Letter from the Archdeacon of Dudley

Over the summer I read the ***Good Childhood Report 2019*** published by The Children's Society, and was sad, but not surprised, to learn that children and young people have become increasingly unhappy as childhood becomes ever more complex. The society's research shows that many children are unhappy with their friendships and their appearance, and are concerned about wider issues like school culture, the experiences of those with low or strained family finances, and whether or not some children actually feel safe during the school day. Too many children are struggling with their lives now, and large numbers are also anxious about their future. Large proportions of children are worried about everything from money and getting good grades at school, to wider issues like crime and the environment.

It is so important that we keep reminding ourselves and each other that working with children and young people is one of our strategic priorities, and that as part of our Kingdom People vision we are ***dedicated to helping children and young people to belong and be nurtured in faith***

We can all play a part in this. Even if we don't have many children in our church, most of us will have contact with children in our family and

friendship groups. How can we better mentor them, share faith with them, instil confidence in them and communicate their inherent value to them? How can we help to ease their unhappiness? Perhaps by showing unconditional love, and spending quality time with them; certainly by committing to pray for them.

Mark Russell, Canon of Worcester Cathedral and new Chief Executive of the Children's Society, said in his introduction to the report, "How can we enable children to thrive not just survive. How do we solve problems like rising mental ill-health, millions living in poverty and the scandal of far too many young lives being lost to knife crime and exploitation? We must start by listening to young people. I mean REALLY listening. We need to stop side-lining young people and harness their enthusiasm and radical energy for change."

As a new school year gets underway, let's commit afresh to helping the children of the Diocese to belong and be nurtured in faith. Let's pray for our church schools, all who work with children in paid or voluntary roles, and let's listen to the children and young people we know and harness their enthusiasm and energy for change, that their future might be full of hope, and our lives enriched by the part they play. ***Nikki Groarke***

Bible Sunday – 27 October

Best way to enjoy the Bible? Be like a dog with a bone!

Sarah brought her beautiful dog Bobby to a Quiet Morning at church. He was very well behaved and loved all the attention he received. As we began our time together Sarah gave him a bone to chew on, and he settled down contentedly, enjoying his own experience of ‘heaven’!

The expression came into my mind, ‘like a dog with a bone’, and watching Bobby at work further confirmed my thinking. Here before us was a wonderful example of what it means to meditate on Scripture – to slowly and patiently chew things over in our mind until we begin to grasp internally what God is saying to us.

The Bible encourages us to meditate in this way. Think of Psalm 1, where we read about the godly person ‘whose delight is in the law of the Lord and who meditates on His law, day and night (v2).’ Think also of Joshua who was told, ‘Keep this book of the Law always on your lips; meditate on it day and night, so that you may be careful to do everything written in it (Joshua 1:8). Mary did this as well, when at the birth of Jesus she ‘treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart (Luke 2:19).’

Perhaps sometimes we don’t spend enough time with Scripture, letting its truth soak into our minds and pondering its meaning and application to our lives. The spiritual discipline of Bible meditation helps us to do just that. Why not take a verse of Scripture that has caught your attention recently, and chew it over as you go through the day, looking at it this way and that way until you feel you have received the goodness it contains?

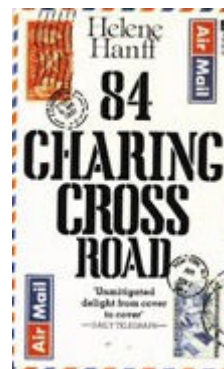

Evesham Street Pastors

Evesham has a busy nightlife; there are four clubs/pubs which regularly stay open to the early hours of a morning during the weekend – some of them until 4 am. Evesham is a popular place and there are often around 600 people in the early hours. They are mainly young but some not so young as well.

Evesham Street Pastors are about to start their seventh year patrolling the streets in the town centre. In many ways the encounters are the same as they were in 2013. There are still those who are in a bad way who need our help. Initially I was surprised how few incidents of this type there were and the same is true today. The overwhelming majority are just having a great night out and need water to overcome dehydration; flip-flops to relieve high-heeled shoes and space blankets to protect against the cold. The occasional plaster and tissue are requested, and we also pick up cans, bottles and broken glass which could be dangerous.

The overwhelming need is for someone to talk to. People have come to know and trust us, they share their joys, challenges and heartaches, sometimes some quite confidential information. We have contact information, which is often of assistance in signposting to those who can help. Not infrequently we meet with people we supported four or five years ago, they have moved on and are so appreciative of the help we were able to give. Friends, who are able to join a patrol as an Observer, almost always comment on the way in which we are respected and appreciated, 'You are friends with so many people' is a comment they often make.

We are a Christian mission organisation and are delighted to be able to share something of the love of Jesus with those enjoying the nightlife of our town. One of our team is a professional video producer, we therefore have a great video and if there is an opportunity to show this at your church or group we would be delighted to share more about the work we do.

There was much hilarity and it was altogether a thoroughly entertaining evening.

St Andrew's Fellowship – September 2019

Our September meeting was enriched by two new members and two visitors, as well as our speaker and his wife. We had had several apologies but still mustered an audience of 20.

John welcomed the new members and visitors, and after a modicum of business introduced our speaker for the afternoon, Mr Alan Tutton whose subject was 'Wood Norton Hall'. He was well qualified to cover his subject as he had been a lecturer at the BBC training college for a number of years.

He started by telling us something of the history of the hall and its original very large estate. He then described the family connections of its regal occupants from the mid 1800s to the mid 1900s. He told us how the self-appointed King (in exile!) of France bought the hall and altered it to make it a royal residence for himself and his wider family. Unfortunately, the enterprise turned out to be beyond his means, and he died a very sick man and virtually penniless. But he had had a whale of a time in the process!

Some years after he had to leave, the extraordinarily elaborate building was bought and turned into a boys' Preparatory school, but that did not last long either. Then, a short time before the outbreak of WWII, the BBC moved part of their operations to Wood Norton to be away from London. Alan described the accommodation in fairly stark terms, showing us archive photographs to make his point. After the end of the war, things gradually returned to normal; most of the operating personnel returned to London, leaving the Training Dept at Wood Norton. Alan clarified for us the excellence of the training facilities, which were gradually updated as time went by.

Eventually, the BBC sold it to the current owners who, as everyone now knows, have turned it into a luxury hotel and conference centre. What many of us did not know, is that there is still to this day, a small remnant of BBC Training still present on the site. As befits an ex-BBC trainer, Alan spoke excellently and fluently, and showed us some wonderful archive photographs as well as some that were more modern.

After a few questions, John proposed a vote of thanks to Alan for providing us with such a fascinating insight into one of Evesham's (at the time) best kept secrets. Our next meeting will be on Tuesday, 8 October, when the well-known local author, Sue Johnstone, will be posing the question 'where do stories come from?' This promises to be another fascinating and informative afternoon. We meet at the Hampton Club (Formerly the Working men's club, opposite the Spar shop) and we aim to start at 2.00 pm. There is plenty of good free parking!

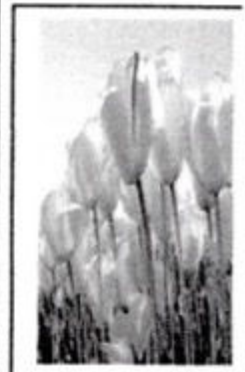

Each man was given a jar with a lit torch in it and a horn.



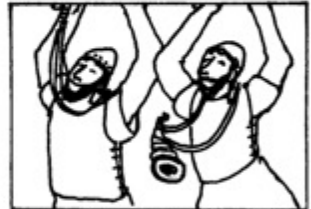
That night they surrounded the Midianite camp.

Ginger and Oat Chocolate Cookies

Ingredients

- 225g/8oz unsalted butter
- 100g/3½oz golden syrup
- 200g/7oz soft brown sugar
- 150g/3½oz plain flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp sea salt flakes
- 4 tsp ground ginger
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 400g/14oz rolled oats
- 2 free-range eggs
- 50g/1¾oz chopped stem ginger
- 115g/4oz good quality dark chocolate



Method

- Preheat the oven to 180C (160C Fan)/350F/Gas 4.
- Line two baking trays with non-stick parchment.
- Melt the butter and the golden syrup in a pan over a low heat. Set aside to cool slightly.
- Combine the sugar, flour, baking powder, salt and spices and mix well to combine. Stir in the rolled oats and mix thoroughly.
- Pour in the melted butter and syrup and stir until well combined. Stir in the beaten eggs and the stem ginger.
- Spoon heaped teaspoons of the mixture onto the lined baking trays, leaving room for them to spread.
- Bake in the oven for 8-10 minutes.
- Remove the biscuits from the oven and set aside to cool completely.
- Melt the chocolate in a bowl suspended over a pan of barely simmering water (do not let the bottom of the bowl touch the water).
- Dip half of each biscuits into the melted chocolate, and place on a cooling rack until the chocolate has set.

Ginger is actually a rhizome, not a root. The ginger plant is a herb, and belongs to the same family as turmeric and cardamom. Ginger is native to south eastern Asia. You can grow ginger from rhizomes found in the supermarket.
