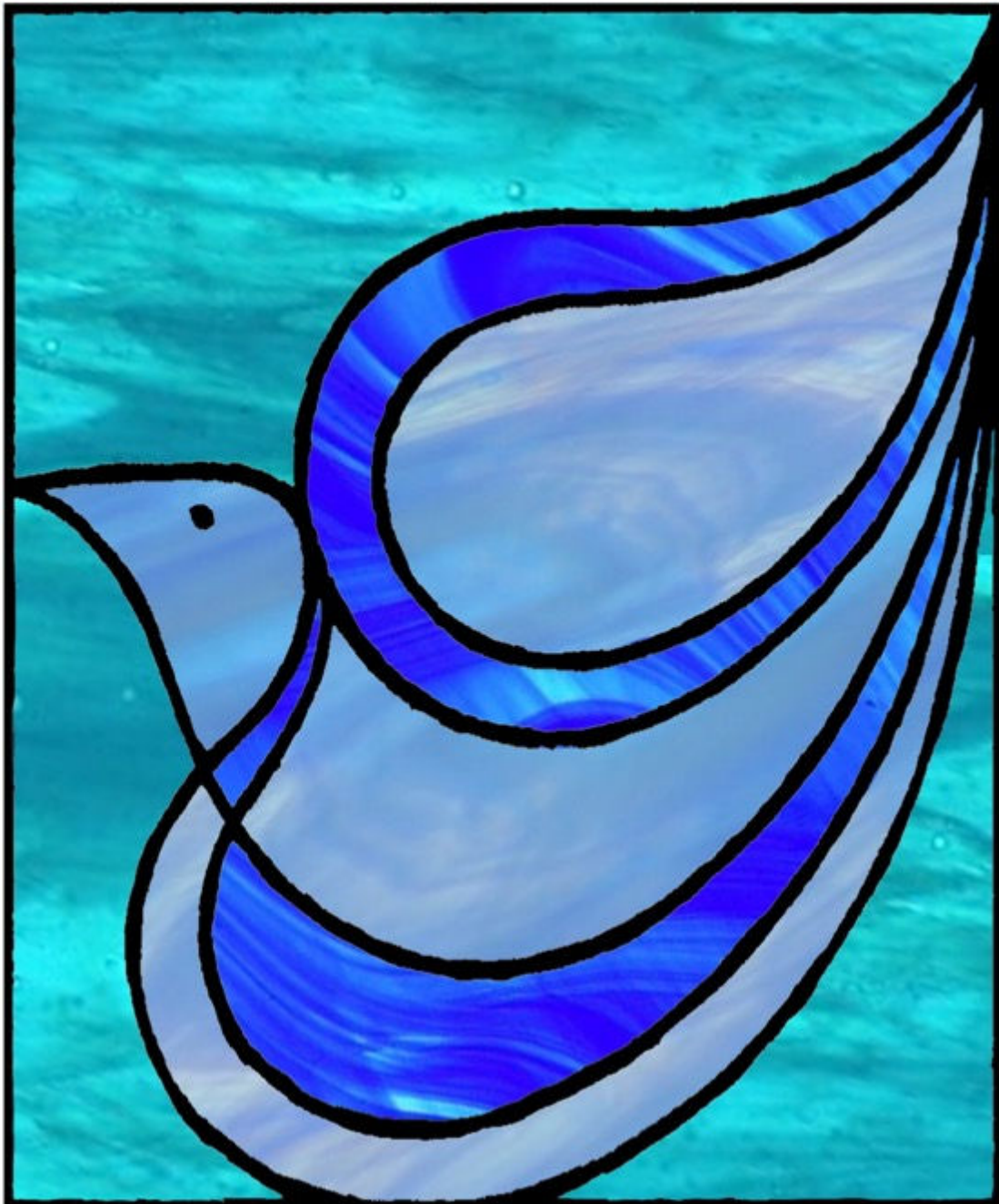

Letter from the Archdeacon of Dudley

Lent will soon be upon us, with its opportunities for taking up spiritual disciplines for a season, doing those things which we know deep down are good for our spiritual health, but often struggle to commit to. Our culture is increasingly short-term, getting people to sign up for anything which stretches indefinitely into the future is challenging, but most of us can manage something for six weeks.



The good news is, research shows it takes about six weeks to form a habit!

So which Lenten discipline might we consider in 2020? What is going to be of most benefit for our growth as disciples of Jesus, as kingdom people? For some of us it may be good to take up something new, like joining a Lent study group in our church, or committing to daily bible readings in one of the many excellent resources available. Others will want to fast from something for the entire season, or a day a week. This may be physical fasting from food, or alcohol, or perhaps a lifestyle fast, cutting out social media or TV. The key thing is that all these disciplines serve to help us focus more on God, making some space in our lives to pray and listen to him.

Discipline is hard work! If our souls, bodies or minds are not stretched by our Lenten endeavours, we are probably not being disciplined enough. I am learning a great deal about physical discipline as I undertake training for running my first marathon at the end of April. The fact that so many lovely supporters are sponsoring me to raise funds for the Children's Society means I have further incentive to keep going, but on a cold and wet day, getting my running shoes on is all about discipline, mind over matter, doing what I have committed to, however it feels. Sometimes it is inconvenient, sometimes it hurts, but I know that I have to keep going, or I will never complete the race before me.

Often when I run, God reveals to me how spiritual disciplines can be similar to physical ones. Routine, habit, consistency are all the staples for health and fitness whether that is in our physical or spiritual life. I will be praying on my ever-longer runs, and using that space away from the phone and email to build my relationship with God, asking him to show me where I need better patterns in my spiritual disciplines to grow closer to him.

My hope is that my new running regime won't stop at the London Marathon finish line. I hope and pray too that all of us who take up new spiritual disciplines for Lent will build healthy habits which stay with us and help us mature as followers of Jesus will beyond Holy Week. Just like my running, they will require effort, and also appropriate rest!

A MOMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

“We’ve left the EU” sing the bells of St. Hugh. “Bah humbug to you” say the silent bells of St. Pugh. It seems that the bitter fault lines which divide Leavers from Remainers show no signs of diminishing any time soon. The latest battle ground is over the ringing of Big Ben and church bells on the 31 January, when Great Britain leaves the European Union. There are difficulties in hearing the bongos of Big Ben at a time of major restoration work, and so the focus has moved to Parish Churches. The suggestion is not to ring at 11pm on the 31st since most people are unlikely to appreciate bells being rung at that time of night, but to ring across the nation at 9am on the 1 February. This depends on the Vicar and therein lies a problem, sixty per cent of the Clergy support ‘remain’ and sixty per cent of laity voted to leave. Many Church bells will be silent by decree of the Vicar.

Various reasons have been given as to why nothing should happen for fear of upsetting those who wish to remain in the EU. On the other hand there was no such sensitivity towards the majority who voted to leave when Parliament was in deadlock for years. There were protests and talk about another referendum and the Liberal Party even declared that they would simply ignore the decision to leave. It does seem that the entire Liberal establishment has tried its best to frustrate what has been termed ‘Brexit’.

Whatever people’s sensitivities, 1 February is an important moment in the life of our nation. For the first time in almost five decades we will be independent with the ability to decide on our own future in the world. It is appropriate to ring the Church bells as they have been used throughout the ages to mark a **Moment of Significance**. If we don’t recognise it we cannot begin to move forward together.

Changes for the well-loved Gideons

Gideons UK have lost a fight to keep their name after their acceptance of women as members angered the International branch. The charity which donates Bibles to hotel rooms and school pupils will have to change their name and the logo on the covers. The organisation started in America in 1899 but had a UK branch. In 2018, the UK branch accepted women after the Charity Commission asked whether or not it was complying with the Equality Act 2010 and then suggested women should be allowed to join for them to remain compliant. In July 2018, the International Cabinet refused to accept financial support from Gideons UK for worldwide ministry and removed its 'National Association' status because it was decided the UK association did not accept the 'Core Values'. The UK branch also changed its logo online to an open Bible in July.



In a letter to Gideon members in September, president Andrew Knight said the UK branch decided it would be better to submit to this decision rather than to challenge the Charity Commission. In a letter to members, Andrew Knight and the Executive Director Iain Mair said: "We were notified of the decision of the Hearing Officer, which is in favour of The Gideons International. This means our application to register Gideons UK has been refused." They add that they take this as "God's will" for the organisation. Because a change in emblem will be necessary, it recommends keeping stocks of Bibles low and not ordering in more. "Together, we must make every effort to avoid a situation where we might have to pulp and pay for Scriptures we are unable to use due to the Trademark ruling."

A Gideons UK member said, "I'm ambivalent in one sense because the Gideons have got a history and a good reputation, but they have become a little bit out of touch with reality; out of touch with the social media side of communications. They're perceived as being an old men's club and really that's not what we want to be, so I am really quite excited about the fact that Gideons are going to get a really fresh start. Things are going to get exciting and we will be able to move forward. Yes, there will be some people who have been Gideons for many years who will be very sad to lose the name but that's not the main point. The main point is that we want to get the Word of God where we can get it out and if a different name helps that then that's good not bad. So I'm not too worried about that."

There will be a small charge to cover materials but only a few pounds – this isn't a fundraising event; this is a get together and craft for positive mental health and reduce waste to landfill. In case you didn't get a chance to try something vegan in Veganuary, here is a recipe to try this month

Vegan Breakfast Muffins

To make 12 muffins you will need:

450g self-raising flour

1 1/2tsp baking powder

1tsp bicarbonate of soda

3tsp ground cinnamon

1tsp vanilla extract

100ml vegetable oil

150ml maple syrup

210ml soya (dairy free) milk

2 apples, grated

3 ripe bananas, mashed

100g ready to eat dates

Oats & demerara sugar for the topping



1. In a large bowl sift together all dry ingredients

2. Beat the banana in a mixer until smooth

3. Add the oil & milk

4. Add the dry ingredients and mix until combined

5. Divide between the muffin cups, sprinkle with the sugar & oats

6. Bake for 25 minutes, at 180°C /160°C Fan, or until a toothpick into the muffin comes out clean

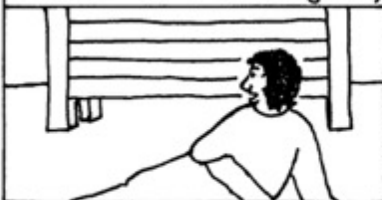


The third time, Eli knew it must be God calling Samuel.
