Letter from the Bishop of Dudley

In many churches that I visit there is a box next to a sign saying, 'For the Food Bank – Thank You'. I hear about numerous lunch groups, 'knit and natter' sessions and after school clubs, and once I saw a poster that read 'Down in the mouth? Join our Loneliness Group for a faith lift'. I still wonder whether the group is thriving.

Across the Diocese of Worcester, social action and community outreach is flourishing. The results are just in from a survey conducted at the end of 2017 which asked about how our churches are involved with activities such as food banks, night shelters, community cafes, debt advice, breakfast clubs and youth groups. 220 of our churches responded and between us we are involved in approximately 500 projects that directly support other people.

These 220 churches ran 168 projects, hosted another 64 projects and 79 projects were carried out in partnership with other organisations. We supported, in other ways, a further 202 projects. That is an incredible amount of good will and lots of commitment to loving our neighbour.

In Worcester, the food bank believes that no one should have to face going hungry and has provided thousands of food packages over the last year. In Evesham, the street pastors are out, even in the early hours of a cold February night, supporting people who are upset or vulnerable. There are countless other projects and groups quietly going on that bring life in abundance to people.

Why do we do it? First, because there is great need. We see people in our communities who are need of support and want to respond with care and compassion. However much we would like it to, the state can't afford to provide everything and, whilst we rightly challenge political decisions, we can respond as a community as well. We know that every act of kindness is a lived-out way of taking seriously Jesus' words to love God and our neighbour.

When we reach out to another, even by the act of leaving some tins for the food bank, we are seeing the face of Christ in the poor and seeking to be where he is to be found.

As a result, we can bring that all important ingredient of 'joy' into peoples' lives, helping them to connect with others, and be less lonely and isolated. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, this gift of 'joy' moves beyond welfare so as to help people fare well. In such a way, we witness something of the kingdom of God in our midst.

Thank you if you are part of the 86% of our churches already involved. You might want to consider how your commitment might deepen in understanding, prayer and action, and your worship and life as a community enhanced even more, as you make these connections with the incarnate Jesus.

New Church Electoral Roll

The electoral roll of the church is the formal list of church members and those (over the age of 16) who worship regularly should have their name on the roll. Only those on the roll may vote at the church annual meeting or stand for election.

Each year before the annual meeting the electoral roll must be brought up to date. Usually that involves just making amendments to the roll, but every six years a new electoral roll must be prepared. In 2019 every parish in the country will be preparing a new roll.

Last year there were changes in data protection legislation (GDPR) and so, in addition, we are required to get your permission to allow us to use your contact details.

Those presently on the roll should receive a letter from me enclosing an application form. Blank application forms for those who do not have their names on the present roll will be available in church. The dates for each parish will be slightly different depending on the date of the Annual Meetings. At St Andrew's, the process starts on 10 February, and completed forms must be returned by 24 March.

St Valentine's Day embraces a time of year historically associated with love and fertility. On this day, we remember the martyrdom of St Valentine, who was executed in Rome around 269 AD, under orders from the Emperor Claudius. Emperor Claudius claimed that married men made poor soldiers and decreed that marriage between younger citizens be outlawed.

Despite this, it is believed that Valentine continued to conduct illegitimate wedding ceremonies in the capital, maintaining that marriage was part of God's plan and purpose for the world. The popularity of his actions ultimately led to his arrest and execution, but not before he fell in love with his jailer's daughter. Legend suggests that on the evening of his execution the priest passed her a note which read "from your Valentine".

The Feast Day of St Valentine invites us to mark and acknowledge the all loving God who blesses those who love one another. The sacrificial love of God in Christ is an example of the human love between men and women.



The GOOD news about chocolate

A little bit of chocolate is good for you – especially your heart.

If you eat up to three bars a month, you could have a 13 per cent lower risk of heart failure than if you do not eat any chocolate. It seems that natural compounds in cocoa called flavonoids boost blood vessel health and help reduce inflammation.

But be careful: if you eat chocolate daily you could experience a 17 per cent *increase* in your risk of heart failure.

So, the advice from the researchers at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai in New York is: 'moderate dark-chocolate consumption is good for health.'

Dear Dad

A seven-year-old boy who sent a birthday card to his dad "in heaven" received a touching letter from the Royal Mail to say it had been delivered safely.

Jase Hyndman, from West Lothian, received the letter assuring him that his message to his father James had made through the "difficult" journey. Posting the heart warming letter to Facebook, mother Teri Copland said: "I actually cannot state how emotional he is knowing his dad got his card... Royal Mail you've just restored my faith in humanity.

"In response to Jase's envelope requesting to be sent to "heaven", Royal Mail's Sean Milligan said: "I just wanted to take this opportunity to contact you about how we succeeded in the delivery of your letter, to your dad in heaven. This was a difficult challenge avoiding stars and other galactic objects on route to heaven," the note added. It concluded: "I will continue to do all I can to ensure delivery of it to heaven safely."

The Facebook post with Royal Mail's response to Jase was shared more than 200,000 times. Jase and his 10-year-old sister Neive mark the occasion of their father's birthday every year since he died in May 2014. Ms Copland said: "He was overwhelmed and kept saying 'my dad really got my letter mum'... I've always told Neive and Jase even if you can't get anyone a present, it's always nice to make sure you send a card at Christmas and birthdays. I want people to realise that a small gesture of kindness can have such a fantastic impact on someone's life... Royal Mail actually took part and that gives me so much comfort."

National Nest Box Week: 14 – 21 February

If you like birds, now is the time to help the next generation get started.

And so this month will see thousands of us shakily climbing ladders against the sides of our houses, garages and trees, to install cosy nest boxes. And soon our tenants will arrive: blue tits, robins, nuthatches, pied wagtails, sparrows, to starlings, tawny owls and even great spotted woodpeckers.

National Nest Box Week was started by the British Trust for Ornithology in order to encourage the conservation of our breeding birds. Nest boxes are desperately needed, as natural nest sites for birds such as holes in trees or old buildings are disappearing fast, as gardens are 'tidied' and old houses are repaired.

It really is worth the trouble to put up a nest box. If you hang one within sight of your kitchen window, you will have hours of fun in observing the young feathered families. You may find these links helpful:

Hampton WI – January 2019

Our January meeting is usually an informal social evening, but on this occasion, we did have a speaker for the evening. Alan Whitehouse came along to tell us about the work of All Saints Food Bank. This food bank runs along different lines to the food bank run by Caring Hands, where referrals are necessary. There has been a tradition of caring for people dating back to the days of Evesham Abbey, when the Almoner was in charge of administering care to the needy. Merstow Green formed part of the Abbey lands, and the rents from it were used to support people who were in need. The Abbey Chronicle tells of great hardship in 1069, when William the Conqueror was expanding his rule over the whole country and was using his army to put down a rebellion in the north. The measures used were harsh, almost amounting to what we would call genocide today. Crops were burnt, cattle and people killed, causing inhabitants to flee south. Evesham was flooded with refugees, who were provided for by the Abbey.

This caring came to an end when the Abbey was dissolved in 1540. In 1605, an embryonic town council was formed, and townspeople started leaving small charitable bequests to help those in need. In the 1970's these small bequests were amalgamated into one charity, 'Evesham in Need', to be administered by the three Evesham vicars. This developed into the All Saints Food Bank in 2014. From initially giving out 10-12 bags of food each month, this has now reached 35 – 45 bags per month. A sharp increase in use of the food bank has been caused by problems with the implementation of Universal Credit, which has seen usage increase by over 100% from the same time last year.

Several members had brought along bags of food and supplies for the food bank, and the proceeds of our book sales throughout the year have been donated to it. We had also received an invitation to the Daffodil Evening at Fladbury WI on Monday, 11 March, when John Stirling would give a talk entitled 'From Toytown to Buckingham Palace'

We then voted on which of the six resolutions put forward for the NFWI AGM. The resolution regarding encouraging more women to have the cervical smear test gained the most votes.

Our next meeting will be on 14 February, when John Butterworth will talk to us about his time as a Newspaper Editor.


It can be read in the Bible in Joshua chapter 6 verses 1-27

Joshua led the Israelites across the river Jordan. They camped near the town of Jericho and prepared to fight.


The people in Jericho locked the town gates.




They thought they were safe.



God told Joshua what to do.




On the first day, the priests carried the sacred chest,




they blew trumpets, and walked round Jericho once.




The army followed not saying a word.




They did this for 6 days.



On the 7th day they walked round 7 times.




The army gave a victory shout!

Chocolate Covered Heart Cookies for Valentine's Day

For the cookies

175g butter, at room temperature

160g caster sugar

2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 egg

275g plain flour

1 pinch salt

1 teaspoons baking powder

For the ganache

200g dark chocolate, chopped

100ml single cream

Makes 2 dozen

Method

Preheat oven to 180 C / Gas 4. Line 2 baking trays with baking parchment.

1. In a bowl, beat butter with sugar until creamy. Add vanilla extract and egg; whisk well.
2. Sift flour, salt and baking powder. Add to previous mixture and beat at low until fully integrated and a dough is formed.
3. Chill in the fridge for 30 minutes.
4. Roll out dough on a lightly floured surface. Cut cookies in the shape of a heart with a cookie cutter. Transfer onto baking tray. Re-roll any scraps of cookie dough and repeat.
5. Bake in the oven for 7 minutes or until edges are slightly golden. Remove and let cool completely in a cooling rack.
6. In a medium pan, warm cream over medium heat. Once bubbles appear on the surface, remove from heat and pour over chopped chocolate. Let it rest for 3 minutes, then stir until chocolate is completely melted.
7. Holding a cookies on one side, dip it in chocolate, covering half of the cookie. Transfer to a lined baking tray until set. Repeat with remaining cookies.
