Letter from the Archdeacon of Dudley



In recent years I have often visited Top Church, Dudley, as plans have come together to make it a Resourcing

Church. Meetings have taken place in a back room, as the main worship area is huge and hard to heat. When I have been involved in Sunday services, the tiny congregation have been dwarfed by the cavernous building, which they have struggled so faithfully to maintain.

It was a delightful experience therefore to walk into the church one recent Sunday to be greeted with well over a hundred people of all ages, ethnic backgrounds and church traditions gathered to hear the recently appointed Resourcing Church Leader, the Revd James Treasure, outline the church's unfolding vision. There was a real buzz!


Home-made cakes and good coffee were served, activities were provided for children and young people, and using an informative PowerPoint presentation, James shared the Top Church story, past, present and future, and explained about the changes planned to enable the church to be fit for purpose for the next 200 years.

Further discussion then took place over plenty of delicious healthy, vegetarian food, served in compostable trays with wooden forks. These details underlined the message James and the team he is forming want to communicate.

I came away inspired and encouraged, hopeful about what will grow in and around Top Church in the coming years, but also challenged about attention to detail. Is the message of welcome, inclusion, care for the environment and whole-life discipleship we preach in our churches also fleshed out in our actions? As Kingdom People do we model lives of integrity? What is communicated to newcomers potentially exploring faith in our churches if we serve unfairly traded coffee in plastic cups and ask for a contribution?

We don't have to be a resourcing church to be welcoming and attractive and holistic in our approach. We could all perhaps identify one small detail in our building or welcome, which if given a few moments' thought and attention, could change the experience next week for those who cross the threshold. What might it be in your place of worship?

On this day

50 years ago, on 28th Nov 1968, Enid Blyton, British children's writer, died. One of the most successful children's writers of the 20th century, she wrote more than 762 books. Best known for Noddy and the Famous Five series.

We need to talk about funerals...

'Taking Funerals Seriously' was the title of a conference recently held in Worcester. For everyone who went, it made us think about death, dying and funerals - not a subject that many of us feel comfortable talking about. It can be hard to find the answers to questions that we don't want to ask; awkwardness, fear and upset can make it difficult to be able to be fully informed when we find ourselves in the position of attending or organising a funeral. The conference prompted us to write this article as a conversation-starter about this difficult topic.

Anyone living in this country is entitled to have a Church of England funeral, regardless of whether they ever attended church or not. Whilst a 'church funeral' suggests a certain location, there is a lot of flexibility about where such a service takes place; it doesn't have to be in church. It could also take place in a crematorium, at an outdoor woodland or burial site, or in a cemetery.

The clergy and other licensed ministers are experienced and well trained in pastoral ministry. When someone dies we understand how difficult this can be; we are there to support you, and your family and friends, before, during and after the funeral with compassion, fellowship and prayer, understanding your sadness and loss. We work alongside you to put together the service - each service is unique and tailored to reflect the life of your loved one. It may, for instance, include a particularly appropriate tribute, favourite poems, music, hymns and songs. Working closely with the funeral directors, we make sure everything is fitting for what is both the celebration of a life and a final farewell.

Central to all Church funeral services is a message of hope. We want to affirm that, while death is an end, it is God's promise that death is not the end. In death, we are invited into a new sort of life in Christ. We believe that this new life that is offered to everyone; every life is precious to God and, as the Bible says, there is nothing - not our actions in life, nor even death - that can separate us from God's love.

Whilst it is a difficult topic to bring up, it may be helpful to you and your family to talk about what you would like for your own funeral, whatever stage of life you are at. There is a helpful website, www.churchofenglandfunerals.org that might be a useful starting point. Any one in your local ministry team would also be more than happy to discuss things with you.

The First World War - Diary of a Momentous Year

1918 was the final year of the Great War. This year, Canon David Winter will look back on highlights of those critical 12 months, when the very shape of modern world history was being hammered out on the battlefields.

November 1918: When the Boys Came Home

By Autumn 1918 it was obvious that the war was coming to an end, Germany was clearly beaten, but no one had actually won. The front line was more or less as it had been for years, but after Amiens the Germans knew that this was a conflict they could never win. High level discussions took place, while in Britain the public mood was surprisingly optimistic. 'There's a silver lining', the songs said. 'Keep the home fires burning till the boys come home'. When an 'Armistice' was announced, there was euphoria. No more killing, the guns silenced. Peace at last!

'Armistice' was a new word for most people – not a peace treaty or settlement (that would follow a conference in Paris the following January), but simply a laying down of arms, but for many that was enough for now. 'No more killing', they declared. Most of the boys did come home, but tens of thousands didn't. We have tended to judge the first World War by the numbers involved – and they are appalling, but each casualty was also someone's personal loss, as I learnt in my first parish.

It was a rural village near Oxford. Each month I took Communion to an elderly woman known to everyone as Kim. She was in her nineties and had been a teenager during the Great War. Her two brothers were serving on the Western Front. A few days before the Armistice the post office motor-cyclist delivered the telegram they had been dreading, one of the boys had been killed in action. A week or so later, after the fighting had stopped, the same messenger returned, with the same message about her other brother. As she told me of it, 70 years after the event, her eyes filled with tears. That was the true price of war, and when I share the silence on Remembrance Day it is her and those two young men I think of, not the million others from many nations who fell in that terrible conflict. My father enlisted to join in 'the war to end all wars'. It didn't, of course. Twentyone years later it all started again. War doesn't end wars. True peace does.

Wilfred Owen - 1st World War Poet and Hero

British poet and soldier Wilfred Owen was killed 100 years ago this month, on 4th Nov 1918. He died leading his troops across a canal in Northern France exactly a week before the war ended. He was 25.

Owen, who was noted for his shockingly realistic poetry about the horrors of trench warfare, was born in 1893 in Shropshire. On leaving school he became a teaching assistant, and in 1913 went to France for two years to work as a language tutor.

But in 1915 he returned to England to join the army. After harrowing experiences in the trenches he suffered from shell shock and went for treatment at Craiglockhart War Hospital, near Edinburgh, where he met fellow poet Siegfried Sassoon.

Owen went back to France despite Sassoon's pleas, and was awarded the Military Cross for bravery after capturing a machine-gun post almost single-handed.

Brought up according to his mother's strong beliefs, Owen had thought of becoming a priest. For a while he was lay assistant to the vicar of the Oxfordshire parish of Dunsden.

His only volume of poems, edited by Sassoon and published in 1920, contains some of the most poignant English war poetry, including *Dulce et Decorum Est* and *Anthem for Doomed Youth*.
