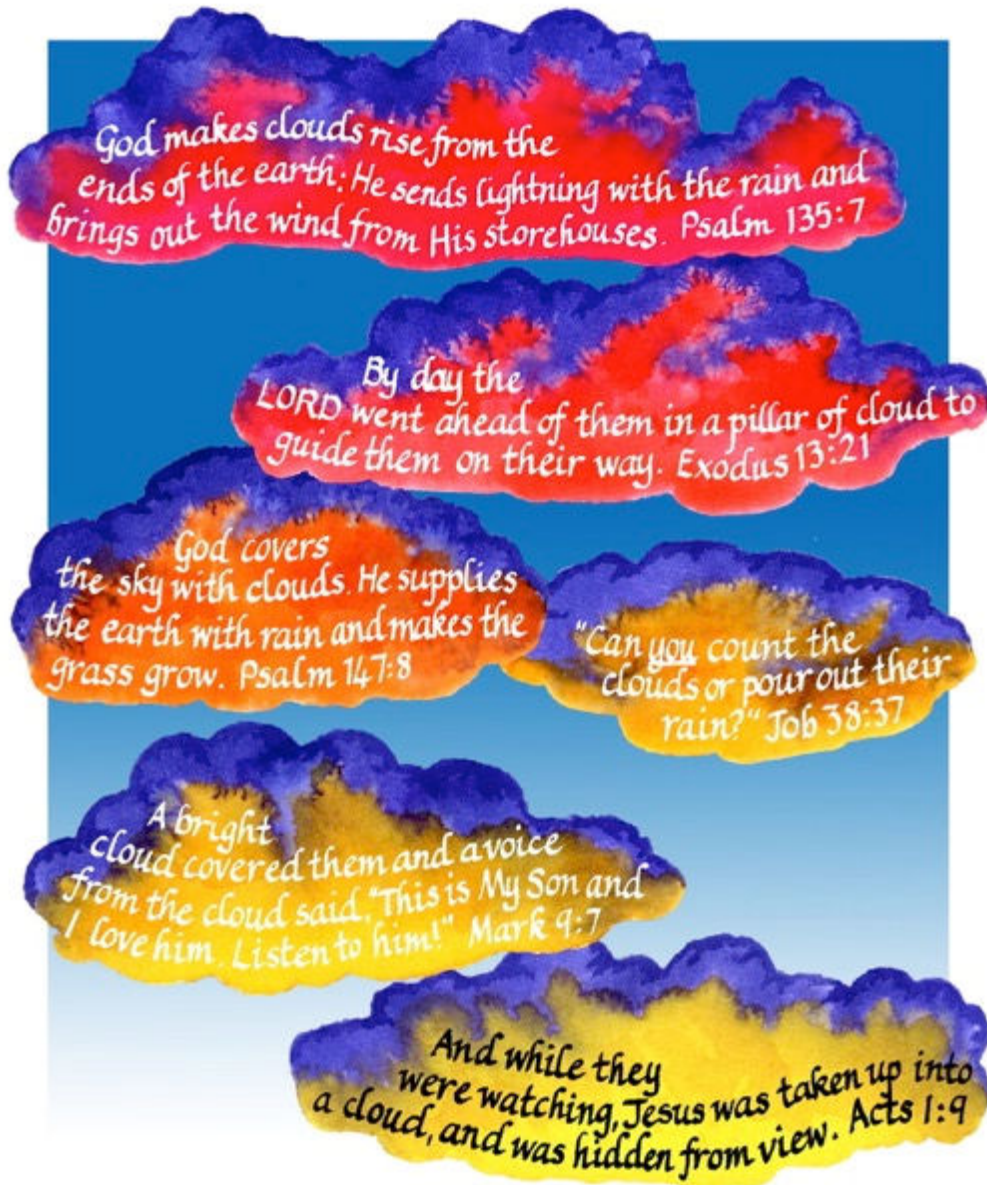

## **Letter from Archdeacon Robert Jones – A worldly faith?**

Sometimes we imagine that our faith is about becoming more religious. However the French priest and palaeontologist Teilhard de Chardin said, 'We are not human beings having a spiritual experience. We are spiritual beings having a human experience.' A palaeontologist is someone who studies fossils, and like any scientist is an observer of things in a search to discover more about them. I think what he meant was since we are created in the image and likeness of God, as we grow as humans we grow more and more into God.

He also said, 'by virtue of Creation, and still more the Incarnation, nothing here below is profane for those who know how to see.' Our humanity in all its shapes and sizes is God's way of fleshing out and manifesting His beauty. 'Nothing is profane for those who know how to see': Heaven isn't very far away, and faith isn't about religious stuff. Indeed common humanity is the home of God: this is what Christmas is all about, when God in Jesus made his home amongst us.

So we should tread the earth lightly: We are already walking on holy ground. Perhaps that is why Jesus gives us such an earthly prayer as the Lord's Prayer: we pray that God's kingdom will come here on earth as in heaven; we ask God to give us our daily bread, just enough for today. In the Gospels Jesus shows us God by the way he looks, listens, speaks and touches. Galilee sees signs of heaven in everyday life.

This is why the heart and high point of Christian worship is the Eucharist, when we take the raw material of the world, bread and wine, and it is transfigured by God's Holy Spirit and shows us God. The Orthodox Church speaks of the 'sacrament of the world'. The poet Gerard Manley Hopkins writes that 'the world is charged with the grandeur of God.' And this month we celebrate the feast of Pentecost: we celebrate when the Church is born, very much here on earth, to live the life of Jesus, very much here on earth.

Pentecost is the moment when the penny drops for the apostles and they begin to see clearly what Christmas, Good Friday and Easter Day mean. Pentecost completes the birth, death and resurrection of Jesus as the birthday of incarnate Christianity. Far from taking us out of this world, the Spirit, which brooded over creation from the very beginning, empowers us to see everything in a new light: the whole world is charged with the grandeur of God.

So let's not become too religious: our faith is world-facing and life-affirming. St Paul even makes the great claim that our bodies are 'temples of the Holy Spirit': this is who we really are, spiritual beings having a human experience. The Church is being truly faithful when we live out Jesus' message to love God, neighbour and self, seeking to encounter him not just in worship but in the faces and concerns of the people we meet day by day. No wonder the liturgy ends with the words 'Go in peace to love and serve the Lord.' Go where He may be found!

## Prayer for May

Lord, this is the time when we celebrate your ascension to Heaven and look forward to remembering the coming of your Holy Spirit.

Thank you for the gift of memories.

Thank you, that as we get older we are able to reflect back on the earlier parts of our lives. Those of us who have good memories, are grateful for it and for what it helps us to achieve.

We pray for those who have lost this faculty and depend on others more when they age. St Paul teaches that your "grace is sufficient for us" and this is so exciting. Help us to grow old gracefully, and to be gracious to those who find it harder.

In Jesus's name we pray, Amen.

# THE VESTRY PROJECT AT ST ANDREW'S

Some time ago, the Parochial Church Council decided that better use could be made of the space afforded by the vestry. Having both legal and financial responsibility for the Church building, the PCC commissioned specialist architect Stephen Sedwell to draw up plans for the project and to supervise it. These plans were submitted to regulatory diocesan authority and were approved.

The first step was to remove the old pipe organ, which was coming to the end of its useful life and took up too much space. This has been done and a new digital organ installed and all paid for. The way is now clear to proceed further as soon as we have the money in place. Easily said, less easily done.

The PCC recently elected me to head up a working party of notable wise counsellors tasked with attracting the required funding.

I have since met with Stephen on site to plan the way forward. The Church is primarily and eternally a place of worship but it is also a listed historical building. We also recognise its need to be relevant to our time now and in the future. Conservation, restoration and the introduction of modern-day facilities are the objectives; all necessary and expensive!

Stephen has advised that the work to be done should be listed under two separate headings: *RESTORATION* and *RE-ORDERING*.

Restoration means the repair of worn parts of the fabric of the building to keep it healthy and safe. For example, the vestry floor has become uneven because there are no foundations for it to sit on. In time it would become dangerous, so it must be replaced. There are established sources of funding for conservation of historic buildings such as ours. I am confident the team can be successful in accessing funds providing we present our case in a proper manner.

Funding for re-ordering (a change of use) is a different matter. The plan allows for a meeting room, a kitchen, a disabled toilet and storage. As a congregation and a parish we will need to contribute heavily and be seen to do so. The treasurer opened a fund for this purpose and holds monies from fund raising events such as the Summer Fete. We shall also need substantial contributions to add to this from private subscription and donations from persuaded businesses. The task is major. A useful suggestion is that donors may wish to fund individual items of the re-order as a commemoration, for instance, the cost of the kitchen, or the screens to separate the vestry from the nave and the chancel.

The architect is currently undertaking the five-yearly building inspection. His report and recommendations will accompany an update of the plans and an estimate of the cost. As soon as we have these to present to potential donors, the team will commence its task.

# The First World War - Diary of a Momentous Year

*1918 was the final year of the Great War. This year, Canon David Winter will look back on highlights of those critical 12 months, when the very shape of modern world history was being hammered out on the battlefields.*

## May 1918: Not just cannon-fodder

If, like me, you wonder how on earth people coped with the sheer horror of the carnage on the battlefields of the First World War, two pieces of writing suggest an answer. One, the poem 'For the Fallen', I wrote about last month. In this article I would like to consider the poem, subsequently an enormously popular hymn, 'O Valiant Hearts'.

It was written by John Stanhope Arkwright and published in a collection of his work in 1919. It seems to me to reflect tellingly the emotional response of a nation in deepest mourning for half a generation of young men. Its best known tune is by Charles Harris. It was my father's favourite hymn, sung every Remembrance Sunday.

But I can remember our new young vicar, fresh from service as an army chaplain in the nineteen-forties, explaining that we would not be singing it again. It confused, he explained, two entirely different things, the sacrifice of so many soldiers' lives in war with the sacrifice of Jesus Christ on the cross. The heart of the problem was verse 4, which directly compared the two acts of sacrifice. On the cross 'in the frailty of our human clay/ Christ our Redeemer passed the self-same way'. It is seldom sung now, but I noticed the tune was played by the military band at last Autumn's Festival of Remembrance.

I have rediscovered it while researching these articles. It is a beautiful hymn, full of passion, grief and hope. Whatever its theological naivety, it offered enormous comfort to a generation reeling from the ghastly slaughter of a war which brought bereavement to virtually every family in Britain. The hymn told them what they needed to hear, that their loved ones were not victims of a senseless conflict; their lives and deaths had meaning and a spiritual dignity. Perhaps once a year we should get it out and read it through their eyes.

## **20th May - Pentecost in Jerusalem**

On that long ago first morning of Pentecost, Jerusalem was crowded with thousands of visitors, for it was one of the most popular feast-days in the Jewish calendar – the Feast of Firstfruits, looking forward to the wheat harvest.



In one small room of that great city, a small group of people who had followed Jesus were praying. There was nothing else for them to do: Jesus had died, He had risen, and He had ascended, promising to send them 'a Comforter'. They were left alone, to wait at Jerusalem. And so they waited – on Him, and for Him. They were not disappointed: for that morning the Holy Spirit fell upon that small room, and transformed those believers into the Church, Christ's body here on earth.

Pentecost was not the first time that the Holy Spirit came to the world – throughout the Old Testament there are stories telling of how God had guided people and given them strength. But now His Spirit would use a new instrument: not just isolated prophets, but the Church, His body on earth.

Acts opens with the preaching of the gospel in Jerusalem, the centre of the Jewish nation. Within 30 years the Gospel had spread throughout the northern Mediterranean: Syria, Turkey, Greece, Malta... to the very heart of the Roman Empire: Rome. The Church was on the move – God was on the move! He was calling people from every nation to repent, turn to Jesus for forgiveness of their sins, and to follow Him.

Our Reception pupils will soon enjoy a trip to Cotswold Wildlife Park where they will see baby Belle, the Park's first hand-reared White Rhino calf.

'How Does Your Garden Grow?' is Year 1's topic. Children will be exploring trees and plants, naming and identifying wild, common and garden varieties of these. Their trip will be to Clive's Fruit Farm, which will allow them to enjoy picking (and eating!) strawberries!

Our Year 5's topic is all based around Space, and they will all be visiting the National Space Centre in Leicestershire, which is home to the UK's largest planetarium.

Year 4's 'Inventors' topic will see children learning about great technological inventions and will be inventing new technology themselves ..... Maybe St Andrew's will have the next Thomas Edison!

The St Andrew's Altos, our school choir, have been practising their singing every Monday after school, as they will soon be performing at Evesham Arts Centre at the annual music cluster event.

Our Key Stage 2 pupils will soon be attending a Football Tournament at Blackminster Middle School, where they will participate in several football matches and will hopefully score some spectacular goals!

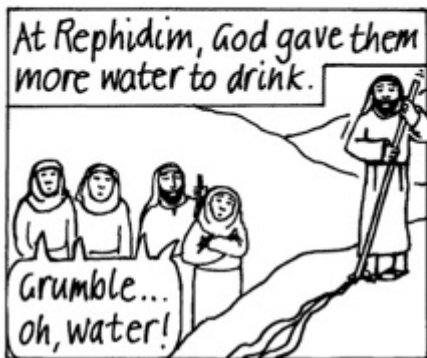
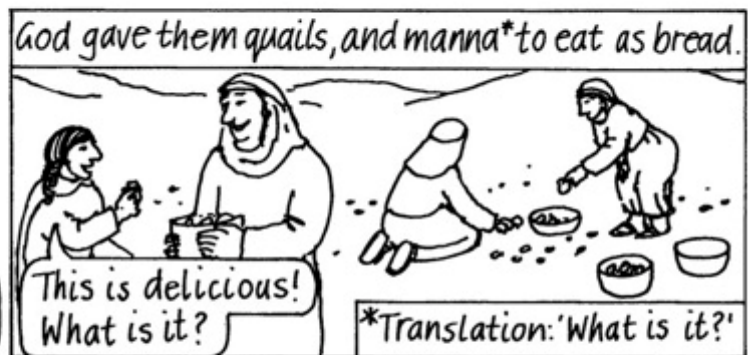
