

Letter from the Archdeacon of Worcester

On the news the other day they reported a study which showed that most people check their mobile phone every twelve minutes, with many looking at messages within five minutes of waking up. I remember seeing a cartoon of a family sitting at their meal, all reading their phones or tablets, and the caption read: 'At breakfast the family was best left to their own devices.' Given how much we now depend on them to talk to people, I do wonder why we never used to see long queues outside telephone boxes. (You might have to explain to your children what a telephone box is!).

Undoubtedly, the internet has opened up new possibilities of communication, but like any new invention we need to develop a way of using it ethically and well.

It is ever so easy to press the button to see who wants to get in touch, and it is rather nice to know. It's important to develop good practice so that we learn how to get the best out of the technology without it taking us over.

Some words from Pope Francis' encyclical; 'Rejoice and be glad' grabbed my attention: 'The presence of constantly new gadgets, the excitement of travel and an endless array of consumer goods at times leave no room for God's voice to be heard. We are overwhelmed by

words, by superficial pleasures and by an increasing din, filled not by joy, but rather by the discontent of those whose lives have lost meaning. How can we fail to realise the need to stop this rat race and to recover the personal space needed to carry on a heartfelt dialogue with God?'

Recovering personal space seems a pretty good idea to me, allowing space for God and for our flourishing. That's a lesson I often still need to learn myself!

There is a strand in the Bible which suggests that wisdom waits. Yet technology creates an expectation of immediacy. Do you remember the email which you sent spontaneously, and afterwards wished you hadn't? Personal space leads to reflective space, and I can't help thinking we need more reflecting and less reacting.

When I've finished writing this, I will email it as an attachment and magazine editors will receive it on a website. That's the wonderful thing about technology. Then I'll go and make myself a cup of coffee and instead of picking up my phone I might just go out into the garden for a few minutes, bathed as it is in beautiful sunshine. Or there again, has someone just messaged me? Shall I take a quick look?

Heritage Open Weekends – 6 – 9 and 13 – 16 September

Over two weekends at the beginning of September, many of our churches will be taking part in the national Heritage Open Days event. Every year in September, historic places across the country throw open their doors to celebrate their heritage, community and history. It's a chance to see hidden places and try out new experiences, all for free.

This year there are two weekends being held: 6-9 & 13-16 September.

Church Building Project Manager, Kate Andrew said: "It's fantastic that so many of our churches are engaging with the Heritage Open Days. It really is a great opportunity to reach those who might not normally go into a church. We've got loads of history and stories to share with people and it's also a good way for parishes to begin thinking about how they might interpret their buildings for a wider audience, learning things along the way about the church that they probably had no idea of before."

For those churches who are regularly open, the weekends provide a chance to give people an insight into areas where they might not normally be allowed. St Mary's, Kidderminster and St Stephen's in Redditch will both give visitors the opportunity to go up their towers and at Top Church in Dudley people will be able to book to visit the Medieval crypt.

"At the very least, I hope that most churches will be open with some refreshments provided," continued Kate. "It's a chance to show those from the local community and beyond what's been happening in our churches and for PCCs to consult visitors on future plans."

Sedgeberrow Vestry Project

The vestry project is on hold at the moment. We received the faculty permission from the diocese in early March. However we have had problems with Wychavon over planning permission. One of their objections has been settled. They needed to know whether bats would be disturbed. As there are none they will not be disturbed.

The major problem is that we need to dig trenches for water and sewage. Wychavon were concerned that graves may be disturbed. Wychavon are proposing a Ground Penetrating Radar Survey, which is very expensive. If any graves are found we would have to have the site excavated by an archaeologist, any bones carefully removed and reburied. They estimate the cost at between £2000 and £10000 per body. As this has been a graveyard for over 1000 years I think that bodies will be discovered. I don't think we could afford the enormous cost of this. We have therefore withdrawn the application for planning permission. The architect is looking into this problem. We hope he will find a solution in the not too distant future.

On a more positive note, because some people have difficulty hearing in the church, especially when there is a large congregation, a sound system has been installed. It has been used twice so far and has proved to be beneficial to everyone, especially to those who need help in hearing.

The First World War - Diary of a Momentous Year

1918 was the final year of the Great War. This year, Canon David Winter will look back on highlights of those critical 12 months, when the very shape of modern world history was being hammered out on the battlefields.



THE GREAT WAR
1914 - 1918

September 1918: Singing – and Surviving – in the Trenches

Modern people, distraught if deprived of ‘all mod con’, must be baffled how men survived year after year of living much of the time in the trenches of the Western Front. For month after month everything was ankle deep in mud. These were their living quarters, complete with primitive toilet arrangements, permanent damp, rats and trench foot – and that’s before one mentions the enemy’s constant shelling.

There were, of course, moments of respite at rest centres behind the lines – and there was always the coveted hope of a ‘blighty’, a wound that was not too serious but would mean treatment back in the UK. ‘Blighty’ was an Urdu word passed on by soldiers who had served in India – it means ‘European’, or in this case ‘home’.

Some men, it’s true, succumbed to what was called ‘shell shock – traumatic stress syndrome. But the amazing fact is that most not only survived the trench conditions and the ever-present danger, but even looked back on it as a significant experience to be proud of. How on earth did they do it?

My answer, largely based on things I heard from my father and his war-time colleagues, centred on two experiences: songs, and camaraderie. When they marched and sang ‘Pack up your troubles in your old kit bag’ and called on each other to ‘smile, boys, smile’, they were celebrating being part of a strange and exhilarating brotherhood. Humour was rife in the trenches, much of it about the sheer awfulness of their situation. The ‘Wiper’s Times’, a newspaper produced by soldiers in Ypres, can still make us laugh, as its recent revival on stage has proved.

It was the camaraderie – the sense of belonging to an exclusive ‘club’ – which made the humour possible and authenticated the songs. It was a profound feeling of belonging which made the impossible bearable. There was, one must add, a third element in trench survival: the chaplains and the Salvation Army. I never heard a single veteran discount their value, right there in the heart of things, offering a prayer, yes, but also tea and cakes and understanding. Of course, the soldiers hated the war, the loss of comrades, the relentless months of deadly danger. But their songs and memories also told another story, which we should not forget.

Hampton WI – July 2018

Our President, Jan Scutt, welcomed 24 members and 4 visitors to the meeting on 12 July.

Thank-you letters had been received from two charities, Dementia UK and The British Legion, for donations in memory of two of our members, Gwen Thomas and Girlie Humphries.

The bi-monthly lunch group had enjoyed afternoon tea at the Evesham Hotel in June, and were looking forward to the next lunch at The Bell in Cropthorne, in August.

The Group Outing to see the Suffragette Silhouettes at the Coalbrookdale Museum of Iron, had been an enjoyable day out.

Members were reminded about the fish and chip supper in lieu of the Harvest Supper in September, and also to make their menu choices for the anniversary lunch at Childswickham, also in September.

It was then time for our speaker, Ginny Meakin, to tell us about how she and her husband fulfilled their ambition of having a smallholding, and being able to build their own home. Initially, they thought about trying an equestrian business, but after attending an agricultural show, a friend suggested alpacas. This also met the criteria of not keeping any animals which would have to be killed for meat. They looked for land, and eventually found what they were looking for in Sedgeberrow, and after ten year's hard work, have achieved their dream.

Ginny gave some background on alpacas, which are related to camels, and are kept for their fleece, which can vary from the classic type from the Huacaya, with a good crimp, to the more silky, lustrous fleece of the Suri, which is rarer. She showed us some examples of fleeces, which come in a variety of natural shades, ranging from black to browns and fawns, through to white. Ginny demonstrated how it is prepared for spinning, although now she sells the fibres for hand spinners, as she doesn't have the time to make craft items herself. The fleece is hypo-allergenic, making it good for pillows, and also has excellent thermal properties.

Ann Evans thanked Ginny on behalf of members.

The monthly competition was for something '**Glamorous**', was won by Jan Scutt. Next month's meeting will be held on Thursday 13 September, when our speaker will be Paddy Hannigan, on the subject of the Suffragette Movement.

Who named Watt?

The Bel and its smaller brother, the Decibel, were named after Graham Alexander Bell, of telephone fame.

The Ampere, often shortened to amp, is named after Andre-Marie Ampere (1775-1836). French mathematician and physicist, considered the father of electrodynamics.

The Volt is named after the Italian physicist Alessandro Volta (1745-1827).

The Ohm, the unit of electrical resistance, is named after the German physicist Georg Simon Ohm (1789-1845).

The Celsius scale, also known as the centigrade scale, of temperature, is named after the Swedish astronomer, Anders Celsius (1701-1744), who developed a similar scale to:

The Fahrenheit scale, proposed by Amsterdam-based Polish physicist Daniel Gabriel Fahrenheit, born in Gdansk, Poland (1686-1736), after whom the scale is named.

Recipe for September

Despite the very dry summer, the Courgettes in my garden have kept on growing, and now I am trying to think of ways to use them up. Courgette Chutney is one option, and here is another:



COURGETTE CAKE WITH CREAM CHEESE TOPPING AND FILLING

Ingredients for the Cake:

- 2 courgettes
- 1 carrot (peeled)
- 200g butter
- 200g caster sugar
- 200g self-raising flour
- 50g ground almonds
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 3 eggs
- 40g sultanas
- Zest 1 lemon
- Zest 1 orange (use juice in frosting)

Ingredients for the Frosting:

- 400g cream cheese
- 200g butter
- 200g icing sugar
- 200g self-raising flour
- 1 lemon

To Decorate:

A handful of toasted flake almonds and lime zest

Method

- Preheat oven to 200°C/180°C/Gas 6. Line and grease 2 x 8" baking tins
 - Coarsely grate the carrot and courgette, then place in a colander over the sink, and squeeze to get rid of any liquid. Repeat until there's no moisture left. Toss in 10g of the flour and leave to one side
 - Sieve the flour into a bowl, add sugar, baking powder and almonds, along with lemon and orange zest, sultanas, butter and eggs.
 - Mix for 2 minutes, then add the grated carrot and courgette. Mix for a further 2 minutes until combined (do not overmix)
 - Divide between the lined cake tins, and bake for 30-40 minutes, or until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. Cool in tins for 10 minutes, then turn on to a wire rack to cool completely.
 - **For the Frosting:**
 - Place softened butter into a bowl, add 1 tbsp of orange juice. Beat together, then add icing sugar and beat till smooth.
 - Stir in cream cheese and lemon zest, mix gently until combined.
 - Spread half the frosting in the middle of the cake and spread the remainder on top. Decorate with the flaked almonds and shreds of lime zest.
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

