Letter from the Bishop of Dudley, Martin Gorick

Does your church have a churchyard, or even just a small patch of ground? If it has, I wonder whether you're taking part in Churches Count on Nature?

(www.caringforgodsacre.org.uk/love-your-burial-ground-week)

During a week in June, Churches Count on Nature brings people together to discover the wildlife in their local churchyard, recording the species they find. Results from across the country are then combined on



the Beautiful Burial Ground portal (burialgrounds.nbnatlas.org) within the National Biodiversity Network, a nationwide database of wildlife in the UK. It sounds fun, and I see St Peter's Pedmore is one of the churches in our diocese who have already signed up to take part, with seed planting, bug hunting and other activities!

As I travel around the Diocese and visit our 250+ churches I'm struck by how many are havens for wildlife, whether in town or country. Many, like St Giles' Bredon, have developed areas sown with wildflowers that look beautiful in spring and summer and are literally buzzing with bees, butterflies, and all kinds of life. Many are working towards Eco-Church awards (ecochurch.arochoa.org.uk), like St Cassian Chaddesley Corbett who gave a beautiful pot of cowslips to every

house in the village as a gift on Mothering Sunday. A joyful gift, and one that will go on giving in future years if planted out in the garden.

When I was Vicar of Smethwick Old Church, I had a large churchyard to care for in a densely populated urban area. It could be quite a headache at

times I must admit, caring for the varied needs of funeral directors arranging burials and people visiting graves, as well as trying to develop a

nature-friendly oasis in the heart of the community. But it gave me real joy too. I love butterflies and was delighted to discover a colony of Speckled Wood that probably dated back to when Smethwick was just a hamlet set amidst rolling countryside. The trees and shrubs of the churchyard had enabled those butterflies to survive in the midst of the Black Country industrial revolution, rapid expansion of population and all that followed. Nature is resilient and gives hope and encouragement for us too. Children of earth, as well as children of God.

Let me know what your church has been up to, and do let me know of any interesting plants, bugs, birds or animals that you find in your churchyard!

'In 1953 I was in the third year at Samuel Southall Secondary Modern Girls' School in Worcester. There was an inter-school competition to write a poem for the Queen's Coronation.

I was lucky enough to win a prize in one of the age groups, a £5 voucher, for W H Smith, presented to me by the Mayor of Worcester.

This started me on my road to writing poetry, and I have recently produced a volume of my poems, which has raised £540 for the Salvation Army, of which I am a soldier.'

Marking Pentecost through praying Thy Kingdom Come



The Day of Pentecost, this year on 5 June, marks fifty days since Easter Day and brings the Easter season to an end.

At Pentecost we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit, remembering how this was given to the disciples after Jesus' ascension, empowering them to begin the work of making disciples of all nations.

Many Christians use the time from Ascension Day to Pentecost to pray for more people to come to know Jesus. After the very first Ascension Day the disciples gathered with Mary, constantly devoting themselves to prayer while they waited for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Trinity Sunday -12 June 2022

Trinity Sunday falls on the first Sunday after Pentecost, which is the 50th day after Easter. The day honours the descent of the Holy Spirit on Jesus' apostles and followers. Trinity Sunday, in its essence, celebrates the mystery of faith and unity on and of the Holy Trinity: the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

The doctrine of the Trinity is considered to be **one of the central Christian affirmations about God.**



Trinity Sunday helps the church to emphasize the proper understanding of Father, Son, and Spirit, and reminds us that God exists in both perfect oneness and community. He is perfect in every way, transcending all creation, sending Jesus to live among humanity, and empowering believers by the Spirit today.

Reflected Faith Series: The Meaning of Colours – Part 2

Last month we looked at the changing of colours in the church's vestments and altar cloths during March, April and May this year. This month of June sees them changing again, but this time for around 20 weeks.

We start the month still in the season of Easter; strictly speaking, in the time after the Ascension. The first Sunday in June is the feast of Pentecost. This was and remains a Jewish Festival. At the time of Jesus, it was a joyful celebration of the first fruits of the Harvest, which was why all the apostles were gathered together in Jerusalem, as was expected of all Jewish men.

As they gathered following Jesus' Ascension, the Holy Spirit came upon them. This is what Christians celebrate at Pentecost, and therefore the colour is red. The following day the colour changes to green, and remains green until the 30th of October, the Feast of All Saints' which will be white.

This gives us approximately 20 weeks of 'green' with the occasional day in between of white or red to celebrate an apostle, saint, or a specific feast day.

So, the question is 'Why?' Why so long?

This time is often referred to as 'Ordinary' time. So, what is 'ordinary' about it? I don't know about your life but mine tends to go along steadily with just the odd up or down time. Most of my days are 'ordinary'.

In church lectionary terms this period of 'X Sunday after Pentecost' follows one main gospel's teachings and miracles of Jesus. It's almost like He gathers us together for a summer school and takes us up a mountainside and teaches us there. It's a time for leaning and growth.

This month

Like the green grass feeds the animals, this month spend some time just looking at a patch of grass or the leaves on trees from a distance.

See the different shades and hues and when you next hear the gospel reading imagine sitting under those trees on that grass with Jesus Himself.

The Trussell Trust

In latest figures released by the Trussell Trust, food banks in its network provided more than 2.1 million food parcels to people in the past year across UK, alarmingly, more than 800,000 of these were for children. In the West Midlands, over 200,000 parcels were provided.



The Bishop of Durham, the Rt Revd Paul Butler, has called on the government to take urgent action to prevent hundreds of thousands of people from being pushed through the doors of food banks as families across the country face the biggest income squeeze in a generation.

Food banks in the Trussell Trust's network provided more than 2.1 million parcels to people facing financial hardship across the UK, from 1 April 2021 to 31 March 2022. This represents a 14% increase compared to the same period in 2019/20 – before the pandemic – as more and more people are unable to afford the absolute essentials that we all need to eat, stay warm, dry and clean. This is the first time food banks in the Trussell Trust's network have provided more than 2 million parcels, outside of 2020, at the height of the pandemic.

The Trussell Trust says food banks in its network experienced their busiest winter outside of 2020 at the height of the pandemic, providing 1.2 million parcels in the second half of the year alone (from October to the end of March). That is more parcels than were provided for the whole year of 2016/17, just five years ago.

As inflation continues to soar and rising bills are putting pressure on families across the country, the Trussell Trust says its network expects need for emergency food to rise further still, over the coming months and beyond. One food bank manager said: "The people who come in are telling me they're scared. People are beside themselves about what the next six months will bring."

With the energy price cap rise just starting to bite the charity says for most people at risk from financial hardship – who cannot work or work longer hours due to disability, caring responsibilities or mental health issues – there is very little protection ahead. Food bank staff and volunteers will always do all they can to help people in their communities, they do this every day - but they cannot and should not be picking up the pieces of government inaction, particularly with a crisis of this scale.

Churches play an important role in supporting people who are reaching crisis point – by housing food banks in their buildings, volunteering, praying and of course donating supplies. As the cost of living crisis carries on, the Trussell Trust ask that you continues to do this, alongside adding your voice to call upon the government to bring benefits in line with the true cost of living as a bare minimum, and strengthen our social security system so no one struggles to stay fed, warm and dry.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee

This month we celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee. She is the longest reigning monarch in British history. Up until recently she attended church every week and still did a full week's work at the age of 96!

It is her commitment to serving God and the nation which stands out in her life. Even before she became Queen, she made a promise, which she has kept for over 75 years: *'I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service'* (21st birthday broadcast, 21 April 1947).



What is the secret of the Queen's consistency of character and service?

In 2002 she said this: *"I know just how much I rely on my faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning. I know that the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings, and to put my trust in God."* These are wise words from somebody who draws her strength from the Christian Faith and can inspire all of us who want to make our lives count!

The Queen has been an example of joyful, wise, and generous service on behalf of others all her life. Six months before her coronation she asked the nation and Commonwealth to *"pray that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve Him and you, all the days of my life."* Paul urges us to pray for all in authority, *"that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness."* (1 Timothy 2:2).

Some simple tricks to save energy

The on-going rise in energy costs is eye-watering. Here are some well-proven ways to save money:

Always turn off the lights when you leave a room. Forget about maintaining an 'ambience' in your home.

Turn down your thermostat by at least a degree. Or two. Or three?

Get some LED bulbs – they are six times more efficient, last much longer, and use 90 per cent less energy than old-style bulbs.

Shower rather than bath. Don't worry about a bit of dirt on your children. It can strengthen their immune systems and help prevent them from becoming allergic to everything.

Don't boil the kettle all the time – it eats up about six per cent of all your electricity per year. Why not consider making a pot rather than a mug, so that you drink as much overall, but less often?

Make a draught excluder - you know, the ones that look like sausage dogs. Don't turn up the heat to combat a draught, fix the draught.

Keep doors closed. If you don't need to heat your **WHOLE** house, don't.

Put some more clothes on. We all know people who like to wear only tee-shirts at home, even in winter. If they belong to your family, get them to put on a jumper, cuddle the dog, wrap up in a blanket, or run up and down the stairs, not turn up the heating.

Set your washing machine at 30. Washing at 30 rather than 40 degrees can reduce your energy consumption by 60 per cent per cycle, according to the energy experts.

Use your electric clothes dryer less. It can account for five per cent of all household electricity. Far cheaper to buy a washing line!

Use your oven only when you can fill it up. Never cook just one thing at a time. And when you are done, leave the oven door open to help heat the house.

All of these are small steps, but together they could make a big difference this year.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Jubilee Chicken

An update to *Coronation Chicken*, with mild spices, apple, walnuts, yoghurt sauce and pomegranate

INGREDIENTS

- 1 large chicken (about 2.25kg/5lb)
- 1 tsp turmeric
- 2 tsp ground ginger
- 2 tsp ground cumin
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- 3 tbsp sunflower oil
- 500g Greek yogurt
- 4 tbsp mayonnaise
- ¼ tsp cayenne pepper
- 4 tsp pomegranate molasses or balsamic glaze, plus extra to serve
- 2 green-skinned English apples, cored and diced
- 200g toasted walnut piece
- bunch flat-leaf parsley, chopped
- 100g/4oz pomegranate seeds

METHOD

1. Heat oven to 160C/140C fan/gas 3. Sit the chicken in a large roasting tin. Mix together the turmeric, 1 tsp ginger, 1 tsp cumin, 1 tsp cinnamon and oil, then brush all over the chicken, making sure all of the spiced oil is used. Season well. Pour 250ml water into the bottom of the tin, cover with foil and seal around the edges. Put in the oven and cook for 2 hrs.
2. Remove the foil and increase oven to 220C/200C fan/gas 7. Cook for a further 30 mins until the chicken is cooked through. Remove from the oven and leave until cool enough to handle. Strip the chicken meat from the carcass in chunky pieces and set aside.
3. To make the salad, mix together the yogurt, mayonnaise, remaining 1 tsp each of ginger, cumin and cinnamon, cayenne pepper and pomegranate molasses or balsamic glaze. Add the chicken pieces, apples, all but a handful of the walnuts and parsley, and season.
4. Spoon the salad onto a large plate. To serve, drizzle with a little pomegranate molasses or balsamic glaze and scatter over the pomegranate seeds, remaining walnuts and chopped parsley.
