight of millions elsewhere will give us more incentive to give thanks and to share what we have more generously. Harvest Festivals are one way of encouraging that.

TryPraying



"Strengthened and Nourished"

Nine members of our churches have shared the year-long **Bishop's Certificate Course** which ended in July. One of them, Cath Latimer of St. Andrew's, has kindly offered her reflections on the experience....

What made me commit to the course?

For some time I had wanted to find out more about the Bible and the life of Jesus; not just reading the words but going deeper, beyond the "thees "and the "thous" and the "old" language used in the Bible, to enable me to obtain a better understanding in a way I can grasp.

After reading about the course in the pew sheet for a few weeks I decided (or was I being pointed to it or nagged by the still small voice?) to do something about it! "Get in touch with the Rev Canon Nick Wright" it said, "Oh no!" I thought; "I don't know him and he sounds too posh and high church for me!"

The still small voice kept saying "Do it!" So finally I did - the reasons to do the course outweighed the excuses not to. I was ready to make the commitment.

About the course...

The cost is £25. There are 30 weekly sessions of approximately 2 hours each, with the usual breaks for holidays. There are no essays to be handed in or marked, but there is some preparation to be done prior to each session.

The group is a "safe" space, with confidentiality given importance in order to respect the views and comments of each person taking part. The course material is well presented and easy to read and the tutors are encouraging and supportive.

How am I feeling at the end of the course?

As this 2017 course comes to an end I am examining my feeling about the experience. One unexpected pleasure has been the close friendship bond that has developed within this very supportive group. We are making plans to keep in touch during the months to come.

As far as the studying is concerned I feel I have come to a deeper understanding of the Bible as a whole and the way it fits together. I've learned more about the life of Jesus; the things he did and how he shared our human frailty. I've enjoyed studying other faiths, and that helps us all have respect for the others people's beliefs, so important in our society today.

I feel strengthened and nourished and realise that whatever our gifts we are all needed in God's plan.

As for future steps, I will wait to be guided; but if writing this article encourages just one person to think about doing Bishop's Certificate then I shall feel I have enabled them to have the very positive experience that I have enjoyed this year.

Why not consider finding out more about the course – you have nothing to lose and everything to gain!

Annual report of the Great and Little Hampton Educational Charity 31 March 2017

Registered Charity number 702528

The value of the holding deposited in shares at the CCLA Charities Investment Fund continues to rise. At March 31st it stands at £80,312 compared to £69,293 at this time last year. Our dividend income, however, was only slighter higher at £2768 compared to £2712 in 2016.

We started the year with a bigger float so were able to issue grants to students of £2225 in total which was up from £1875 distributed in 2016. Students at degree level who are studying away from home received £50 each. Degree students living at home received £40 while two students studying F.E. courses away from home which incurred large fees received £55 each. A level students, apprentices and those studying F.E. courses whilst living at home were awarded £35 each. We received 48 applications in all compared to 45 in 2016.

The Clerk's honorarium remains at £230; stationery and postage came to £42. This year we were also able to increase our holding by buying shares costing £500. In this way we hope to be able to protect the long-term value of the fund so we can support future as well as current students from the parish of Hampton who are engaged in studying and are under the age of 25.

The charity can be contacted via our Clerk, Mrs Jan Dodwell of 50, Sycamore Avenue. Evesham WR11 1YE. We are 5 trustees who meet 3 times a year. At our meeting in November we consider the main batch of applications and decide how best to disburse the bulk of the income. We meet a second time in Jan/Feb to consider any special business which may have arisen and hold our AGM in May or June.

Once again it's a pleasure to be able to thank our Clerk for her superb efficiency and Mr Dennis Wright for checking over our accounts.

The make-up of the Trustees is set down in the terms of the charity. The vicar of Hampton. The Rev Mark Binney is a member by virtue of his office. Evesham Town Council is represented by Councillor John Smith. The County Council's nominee is myself, Jim Griffiths, who also happens to be the Chairman at the moment. We have two co-opted Trustees: Mrs Ros Saunders and Craig Jennings.

So, all in all, the charity is in good heart and should be able to offer support for the young residents of the parish for many years to come



The Hobbit - celebrating the 80th anniversary

J.R.R. Tolkien's fantasy novel The Hobbit was first published 80 years ago, on 21st September 1937. With a number of revisions, it has remained in print ever since. Today it has sold 100 million copies and been translated into about 50 languages, including Icelandic and West Frisian. It has also spawned a trilogy of films, which, although flawed, are spectacular in scope.

Tolkien was Professor of Anglo-Saxon at the University of Oxford. He was also a devout Roman Catholic, whose vision of Jesus' story as a 'true myth' helped convert his friend C. S. Lewis to Christianity.

Tolkien had an academic fascination for ancient languages, particularly Old Norse, but he also produced a series of amusing poems and stories for his children. All this came together in The Hobbit, which, while primarily a children's book, created a rich fantasy world, that was a precursor of the one underlying his major, profound fantasy epic, The Lord of the Rings.

The original manuscript of The Hobbit was two years in the making, and circulated originally among his friends. Through contact with one of Tolkien's students at Oxford, the publisher George Allen & Unwin obtained a copy, and the 10-year-old son of the owner gave it an enthusiastic thumbs-up.

The initial run of 1,500 copies sold out within three months, and further runs proved similarly popular.

Tolkien wrote that in creating these stories, his allegiance was to Christ and the Church. He felt myths generally were part of our God-created imagination.

Autumnal Equinox - 23 September When the sun goes edgewise - and daytime equals night

23rd September is the autumnal equinox (if you live in the northern hemisphere) or the vernal (Spring) equinox (if you live in the southern hemisphere). The equinoxes occur in March and September, when the Sun is 'edgewise' to the Earth's axis of rotation, so that everywhere on earth has twelve hours of daylight and twelve hours of darkness.




