

Letter from the Archdeacon of Worcester, Robert Jones


An article in the *Church Times* took me back to a hymn I'd not sung for many a year with its wonderful opening line, 'O Love that wilt not let me go'. This is the only sort of love which really counts; it's the one we recognise in our own loved ones, in parents who loved us into life, in friends who mean the world to us - and, of course, in the God revealed in Jesus Christ.

It is one year ago that we first went into lockdown. Perhaps you can recall what you were doing then when life was more 'normal'. I can remember going for drinks with neighbours the weekend

before it all happened, when Covid seemed something quite distant. Now there are few of us who have not been affected personally one way or another. We know people with Covid, we know people who have died from Covid, and all of us are living with the consequences of Covid.

Lent takes us back to Jesus' forty days and nights in the desert. It seems to me that we are living our own wilderness experience in a way we could never have imagined. For Jesus this was a time of struggle: as the 23rd Psalm puts it, he walked through the valley of the shadow of death. Yet he was held in a love which would not let him go, and emerged from it to a

ministry which was to turn the world upside down in faith, hope and love. Whatever else is lacking during this time of wilderness, one thing not absent is loving kindness. We've seen it in NHS workers, teachers, neighbours and many others. In practical down-to-earth ways we have seen and experienced living examples of 'love that wilt not let me go'.



only to myself, and which caused me the most severe mental suffering. The hymn was the fruit of that suffering', he says, and then he wrote these beautiful lines:

'I trace the rainbow through the rain, and feel the promise is not vain that morn shall tearless be.'

Tracing the rainbow through the rain. Isn't this God's tenacious love for us, stronger than we can imagine, mirrored by our human experiences of being loved? We've surely had plenty of rain lately, but, you know, I've seen the odd rainbow too - hold on to such precious glimpses of glory in times as these.

Mothering Sunday

Mothering Sunday is celebrated in churches on the fourth Sunday in Lent (14 March in 2021).

Traditionally it is a day when we thank God for the love of our mothers, and we thank them in person for their care for us. In the UK, the service dates back hundreds of years to the time when people were encouraged once a year, on Laetare Sunday, to return to their home or 'mother' church or cathedral.



The Children's Society

In 2021, the Children's Society is asking churches to help them fight for hope for children and young people on Mothering Sunday, when we think about and thank all those who care for us.

The coronavirus pandemic has affected all our lives, but it has hit vulnerable children and young people particularly

hard. They have had months out of school, hidden from view and often without access to online learning resources. Lockdown has trapped children at home with people who hurt and abuse them, and our research shows lockdown has also made some children more vulnerable to criminal exploitation and online grooming. As their mental health and well-being suffers, many children are losing hope. Over the last 15 years, The Children's Society has studied and reported on children's well-being. And each year they have seen a consistent decline, which has only worsened as a result of the pandemic. The charity has launched its ambitious goal of overturning that decline by 2030.

The theme of their Mothering Sunday resource is 'Fighting for hope'. The charity fights for hope by providing support for those who need it most and by campaigning for changes that make life better for young people.

Alyssa's story

Alyssa (not her real name) grew up in a home where there was violence, and that affected her mental health. Then she started getting bullied at school too. At one point Alyssa felt that she was completely overwhelmed, like she was 'drowning'. Unfortunately school didn't offer her the support she needed.

She says: 'My life before The Children's Society, I wouldn't even consider it a life. I would try and stay in the house as much as possible. I'd refuse to go to school, or I would pretend to be sick so I wouldn't have to go, and it wasn't healthy.'

Eventually, Alyssa came to one of The Children's Society's projects and received counselling from Kerry, one of our project workers. This gave Alyssa the strength and tools to get better.

Sarah Jayne Hewitt has been appointed as the new Community Missioner at Christ Church Matchborough in the Benefice of Ipsley, Redditch.

This will be a one-year post to help resume the church's community work, assess the changing needs of Matchborough and assist in defining the long term post of the Community Missioner. She will work alongside Ian Evans, who is a part-time self-supporting minister at the

church as well as the lay team.

Sarah, who is currently the Evesham Deanery Missioner, will start her new role in April.

Sarah said: "I have been greatly blessed by my seven and a half years in Evesham and I hope that some form of the mission created will long continue. I am really grateful to the people I have worked with for willing to give new things a go and seeing what was possible. Moving to Christ Church feels like a bit of a homecoming as my father was born in Redditch, being Head Choir Boy at St Stephens in the late 1930's and my family bought a house in Matchborough in the early 1970's. I'm really excited about this new chapter of my ministry and very much looking forward to working with Ian and his team."



Nest Boxes

Our birds are short of nesting holes, and no wonder: gardens, parks and woodland are much neater than they used to be, and modern homes offer few crannies for nest building.

'Welcome to our Future' secured a grant to provide bird boxes for churchyards in

Hereford and Worcestershire. **St Andrew's** took delivery of their boxes, and with thanks to a small group of local people, we now have them up and ready for birds from robins to owls to take up residence in our beautiful churchyard.

Our grounds are a haven for wildlife with squirrels, bats and owls living in the vicinity, and we can see beautiful wild flowers, including crocuses, primroses and snowdrops at this time of the year.





Church Electoral Roll - Hampton

The church electoral roll is the formal list of voting members of the church and everybody who worships regularly should be on the roll. Each year the roll must brought up to date before the Annual Meeting.

Due to Covid the Annual Meeting at Hampton is later than usual, on Sunday 16th May, and the revision of the roll will commence on 28th March. Census 2021 will provide a snapshot of modern society

Households across Worcestershire will soon be asked to take part in Census 2021.

census 2021

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that gives us the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

It will be the first run predominantly online, with households receiving a letter with a unique access code, allowing them to complete the questionnaire on their computers, phones or tablets.

"A successful census will ensure everyone from local government to charities can put services and funding in the places where they are most needed," Iain Bell, deputy national statistician at the Office for National Statistics, said.

"This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, schools and new transport routes. That's why it is so important everyone takes part and we have made it easier for people to do so online on any device, with help and paper questionnaires for those that need them."

Census day will be on March 21, but households across the country will receive letters with online codes allowing them to take part from early March.

The census will include questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well as voluntary questions for those aged 16 and over on sexual orientation and gender identity.

Results will be available within 12 months, although personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.

Lemon Drizzle Simnel Slices - A Mother's Day Treat!

(A combination of my two favourite cakes!)

Ingredients

- 250g softened butter
- 250g golden caster sugar, plus 50g for topping
- Zest and juice of 2 lemons
- 3 large eggs
- 200g plain flour
- 100g ground almonds
- 2½ tsp baking powder
- 50ml milk
- 100g dried mixed fruit
- 300g marzipan, chilled
- 50g icing sugar



- Heat oven to 180C/160C fan/gas 4. Oil and line a 20cm x 30cm baking tin with baking parchment.
- Beat the butter and sugar with most of the lemon zest until pale and fluffy.
- Add the eggs one at a time, mixing constantly, then add the flour, almonds and baking powder, and keep mixing until you have a smooth cake batter.
- · Stir in the milk and dried fruit.
- Scrape half the cake batter into the tin and level the surface.
- Coarsely grate half the marzipan onto the batter to create an even layer, then cover with the rest of the batter, trying not to disturb the marzipan too much.
- Level the top and bake for 35-40 mins or until a skewer inserted into the centre comes out clean. If any wet cake mixture clings to the skewer, return the cake to the oven for 5 mins, then check again.
- Mix the remaining caster sugar with a quarter of the lemon juice, then drizzle over the cake while still warm.
- Leave the cake to cool in the tin.
- Mix the icing sugar with enough lemon juice to make a drizzly icing – 2-3 tsp should be enough.
- Divide the rest of the marzipan into 11 even lumps and roll into balls.
- Drizzle the icing over the cake, top with the marzipan balls and sprinkle with the remaining lemon zest.
- Will keep in an airtight container for up to five days.
