Bishop John reflects on his experience of the Coronation of King Charles III

God save the King! Long Live the King! We shouted. What a spectacle was the coronation. They don't happen very often: there were only three in the 19th Century, four in the 20th and this is of course the first in this century.

I was privileged to have a ring-side seat, not as the 113th Bishop of Worcester but in my most esoteric role, that of Lord High Almoner to the King.

The theme of the coronation was service. More moving for me than all the wonderful music, glorious though it was, was the sentence with which the whole thing began, spoken by a young chorister:

'Your Majesty, as children of the Kingdom of God, we welcome you in the name of the King of kings.' The King replied, 'In his name and after his example, I come not to be served but to serve.'

The King is a committed Christian who, like his mother, is someone who has taken to heart the words and actions of Jesus and given such unstinting Christian service all his life: service to all, regardless of colour or creed.

The coronation was a great occasion, an amazing spectacle of pomp and pageantry, but at its heart was our King dedicating his life in service to the King of kings. My prayer is the same one that King Charles knelt to pray before the altar during the coronation.

God of compassion and mercy whose Son was sent not to be served but to serve, give grace that I might find in thy service perfect freedom and in that freedom knowledge of thy truth. Grant that I may be a blessing to all thy children, of every faith and belief, that together we may discover the ways of gentleness and be led into the paths of peace, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

God - the Three in One

This month we celebrate Trinity Sunday. The doctrine of the Trinity is one of the most important of the Christian faith, for it goes to the very heart of what God is like. The Bible is quite clear: there is one God, but He is revealed in three 'persons' – the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.



Have you ever wondered at what point in the Bible God is

revealed as being more than one person? Well, you don't have to read very far: only to Genesis 1:26, where God (Elohim – a plural noun) says: Let US make man in OUR image. (Gen. 1:26)

The Bible reveals a pattern: God the Father lives in heaven and has never been seen. God the Son became the incarnate Jesus Christ, who made known to us the Father, and God the Holy Spirit, who is unseen, has been sent to live within and to equip His people, the Church.

The Trinity is basic to our salvation – for these three persons in the one Godhead have combined to save us from our sins: it is the WILL of the Father, the saving WORK of the Son, and the indwelling WITNESS of the Holy Spirit. (John 14:16, 23-26).

Worcester Diocese Ordinations 2023

This year's ordinations will take place over the weekend of 1 and 2 July. Curates who have completed their first year of training will be ordained Priest on Saturday 1 July at 2pm. After their ordination, they will be able to preside at Holy Communion.

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Father's Day

Father's Day began because way back in 1909 there was a woman in Spokane, Washington, named Sonora Louise Smart Dodd. That year she heard a church sermon about the merits of setting aside a day to honour one's mother. Mother's Day was just beginning to gather widespread attention in the United States at this time. But Sonora knew that it was her father who had selflessly raised herself and her five siblings by himself after their mother had died in childbirth. This gave Sonora the idea to petition for a day to honour fathers, and in particular, her own father, William Jackson Smart. Eventually on 19 June 1910, the first Father's Day was celebrated in Spokane, USA

Gradually, other people in other cities caught on and started celebrating their fathers, too. The rose was selected as the official Father's Day flower. Some

people began to wear a white rose to honour a father who was dead, and a red one to honour a father who was living. Finally, in 1972, President Richard Nixon signed a presidential proclamation declaring the third Sunday of June as Father's Day – a permanent, national holiday.



Mission Opportunities at HMP Long Lartin

The Anglican Chaplain at HMP Long Lartin, the Revd Nick Scott, is looking for volunteers to work with him. Could you help?

HMP Long Lartin is a High Security Prison on the edge of the Diocese. Hundreds of men spend their days here, all of them in need of the love of God, but some more than others. After 24 years of ordained ministry, I find myself more blessed than ever to be given the opportunity to serve in this place.

I am seeking people to work with in this ministry, Christians who are willing and able to pray alongside some of those whose lives took a most terrible turn. Throughout my 14 months working here I have experienced great trust and respect from everyone at the prison, but there is no denying that some of the crimes committed by the prisoners are grievous.

We have a group called the "Sunday Friends". COVID sadly reduced its numbers down to four, so we are seeking new friends for this. All that is required is to come along to our Sunday morning worship once a month and be with the prisoners in prayer and fellowship.

For those who have experience of leading worship, lay or ordained, you could be vital in aiding in the delivery of services. Whatever your experience, if you're willing to support of lead occasionally you would be most welcome.

All people would need to go through a security check to enable access to the prison. Once here we are always well looked after by the excellent prison officers. Butterfly Awareness and Education Day – 3 June Where have all the butterflies gone? by Bob Peters

I have been fascinated by butterflies since my father gave me a small patch of ground at the bottom of our garden about 70 years ago. I could grow anything I liked, so the first thing was to plant some runners from a strawberry patch in the family fruit garden. We lived near Tiptree in Essex where there were acres and acres of strawberries, so the location was perfect.

It was while tending my tiny strawberry patch that I became interested in the visiting butterflies that would always seem to be there.

Then there was a fascinating collection of butterflies and moths we had. I can't remember where it came from, but as I was the only family member interested in it, so I claimed it as mine. They were displayed in several boxes with glass fronts. Each specimen had been carefully pinned and labelled with their Latin names which I spent hours unsuccessfully trying to decipher.

My favourite butterfly was a splendid Swallowtail and I always hoped that one day I would see one flying in my garden — there was a remote chance because at that time migrant Swallowtails were said to frequent East Anglia and my garden was only about 100 miles south of their habitat.



I never saw one flying wild until I went to the Mediterranean in my adult life.

A bout of Covid a couple of years ago left me without the energy to do much gardening until recently — this lack may have also been age related! However, this year I have been able to get out in the garden a little more and apart for an abundance of thistles, nettles and a variety of weeds, normality is slowly returning. The most striking thing that I have noticed is the lack of the butterflies that I usually like to stop and watch. I know that it is still early in the season, but by now there should be a good number flying around. I have spotted one lonely Brimstone, which is always the first to be seen every year, one Orange Tip, and one splendid Peacock.

So, where I wonder, have all the butterflies gone?

The best source of information on this subject that I have found is the latest 28-page report published by the UK charity, Butterfly Conservation. The report is called *The State of UK's Butterflies 2022* and it summaries the key findings as being a massive decline:

In the UK, long-term trends show that 80% of butterfly species have decreased in abundance or distribution, or both since the 1970s.

The Struggle

A man found a cocoon of a butterfly. He took it home so that he could watch it come out of the cocoon. On that day, a small opening appeared. He sat and watched for several hours as the butterfly struggled to force itself through that little hole.

Then it seemed to stop making any progress and appeared able to go no further. It just seemed stuck. So that man in his kindness decided to help. Taking a pair of scissors, he snipped off the remaining bit of the cocoon. The butterfly then emerged easily.

The man expected that at any moment, the shrivelled wings would enlarge and expand and the swollen body would contract and the creature would flutter by. It did not happen! In fact, the butterfly spent the rest of its life crawling around. It was never able to fly.

The man in his kindness and haste did not understand the restricting cocoon and the struggle required to get through the tiny opening were God's way of forcing fluid from the body of the butterfly into its wings, so that it would be ready for flight.

Sometimes, struggles are exactly what we need in our lives. If God allowed us to go through our lives without any obstacles, it would cripple us. We would not be as strong as we could have been. We could never fly!

Reflecting Faith Series: the Lectern 2

Why not have a good look at the lectern in your church, to see what is was made from and if it has a particular design.

There seem to be two distinct styles for lecterns, either a 'simple' plain book holder or one in the shape of a bird. Both styles are usually made from either wood or gilt metal (brass).

The bird is an eagle - often holding the world in its talons. The intention being that the eagle is known as the most powerful bird, which can fly the highest and longest without pausing and so can take the Word of God - the Bible that it holds - to all the places in the world.

There are 44 mentions of eagles in the Bible, but just two to include here:

In Exodus after the Israelites have left Egypt and crossed the Red Sea they camp in the wilderness, where they are not surprisingly worried about what will happen next. Shall we say 'there's a bit of grumbling and groaning' going on?

So God calls to Moses with words to encourage them, 'The Lord called to him from the mountain, saying, 'Thus you shall say to the house of Jacob, and tell the Israelites: You have seen what I did to the Egyptians, and how I bore you on eagles' wings and brought you to myself." (Ex 19: 3-5)

And the second is one to uplift us all when we are in need of support:

Isaiah in chapter 40 is trying to describe how awesome and powerful God is and concludes that even our youth will grow weary in comparison. However, 'those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint.' (Is 40: 30-31)

So perhaps as we hear the words of the Bible passage read to us from that symbolic figure we are reminded to both trust in the Lord and to gain inner strength.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH Roast Vegetable Frittata INGREDIENTS

- 1 red onion, cut into wedges
- 1 yellow pepper, deseeded and cut into thin slices
- 1 red pepper, deseeded and cut into thin slices
- 1 courgette, cut into inch-thick semi circles
- 2 sprigs of rosemary
- 1 sprig of thyme
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- 2 garlic cloves, thinly sliced
- 10 medium eggs
- 100 ml semi-skimmed milk
- 20 g parmesan, grated
- 5 g parsley, roughly chopped
- 2 x 160g bags Italian-style salad, to serve

METHOD

- Preheat the oven to 200°C/fan 180°C/gas mark 6.
- Line a 30cm x 20cm tin with baking paper, making sure it overlaps on the sides.
- Add the vegetables to the tin, season and toss with the rosemary, thyme and olive oil.
- Roast for 15 minutes. Add the garlic and roast for an additional 10 minutes.
 Remove from the oven, remove the herb stalks, and turn the oven down to 180°C/160°C fan/gas mark 4.
- Whisk the eggs together with the milk, parmesan, parsley and some seasoning, then pour the egg mixture over the vegetables.
- Bake for 30 minutes or until set and golden brown on top.
- Leave to cool slightly, then cut into squares and serve with the salad leaves.
