Letter from the Archdeacon of Worcester, Robert Jones

The month of June sees the Church emerging from the long seasons of Lent and Easter into the even longer Trinity season, which stretches through the summer into the autumn. Some churches call this period Ordinary time, which I rather like. Without ordinary, we would not appreciate the extraordinary. It seems to me that most of us are yearning for a touch of the ordinary right now. We have done our best to make the most of difficult times under lockdown, but are looking forward to 'normal' human contact and, as some people put it, getting our lives back. In truth our lives have carried on, albeit within boundaries. And we have had time to reflect. A little while back in the midst of all this, I read something which stuck with me and got me thinking: 'God does not send us plagues to teach us things, though we can learn from them.'

When bad things happen, people ask why. The God revealed in Jesus does not visit plagues on people, nor wish natural disasters on anyone. Rather, the Gospel shows us a God who chooses to walk with us, meets us in the storms of life, and experiences the highs and lows of what it means to be human alongside us.

So what are we learning? After years of bruising debate about our relationships within Europe, we are learning the art of listening and talking kindly with one another again. Community spirit is flourishing and in

the midst of isolation we have become more connected: not only through social media, but also through the humble



telephone. We have learned what it is to miss our social contact with one another: love of neighbour has reemerged in a new and stronger way. We are learning that we are connected across the whole world. 'Me first' does not work when facing a common challenge to our well-being whoever thought we could all be first anyway? What happens thousands of miles away affects us and we are learning that we are all responsible for each other, challenged to work for the common good because that includes our own good.

George Herbert, the seventeenthcentury priest-poet, wrote a poem called *Prayer*, in which he used the delightful phrase 'heaven in ordinary'. As we enter these weeks of Ordinary time, we could try to see what we have learned. You might like to look up the poem, which ends like this: *Heaven in ordinary, man well drest, The milky way, the bird of Paradise, Church-bells beyond the stars heard, the soul's blood, The land of spices; something understood.* George Herbert (1593-1633)

Church of England has launched a new programme to make prayer a household habit once again. <u>#FaithAtHome</u> will feature weekly video content to help families to talk about faith and pray together.

The videos will be led by children, young people, staff and school leaders from across the country. Over the next three months, #FaithAtHome will explore themes including courage, patience, generosity, resilience, love and hope.

Bishop Martin has supported the launch of these new resources saying:

"I'm delighted to support the national Church of England initiative for families and children called #faithathome. Many of our ancestors in Britain would have gathered in their homes for family prayers, and in the current lockdown many people have been re-discovering the strength and comfort that comes from doing this. #faithathome helps families who stay together to pray together. I commend it to you.'

'Hope' is the topic for the first assembly at the Oak National Academy today, led by the Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby, which aired at 10am this morning. The Oak National Academy was set up to provide video lessons and curriculum resources to assist teachers as they support pupils through the current COVID-19 restrictions. The assembly will be followed by weekly collective worship, provided in partnership by the Church of England and Oak National Academy, with content drawn from #FaithAtHome.

Memories of VE Day by Clova Jarvis



Some of you may have seen Clova's brief appearance on The One Show on VE Day, recalling her memories of the day. This is an account that she has written for The Herald.

"The BBC was preparing programmes to celebrate the 75th anniversary of VE Day. The British Legion was asking for volunteers to recall their experiences,

and my son suggested that I offered to help. Shortly afterwards a lady from the British Legion rang me to discuss my wartime experiences, especially VE Day 1945.

She arranged for someone from BBC4 to interview me, and asked if I would do a Skype interview for BBC TV's The One Show as well.

I was 18 years old on May 8th 1945, working in a restricted occupation which involved war work. I was operating a calculating machine in a plastics factory in Gidea Park Essex, very close to Warley Barracks in Brentwood. That day Churchill had spoken on the radio at 3pm to tell us we were at peace.

It was a very normal working day and as usual on a Tuesday, I had taken my dancing shoes and dress to change into for the evening. I always went to my friend's home to dress for the dance and to have a meal, we then went by bus to the barracks. On this special evening, soldiers were hanging strings of lights on the trees and building an enormous bonfire. Excitement was in the air!

The dance started, and as the sun went down we were led in a dance around the bonfire. Shells were fired and in the great excitement, the soldiers had lowered their range far too much, and the blast had shattered the windows of the gym!

Later, my friend and I walked to the rail station, and when the steam engine arrived we asked the engine driver to stop at Forest Gate for us to get to my home for bed.

This was only the beginning of the celebrations, as there was a procession with the King, Queen and Winston Churchill, with appearances on the balcony of Buckingham Palace. There was a service at St Paul's Cathedral, followed by a marchpast by the armed forces.

Of course, the street parties played a very important part in the celebrations of the East End of London, and I managed to wear out the soles of a pair of shoes dancing at one of them.

Dandelions!


Many of us actually like dandelions. Their amazingly cheerful colour always brings a smile to our faces. The not-so-neat-and-tidy gardeners among us can simply enjoy flowers where they grow.

The name 'dandelion' apparently derives from 'dent de lion' – lions' teeth, owing to the tooth-like shape of its leaves. There are many different varieties of dandelion, but they all have the toothed leaves arranged in a rosette around the single flowers, each one made up of up to two hundred [yes, really!] tiny florets on a smooth stem, that when picked, releases a milky substance known as latex. The golden heads, which close up at night, in wet weather, or if picked to go in a vase, give way to the seed-heads we all know as clocks. Who cannot remember proclaiming the time as a child, having blown the seeds away, counting each breath as an hour? And who, if this happened in the garden, remembers the reaction of a parent, or grandparent, to the efficient dispersal of the seeds all over the vegetable patch or flower bed!

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7 June - Trinity Sunday Celebrating our God who is Three Persons

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself – way out there in space, and unapproachable in its fiery majesty – is



The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example:

Deuteronomy 6:4: 'Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one.'

Isaiah 45:22: 'Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other.' Genesis 1:1-2: 'In the beginning God created.... and the Spirit of God was hovering...'

Judges 14:6: 'The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...'

John 1:1-3: 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through Him all things were made; without Him nothing was made that has been made.'

Luke 24:49 actually manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells His disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.' In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we turn to its brilliant light, we find that the warmth and life there as well.

21 June - Fathers' Day, a time to celebrate male role models

In the UK, USA and Canada, the third Sunday in June is Father's Day. It's usually a good time for sons and daughters to take their father to his favourite restaurant, or to watch a favoured sport, or whatever else he enjoys doing.

How will you celebrate it this year? If your own father cannot be with you, how about a Zoom meeting?

How do these special days ever get started, anyway? Well, Father's Day began because way back in 1909 there was a woman in Spokane, Washington, named Sonora Louise Smart Dodd. That year she heard a church sermon about the merits of setting aside a day to honour one's mother. Mother's Day was just beginning to gather widespread attention in the United States at this time. But Sonora Louise Smart Dodd knew that it was her father who had selflessly raised herself and her five siblings by himself after their mother had died in childbirth. So the sermon on mothers gave Sonora Louise the idea to petition for a day to honour fathers, and in particular, her own father, William Jackson Smart.

Sonora Louise soon set about planning the first Father's Day celebration in Spokane in 1910. With support from the Spokane Ministerial Association and the YMCA, her efforts paid off, and a 'Father's Day' was appointed. Sonora Louise had wanted Father's Day to be on the first Sunday in June (since that was her father's birthday), but the city council didn't have time to approve it until later in the month. And so on June 19th, 1910, the first Father's Day was celebrated in Spokane.

Gradually, other people in other cities caught on and started celebrating their fathers, too. The rose was selected as the official Father's Day flower. Some people began to wear a white rose to honour a father who was dead, and a red one to honour a father who was living. Finally, in 1972, President Richard Nixon signed a presidential proclamation declaring the third Sunday of June as Father's Day - a permanent, national holiday.
