Letter from the Archdeacon of Worcester

We live in tumultuous political times, so much so that many people are literally switching off from TV and radio news. It does indeed seem that megaphone diplomacy, which, of course, is no diplomacy at all, is playing a bigger part in our public discourse. We must not have a false sense that history automatically gets better as we learn to live better, when it is clear that human sinfulness can mess things up just as effectively today as it ever did.

So as Christians we must not be naïve about progress, but nor must we despair or give up hope either. We have a Gospel to proclaim and it is Good News. Our calling as Church in every generation is to be a community of hope, and if you look at the world in which Jesus lived, it was clearly as chaotic and seemingly hopeless as ours today. We must be realistic and yet bearers of hope.

What concerns me about today's politics is the poverty of our political discourse and conversation. Whatever else populism might or might not be, the language it uses is designed for newspaper headlines or media news feeds. It tries to give simple answers to complex questions. It feeds people's sense of unfairness. It requires an enemy and puts people down. It does not have any nuances, allow for compromise or considered thought. Twentieth-century history shows us where it can lead.

This is simply not good enough as a way of doing politics, or building a stable world order and country, nor indeed of running a church. Whenever we are tempted to caricature someone else's belief and way of living out the faith, we need to check ourselves and remember wise words from the letter of James in the New Testament: 'you must understand this, my beloved: let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger; for your anger does not produce God's righteousness.'

Being 'quick to listen' – what might that look like in our public life?

Week of Prayer for Christian Unity 18 to 25 January 2019

Service at St Andrew's, Hampton on Monday 21 January, at 12 noon

The theme for the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity in 2019 focuses on Deuteronomy 16:18-20, 'Justice, and only justice, you shall pursue...', in relation to Indonesia, a nation with ethnic and religious diversity in much need of unity.

The Christians of Indonesia found these words incredibly poignant in light of their situation. Issues of economic injustice and the challenges associated with religious pluralism are highlighted within the materials for 2019.

Of Indonesia's population, only 10% are Christian. Nevertheless, many Indonesians live by the principle gotong royong, meaning to live in 'solidarity and by collaboration' with their neighbours. Unfortunately, this is not always true of contemporary Indonesian approaches to economics, which can be open to corruption by businesses and the government, and often negatively impact on the environment. Many of Indonesia's inhabitants face poverty, as a result of this lack of justice and the failure of the strong to protect the weak.

BIBLE STUDY? I'M NOT SURE IT'S FOR ME.

Have you ever wondered what goes on at the **Bible Study Group** every Monday morning at the Vicarage? Perhaps you think it isn't the kind of thing that would 'do anything' for you? Maybe you haven't even given it a thought.

Well, those of us who go to it each week thought it might be useful if we were to share with you what does go on there, and warmly invite you to think about joining us. **Why?** Because we very much enjoy sharing, not just an opportunity to learn more about what the Bible says, but an hour of Christian fellowship in a free and easy atmosphere – and we think you might enjoy it too.

So, how does it work? We first decide which book we want to study. We are presently looking at St Paul's Second Letter to Timothy, and we base our sessions on Study Guides in the 'Book by Book' series by Paul Blackham. Each session usually begins with a prayer, then a short video presentation which takes us through the passage chosen for that day and in which Paul (Blackham – not the Apostle!) discusses with two colleagues any points of interest and inspiration which they see there, or which might need further explanation. The Study Guide has a series of questions which we then consider together as a group. At some point, we have a cup of refreshing tea or coffee to help inspire us with our answers to these questions! And if we find some of the questions tricky – which we often do! – Paul has provided some suggested answers at the back of the Study Guide to help us to understand it all better.

It doesn't sound too frightening, does it? And you absolutely do not need an academic qualification in Religious Education. You don't even need to join in the discussion if you don't want to. It's all about getting to know the Bible a little bit better and through that, strengthening our faith, and all this in comfortable surroundings and among good friends. You might find that it **IS** your kind of thing after all. Plough Sunday Service at Hinton – 6 January at 11.15am

Traditionally, Plough Sunday has been observed on the First Sunday of Epiphany since the Victorian age, however, it has a much older association with the first working day after the twelve days of Christmas, hence the phrase 'Plough Monday' used in some places.

Although the nature of farming has changed over the centuries, today Plough Sunday is still seen as a way of celebrating farming and human labour more generally near the start of the calendar year. It is an opportunity to cherish the land and to remind us all of our dependence upon it and upon God.

in Hinton we shall be having our usual biennial Plough Sunday Service in St Peter's on 6 January at 11.15am. This is a centuries old service which asks for God's blessing on the sowing and reaping in the year ahead. Turning towards the Plough which has to be laboriously lifted into the Church beforehand the whole congregation calls 'Speed the Plough, Speed the Plough, Speed the Plough'. Our ancient Plough was only recovered from weeds and brambles a few years ago. It is the original one which has been used in St Peter's over many years. All are welcome to attend, and, as usual, there will be refreshments afterwards.

A short story from the Bible


It can be read in the Bible in Numbers 22: 2 to 24:25

Then Balaam saw the angel...




King Balak was ready to pay Balaam.



Look, there they are. Now curse them.




Balaam tried to curse the Israelites but he could only say a blessing.

A Cake for Epiphany

The Galette des Rois (Kings) is much loved in France, when it is traditionally eaten on 6 January to mark the feast of the Epiphany, when the three Kings visited the Baby Jesus to present him with gifts. The tradition of eating the cake dates back to the 14th century.

It isn't just a cake!

The Galette des Rois is not just about having a cup of tea and something sweet. There's an age-old protocol that needs to be followed and it's all to do with the little charm that bakers hide inside the cake.

First of all, the youngest child has to hide under the table and tell whoever is cutting the cake who should get which piece.

Whoever finds the charm, known as a "féve", in their slice (as long as they don't swallow it) gets to wear the crown that comes with the tart and then names their king or their queen.

And then everyone just sits down and enjoys it. Possibly with a glass of champagne.

To make the Cake

INGREDIENTS

2 sheets ready rolled puff pastry

140g ground almond

75g soft butter

80g sugar


3 egg whites

1 yolk

Mix the butter and the sugar until the mix whitens, then add the beaten eggs and the ground almonds. Mix well.

In the middle of the first sheet of puff pastry, pour the mix. Lay the second sheet on top, then roll the sides of the sheets together towards the inside to seal the Galette.

With a knife, draw diagonal lines in both direction (so that they cross each other) to create the pattern.



Then with a brush, spread the yolk on the whole cake to give it a golden colour.

Put in an oven for 30 minutes at 200 degrees.

Serve hot - but it is excellent cold too.
