Letter from the Bishop of Worcester

All Together as Kingdom People

Saturday 28 September

Worcester Cathedral

It is now over five years since our **Kingdom People Vision** was unanimously and enthusiastically adopted by Diocesan Synod in 2013.

The Church is God's gift to the world, which is called to be an effective sign of God's Kingdom. God's mission is to reconcile the whole creation in Jesus and establish the reign of God. Jesus's first words in his ministry were 'Repent and believe the good news: The Kingdom of God is at hand'.

As Christians, we are called to be Kingdom people: those who both hear and proclaim that message, becoming agents of the transformation of the world according to God's loving purposes in Jesus. Churches should be places where people seek to live out their vocation to be Kingdom people and where the Kingdom values of love, compassion, justice and freedom are embodied and proclaimed.

On **Saturday 28 September**, we will once again come together in Worcester to worship, share resources and be inspired in this vision and our 'Kingdom People' journey. You may remember our last such day in 2015: it was a great occasion, with people gathering from right across the Diocese.

Highlights this year include the presence of the Bishop of Liverpool, Paul Bayes, (formerly one of our honorary canons) and a wide range of workshops - from which you'll come away with new ideas to reinvigorate your worship, connect your faith with life beyond church walls, or help make running your parish easier. There will be sessions suitable for families to attend together as well as practical prayer stations and a chance to be involved in a 'Kingdom Arts' project. The day will also include a ministry of hospitality with breakfast and afternoon tea provided free of charge, courtesy of a gift from a charitable trust. You'll just need to bring lunch (or take the opportunity to head into Worcester in the break to get something). I'm hoping very many people from across the Diocese will come and join us to worship, learn, share and eat together.

Please do look out for more information on the diocesan mailing and website. To enable us to plan workshops etc, we'd be very grateful if people could book in through the Eventbrite website as early as possible and definitely before Saturday 14 September.



Annual Report

Great and Little Hampton Educational Charity 3 April 2019

Registered Charity number 702528

The Charity Commission now ask all charities to publish each and every year in their Annual Report an outline of their purpose and organisation. I apologise, therefore, that the following two paragraphs of the 2019 report by necessity cover the same points as last year.

So.... we exist to provide financial support, at our discretion, to residents of the parish who are under the age of 25 and engaged in education or an apprenticeship. The Charity can be contacted via our Clerk, Mrs Jan Dodwell of 50 Sycamore Avenue, Evesham WR11 1YE. We are 5 Trustees who meet 3 times a year. At our meeting in November we consider the main batch of applications and decide how best to disburse the bulk of the income. We meet a second time in Jan/Feb to consider any special business which may have arisen, and we hold our AGM in May or June.

The make-up of the Trustees is set down in the terms of the Charity. The vicar of Hampton, the Rev. Mark Binney is a member by virtue of his office. Evesham Town Council is represented by County Councillor John Smith. The County Council's nominee is me, Jim Griffiths, who also happens to be the Chairman at the moment. We have two co-opted Trustees: Mrs Ros Saunders and Mr Craig Jennings.

The major difference in the past year lay in the sheer number of applications we received. Perhaps because more and more students are moving on to higher forms of study, we had 55 applications instead of the 44 in the previous year. Our income remained very much the same (£2917 instead of £2838), so we had to drop individual grants very slightly. In fact we managed to reduce the grants on average by only £5 each, by not re-investing our usual £500 or so from income by which we seek, when we can afford it, to protect the value of the fund for future generations. Out of a total income for the year of £2,910, we distributed £2330 in grants to 54 applicants in total. 42 degree-students living away from home received £45 each; 9-degree students were living at home and had £35 each. We awarded £30 each to a further 3 who were living at home and following FE courses, such as A-level. We awarded £35 to one FE student who was living away from home. One application was refused.

The honorarium of our highly efficient Clerk still remains at £230, where it has been for a good number of years. Costs for stationery and postage increased to £84.43. We would like to express our gratitude to our new auditor, James Turner, who's already proving a valuable asset to the work of the Charity.

Our total expenditure was therefore £2644 from an income of £2917.

Our policy of buying more shares, when we can, in the Charities Investment Fund continues to pay good dividends. Literally! In January 2018, the market value of the fund had stood at £84,982 compared to £77,994 at the same time in 2017. This March we are pleased to write that the investment is now worth £88,726. Since we moved the funds from a Deposit account to an Investment account, we have bought extra shares over the years to the value of £5,600, usually at the rate of £500 in a year when we can do so without penalising current applicants. In this way the value of the fund has been helped to increase by some £40,000. Should dividends fall dramatically, or we experience a huge increase in the number of current students making applications, we can always draw down from the fund to maintain the value of the grants.

Recent official minutes express it more formally:

“Trustees were aware that funds accumulated without a power to convert them to endowment continue to be income funds and that such accumulated income funds are unrestricted and count as reserves and that they must be reported as such in the annual report.

Trustees had acknowledged that any future capital growth resulting from such investments would be available for distribution as and when needed.”

We are very conscious of our duty to safeguard the function of the fund for future students and apprentices of Hampton parish as well as to support current young residents. So the fund is in good heart and we look forward to maintaining the aims of the Charity for many years to come.

Canon Richard Meyer

Father Richard Meyer, Vicar of Hampton in the late 1970s and 1980s, passed away on Thursday 13 June 2019, following a short illness.

Father Richard was brought up in the Church of England and served in the ordained ministry for over 20 years. He became a Catholic in 1994, and was ordained Priest in 2002. Fr Richard was Chaplain of the Catholic School for Girls at Leweston, Sherborne until 2010, when the Bishop of Plymouth asked him to move to Bridport Parish. He was an Honorary Canon of Plymouth Cathedral.

Canon Richard was married to Jan, who died in February 2014. He is survived by two children and five grandchildren.

St Peter's Church in Hinton had a chancel in mediaeval times and it was still in existence in 1572 but was destroyed by fire sometime between that date and 1700 when the Church was described as having 'one complete aisle' The new chancel was built in 1895 at a cost of £600 and was designed by John Dando Sedding, a noted Arts and Crafts architect (One of his other churches is Holy Trinity, Sloane Street in London.) David reminded us of Parfait Amour and Blue Curacao, followed by the Champagne Perry that we knew in our younger days as Babycham! During the 1960's he began to travel to Spain and was able to purchase Spanish Burgundy or Sauvignon Blanc at 3s 11p a bottle, (about 20p today). Over the years he gathered an extensive sensory library and vocabulary.

In those younger days of his life, he saw wine stored underground beneath the Real Tennis courts of Henry VIII, in Orange Street London, where there were extensive cellars. David became a Quality Control Taster, sampling hundreds of wines before lunchtime, and the Gin collections after lunch! David assured us the bouquet of gin was the most wonderful of all. Later in his career he became a Wine Buyer.

David answered many questions and explained why different wines have specific flavours. This was a most interesting talk and very much enjoyed by all members who then tasted and gave opinions on two wines for fun. Nibbles were provided. He took us all back to long almost lost memories.

The meeting concluded with Refreshments and the Raffle.


