Letter from the Archdeacon of Worcester, Robert Jones

Let's hope we can celebrate Christmas more openly and at ease this year than last! Looking back over the past 18 months or so it is hard to believe how much we've had to put up with and how we've changed our behaviour in order to stay safe. I'm amazed how we have adapted our lives. Who would have thought that wearing masks in crowded places would become second nature? That a nationwide vaccination programme would have been so successfully developed? And that we'd all get used to administering lateral flow tests ourselves?

We have learned to manage public worship as safely as possible. We have celebrated funerals, weddings and family events in new and creative ways, though at some cost along the way. We have had to concentrate on the essentials. We have put ourselves out to look after ourselves and others with practical loving-kindness.

Although we lost so much, it seems to me we have gained much as well. Perhaps, you could say, we put the heart back into human society.

Do you remember how last year's Christmas celebrations were much more muted than usual? People commented on how much they actually enjoyed the simplicity of pared down celebrations and an albeit enforced break with old routines. We had to re-think. We had to ask what



really counted. We had to improvise and because we couldn't sing in church, we went outside to sing our carols. Strangely enough we took Christmas back to where it first began - not shut inside holy places, however beautiful, but outside in the world God so loved.

Mary and Joseph also had to improvise as they found a place for their son to be born. The heart of Christmas was born in the mucky manger of Bethlehem: even there, surely, their hearts sang for joy. The beating heart of Christmas was and is the Babe of Bethlehem, born for us.

The Children's Society Good Childhood report for 2021

This Christmas, many parishes will raise money for the Children's Society through their Christingle services. Earlier this year, the charity published its annual Good Childhood Report.

The Children's Society Good Childhood report for 2021 shows that modern life continues to erode the happiness of young people, with increased numbers dissatisfied with school, their friendships and their appearance.

Although children and young people have been incredibly resilient during the pandemic, approximately a quarter of a million did not cope well with the disruption. It has been reported that many are now plagued by new worries about their future, especially in terms of having enough money, finding a job and getting good grades, as well as the climate emergency. Despite this, seven in ten 10-17 year olds are optimistic about the future regardless of the uncertainties reinforced by the pandemic.

The Children's Society runs services and campaigns to improve children's lives, reignite their hope and change the systems that are placing them in danger.

Please pray for all children and young people who are unhappy or struggling with their mental health, as a result of the pandemic or otherwise. Give thanks for all those who raise money for the Children's Society over the Christmas period through Christingles and other services.

Plant a Tree for the Jubilee

In 2022, Her Majesty The Queen will become the first British Monarch to celebrate a Platinum Jubilee and a number of plans are in place to celebrate her seventy years of service to the Nation.

The Queen's Green Canopy (QGC) is a UK-wide tree planting initiative, inviting people to "Plant a Tree for the Jubilee", with a focus on planting sustainably. The QGC will encourage planting of trees to create a legacy for future generations to enjoy, in honour of HM The Queen. Churches have been invited to take part.

Lt Col Patrick Holcroft, Lord-Lieutenant of Worcestershire writes:

"As HM The Queen's representative in the County, I would like to encourage Worcestershire residents, landowners, schools, communities, towns, parishes and businesses to participate in this wonderful project and plant trees from October (when the tree planting season begins), through to the end of the Jubilee year in 2022.

The Lieutenancy and Worcestershire County Council have endorsed two planting projects: one has already begun on a 10 acre plot at Bewdley, and a 150 acres near Evesham will begin in the next few months.

The QGC is aimed at everyone so please do get involved, either by planting a commemorative tree in your garden, some fruit trees, or a larger woodland area. Sedgeberrow Church Finance

The financial situation of the church has got to be sorted out. It has been shelved for far too long.

We need a steady income from church members to start with. We would then hope to extend the scheme to the rest of the village. It is the only way forward.

Church members are responsible for the cost of running the church. That includes paying for priests and the general costs of running the church.

The costs of the upkeep of the building can be spread wider as the building really belongs to the village. This problem will have to be dealt with after we have sorted out our own finances.

We therefore have to make some serious decisions if we are to keep the church open. We need to know that we have an income to pay for essential services.

Our estimated outgoings are as follows:

Parish Share (to pay for the priest and diocese) is £4-8k to be negotiated by the churchwardens. The three churches have to find £58,019

Insurance £3k

Mowing £2500 (we do get 1-2k back from the PC)

Electricity £800

Organist £600

Plus many other items such as candles, wine, wafers.

Some serious thinking and giving has to be done.

The PCC has agreed that we should join the Parish Giving Scheme. This is a scheme organised by the Church of England which enables parishioners to give on a regular basis by direct debit.

As you can see from the figures I have given, our basic outgoings are at least £12k per year. I do not know how much anyone can afford to pay. But if every regular member gave £5 per week this would raise about £5000 per annum. That is less than half the essential amount needed to keep us afloat and keep the church open. Hopefully some people will be able to give more which will then enable us to look forward to a viable and brighter future.

I know that we gain an income from coffee mornings (around £2000) but this is money which should be helping towards the cost of decorating the church and other repairs for which we need a very large amount of money.

We had an inspection just before the Covid outbreak, and there are a number of essential repairs needed. This is where the scheme needs to be extended to the people of the village.

The Parish Giving Scheme involves agreeing to give money on a regular basis, either monthly, quarterly or annually. The money is taken on or near the 1st of the month

and by the middle of the month the money and any Gift Aid due is paid into our accounts. Anyone can make this donation anonymously if they so wish.

The direct debit can be set up either online, by telephone or by a paper application form.

I have seen a comment by someone who signed up by telephone who said it was very easy and took about 10 minutes.

Please give serious thought to what I have said.

A new group are in training to keep the ringing tradition alive but there's always room for a few more if anyone is interested. There's also a Choir in Hinton now, and they will be singing jolly Christmas songs to accompany the Christmas Fayre at 1.30pm on 4 December. The choir has involved singers and people who claim not to be able to sing, but find that they can when assisted by Val, our able choir mistress. Thanks go to Val for her dedication and positivity. I'm hoping the Choir will continue to be a feature of village life here. When the weather warms up again in the Spring, do let your PCC know if there are any events you would like to see taking place at St Peter's – especially if you are able to organise or help!

The Advent Ring

Many churches have an Advent ring as part of their Christmas preparations, and some people have one at home as well. It is usually a ring of greenery with four candles round the edge and a larger one in the centre.

On the first Sunday in Advent one candle on the ring is lit at the start of the main service, to burn for the whole service. Often it is lit by a child, and a special prayer may be said and/or a verse of a special hymn is sung.

On each subsequent Sunday an extra candle is lit, and an additional verse of the hymn is sung. By Christmas Day all five candles are lit, the central symbolising Christ, the light of the light of the world.

For each Sunday in Advent there is a specific theme and a watch word: Advent 1 – The Patriarchs – Awake!; Advent 2 – The Prophets – Be Glad!; Advent 3 – John the Baptist – Return; Advent 4 – The Virgin Mary – Prepare; Christmas Day – The Christ. During Advent we follow the pattern of God’s redemption through the Old Testament and into the New and are challenged to prepare spiritually for the wonderful gift given to us at Christmas. Each candle lights for our Advent path.

21 December - Winter Solstice

A Midwinter festival has been a part of life since pre-Christian times. When the hours of daylight are fewest, the warmth of the sun weakest, and life itself seemingly at a standstill, our ancestors, the pagan peoples of Europe and Western Asia, kept festival by lighting bonfires and decorating their buildings with evergreens.

Perhaps they believed that the dying sun could be enheartened by fire, and the life of the buried seed assured by the presence of evergreen branches.

With the advent of Christianity, the Spring gods became identified with Christ, and the birthday of the sun with the birthday of the Light of the World.

The early church father Tertullian did not approve of Christmas decorations. “Let those who have no light in themselves light candles!... You are the light of the world, you are the tree ever green....” But by the time of St Gregory and St Augustine, four centuries later, this had changed. Pope Gregory instructed Augustine not to worry about harmless outward customs, as long as the right God be worshipped through them. And so many Anglo-Saxon customs were never discarded, but simply endowed with a new significance.

By 1598 one John Stow of London wrote how: *‘Against the feast of Christmas, every man’s house, as also their parish churches, were decked with holme, ivie, bayes, and whatsoever the season of the yeare afforded to be greene.’*

RECIPE OF THE MONTH FOR DECEMBER

Chocolate Chip and Apricot Cake

INGREDIENTS

- 250g butter
- 250g demerara sugar
- 200g skinned hazelnuts
- 4 eggs
- 250g plain flour
- 2 tsp baking powder
- 3 tbsp espresso coffee
- 200g soft dried apricots
- 250g dark chocolate



METHOD

Oven 180C/Fan 160C/Gas 4

1. Line the base of a 23cm spring-form cake tin with baking parchment.
2. Cream the butter and sugar until light and creamy.
3. Place the hazelnuts on a baking sheet, then brown them lightly in the oven, then chop finely.
4. Break the eggs into a bowl and mix lightly with a fork, then add the beaten egg, gradually, to the butter and sugar. Mix in the baking powder into the flour, then fold into the cake mix, and add the espresso.
5. Chop the chocolate into small pieces, then add to the cake mix along with most of the finely chopped apricots and hazelnuts, leaving some apricots and hazelnuts to scatter on the top of the cake after baking.
6. Put the mixture into the lined cake tin and bake, in the centre of the oven, for about 75 minutes until the cake is lightly springy to the touch and just starting to come away from the sides of the tin. Scatter the reserved apricots and nuts over the surface.
