Letter from the Bishop of Dudley

The hymn 'Dear Lord and Father of mankind' is a favourite of many. I love the calming sense of the hymn as it progresses from verse to verse. The third verse speaks of the Sabbath rest by Galilee, recalling Jesus taking himself off into the hills in prayer to enter into communion with his Father in "the silence of eternity interpreted by love".

Within Judaism, as we see from many stories in the gospels, the Sabbath has a central place in the rhythm of the week and in the makeup of life. In fact, it has a central place in the Ten Commandments, as the commandment to keep the seventh day unlike all other days is found between those commandments that talk about people's relationship with God and those that speak about relationships with other human beings. This Sabbath commandment, then, is the hinge point. It brings together God and the human world, the loving of God and loving of neighbour, in a unique way.

The Sabbath day is a place-marking gift, a day on which to stop toiling and to rest. It is also a day of joy to unwrap again all of the blessings we have been given and to be re-thankful for them. Rest and joy lead into freedom and we read of the sabbatical year when land is allowed to breathe, debts are cancelled, and slaves are released from that which binds them. In turn, this leads back to rest and joy.

In our own lives, there are various rhythms that are played out. We find we need to snatch periods of Sabbath time amidst pressing other responsibilities. Carers speak of the crucial need for rest, and whilst respite care often carries a sense of guilt, it allows the carer to go on caring. After a traumatic or difficult period, we begin to see small signs of joy again and count our blessings. Freedom comes in many forms and I recall talking to a prisoner in HMP Hewell about his sense of freedom when he sang hymns of praise.

During the autumn, with the agreement of Bishop John and the support of the Archdeacons, I will be on sabbatical. I hope this extended Sabbath time will offer some rest which, to my mind, isn't loafing but is about doing things that bring me spiritual, intellectual and physical replenishment. I'm going to spend time writing, which always brings me much joy. Freedom will come from having a break from some of the ministerial responsibilities, which come with my role!

I am hoping to learn more about Orthodox Christianity, and will be spending time on pilgrimage to Mount Athos in Greece and taking part in a week-long painting retreat at the Bethlehem Icon School. In both places, as well as in the creativity of writing, I hope to encounter the silence of eternity interpreted by love.

I am delighted that sabbaticals are taken seriously in this Diocese and hope that the fact that I am taking one will encourage other clergy, who have not done so for seven years or more, to consider doing so. Do encourage them! My one previous experience of a sabbatical was personally very enriching and parishioners were kind enough to say that it was, in turn, beneficial for them - though they lacked clarity whether that was during or after the sabbatical! I'm enormously grateful for this gift, and especially the generosity of colleagues in making it possible, so that I can go deeper into Sabbath life at the hinge point of serving God and my neighbour.

Our project for converting the vestries is on hold at the moment. We have withdrawn our application for planning permission whilst we have a rethink. The local authority are worried that graves may be disturbed by digging trenches for water and sewage. They want us to have an expensive full ground penetrating survey of the churchyard. They have suggested that it could cost between £2000 and £10000 per grave to excavate and rebury coffins. We estimate that in a worst case scenario this could cost maybe £200,000, as the area has been a churchyard for a thousand years or more.

However the contractor has come up with some new possibilities, which need to be discussed.

On a much brighter note we have had a working party to clear the drains around the church and to sort out what we keep in the vestries. As a result we have been able to get rid of a lot of rubbish and set up a temporary meeting room in one of the vestries. We will now be able to have some of our meetings in there. The brightest part of the day was that amongst those helping out were a group of people who do not usually come to services.

The First World War - Diary of a Momentous Year

1918 was the final year of the Great War. This year, Canon David Winter will look back on highlights of those critical 12 months, when the very shape of modern world history was being hammered out on the battlefields.



THE GREAT WAR
1914 - 1918

October 1918:

October 1918 was the month when both sides, in their different ways, decided that they had had enough war. The Germans, following their defeat at Amiens, no longer had any hope of a strong negotiating position in peace talks, let alone victory. Their economy was struggling, and morale was low. The Allies, now sure of final victory, wanted it all over without further disastrous casualties. The politicians, fearful for their own futures, wanted time, but the generals were now calling the shots. The time had come for a ceasefire, then let the negotiating begin.

The military won this battle, at least. The word 'Armistice' was banded around: not a treaty, but simply (as the Latin word suggests) as a laying down of arms. The three most influential national leaders on the Allied side agreed, and the Germans and their dwindling band of associates had no choice but to go along with the solution. An Armistice was agreed for a memorable date: the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of the year. Following preliminary discussions, a negotiated treaty would be finalised at Versailles in the following January.

Compared to Brexit, that is express progress!

The Armistice was, in some ways, simple. The guns would go silent, killing would cease from that designated hour. The Versailles negotiations, on the other hand, would be complex, though somewhat simplified by the fact that the Germans came naked to the table. They were desperate to save their land from occupation, whatever the cost. In fact, it cost them £6.6 million in reparations (probably about six billion pounds today).

Each of the Allies had important items for the peace agenda. France wanted Alsace-Lorraine restored to French sovereignty, and the Rhineland demilitarised. Britain wanted German military power negated and problems in the Middle East solved. The Americans wanted democracy restored and the will of the people recognised throughout Europe. The three leaders – David Lloyd George and Presidents Clémenceau and Woodrow Wyatt agreed about most of the agenda, including the carving up of The German colonial empire in Africa.

Peace would come at last, but not, as one wise man observed, the 'kiss of peace'.

Hampton WI – September 2018

Our President, Jan Scutt, welcomed 25 members and 1 visitor to the meeting on 13 September.

For a change we started our meeting with Social Time, and a very lively and interesting talk by Paddy Hannigan on Suffragettes and Votes for Women. Paddy was wearing a boater, waistcoat and sash in the Suffragette colours of purple for loyalty, green for hope and white for purity. He started his talk by demonstrating the selection method for women to take part in a demonstration in Hyde Park. This involved throwing a pretend stone (a painted polystyrene ball) at the shutters, and shouting 'Votes for Women! Down with the Government!' Joyce Davey was judged to be the best candidate!

The Suffragette movement had begun at a time when women had few rights, and the property laws meant that all married women's property became that of their husbands, and of course there was no divorce.

In 1897 the National Union of Women's Suffrage Societies was formed (NUWSS), with Millicent Fawcett as President. They went on marches to promote the idea of women getting the vote. Nothing came of their marches and demonstrations as neither political party wanted women to have the vote, in case they voted for the opposition. In 1903 Emmeline Pankhurst and her daughters formed a more militant group in Manchester, the Women's Social and Political Union (WSPU). They attended a meeting at Manchester Free Trade Hall attended by Winston Churchill, and sent up a note "what about votes for women". The meeting descended into chaos, and many, including Mrs Pankhurst were arrested and appeared in court. Given the choice between a fine or prison, and they chose prison. The group became more militant, marched on Downing Street, had battles with the police, chained themselves to railings, broke windows in public buildings. Many were sent to prison, including Mrs Pankhurst, but there was still no vote. When war was declared in 1914 the suffragette action was called off because women were then needed to work because of the shortage of men.

When the war ended attitudes started to change, and some women over 28 were given the vote. Finally in 1928 women of 21 were given the vote.

Members were reminded of the Anniversary Lunch at the Childswickham Inn, and the next bi-monthly lunch in October at Batsford Arboretum.

Next month's meeting will be held on Thursday 11 October, when we will be holding our AGM.
