A Letter from the Bishop of Dudley

Recently I made my first visit to the National Memorial Arboretum near Lichfield. It's a place of memory and hope, and I was particularly struck by the main memorial to those members of the armed forces who have died since 1945. Names are carved on about two thirds of the stone walls; sons and daughters, husbands and wives, mums and dads, who never came home. I found myself running a hand along the smooth wall for future years and wondered whose names would be there. I pondered to myself what pain was still to come, what tears and bloodshed, bullets and bombs? Oh, if only we could learn to make ploughshares and pruning hooks. How, I wondered, could I make a difference towards building a little part of more peaceable world?

In 1940 a young twenty-five year old left his native Switzerland and moved to France wanting to make a difference. For years he had been ill with tuberculosis, and during that long convalescence the call to create a community had matured within him. At the height of the Second World War, Brother Roger, as he became known, realised that he could build a little part of a more peaceable world by assisting refugees.

He settled in the small Burgundy village of Taizé, close to the demarcation line dividing France in two, and it was there that he, together with one of his sisters, began sheltering refugees, including Jewish people. There was no running water, just the village well, and food was scarce.

Brother Roger's parents, knowing that their son and daughter were in danger, asked a retired French officer who was a friend of the family to watch over them. In the autumn of 1942, he warned them that their activities had been found out and that everyone should leave at once. So until the end of the war, it was in Geneva that Brother Roger lived and it was there that he began a common life with his first brothers. They were able to return to Taizé in 1944.

Since then Brother Roger's ecumenical community has grown to around 100 brothers. Each summer they are joined by thousands of young adults to spend a week seeking communion with God in prayer, singing, silence and reflection. Young people who spend time there often rediscover an inner peace, a meaning to life and a new impetus. Experiencing a simple life shared with others reminds us that daily life is the place where Christ is waiting for us.

Next July I am going to be leading a pilgrimage, together with the Bishop of Southampton in the Diocese of Winchester, to Taizé. I warmly invite 18 to 25 year olds to join me, but all of us can play a part in this pilgrimage. Please share this page with young people who you know. My prayer is that this pilgrimage will encourage a generation of young people in their Christian life and witness as together we sing a song for peace.

The Cotswold Connection to the Gunpowder Plot

Bonfires have burned on 5 November throughout England to mark the failed Gunpowder Plot of 1605.

Resistance to persecution against practising Catholics in England in the 16th and 17th Century, erupted in an outburst of Catholic extremism which came in the form of the Gunpowder Plot of 5 November 1605.

A radical group of young men, tired of the persecution against their faith, conspired to blow up the new King James 1 along with his Government in the Parliament building, and in the aftermath cause an insurrection in the Midlands, including the Cotswolds and use foreign assistance to restore a Catholic monarch to the throne in the person of the King's daughter, third in the line of succession, Princess Elizabeth.

At the time that James 1 was on the throne, England had broken away from the Catholic faith and the Church of Rome during the reign of Henry VIII (circa 1536), but there were still many Catholics in the country. Guy Fawkes (an Englishman) joined up with a group of thirteen Catholic plotters, led by Robert Catesby, who planned to overthrow the King and put a Catholic monarch back on the throne. Guy Fawkes had previously fought for Catholic Spain against the Dutch and had become experienced in the use of explosives. He also used the Italian version of his name - Guido Fawkes.

The plotters rented space in the cellars of the House of Lords and filled it with 36 barrels of gunpowder. Guy Fawkes was put in charge. They planned to explode the gunpowder during the opening of Parliament, on 5 November 1605. One or more of the plotters, worried that some of their fellow Catholics and friends would be at the opening and get caught in the explosion, gave written warnings not to attend that day. One recipient showed his letter to the King, and the cellars were thoroughly searched and Guy Fawkes caught.

After days of torture, Guy Fawkes gave up the names of his fellow plotters and eight of them went to trial in January 1606. All were found guilty and executed by hanging and quartering. Robert Catesby died at the raid on Holbeache House on November 8th, 1605; he and Thomas Percy both being shot apparently with a single bullet.

It was at **Coughton Court**, on the edge of the Cotswolds, that arms, horses and ammunition had been stored, ready for the uprising that was meant to follow the destruction of Parliament. And it was in **Coughton's** great gatehouse, early on 6 November 1605, that the family and associates of one of the chief gunpowder plotters received news of the plot's failure.



Lisa's Lemon Meringue Pie

10oz short crust pastry (fresh or frozen)

65g caster sugar

40g butter

125ml water

25g cornflour

125ml milk

3 egg yolks

2 lemons juice and finely grated

Roll out pastry and line a flan tin, prick base and bake blind for 10-15 min

Put sugar, butter, water, juice and lemon zest into a saucepan

Bring to the boil, continue stirring until sugar has dissolved and butter has melted

In a separate bowl/jug mix cornflour and milk, and add to lemon mixture. Keep stirring until it thickens. Remove from the heat. Add lightly beaten egg yolks, mix and leave to one side.

Whisk together egg whites until stiff and gradually add castor sugar (NB egg whites are best whisked in a glass bowl)

Put lemon mixture in pastry case and put meringue mixture on top. Place back in the oven 180C until meringue turns golden (about 15 min)

You can also make this with either oranges or limes instead of lemons. Equally as delicious!

And you can eat hot or cold.

Now you don't have to wait until you come to a Benefice service at Hinton to have lemon meringue.

World Toilet Day

World Toilet Day, a UN Day of Observance, is held each year on 19 November.

More people in the world have a mobile phone (6 billion) than have access to a toilet (4.5 billion). One initiative linked with World Toilet Day is Toilet Twinning, begun by CORD (Christian Outreach for Relief & Development) and now run by Tearfund.

This promotes projects for improving sanitation in some of the poorest communities in the world, raising funds and awareness through twinning toilets. For £60, a home, church or school can be linked to somewhere where facilities are very different. The funds raised help Tearfund deliver water and sanitation projects in more than 25 countries. Those twinned receive a certificate and photo, with coordinates of the toilet twinned.

1st Hampton Brownies have twinned two of the toilets at Hampton Guide and Scout Hall with toilets in Bihar, India and Mirpur Khas, Pakistan.
